Heart Attack Claims Life Of Promonite Slaton Doctor John C. Locke Here Thursday January 30

Dr. John C. Locke, 39 a Slaton physician since 1956, died of a heart attack about 9:30 a. m. Thursday after making his rounds at Mercy Hospital.

Services were held at 2:00 p. m. Saturday in the First Baptist Church with the Rev. John Floyd of the First Christian Church officiating, assisted by the Rev. Fred Ryle, minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Monohans.

He graduated from Austin High School, Austin, and served with the Third Army in the European Theater in World War II. Dr. Locke received his BA and MA degrees from the University of Texas and his Doctor of Medicine degree from the University's medical school in Galveston.

Internship was served at Kings Daughters Hospital in Temple. Dr. Locke was a member of

the Mu Delta Honorary Medical Service Society, the AED honorary pre-med society and Phi Chi medical fraternity at the University of Texas.

He was also a past vice president of the Lubbock-Crosby-Garza Medical Assn. and a member of the Khiva Temple Amarrillo.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Cindy, 8, and Melissa, 6, a son John C. Jr., of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will H. Locke, San Antonio; a brother, Bruce, El Paso; and two sisters, Mrs. Wallace Langston, Dallas; and Mrs. A. T. Thompson, Carlisle Barracks, Penn.

Around The FIRE HOUSE

The Slaton Volunteer Fire Department met Monday night February 3, in the usual business meeting. There was some discussion of the booster unit recently purchased by the Chamber of Commerce as to its arrival and also of the prospective unit on which bids are being obtained for purchase by the City.

Fires were scarce during the past week as falling moisture quelled grass fire calls. One call however made Monday night to the 900 block of South 17th Street. A cooking unit overheated and smoked the residence at that address. Damage was light.

Do you always turn out portable oil or gas heaters when you go to bed?

Since gas and oil heaters use up oxygen as they burn, do you always keep a door or window slightly open in any room where such a heater is being used?

Do you see that any portable heater is placed well away from curtains, bedding, furniture and other combustible materials?

If you have a fireplace, is it equipped with a sturdy metal screen?

These are a few items which you might check on your list of Fire Prevention Helps as prime targets for fires. These plus others not in this print are causes of most fires throughout the nation, as tabulated by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Won't you help?

Missionary From India Speaker For Local Presbyterian Women

"India is a country of many contrasts," said Miss Mildred Hoffmeister, missionary, when she spoke Monday to the Women of the First Presbyterian Church at a luncheon in the Hospitality Room of Bruce's Cafe.

There is wealth and extreme poverty; jungles, mountains and deserts; the villages of India number 800,000 with few large cities, Calcutta ranking third largest in the world. The streets are filled with automobiles, bicycles, carts and people of buffalo while jet planes zoom overhead.

Miss Hoffmeister, who has spent thirty-three years in India, is administrator of a primary school in Ladhaina. "We teach in our languages," she said. Enrollment in the school is 825 with students ranging in age from 4 to 12 years. All different religions are represented, with about one-third from Christian homes. Other major religions are Hinduism, Buddhism and Moslem.

Because of wide spread poverty few village congregations have any kind of a church building so they worship outdoors.

In displaying the flag of India, Miss Hoffmeister pointed out the orange stripe across the top denoted bravery; the middle stripe

of white is for purity; and the green across the bottom is for vegetation.

Among many articles of interest which she displayed, including some beautiful jewelry, were copies of the New Testament in Urdu and Hindi.

Home on leave, Miss Hoffmeister told that Presbyterian missionary work in India dates back to 1834.

Places were laid for eighteen at the horseshoe-shaped table. An arrangement of large palm leaves and colorful fruit was accented with a length of Indian silk.

Texas Rural Families Receive 74 1/2 Million In Loans In 1963

The U. S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration made or insured \$74 1/2 million in loans to Texas farm and other rural families, during 1963, L. P. Cappelman, state director of the agency announced in Temple today.

A total of 11,977 families used one or more of the agency's loan programs during the year.

Farm Home Administration operates a broad program of supplementary credit for rural development in Texas.

The agency makes loans for family farming operations, farm development, rural housing, community water systems, soil and water conservation and development, recreation enterprises, and other purposes.

