'65 PLATES GO ON SALE

Vehicle registration plates for 1965 went on sale Monday and the "new-look" tags are not too popular with some citizens.

Plates may be obtained in Slaton at the Drewry Insurance building, office of Mrs. F.A. Drewry, deputy tax assessor-collector. Vehicle owners are reminded to bring their title and license receipts.

Reason for the unpopularity of the plates with some motorists is the new three-letter, three-number system used. Passenger car plates now available here have the prefixes "CCG", "CCH" and "CCJ". These letters are followed by two or three numbers, 10 to 999.

With the numbering setup, many owners will not be able to secure their house numbers and none can match their telephone number. Prefixes are made up of consonants only; vowels are omitted to avoid spelling out words.

The registration period ends April 1. More than 3,400 passenger cars alone are expected to be registered in Slaton. Lubbock County received 119,365 sets of plates are also on sale, of course, at the tax assessor-collector's office at the Lubbock courthouse. Passenger plate numbers begin with CBC 700 to 999 and end with CCG 10 to 999.

Zone Requests To Be Aired

A meeting of the Slaton Planning and zoning Commission has been called for 6 p.m. today to consider requests for two special acceptances to the zoning map.

The meeting will be held in the City Hall courtroom.

Joe Wicker is requesting a change in zoning so that he can construct a five-dwelling teacher apartment at 1160 W. Crosby. The other appeal is from Bob Thompson, who wants to open a one-operator beauty in his home, 210 S. 12th St.

Property owners within 200 feet of the two sites involved have been invited to attend the meeting and present their views. The commission will make a recommendation to the Zoning Board of Adjustment, which will make a decision following a public hearing.

Claude Anderson, 85, longtime Slaton resident, died about 10:30 a.m. Saturday at Mercy Hospital.

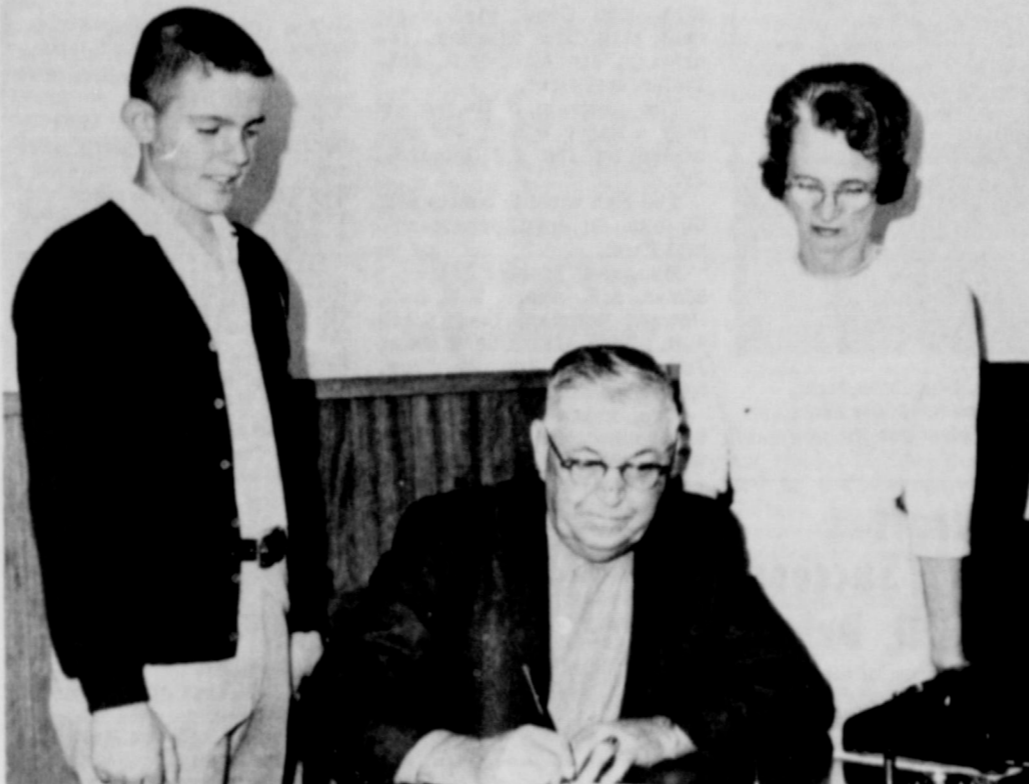

Mayor Proclaims Heart Campaign Month Here

With two healthy heart-surgery patients looking on, Mayor Jonas Cain this week signed a statement which proclaimed February as "Heart Month" in Slaton.

