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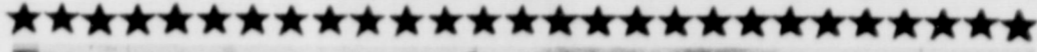

MORE MOISTURE IS FORECAST

Rain, Snow Give Boost To Area

Much-needed moisture, ranging up to about one-half inch, fell over the Slaton area Monday and Tuesday night in the form of rain and snow. The long-awaited rain and snow put a smile on the faces of farmers and businessmen--the only complaint being that it didn't last long enough.

A light shower started the change in the weather Monday afternoon, then another good shower preceded a sleet and snowfall Monday night.

The wet weather was part of a massive front that brought larger amounts of snow and moisture in the Panhandle of Texas. Several inches of snow were recorded north and northwest of Lubbock.

Measurements of the moisture here in Slaton ranged from .30 to almost .50 of an inch. Farmers are still hoping for more moisture to get the soil in good condition for spring planting.

There was not enough snow and ice to postpone school or other activities in the immediate area. Hazardous driving conditions were posted by state highway and local police officials, and motorists apparently heeded the warnings since few vehicle accidents were logged.

A panel vehicle overturned near the Lubbock overpass Monday afternoon, but the driver escaped with lacerations. He was Carl Williams driver of a Lubbock Hydraulic Jack Equipment Co. vehicle.

Streets and roads were iced over Tuesday morning, but the sun quickly thawed the light covering of white.

SUSPECT JAILED IN ROBBERY

Station Man Hurt

R.B. Conner, 19-year-old Slaton Negro, was in the Lubbock County Jail Wednesday after being arrested and charged with robbery by assault in connection with the beating and robbing of a Slaton service station attendant early Saturday morning.

He was arrested Monday after a two-hour search began for the man who robbed Geer Texaco Station at the intersection of U.S. Hwy. 84 and F-M 400.

Carol West, 43, who was released from Mercy Hospital Sunday, identified Conner as being the bandit who beat him and robbed him of some \$93 in cash about 5:30 a.m. Saturday.

Bond was set at \$5,000 for Conner, who was still in jail Wednesday morning. At the time of his arrest, he was on parole after being sentenced to the penitentiary on a forgery charge.

M.D. Geer, station owner, reported that "about 50 stitches" were required to close lacerations on West's head. Geer said it was the first time one of his attendants had ever been robbed.

Attendant West told Slaton policeman Gene Carpenter that the assailant drove into the station driveway and asked for water for a leaking radiator. After the car had been serviced, the man followed West into the station, talked a while and inquired about the distance to Snyder.

West said that when he turned his back the Negro struck him on the back of his head with his fist, then struck him in the face. During an ensuing scuffle West said he was hit several times over the head with a tire tool. He sustained about a two-inch cut at the edge of his right eye.

West told officials that he was forced to crawl on his knees to the cash register and open it and that he was dragged back into a restroom where the assailant "threatened to kill me if I came out."

The attendant got a good look at the car as it was leaving the station as it was leaving the station headed toward Lubbock. West called Slaton police at 5:30 a.m. and was taken to the hospital by patrolman Carpenter.

Dr. Vardy, 1st Graders Highlight PTA Program

West Ward PTA meeting Monday night featured a musical program presented by Mrs. James Perkins before the school music teacher and grade students. Mrs. Perkins was announced for her class. Seven students stood when Mrs. Perkins name was called. Fields Alex Webb, president of the PTA, presented the business meeting report was given on the meeting board meeting last night.

Bob Kern, vice-president, introduced Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent of schools, who brought a very informative program on drop-outs. He said people used to not think about the dropout problem like they do today, but it was definitely a problem back then, too. For instance, he said "When I was in the seventh grade, there were 17 people in that grade. Only two of the 17 graduated."

He went on to say people without a high school education now are limited in finding good jobs. Two generations from now it will be harder than ever. To have a high standard of living, a high school education is a dire necessity, he said. In a study made in the West Texas area, about 70 percent of students in the seventh grade finish high school. Dropouts are more predominant at age 16 than any other age. This may be because they can drop out at this age legally. A person entering high school but not graduating will make \$30,000 less than a graduate in a lifetime, the survey showed. Every time there is a high school graduate, there are 10 that dropped out. Among the causes of dropouts in our area are: disinterest, home responsibilities, financial problems, attitudes, economic pressures, other student's influences unhappy homes, early marriages, reading ability, no participation in extra-curricular activities, poor health, and personality problems. Dr. Vardy said that a student having a car isn't always a problem, but a car sometimes becomes the number one need in some student's mind rather than finishing school. He may think it is more important to drop out of school to operate the car, than stay in school. The survey showed in early marriages, more are completing school than did three years ago. Also, boys are more likely to drop out than girls. The approximate salary now being earned by students that should have graduated in 1964 is \$225, Dr. Vardy said. The national average of school graduates is 65 percent. Statistics show the per cent of Slaton students graduating is 79 percent for the last five year period. For instance in 1960, there were 80 eighth grade students here and last May, 60 graduated from SHS. Dr. Vardy said "I know on one does more guidance than an elementary teacher."