Loans are made only to borrowers who cannot obtain credit from banks, Production Credit Associations, and other conventional lenders.

Mr. Cappelman reported that in 1963 Farmers Home Administration supervised loan programs had two major results of importance to the economy of the state.

"Loans to family farmers enabled them to make a major contribution to the well being and progress of the state's

agriculture during 1963," he said.

"Texans can be proud to be represented by a man of Representative Parsley's caliber," Tunnell added. "His astute judgement and quick understanding should insure excellent representation for Texas."

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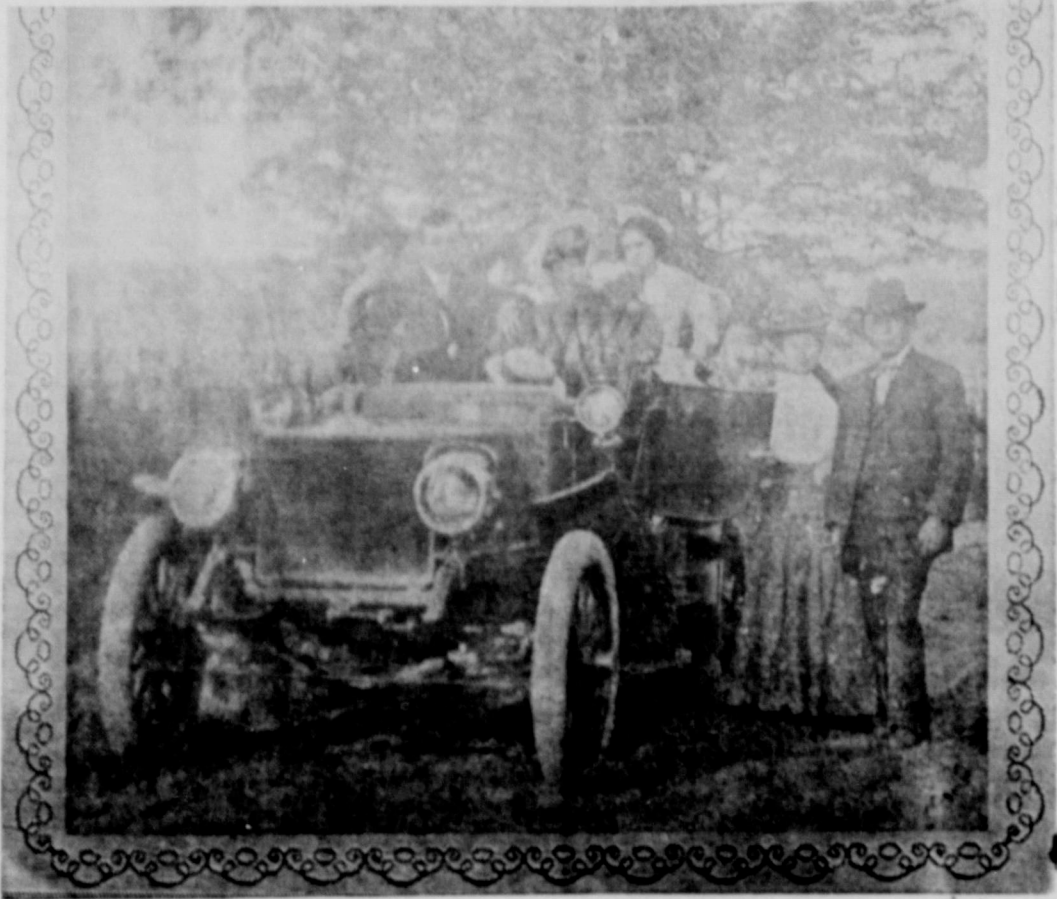

Texas First Traffic Law



A PICTURE OF A PICTURE

Little did this group of Sunday drivers realize they were making history one day 96 years ago when they stopped to have their picture taken. But today the original photograph, in the form of a glass plate, is kept on display at the Dallas Historical Society Museum as the first automobile to be licensed in Dallas County. Marvin Bradshaw, Right of Way Agent at Dallas in District 18 of the Texas Highway Department,

PASSED BY 30TH LEGISLATURE, 1907

AUTOMOBILES — REGULATING RUNNING OF SAME.
H. B. No. 93. Chapter XCVI.

