PROPOSED CLOSING IS PROTESTED

Wilson Depot Manager At Post For 33 Years

If this month, February, 1965, had 29 days in it, J.F. Covey could say he had been at the Wilson Santa Fe depot for 33 years. But since it only has 28 in it, you count it up. Any way you count it, it is still

a long time to stay in one place with one job. Mr. Covey said when he and his wife came to Wilson, he told her "we'll just stay here a little while." That was back in 1932 in the depression days when there

was no choice of jobs. He took what he was lucky enough to get. But when the time came that he could have left Wilson, his choice was to stay. At a hearing in Tahoka last Thursday over whether to close the Wilson depot, 14 Wilson residents represented the town in protesting its removal. The hearing was primarily held to give the people of Wilson a chance to protest and was held in the Lynn County Courthouse. The Railroad Commission will study the matter for 60 days to six months and then will make their ruling from the evidence.

Should the depot be closed there, it will also close the Western Union telegram service there, as Mr. Covey also tends to that. Whether the depot closes or not, the Coveys are making their plans of retiring. He has 41 years continuous service with Santa Fe. They have looked ahead and have already purchased some property in Ruidosa, N.M., to build a home on when they decide to retire. He said they had been going to Ruidosa for 35 years, and consider it a very friendly town. He enjoys trout fishing. With a free train ride available (See WILSON DEPOT, Page 9)

Belcher of Clyde, Mrs. J.H. Thomas of Roosevelt, Mrs. R.D. Hopper and Mrs. Mike Haddock of Slaton, and Mrs. Harlan Hatgrove of Lubbock, 35 grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. New Printing Plant To Serve Area Papers

Organization of a new printing corporation in this area was announced this week by Slatonite Publisher C.G. Nieman, one of the principal stockholders. The printing plant for the new corporation, Blanco Offset Printing, Inc., will be located in Floydada and will open for business about April 1, 1965. Basically the corporation will be in the business of printing area newspapers by the offset method and similar custom printing. The Slatonite is already using the offset method, with the paper currently being printed in Friona. A similar "central printing" plant is located at Hereford. The business will begin printing the following papers as soon as equipment is ready to go: Slaton Slatonite, Crosbyton Review, Floyd County Hesperian and Lockney Beacon. A new Goss offset press has been purchased for delivery April 1, and other facilitating equipment has also been purchased. The plant will be able to print color advertisements and features. Stockholders of the new corporation are: Nieman of Slaton, Wendell Tooley and John Edd Blessing of Floydada, Hubert Curry and Wayne Dodson of Crosbyton; and Edgar Hays, Willis Reynolds and Jim Reynolds, all of Lockney.

Heart Sunday Drive To Be Conducted Here

The 1965 Heart Fund drive will reach a high point this weekend when the Heart Sunday army, composed of local volunteers, will carry the fight against the heart diseases to the front door of every family in this community. Mrs. George Privett, Heart Sunday chairman explained that each volunteer will be wearing a Heart badge with their names on it when they call at the homes to receive gifts for the Heart Fund and to distribute a pamphlet giving valuable information on reducing the risks of Heart attack. Mrs. Privett announced that residential visits will begin at 2:00 and will be completed by 5:00. Those who are not at home when the Heart volunteer calls are asked to mail their gifts to the Heart Fund in the pre-addressed envelope that will be left at the door. The Heart Sunday observance marks the high point in the Slaton Heart Association's annual campaign. Proceeds from this drive will be used to fight diseases of the heart and blood vessels --locally, in this state and nationally. These diseases are responsible for more than 54% of all deaths.