Mrs. Floyd Boyd and teenager Tom Davis, both leading normal healthy lives thanks to recently developed techniques in heart surgery, were two of the interested onlookers at the proclamation signing. Mrs. W. T. Davis Jr., community vice chairman of the Slaton Heart Fund, was also present.

The Heart Fund drive started Monday and will continue throughout the month. It will reach a high point on "Heart Sunday", Feb. 21, when hundreds of volunteers will ring doorbells throughout the residential areas of the city to receive contributions from their neighbors.

Mrs. Connie Locke is heading the heart campaign in Slaton this year. The drive is dedicated to her husband, the late Dr. John C. Locke.

Other volunteer leaders besides Mrs. Locke and Mrs. Davis include Mrs. George Privett Sr., Heart Sunday chairman; Mrs. August Kitten special events; Mrs. Robert Hall Davis, special gifts; Don Kendrick, coin containers; Tommy Wallace, treasurer and memorial funds; Mrs. Robert Ayers, publicity.

The local heart association is an affiliate of the American voluntary health agency dedicated exclusively to combatting the heart and blood vessel diseases.

Observing that the heart and blood vessel diseases took more lives each year than all other causes of death combined, Mayor Cain called upon all citizens to support the Heart Association's program to control this health enemy.

He cited the research, professional and public education; and community service program of the association and said:

"I urge our citizens, through their businesses, civic and service organizations, and in their homes, to assist in support of this important program by contributing generously to the Heart Fund drive in the Slaton association."

God loves us so much that He gave us all His wonderful qualities that we may, in turn, give and share them with His other children. God's love is in our hearts as kindness, forgiveness and tolerance and we should treat it as such in our dealings with others.

When he was two years old, Tom had an upper respiratory infection and a doctor also discovered a heart murmur. After being sent to a heart specialist by a local physician, it was discovered that Tom had a hole in the wall of his heart.

At this time--1952--the surgery to correct this type of heart damage was done on an experimental stage in dogs. The Davis family was told that Tom would never be able to actively participate in sports if this condition would gradually turn blue by the time he was a teenager.

By the time Tom reached seven years old, however, open heart surgery had been perfected enough for doctors to prescribe an operation. Surgery was performed by Dr. E. William E. Delbaque and Dan Cooley at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

Tom came with flying colors, doctors reporting his case to be the best to that time as far as pre- and post-operative treatment was concerned. The operation was termed a complete success!

City Awards 2 Contracts

Contracts were awarded on the drilling of two water wells and on the purchase of a back-hoe tractor and loader when Slaton City Commission met in a special session Friday afternoon, Jan. 29.

The wells are to be drilled on the city's new water field on the Rhoads farm. Contract was awarded to F.B. Skaggs Drilling Co., Brownfield, on a low bid of \$10,893.50. Only other bid submitted was by White Irrigation Well Service Co. of Lubbock in the amount of \$12,840. Alternate proposals were considered without gravel packing.

After a discussion on four bids for the back-hoe tractor, commissioners awarded the contract to Yellowhouse Machinery of Lubbock on a net purchase of \$6,450. Price included trade-in of the city's used back-hoe tractor.

The winning bid was actually the highest submitted, and was for a John Deere Model 2110. Wayne Baker, director of public works, recommended this machine--which was heavier than the others--to be accepted. After a lengthy discussion, commissioners approved the action.

Other bids on larger models: Montgomery-Schnell of Slaton, \$5,632.64; E.K. Hufstader and Son of Lubbock, \$5,384.80. Service Machinery of Lubbock bid \$4,970 on a single model. The other three companies had lesser bids on alternate models.

School Board Hears Request From Teachers

A request from the Classroom Teachers Assn., calling for an election, and desegregation policy were main items for discussion at a meeting of the Slaton School Board Wednesday morning.

The board, after study of the order passed in August relative to desegregation of schools, moved that the board president be authorized to sign an article of compliance with Title 6 of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

The request from the classroom teachers concerned an improved sick-leave plan and extra pay for such duties as gate keeping, score keepers, clock operators, fence watching and extra bus driving.