An Act to regulate the running of automobiles and motor vehicles, and the requiring of the owner of such machine to register his name and the number of his machine with the county clerk of the county in which he resides, for the violation of which a penalty is provided.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas: All owners of automobiles or motor vehicles shall before using such vehicles or machine upon the public road, streets

or driveways, register with the county clerk of the county in which he resides, his name, which name shall be registered by the county clerk in consecutive order in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall be numbered in the order of their registration, and it shall be the duty of such owner or owners to display in a conspicuous place on said machine the number so registered which number shall be in figures not less than six inches in height. The county clerk shall be paid by such owner or owners a fee of fifty cents for each machine register ed.

Sec. 2. No automobile or motor vehicle shall be driven or operated upon any public road, street or driveway at a greater rate of speed than eighteen miles an hour, or upon any public road, street or driveway with the built up portions of any city,

town or village, the limits of which shall be fixed by the municipal officers thereof, at a greater rate of speed than eight miles an hour, except where such city or town may by an ordinance or by-law allow a greater rate of speed, provided the speed limit shall not apply to race courses or speedways.

Sec. 3. No person in charge of an automobile or motor vehicle on any public road, street or driveway shall drive the same at any speed greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard to the traffic and use of the public road, street or driveway by others, or so as to endanger the life or limb of any person thereon.

Sec. 4. All drivers or operators of automobiles or motor vehicles are prohibited from racing upon any public road, street or driveway.

Sec. 5. Any person driving or operating an automobile or motor vehicle shall at the request, or signal by putting up the hand, or by other visible signal from a person riding or driving a horse or horses or other domestic animal, cause such vehicle or machine to come to a standstill as quickly as possible and remain stationary long enough to allow such animal to pass.

Sec. 6. Every driver or operator of an automobile or motor vehicle shall have attached thereto a suitable bell or other appliances for giving notice of its approach, so that when such attachment is rung or otherwise operated it may be heard a distance of three hundred feet, and shall carry a lighted lamp between one hour after and one hour before sunrise.

Sec. 7. Every one who violates any of the provisions of this act shall be punished by a fine of not less than five and not more than one hundred dollars.

Sec. 8. The near approach of the end of the session has created a demand for immediate legislation on this subject, and in view of an imperative public necessity that the commission on this subject be read in each house of the Legislature three several days be suspended, and this act shall take effect after its passage, and it is so enacted.

Approved April 15, 1907.
Take effect ninety days after adjournment.

