paving assessments. In other business, the commission authorized a survey to determine exact location of city land near the Roche property southwest of town, questioned Cemetery Supt. Cam Jordan on management policies, and took care of routine mat-

Bennett Reeves, consultant engineer, presented plans and specifications for the paving program, estimating the total cost at approximately \$247,465. The city's share in the project would total about \$60,485.

The plan includes about 80 blocks in the city and some 54,000 linear feet of curb and nbering project | gutters. The engineer said some paving would have to be removespecailly to ed in order to improve drainers. Their project is to age problems. Property owners pers on homes of indi | will not be assessed where paving and curb and gutter is torn up and replaced.

The paving project calls for the city to pay for 20 percent of the cost of front footage and 30 percent on the side streets. Property owners will be assed for all curb and gutters.

In a report on Division Street, Reeves said the city had completed \$13,735 in construction with some \$5,500 to be completed. This commits the city for about \$19,235 on the street. leaving some \$40,000 from the

public hearing was set for March 8 on assessing property owners for the Division Street project. Cost was reported at

\$1.77 per front foot on the street. City Atty, George Lemon and Police Chief Robert Breedlove asked the commission to give the city judge the "greenlight" on levying stiffer fines on speeders in the city limits. A number of tickets have been on "contesting for speed" and "light" fines of \$10 to \$15 have been customary, it

Lemon pointed out that the maximum fine is \$200. He and the police chief recommended that the judge "make it extremely expensive" for repeat offenders. It was pointed out that a number of youthful drivers have been involved in the speeding violations.

The annual city election was officially set April 6. Presiding judges , in Wards 1 through 4, will be August Kitten, Phil Brewer, Charles Whalen and Tom Stracener, Candidates must file by March 6. The terms of the mayor and commissioners of Wards 1 and 3

Jaycees Sponsor SUSPECT JAILED IN ROBBERY

Station Man Hurt

Slaton Negro, was in the Lubbock County jail Wednesday after being arrested and charged with robbery by assault in connection with the beating and robbing of a Slaton service station attendant early Saturday

ter an area-wide search began for the man who robbed Geer Texaco Station at the intersection of U.S. Hwy. 84 and F-M 400.

Carol West, 43, who was released from Mercy Hospital Sunday, identified Conner as being the bandit who beat him and robbed him of some \$93 in cash about 5:30 a.m. Sat-

Bond was set at \$5,000 for Conner, who was still in fail Wednesday morning. At the time of his arrest, he was on parole after being sentenced to the penitentiary on a forgery charge.

M.D. Geer, station owner reported that "about 50 stitches" were required to close lacerations on West's head, Geer said it was the first time one of his attendants had ever been robbed.

Attendant West told Slaton policeman Gene Carpenter that the assailant drove into the station driveway and asked for water for a leaking radiator. After the car had been serviced, the man followed West into the station, talked a while and inquired about the distance to Snyder.

West said that when he turned his back the Negro struck him on the back of his head with his fist, then struck him in the face. During an ensuing scuffle West said he was hit several times over the head with a tire tool. He sustained about a two-inch cut at the edge of his right eye.





In a study made in the West Texas area, about 70 percent of students in the seventh grade finish high school. Dropouts are more predominate at age 16 than any other age. This may be because they can drop out at this age legally. A person entering high school

but not graduating will make \$30,000 less than a graduate in a lifetime, the survey showed. Every time there is a high school graduate, there are 10 that dropped out. Among the causes of dropouts in our area are: disinterest, home responsibility, financial problems, attitudes, economic pressures, other student's influences unhappy homes, early marriages, reading ability, no participation in extra-curricular activities. poor health, and personality

Dr. Vardy said that a student having a car isn't always a problem, but a car sometimes becomes the number one need in some student's mind rather than finishing school. He may think it is more important to drop out of school to operate the car, than stay in school. The survey showed in early

gram have been allotted 8,022 000 lbs. of frozen beef and 2 490,000 lbs. of frozen chicken bought by the U.S. Department of Agriculture during 1964.

This represents Texas' share of the 51,9 million lbs, of chicken and 178.5 million lbs. of frozen beef purchased to help schools meet protein requirements for lunches served under the school lunch program, explains John J. Slaughter, area food distribution director of US DA's Agricultural Marketing

The allotments will provide about 1-1/2 servings of beet

per child per week, and 7-1/2 servings of chicken per child during this school year.

Around 3,320 schools operated cafeterias under the national school lunch program in 1964 -the largest single operation in the state. These cafeterias feed nearly 30 percent of the students enrolled in elementary and high schools. Under the program, USDA

contributes cash and foods accounting for about one-fifth o the cost. Children's meal pay ments make up around 60 percent of the cost and local and state sources pay the remain ing 20 percent.