Recipe Of The Week

Because of this reporter's interest in seeing some re-finished furniture, and being invited into the home of a busy exceptionally outstanding mother and homemaker, I had the pleasure of touring one of Slaton's more beautiful homes. My grand tour started in the kitchen, of course, it was a kitchen designed and used by Mrs. Tommy Davis. Everything was in place, and there was a place for everything. Mrs. Davis, better known as Carolyn is the mother of four children who all enjoy athletics. She is also the wife of Tommy better known as one of the Davis' at Slaton Lumber yard and president of the Slaton Lion's Club. Their children are Tom, 14, Marilyn, 12, Dan, 11, and Jan, 9. The Davis' moved into their new home at 755 S. 22nd May of last year. They have re-finished nearly every piece of furniture in their home. CHICKEN AND RICE
Put in greased casserole 1/8 lb. melted butter or oleo 1 can cream of mushroom soup 1 can cream of celery soup 1 cup of water 1 cup uncooked rice (Some add 1 can cream of chicken soup) Salt, pepper and cup up fryer. Place chicken on top of above mixture and bake at 300 degrees for 3 hours.

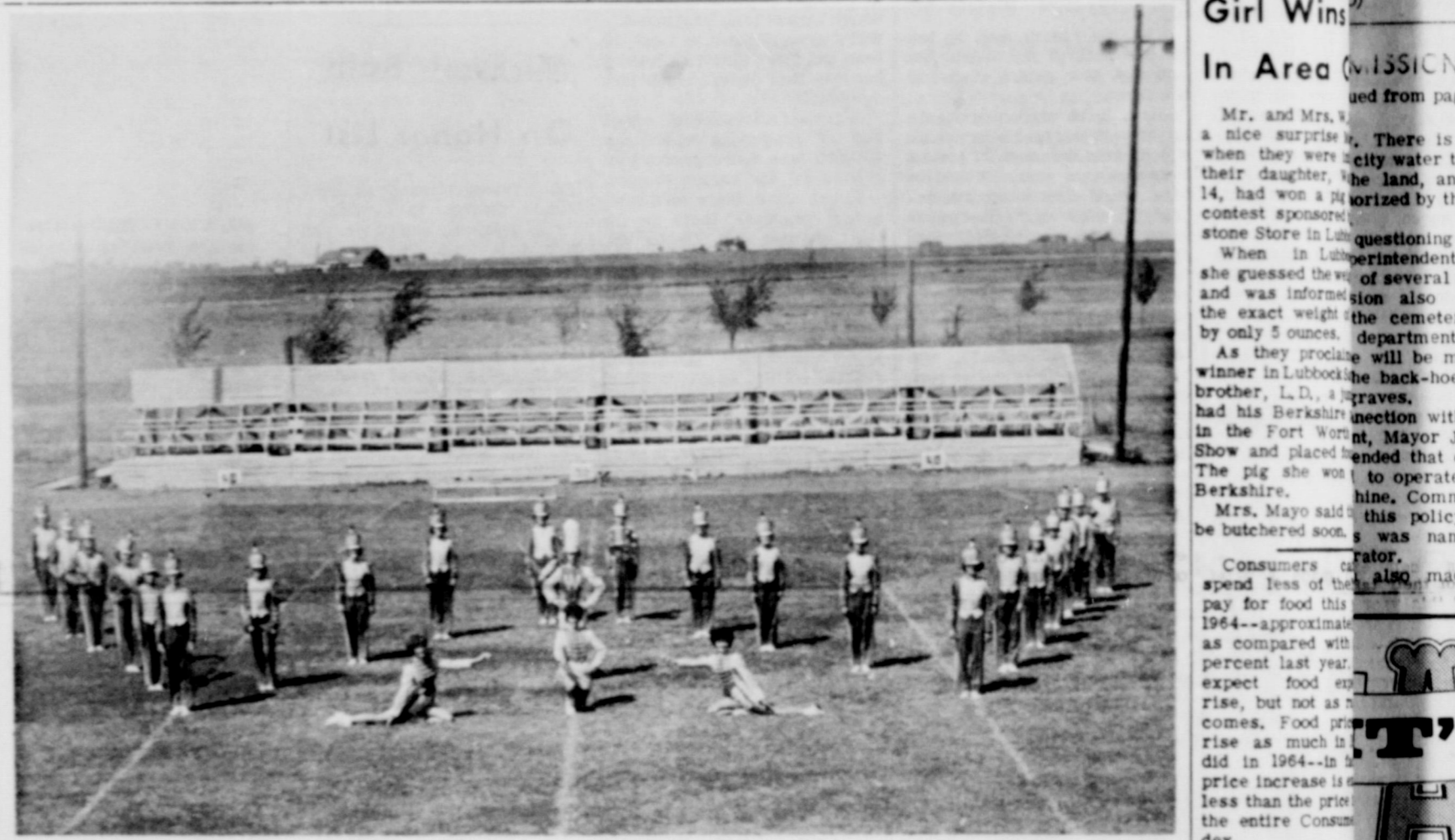

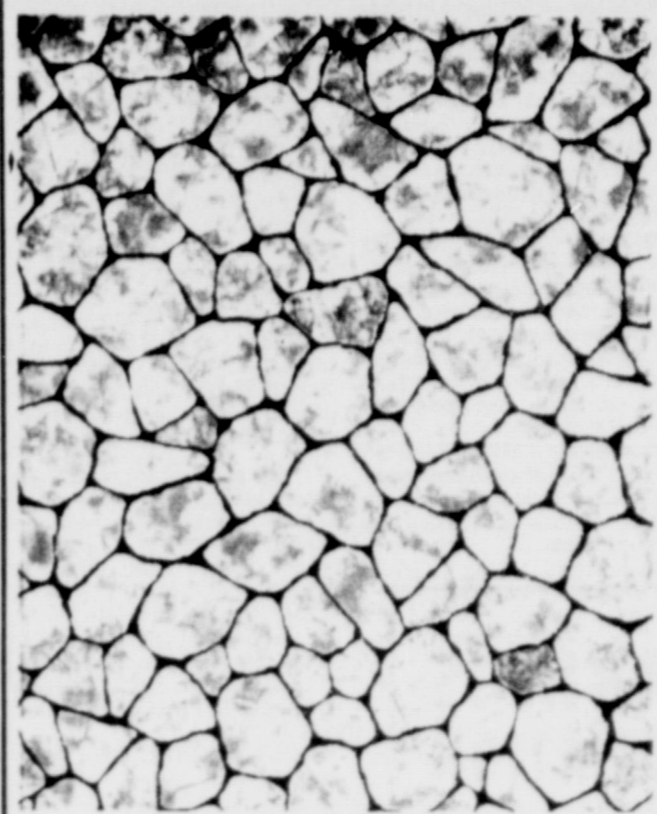

School Lunch Menus Feature Beef, Chicken

Texas schools participating in the national school lunch program have been allotted 8,022,000 lbs. of frozen beef and 2,490,000 lbs. of frozen chicken bought by the U.S. Department of Agriculture during 1964.