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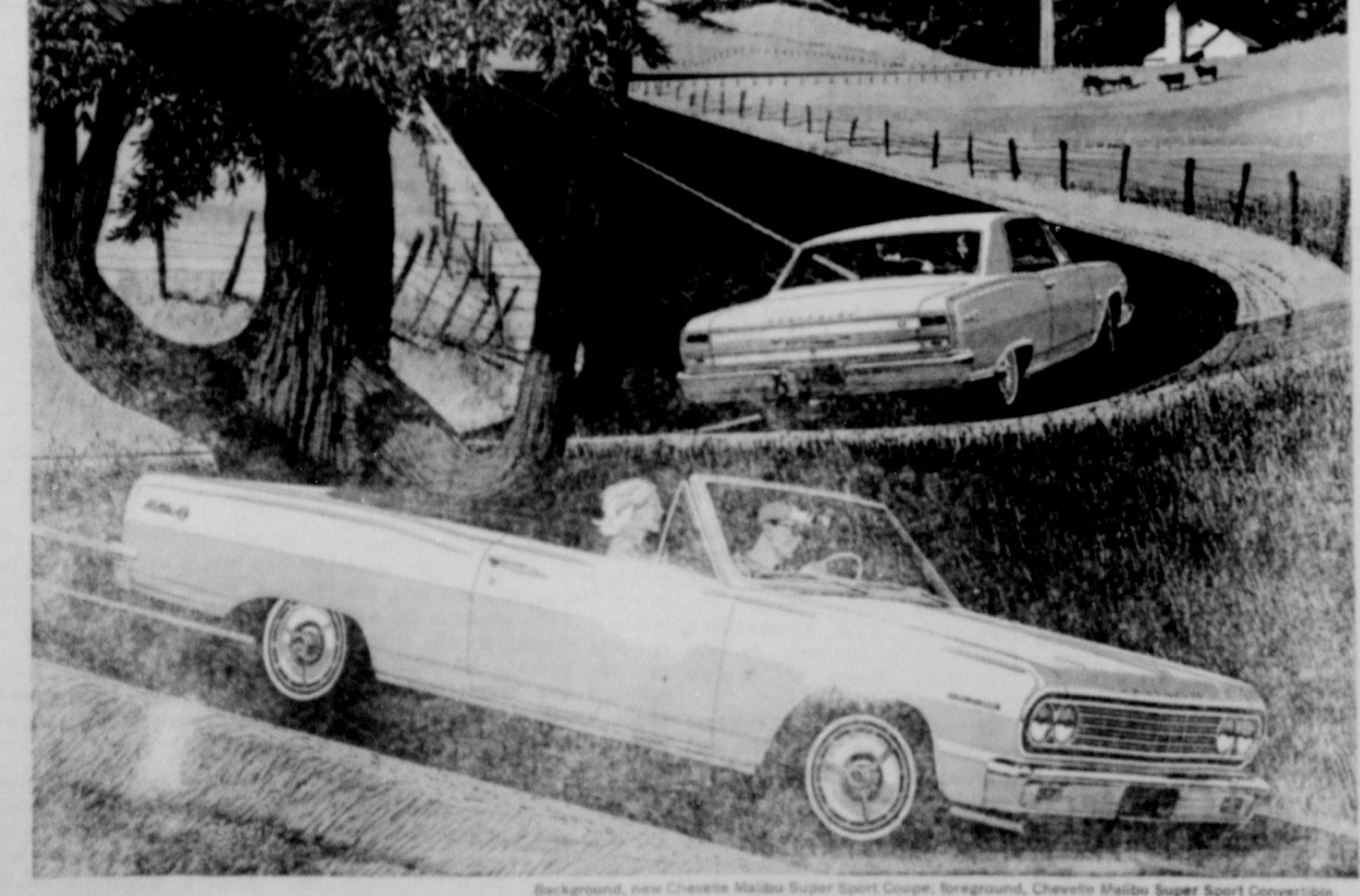

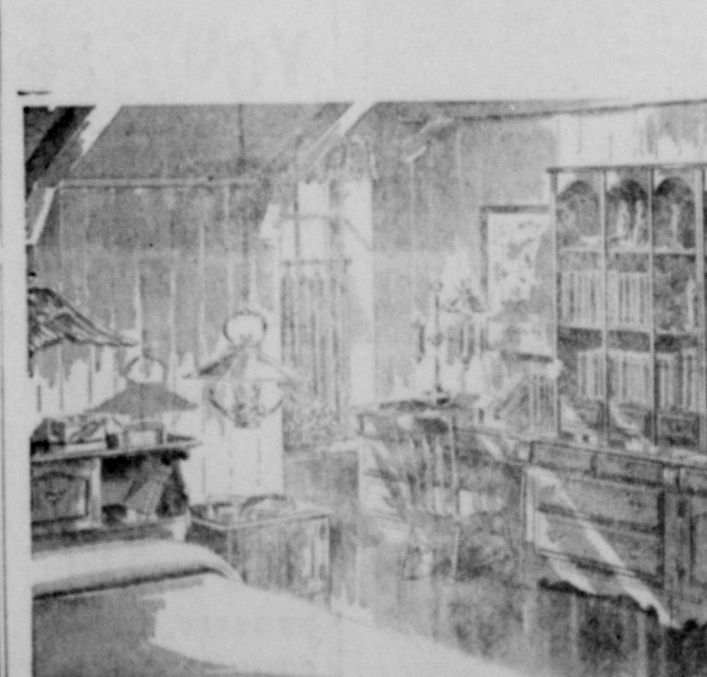
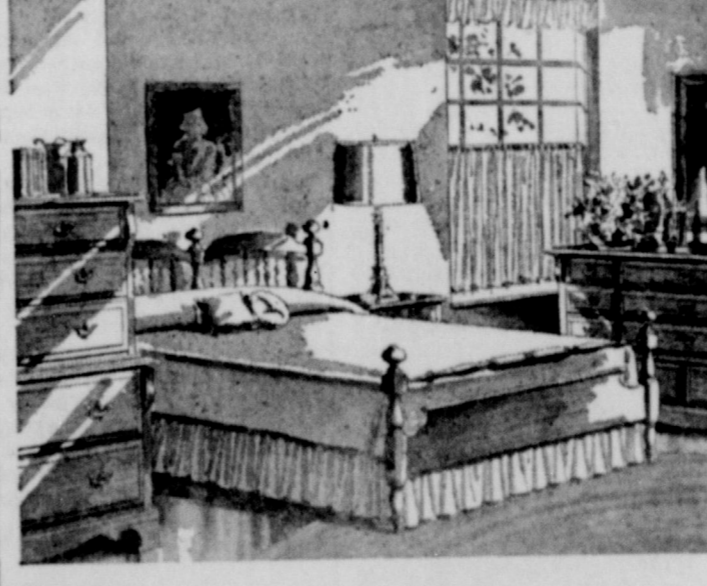

