

City Sales Tax Not Favorable

City Commission Monday had a record for 1965 as it was hard to beat in session just 1 1/2 hours.

Half a dozen items were agenda, and commission members in rapid order to allow Mayor and City Sec. Bob Cain to leave on a business trip to Austin.

On the brief session a report from the Board, approval on reading of a zoning ordinance and discussion of a plumbing code. Commissioners also approved a trip in order that they might oppose legislation on a local option. A public hearing on the bill had been set for Tuesday in the House on Revenue & Taxation.

In a brief discussion on the bill, the city commission agreed that, in its present form, it was not in the best

interests of the city. Provisions of the bill would allow a city, with the approval of local citizens, to levy sales tax of one-half to one percent--as determined by voters--on items specified in the State Limited Sales, Excise and Use Tax Law. State Comptroller would collect and remit local levy in return for a nominal fee.

Mayor Cain was of the opinion that the bill--sponsored by the Texas Municipal League--was favored by larger cities. He sees this as one of the dangers of the legislation, that "large cities might gain up and make it mandatory later on."

Proponents of the measure claim it offers the first broad-based relief for the municipal tax structure--and the property owner--in history. It is tagged House Bill 4 and is sponsored by Rep. John Traeger.

Mrs. Bill Smith and Cemetery Supt. Cam Jordan appeared at the meeting to discuss purchase of burial equipment for the city. In a recent called meeting with the Cemetery Board, commissioners decided the city should proceed with plans to buy equipment.

The city has been using equipment provided by Williams Funeral Home. The cemetery group, headed by Cecil Scott, will recommend equipment to be purchased at the next commissioner meeting.

With the filing deadline still nine days away, the city election has drawn just one contested race--but that one shapes up as a dilly.

The entry of two candidates into the mayor's race this week ran the total to three with incumbent Mayor Jonas Cain being challenged by J.W. (Curly) Martindale and Luther Gregory.

Two commissioners' terms are up this time but only one man has announced. Henry Bolinger has filed for reelections commissioner of Ward 3 with no challengers as yet.

Clark Self, Jr., incumbent commissioner of Ward 1, has not declared his intentions to date, and no one else has tossed his hat in the ring for that post.

Deadline for filing as a candidate is March 6 in the city secretary's office. The city election is scheduled for Tuesday, April 6.

After Mayor Cain announced his intention last week to seek another term, Martindale was the first to file against the incumbent. A longtime resident of Slaton, Martindale operates a service station and is currently serving on the school board.

Gregory, a retired railroad man--as is Cain, was city judge until Dec. 31, 1964, when he resigned after the commission reduced his salary. He filed in the mayor's race Tuesday.

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IT'S FFA WEEK IN TEXAS

Ag Students Saluted

The Future Farmers of America organization is in its 36th year in Texas. There are 40,482 members studying vocational agriculture in 875

high schools in Texas. In these vocational agriculture classes students are provided an opportunity to secure technical and scientific training in agriculture as well as to receive training in leadership, citizenship and cooperation.

Texas membership has grown from 28,643 in 1950 to 40,482 in 1964. The largest growth has come in the last three years with an increase of over 3,500. In a recent study conducted by Mr. George Hurt, State Director of Vocational Agriculture, it was found that 86 per cent of the vocational agricultural students who graduated from high school last

year and were available for employment are now in full-time farming or in agricultural related occupations. Approximately one half of this number are in full-time farming.

Agriculture today is more than farming. It involves those who process and distribute many agricultural goods. Many people are employed in agricultural occupations such as engineers, scientist, management personnel, sales and service personnel and educators. Also there are over 60,000 desirable openings each year for farm operators, farm engineers and full-time hired farm labor.

These people need a sound education and a continuing education to help keep them abreast of the rapidly changing technical and management aspects of farming.

FFA Practices For Ag Career

The Future Farmers of America is a national organization of boys and girls studying Vocational Agriculture in the public schools.

The FFA is an educational, nonprofit, nonpolitical, youth organization of voluntary membership, designed to develop agricultural leadership, character, thrift, scholarship, cooperation, citizenship and patriotism. One of the requirements for membership is that the boy must be enrolled in a high school class of Vocational Agriculture. The age limit is 14-21.

The national membership is over 400,000 and is sponsored by the U.S. Office of Education. The Texas Association of FFA is sponsored by the schools in Texas. The local Vocational Agriculture teacher serves as local FFA Chapter Advisor.