This represents Texas' share of the 51.9 million lbs. of chicken and 178.5 million lbs. of frozen beef purchased to help schools meet protein requirements for lunches served under the school lunch program, explains John J. Slaughter, area food distribution director of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

The allotments will provide about 1-1/2 servings of beef per child per week, and 7-1/2 servings of chicken per child during this school year.

Around 3,320 schools operated cafeterias under the national school lunch program in 1964--the largest single operation in the state. These cafeterias feed nearly 30 percent of the students enrolled in elementary and high schools.

Under the program, USDA contributes cash and foods accounting for about one-fifth of the cost. Children's meal payments make up around 60 percent of the cost and local and state sources pay the remaining 20 percent.

The State Education Agency will allocate the beef and chicken among Texas schools participating in the national school lunch program and the State Department of Public Welfare will make distribution.

Some Payments Not Taxable On Income Tax

Some payments received by a taxpayer on account of illness or personal injury are not taxable income for Federal tax purposes, John J. Sloan administrative officer of Internal Revenue for the Lubbock office said today.

The law allows (subject to certain limitations) a taxpayer to exclude from income amounts received under a wage continuation plan financed by his employer, when he is absent from his job due to injury or sickness. In this case the taxpayer must attach a statement to his return showing computation of the amount excluded, the dates of absence, and whether or not he was hospitalized.