Pember Is SHS Citizen Of Month



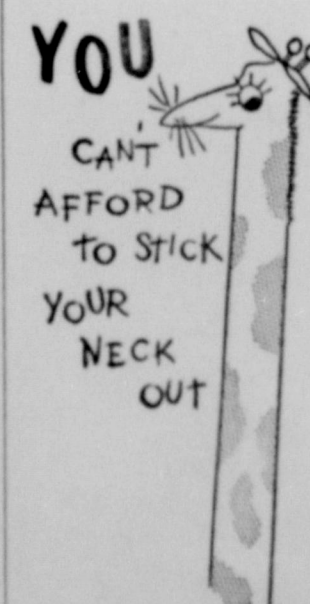

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Tex. — Capitol talk is around Texas' new standard for voter qualification. A lot of speculation concern in political circles by South Dakota into effect a Federal amendment abolishing poll tax as a requirement in future federal elections. Those who want to vote locally, as well as officials, still must have receipts or appropriate signatures.

Those who are content to be president, vice president and congressmen, won't have to pay. They must get a free receipt from their tax collector.

Registration for federal elections after the U. S. Services Administrator that the amendment is part of the federal constitution. Laws will be allowed for the amendment effect to obtain the receipts stamped "poll tax." These "tickets" to vote in federal elections after this year, they obtained during the 30-day period of October 31.

Experts think the state d in anticipation of the amendment's ratification e of most emergencies prevent chaos, if not

confusion. Detailed instructions soon will be sent to county tax collectors by Secretary of State Crawford Martin.

Gov. John Connally, meanwhile, warned Texans that failure to pay the poll tax commits them to "only half a vote in the 1964 elections." Connally joined groups on all sides of the political fences in the final week's campaign to pump up lagging payments.

CONGRESSIONAL RACES UNDISTURBED — Governor Connally anticipates no disruption in congressional district races this year, since the U. S. Supreme Court recessed until February 17 without taking action on pending redistricting cases.

Filing deadline for Texas primaries is February 3. Connally and other state officials do not think the high court will interfere with election machinery already in progress.

Last October a Houston federal court held Texas congressional district boundaries unconstitutional since they are not based on equal population.

Republicans brought the suit seeking to recarve the district in the interest of metropolitan areas. The Houston decision, which has since been stayed pending the state's appeal, ordered all 23 congressmen to run statewide unless the districts are equalized on the basis of population.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED — Former Secretary of State Tom Reavely of Austin was named by Governor Connally as judge of the newly-created 167th district court of Travis County which goes into operation on June 1.

Among other recent appointments by the governor are: Dr. John J. McKetta Jr., dean of the University of Texas College of Engineering, to serve on the Southern Interstate Nuclear Board.

Judge Victor H. Lindsey, 72nd District Court, Lubbock, as presiding judge for the Ninth Administrative District, to succeed the late Judge Luther Gribble of

Childress. C. E. Knolle, Jim Wells County dairyman, as chairman of the Texas Animal Health Commission, succeeding Clayton Puckett of Fort Stockton who remains on the commission.

