Graham cracker crust

Mix graham cracker crust according to directions. Place in pie tin. Drain cherries and pour into crust. Mix other ingredients and pour over cherries. Take fork and lift up some of the cherries. Sprinkle with pecans. Chill in refrigerator several hours.

2 oranges
2 large bananas
1 no. 2 can fruit cocktail

Slaton S&L To Hold Open House

B.B. Castleberry, executive vice-president, announced today that the general public is invited to attend open house and view the newly redecorated office and remodeled building. Citizens may register for six gifts that will be given away. The drawing will be held May 11. You do not have to be a depositor or a borrower to register for these prizes, nor do you have to be present to win. The financial institution recently completed extensive interior and exterior decorating and remodeling. The savings and loan building has taken on a colonial look after being painted white and trimmed with green shutters. New carpet, interior lighting, and other renovations

provide a new look inside. Slaton Savings and Loan Association has occupied the former bank building since 1958. The building was purchased from Citizens State Bank in 1963. Other improvements have been added prior to this time, including an elaborate directors room, which is also used by community and civic groups for their committee meetings. The Slaton Savings and Loan recently marked its sixth anniversary and Castleberry announced this week that over \$700,000 in dividends have been paid to depositors since the opening for business Dec. 2, 1958. The Association was chartered with \$100,000 capital and \$25,000 surplus. The institu-

tion has grown to a total of more than 5.3 million dollars in assets. It is a stock association with some 50 stockholders. Magic in the Jury Box

To bring out the liar in man's nature, few situations can compare with a call to jury duty.

"I can't serve because my wife is sick and I have to take care of the children," said a man who had no wife and no children.

"Sorry, but I'm practically deaf," said a man who had no trouble at all hearing a quiet footstep behind him.

"I just can't afford the loss of pay," said a man whose company paid full wages to any employee serving on a jury.

Such reluctance to serve on juries is common. But it is common only among those who have never tried it. According to a recent survey, no less than 94% of those who have served once want to serve again. Exposed to the experience, people by the thousands change their minds.

What magic in the jury box causes this transformation?

No doubt part of the magic is simply an easing of fears of the unknown. The procedure turns out to be not that complicated, the responsibility not that frightening, the law not that mysterious.

But, besides the negative magic

of relief, there is a positive magic of participation. Each individual



juror, like each person in a New England town meeting, plays a direct and vital role in a basic process of government.

It is true that jury duty service can be demanding. Within the jury room, in most cases, the first ballot is not unanimous. As the debate goes on, passions may ignite, voices rise, even tears fall.

But in what worthier, more satisfying cause could that effort be spent? Here is pure public service, untainted by financial reward or political ambition. Here are 12 fellow citizens, brought together in one brief encounter for but a single purpose: to do the work of justice.

There is another plus to jury duty, not always spelled out in the citizenship books. You become an "insider," with all sorts of fascinating information about the workings of the courts.

Signed by the state commissioner of health and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewerage Works Association, the certificate of competency is intended as visual evidence of skill in modern utility plant management and an understanding of the work's importance to community health.

Before a plant operator is certified, he must show proof of actual work experience and a record of satisfactory attendance at special schools at which the principles of utility plant management are taught. The schools are held under auspices of the state health agency, Texas A and M University, and the Texas Water and Sewerage Works Association.

Many operators attend the schools on their own time and at their own expense to prepare themselves to take a written examination which they must pass before they can be certified.

The Slatonite recently acquired a new rural correspondent from the Posey community and after being in and out of the hospital lately, she hopes to have a column every week. The new correspondent we are very proud of is Mrs. Anna B. Gentry.

I made a visit out to her home last Thursday to meet her, and found a very friendly, happy, gracious lady. I could tell by talking to her over the phone that she loves people, but I was glad to have the opportunity to meet her in person.

Mrs. Gentry spends most of her time in a wheel chair, and manages to do nearly all of her own work. She does her work by choice, because she says she likes to stay busy and especially enjoys helping others. The only thing she doesn't attempt to do is her ironing, and a girl comes in a half-day each week to iron for her and to do other odd jobs.

She not only keeps her home in order but does yardwork, too. She says anywhere the wheel chair will go, she can

work. She enjoys the yardwork and raising pot plants. She does all her own cooking and keeps her freezer full.

You might wonder why I was so impressed by Mrs. Gentry doing so much of her own work, but it's easy to understand once you're acquainted with Mrs. Gentry. For someone to do all the things she does after such an ordeal of bad health, I think it is just wonderful.

Mrs. Gentry has been in a wheel chair for four years. She had been treated for arthritis for 20 years, but until she entered John Sealy Hospital and underwent surgery for a growth on her back, she had never found relief.

She thinks she owes her life to that doctor and to God. She said she just put her life in the hands of the Lord, and "everything worked out for the best". Just recently, she underwent other surgery at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, but is now back doing her work again.

