per cent. While living on and improving my land I taught some available schools, one of which was at Gomez the first settlement in Terry county. There I married my present wife who was my assistant teacher. We lived and started our large family in an eightby-ten "dug out", with a 12x12 box "shack". During this time I taught two years at Union, the only school then in this quarter of Lubbock county.

We thought we were having great hardships then, but I wish we could day. find opportunities like them to enjoy again.

Being a diversifier, I introduced cotton raising, so that we might have day. a money crop in addition to cows. But the "fool new commers" over did the cotton crop. Then I started sirup making and was popularly known from the Cap Rock to New Mexico as "Old Man Sorghem Lasses Florence." Then I started the first dairy business in cut-back brindles and specks, and selling butter and butter milk in Lubbock, only 13 miles away.

In those days there were many law suits over homesteads on account of uncertain bundaries and settlements them all. During that time, I wrote, Milliken. an attempt at a poem which pictures truly the troubles of a homesteader of those days. 



To date the five gins have turned out 10,000 bales.

he peak of the cotton crop was reached some two weeks ago. Most of the fields now present a brown and sear view, with here and there a field of scattering open cotton yet to be gathered. True, there is yet to be gathered the late crop planted after devastating hoil storms and swept through one of the richest agricultural sections of this area. It is believed, however, that even though this section has gathered the best cotton crop in several years the ginning season will close earlier than usual, due partly to the almost unbroken favorable weather this fall; and to the rush of unemployed to the cotton fields.