Other types of payments that are not taxable are those made:

1. For damage under a suit or in settlement of a claim under Workman's Compensation Acts, and under an accident or health insurance policy on which the taxpayer pays the premiums.
2. On account of a taxpayer's contribution to an accident or health plan jointly financed by him or his employer.
3. Under an employer-fin-

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RUGGED INDIVIDUALISM?

A young man lived with his parents in a public housing development; attended public school, and participated in the "free lunch" program. He entered military service and, upon discharge, retained his National Service Life Insurance.

He attended the state university and worked part-time at the state capitol to supplement funds provided by his GI education check. Upon graduation he married a public health nurse, bought a home with a FHA loan, and obtained an RFC loan to go into business.

Their baby was born in the county hospital. Wanting some farm land and a home for his parents, he bought a small ranch with the aid of the veterans' land program. For his livestock, he obtained emergency food from the government. Later he put part of his land in the soil bank and the payments he received helped pay for the ranch.

His father and mother lived comfortably on the ranch with the help of their social security and old age assistance checks. REA lines supplied electricity; the government helped him clear his land; the county agent showed him how to terrace it, and the government built him a fish pond. He read books from the public library, and his banked money was insured by an agency of the government. His child grew up; entered public school; ate "free lunches"; rode in a school bus, played in the municipal park, and swam in a public pool.

The man owned an automobile, so he favored the Federal Highway program. He signed a petition, seeking federal assistance in developing an industrial project to "help the economy" of his area. was the leader in a move to get a new federal building to build a great power dam, costing millions, so the area could get cheaper electricity.

Then, one day, after hearing that the per capita income tax bill in 1959 averaged \$251.49 for every man, woman and child in the nation (over 177 million persons), he wrote his Congressman:

"I wish to protest these excessive governmental expenditures and attendant high taxes. I believe in rugged individualism. I think people should stand on their own feet without expecting handouts from the government and, in turn, us taxpayers.

"I am opposed to all socialistic trends, and I demand a return to the principles of our Constitution."

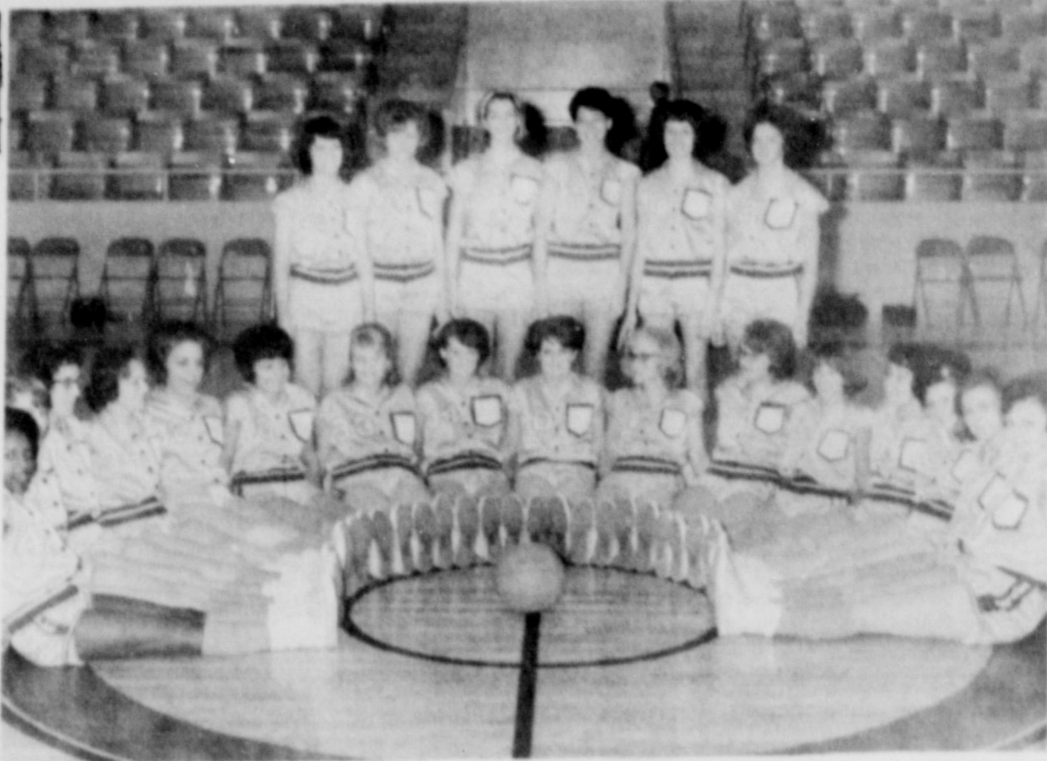