White's Under New Manager

White's Auto Store will remain in Slaton, it was revealed this week with the announcement that W.T. (Bill) Cirono of Lubbock will assume operation and management of the store. Cirono announced acquisition of the franchise Monday from the Poyner Brothers, former owners and operators. Remodeling and complete restocking of the store began this week, and Cirono said a "formal opening" would be held in the near future. The White Auto Store will remain in the same location, and it will be open for business prior to the formal opening. Cirono, a veteran insurance agent and office manager, will move his family to Slaton as soon as housing is obtained. His wife, a former school teacher, will probably help in the business. They have two sons--Bill, 15, and James, 13, both attending Christ the King High School in Lubbock. A native of New Jersey Cirono was manager of Washington National's office in Phoenix ARIZ., for 18 years. He was state manager for the Great Commonwealth Insurance Co. in Lubbock the past two years. Cirono stated that he was "looking forward to the challenge of the new business and meeting new friends." He added that he was tired of a "traveling job" and had been searching for an opportunity such as the one here. "I believe Slaton has a bright future, and I want to be a part of it," the new manager said. He lists his favorite pastimes as playing golf, hunting and fishing. Bobby Poyner, manager of the White store and here since its opening more than five years ago, announced that he will continue to live in Slaton for an indefinite period. A former Church of Christ minister, Poyner is starting a series of evangelistic appearances in the area. He plans to continue this work at least until the end of the year.

GROUP GOING TO CAPITOL

Ten area farmers and businessmen will go to Washington, D.C. next week, carrying an appeal for a restoration of a one-cent cut in cotton parity prices, it was announced Tuesday by Jimmy Davis of Acuff, vice chairman of a protest group which recently met at Roosevelt.

Davis and Joe B. Tate will represent Lubbock County in the Washington meeting with Vice President Hubert Humphrey, Congressman George Mahon and several ranking agricultural officials.

The meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. next Thursday. Davis pointed out that the \$5 per bale cut planned in 1965 would mean a loss of \$1,193,413 in Lubbock County alone. Over the 20-county area covered by extension district 2, the loss in farm income would total \$9.5 million, Davis added. "This is the most serious situation we've ever been faced with on the farm front," declared Davis. He appealed for interested businessmen to address letters to the Vice President, listing facts as to how the cut would affect them. Send the letters to Davis, Rt. 1, Lorenzo, and he will take them to Washington with him. Davis said all the group would be attempting to accomplish on this trip would be to restore the one-cent parity cut.

About 100 farmers representing about six area counties attended a meeting protesting price reductions of cotton supports in the Roosevelt High School Auditorium last Thursday night.

Participants approved a resolution requesting a reprieve on the one-cent price reduction for 1965 and reconsideration of the 2 1/2 cent slice of 1964.

H.M. Baggerly, Tulsa newsman, spoke on "Philosophy of Farm Programs" and his talk was followed by a panel discussion and question-answer period.

Mayor Cain, Bollinger File For Reelection

The political pot began to simmer a little in Slaton this week with the announcement that two candidates have filed for city posts. Mayor Jonas Cain and Commissioner Henry Bollinger both filed for reelection, according to information from the city secretary's office.

Cain will be seeking his second term as mayor of the city, and Bollinger also seeks a second term as commissioner of Ward 3. Terms of office are two years. The terms of the mayor and commissioners of Wards 1 and 3 expire this year, Clark Self Jr. is the incumbent in Ward 1. Deadline for filing at the city secretary's office is March 6.

The city election comes up April 6. Slaton school trustee election is set for April 3. Two terms expire on the school board and no filings were reported as of Wednesday. Deadline for candidates is March 3.