John M. Stemmons of Dallas, appointed as a director of the Dallas County Flood Control District.

INVESTIGATION CONTINUING — A half dozen state investigators are looking into activities of Corpus Christi promoter Paul Sandblom, who is charged with dealing in unregistered securities.

Additional charges may be filed against the South Texas financier, according to State Securities Commissioner William King. He has four agents combing the tangled financial affairs of Sandblom, 39. And the state auditor has assigned two more investigators.

A court-appointed receiver of the bankrupt promoter's estate estimates he took in over \$25,000,000, but now has assets of only \$27,000.

TEXAS COURTS — Court of Criminal Appeals has ordered new trials for two men who had served a total of 43 years in Texas prisons.

Decision was in line with a recent Supreme Court ruling that all indigent persons accused of crimes are entitled to court-appointed counsel. Texas law has required designation of such counsel only in capital cases. Several similar appeals already are before court here.

State Supreme Court heard arguments as to whether the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission can prevent use of nets and seines in Galveston, Trinity, East and West Bays, in view of a 1957 law apparently permitting use of trammel nets there.

Lower courts have held for fishermen opposing a 1949 commission order against netting.

Supreme Court also agreed to permit a coastal hospital district to request clarification of a state constitutional amendment authorizing such districts to be created by statute. Sweeney Hospital District wants to determine if citizens voting on district bonds have to render personal property for taxation.

The contempt of legislature cases growing out of investigation of Southwest Conference basketball point-fixing allegations and another arising from slant hole oil probes were postponed by an Austin district until March.

Texas Civil Judicial Council reported that about two-thirds of the nearly 200 State district judges in Texas receive salary supplements from County governments in addition to their \$12,000 annual pay from the state.

Supplements range from \$600 a year in some rural areas to \$3,000 in Harris County, where district judges make \$20,000 a year.

WATER HEARING PUT OFF — Hearings on four Brazos River watershed reservoir proposals have been delayed by Texas Water Commission until March 23 to await additional engineering studies.

Projects are: Proctor Reservoir on the Leon River near Comanche; Belton Reservoir on the Leon River in Bell County; Stillhouse Hollow Reservoir on the Lampasas River in Bell County; and Somerville Reser-

Walker; Supreme Court Associate Robert W. Hamilton; and Court of Criminal Appeals Presiding Judge K. K. Woodley.

Also: Democrat John Van Cronkhite and Republican George Bush, Dr. Milton Davis and Dr. Robert Morris, all of whom want to dethrone U. S. Sen.

Ralph Yarbrough who preferred to file late for re-election. Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is another who chose to put off announcing his re-election plans until near deadline.

Home Administration to its borrowers helped them develop and enlarge their farms, operate more efficiently, and build a sound farming business.

"In addition, Farmers Home Administration loan services for the broader rural community resulted in new homes and better rural neighborhoods in many parts of the state. These services of Farmers Home Administration were expanded in 1963. We believe they will continue to grow in line with increased emphasis of national and state leaders on rural and area development programs," Mr. Cappelman said.

Mr. Cappelman gave the following breakdown of FHA's loan programs in Texas in 1963. A total of \$35,000,000 went to 6,755 Texas farmers to pay for equipment, feed, seed, livestock for other farm and home operating needs, and to refinance cattle debts, carry out forestry purposes, and develop income-producing recreational enterprises.

Farm ownership loans totaling about \$10,000,000 were used by 436 farmers to enlarge, develop, and buy farms not larger than family size, and to refinance debts, carry out forestry purposes and develop income-producing recreational enterprises.

Emergency loans amounting to an estimated \$18,000,000 were made to 3,785 farmers to assist in maintaining normal farming operations following the various emergencies in different sections of Texas such as drought, excessive rains, storms or tornados.

insect damage, etc. Rural housing loans estimated at \$6,000,000 were made to 671 farmers and other rural residents.

Water development and soil conservation loans totaled an estimated \$5,300,000. Most of these funds were used to install 36 rural community water systems. These systems with 3,506 connections enabled some 14,000 people to have good water that would pass Texas Health Department requirements.

In addition to the state office in Temple, Farmers Home Administration has 136 local offices serving all counties in Texas.
