Funeral Services For Dr. S. H. Adams

A large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends, both from Slaton and outside points, were in attendance upon the funeral service held Friday afternoon, October 14, for Dr. Sam H. Adams. The service was held from the family home, 255 S. 10th street.

The hundreds who came to pay their last tribute of love and esteem to the fallen man crowded every room of the spacious dwelling and overflowed into the yard and the street beyond.

The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Bickley, presiding elder of this district; and the local pastor of the Methodist church, Rev. Mr. Charles E. Fike. Both Ministers praised highly the Christian spirit, and works, of the deceased. Several scripture quotations were read, but the one forming the base of the funeral oration was: "Know ye not that a great man has fallen among you?"

In speaking of his demise following the funeral Mrs. Adams recalled that their 25th wedding anniversary was October 1st, 1932. "Also," she stated, "just the Sunday before his death we observed his birthday." An appropriate dinner and birthday cake was prepared at the family home, October 9th.

Dr. Adams has been a steward and trustee in the local Methodist church the greater part of the time since the church was organized. At the time of his death he was a steward of the church; a member of the County School Board; assistant county health officer; Santa Fe surgeon for the past 21 years; and for many years served as City Health Officer.

He was a great lover of his home and took especial pleasure in the family yard, one of the prettiest in Slaton. This home was built in 1915, and it is understood that it was his wish that the last rites over his body would be held from this home.

Besides the widow, and two daughters, Miss Josephine and Mrs. A. A. Corcanges, relatives who survive are: four sisters, Mrs. F. N. Denham, Lubbock; Mrs. George Smith, Crosbyton; Mrs. Henry Hollis, Floydada; all of whom attended the funeral service. One other sister, Mrs. J. K. Mathews, of Tatum, New Mexico, could not attend.

Relatives of Mrs. Adams—here for the service—were: Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Frye (sister); John Frye; W. B. Price, brother, and Mrs. Price and daughter, Elizabeth Ann, all of Lubbock. Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Corcanges, of Ft. Worth were accompanied by Theodore Corcanges, brother-in-law to Mrs. Frances Adams Corcanges. Other relatives present were Mrs. R. F. A profusion of gorgeous floral offerings banked about the casket, and overflowing all available space at the home spoke eloquently of loving tributes to his memory. These flowers were later banked about the mound in Englewood cemetery where interment was made.

A TRIBUTE

Sam Houston Adams was born near Lumpkin in Stewart County, Ga., October 9, 1874, and lived there until he was eleven years old. His first school was at Old Shady Grove School near his birth place. His first teacher being Miss Janie Ward. From early childhood he was a close observer, a lover of nature, and a studious pupil. He loved the woods with its flowers, birds, squirrels, and babbling brooks. He was always a peaceable, congenial child, however, he was strong in his conviction of a principal. He was fond of his play mates and friends and as long as he lived, loved to relate minor incidents of his childhood play and associates.

He was a favorite with relatives and friends, spoken of as a fine boy of promising worth and character.

In November 1885 he moved to Anderson County, Texas, with his parents. They did not remain there long and I do not recall anything of special interest there.

moved out further west, resided in Cisco for a time and near Cleburn in Johnson County for several months. Finally in the fall of 1886 the family settled down at Wyatt, in Ellis County, Texas. There it was that he again entered school. For six years they lived there on a farm. Houston worked and went to school when he could. That community proved to be a field of fine environments for growing children and Houston acquired much of real worth to his fine nature.

It was there at the county school house that he attended Church and Sunday School with an attendance record of which he was proud. Having never missed a Sunday. There under a brush arbor under the convincing pleading of Brother Davis, a Methodist Minister, he was converted to the Christian religion. With a mind and heart full of righteous traditions, a heritage handed down from a fine line of moral and Christian ancestors, with a true perspective of honor and truth he was a fine young man of seventeen years when his father, who possess the virtue of a hearty pioneer spirit, moved to Floyd County, near Floydada, in 1892.

The Adams' endured several years of privation and hardships attendant to pioneer life. Houston was brave, energetic, and persistent. It seemed for a time that his education was finished, but as he worked and helped his father to provide the necessities for the home and family, he studied some too.

A country school was opened after a year. He went when he could and kept up his interest in his books. In 1895 he took examination for a teacher's certificate, at Floydada and was elected to teach the Lakeview school District 11 in Floyd County. He taught and studied for ten years. He taught five years in his home school of Lakeview, and at Mayview and Sandhill in Floyd County. He taught in Matador for two years and at Tulla.

He began his study of Medicine at Louisville, Kentucky, in the spring of 1904. He continued his course there and was graduated as Dr. of Medicine in May 1909.

He was very happily married to Miss Julia Price of Hale Center, Hale County, Texas, on October 1, 1907. Two sweet girls, Frances and Josephine were born to them.

After finishing his medicine he came to Lubbock, where he practiced medicine for two years. He then moved to Slaton, a baby town, and took up his profession. He became the Santa Fe physician and has served in that capacity until his death. I need not comment on his work and life in Slaton as it is too well known.

He was the idol of his father and mother, and adored by four sisters who are heartbroken at his going. In his home he was the head of his house and loved and respected by his devoted wife and daughters to whom he was devoted and true.

Slaton Citizens Back Move To Curb Criminals

Headed by Sheriff-elect Tom Abel, and Mayor George, a delegation of Slaton business men attended the called mass meeting at Lubbock, Tuesday night, when strong resolutions designed to curb the criminal was passed by vote of the large assembly of both men and women.

The resolution follows: "Resolved that it is the sense of this meeting that a committee be appointed here and now by the presiding officer to solicit subscriptions to a fund, to be used for the following purpose: To pay a reward of \$500 for information resulting in the arrest and final conviction of the slayer of Robert Tharp; and To pay a reward of \$500 for information resulting in the arrest and conviction of each person who shall, in Lubbock County, during the twelve months next after this date, kill or wound any person while engaged in the commission of robbery or while attempting to escape therefrom.

"It was a rousing meeting" Sheriff-elect Abel said in speaking of the mass meeting which was held at the First Baptist church in Lubbock. Mayor George said, "We just wanted to let Lubbock county citizens know we are back of any move to 'curb the criminal'."