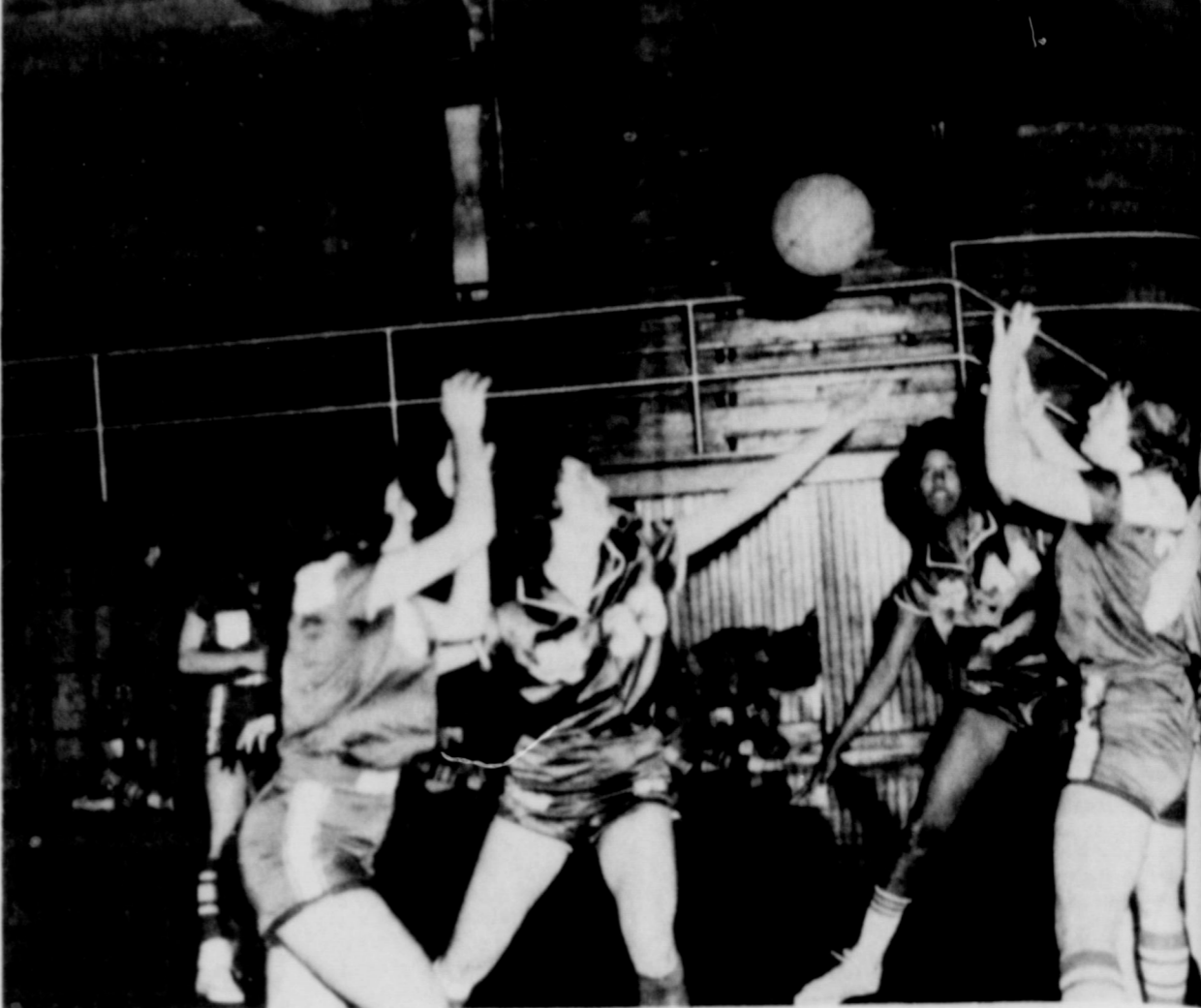

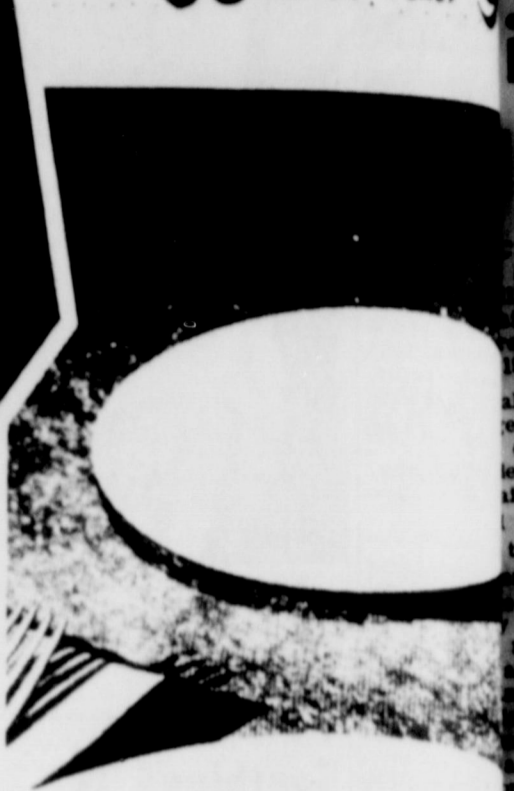