Mrs. Gentry moved to the Reiger Place near Slaton with her parents in 1920, married Samuel Gentry in 1921 and they

raised six children. Mr. Gentry died in July of 1956, since that time, Mrs. Gentry has spent most of the years living alone in her home northeast of Slaton.

Mrs. Gentry is very proud of her six children and 15 grandchildren. In her living room are pictures of them for her enjoyment. Her children are: from Lubbock, C.S. Gentry and four children, Mrs. Ray Johnson and one daughter; Mrs. Bill Karon and one son, and Mrs. Bobby Swann and two children; from Slaton, Mrs. Everett Mangum and four boys, and Guy Gentry and three girls who live on Rt. 1, Slaton.

Mrs. Gentry expressed her appreciation to the residents in the Posey Community for letting her print the news, and hopes they will cooperate with her even more as time goes on.

Slaton was the only school in the area to qualify a team in each of the five contests to be conducted at the State Future Farmers of America meet at College Station Saturday, Monday High of Lubbock qualified three teams.

Besides the district and area

contests held at Lubbock, Tech sponsored a contest for teams from areas 1, 2 and 4.

Here's how the Slaton teams placed: Livestock judging--second in overall contests, first in area and district, Bobby Joe Harlan was ninth high individual out of 450 team members.

Poultry--Fifth in area, third in district; Roy Childress was 10th high individual overall. Dairy Cattle--10th overall, 4th in area, 3rd in district; also 2nd overall in Holstein judging.

Meats--10th overall, 3rd in area and in district. Dairy Products--9th overall, 4th in area, 3rd in district. Land judging--2nd overall, 2nd in district (no area contest). Byron Henderson was 4th, Bernard Wall 6th and Richard Cooper 8th high individuals in land judging. Cotton classing--5th overall, 2nd in area, 2nd in district. Tommy Biggs was 9th high individual.

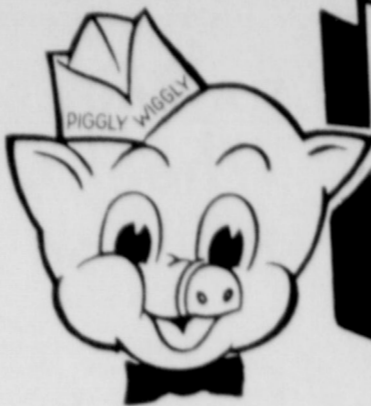

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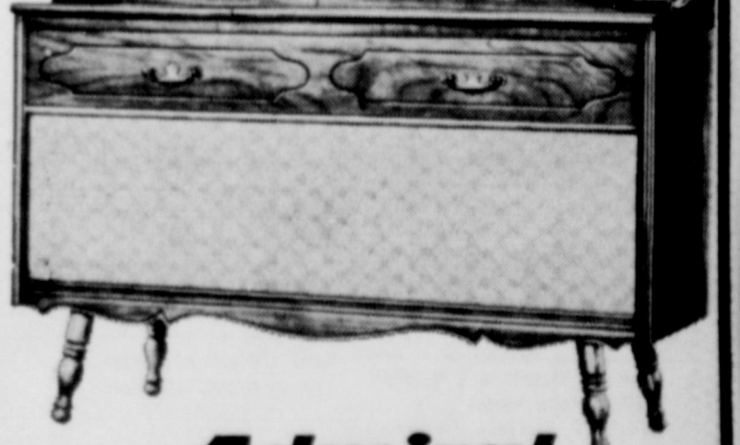
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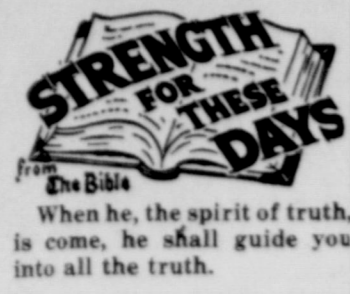

Armed Forces Day Exhibits At Reese AFB

A 12-foot model of the Titan II Intercontinental Ballistic Missile will be at Reese Air Force Base for the Armed Forces Day observance May 8. The Titan II model from Sheppard AFB, together with other Army, Navy and Air Force Missile and rocket models, will be on display.

The United States Air Force Titan II, a two-stage ICBM, has a range of over 63,000 miles and a speed of over 15,000 miles per hour. It was selected as the booster for the two-man Gemini space capsule, Molly Brown, that circled the globe late last month.

The actual missile is 102 feet in height and weighs 150 tons. The inertial guidance system is invulnerable to jamming and provides the ability of launching the Titan II force in space after another or several Titan II force in space. This second generation Titan can be launched from installations as well as launching pads.

In addition, there will be a display of air-to-air and air-to-ground missiles on display. Everyone in the Slaton area is invited to visit the area on May 8, and view the bits demonstrating the Air Force's "Power for Peace."