The FFA is furnishing well-trained leaders and citizens for responsible positions in agricultural business and industry professional agricultural work farming, and ranching. Four out of every ten employed persons in the United States work in some phase of agriculture.

Lubbock County Eligible For Emergency Loans From FHA

Lubbock County has been designated eligible for emergency loans. This designation has been made as a result of drought conditions for the past year, announced Ralph E. Griffiths, county supervisor, Farmers Home Administration.

To be eligible for an Emergency Production Loan, an applicant would have to be an established farmer or rancher in the county. Also, he must be a citizen of the United States; be unable to obtain from others lenders the credit required to continue his normal operations; has reasonable prospects for success with the assistance of a loan, and possesses the legal capacity to contract for the loan.

Loans may be made for the purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, replacement equipment and livestock, and for other essential farm and home operating expenses. Loans may not be made for refinancing existing debts or to compensate applicants for their losses.

The interest rate is 3%. Repayment schedules depend upon the purpose for which funds are advanced and upon the estimated income of the applicant.

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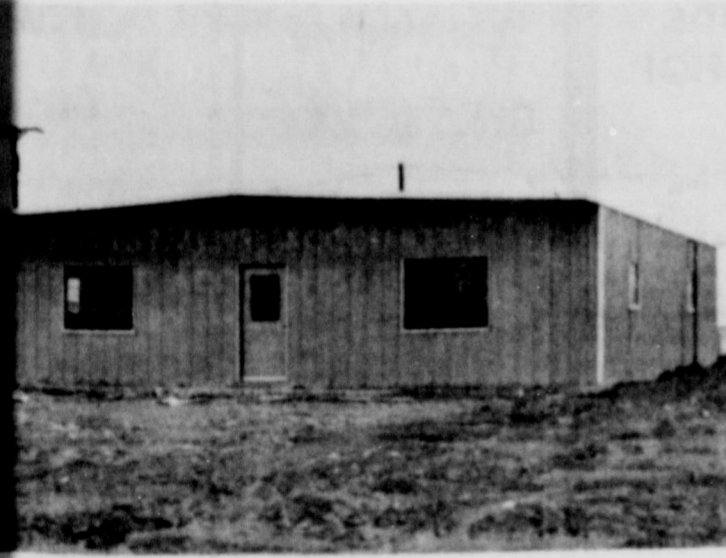

She is survived by her husband, two sons, nine daughters, one brother, four sisters, 38 grandchildren and 45 great-grandchildren.

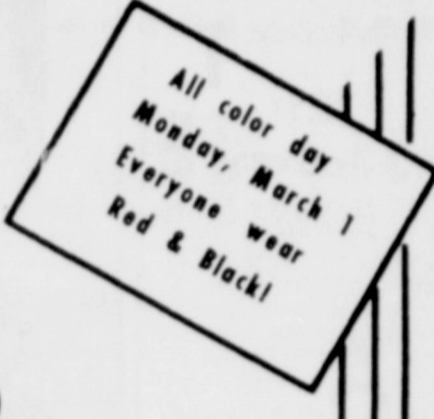

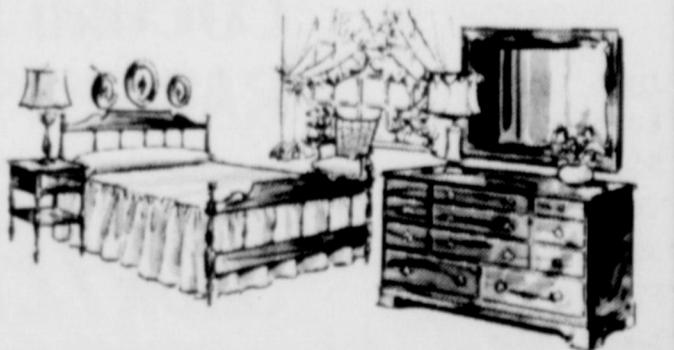

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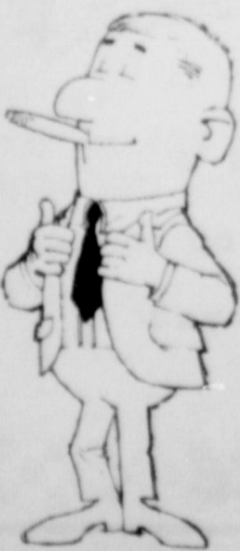