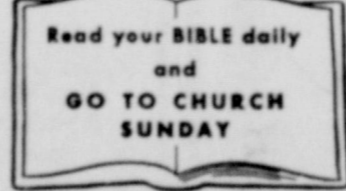

son to recommend a cotton program along with programs for other commodities in his farm bill April 5 could be an indication of things to come (or not to come) unless the cotton industry itself is able to make peace between divergent views and gather its forces behind a single legislative approach to cotton's difficulties.

So believes Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. "Otherwise," Johnson says, "the battle for cotton legislation might well be lost by default." He continues by pointing out that the major controversy of the moment is that existing between champions for two different methods of protecting a non-recourse loan at or near a level in keeping with producer income needs, taking into account costs of production, supply, demand, parity etc.

Others propose a low loan level at about the world market price with direct compensatory payments to producers. Johnson admitted there were logical arguments on both sides of the question, but said: "It appears highly unlikely that producers across the cotton belt can be easily persuaded to accept a program which they have consistently opposed because of a fear of limitations."

If a new cotton bill should fail to pass Congress before the current program expires in 1966, the production and marketing of cotton would revert to the Agricultural Act of 1958. Johnson said, and explained that: "This would mean essentially the same program as was in effect in 1963 before passage of the Cooley Bill in 1964—a national minimum allotment of 16.3 million acres, the same as now; an export subsidy about no consideration of the price domestic mills pay for cotton, and other administrative changes which might be made relative to skip-row planting and re-lease and reappointment."

He also noted that: "In the opinion of many, a return to this kind of program at this time with the resultant loss of markets and other problems, would mean certain destruction for the cotton industry."

With respect to the current program, Johnson said that in spite of some dissatisfaction, it has restored confidence in the domestic textile industry and halted the rapid loss of cotton's markets to synthetic fibers. And, observing that textile spokesmen have stated on numerous occasions that that industry will not again shoulder the burden of two-price cotton, Johnson said: "It seems obvious that the principles of one-price cotton must be retained if at all possible."

Johnson concluded his remarks with the following: "With the shift in population from farm to urban areas and with redistricting according to population, agriculture no longer enjoys the power and prestige it once held in the halls of Congress. Also it seems that agriculture in general and farm programs in particular have been attacked more viciously in recent years than ever before as a drag on the economy and an unnecessarily heavy burden on the taxpayer. It is difficult to believe, however, that the American people, if fully informed, will be forced in icy indifference to the problems of the farmer. Our farm people, farm organizations and other segments of agriculture must unite behind a program within the scope of our nationwide resources and responsive to our nationwide and worldwide needs and take this program to the American people. If we can do this, and I am confident we can, our farmers can be assured of their rightful share in the prosperity which they have helped to create."

Accent on Health

Light from a single window breaks the dark expense of a five-story building. Inside the room is a research scientist pouring over a pile of notes, trying to piece together bits of evidence which could possibly lead to a significant breakthrough in the battle against cancer.

Miles away in a small town, a secretary unlocks the door of the local health department and starts filling our requisitions for needed supplies. She is no scientist and the researcher hates the trivialities of order forms.

Yet both of these people have much in common. They are both engaged in a health career. In the growing competition among industry, the professions, education, government service, welfare and the health services for skilled, competent personnel, a career dedicated to serving fellow man through the health services can be rewarding both career-wise and personally.

Health careers include callings that care for the ill and the injured, and they include

callings that help to prevent illness.

Training varies from about a high school education for some workers in a hospital to more than eight years of college for a physician.

The entire spectrum of working talents are offered in health fields including biologists, food service workers, housekeepers, statistical clerks, machinists, administrators, engineers, writers, artists, chemists and photographers. The list goes on and on.

A health careerist can be his

own boss as a private physician or consultant or he can work as a skilled member of a highly organized team in a local or state health department, hospital or health agency.

However, high standards are demanded regardless of the precise job performed. Many Texas Colleges and universities offer courses designed to train students for the various health careers.

The health sciences are just beginning to enter on a new threshold of achievement. Atomic medicine is providing better diagnosis and treatment of such ills as cancer, and thyroid diseases and epidemiology procedures in public health are solving more and more communicable disease problems.

High school students should consider a health career seriously.

Steps Listed For Entrance Into College

College to the average student is an institute of higher learning. Some go for the education and some for the experience. However, to enter college as a freshman, an applicant takes the following steps:

1. Applies for admission on forms furnished by the Dean of Admissions.
2. Provides the admission office with an official transcript of his high school record. The applicant must assume the responsibility for having his records forwarded. Applications forms and transcripts should be sent in immediately following the close of the last semester in high school.
3. Files a health data form. This form is to be completed by a physician and must include a statement of successful smallpox vaccination within five years prior to registration.
4. Furnishes scores on Scholastic Aptitude Test of College entrance examination.
5. Decides which school or curriculum he wishes to enter.
6. Reports to the college campus on the day indicated in the official college calendar. All entering freshmen must report at the beginning of freshman orientation.
7. Pays fees on the days indicated for registration.