The association asked that the matter be considered in light of a study of the policies of other schools of similar size. The board reportedly made favorable comment on the request, but decided to give the plan further study.

The board officially ordered the trustee election for April 3, at which time two trustees will be elected to serve three terms. Charlie Whalen was appointed election judge.

Ordinary routine business was conducted, such as reading of the minutes, approving bills and presentation of necessary reports.

Farmers Set Protest Meeting

An area-wide meeting to protest the cut in cotton prices proposed in President Johnson's budget has been called for the Roosevelt School next Thursday at 7 p.m., it was revealed Monday by E.W. Pratt of Acuff.

Jay Naman of Waco will be guest speaker at the meeting announced Pratt. Several area farmers planned to protest meeting and all area businessmen and farmers are urged to attend.

Among items expected to be brought out at the meeting will be the number of small farmers being forced off the farm, the tightening of credit in all directions, and increasing prices on farm machinery and equipment.

Three tires and wheels were stolen from parked pickups over the weekend. Reporting the thefts were Kyle Simonton of 925 S. 10th, L.W. Vardell, 905 S. 22nd and W.W. Stanley, 705 S. 12th.

Two arrests for carrying prohibitive weapons were made last week. Two complaints of vandalism in the form of broken windows, were reported.

Tigers Tumble at Post, 55-44

The Tigers lost an opportunity to move into first place ahead of Idle Denver City, while Morton grabbed a share of the lead by beating Frenship, 76-55, at Morton Tuesday night. The Morton team moves into Slaton Friday night for important league battle.

Slaton now has a 3-2 record in the district chase, and Post is 2-3. Morton is 4-1 and Denver City 3-1.

The Tigers had only one good quarter at Post Tuesday night, scoring 15 points in the second stanza to grab a 27-26 half-time advantage.

But the fired-up home team and the whistle-happy officials stopped Slaton's momentum in the second half. Post tabbed 29 points to only 17 for the Tigers. Talented Ronnie Pierce garnered game scoring honors with 28 points for the winners.

Bobby Brake led Slaton with 12 points, and Larry Smith tallied 11 before fouling out in the fourth period. Deane Hatchett hit for 9 against the pressing Post defense. Slaton was charged with 21 fouls, Post with 13.

The defeat left the boys with a 17-4 season record. The Tigers picked up a 62-58 victory in a non-conference game at Petersburg last Friday night. The Tigers rallied with a 25-point effort in the final period to down the tough Buffaloes.

Larry Smith bagged 27 points and Hatchett 18 in the triumph. Brake also posted 12 in the win, while Jack Scarborough led the Buffs with 21. The Tigerettes tallied a 51-39 win over the Petersburg girls as Peggy Kirksey, Marilyn McSween and Sharon Williams put up 20, 15, and 13 points, respectively.

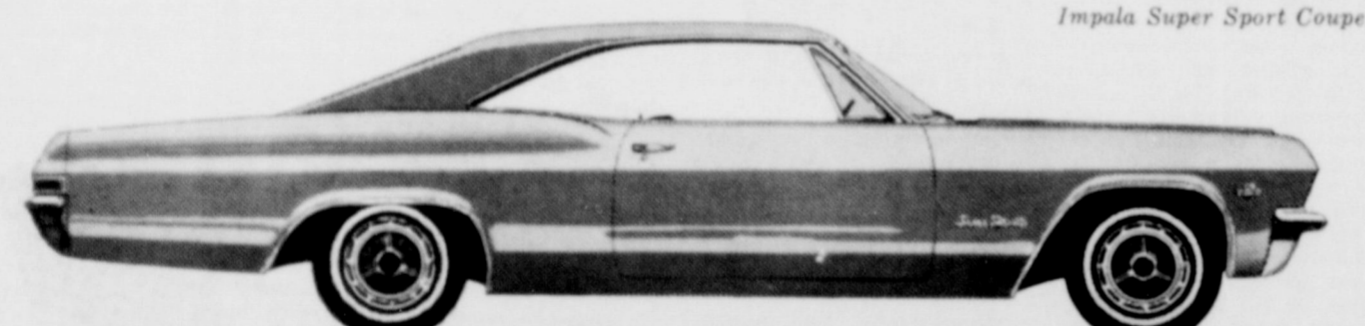

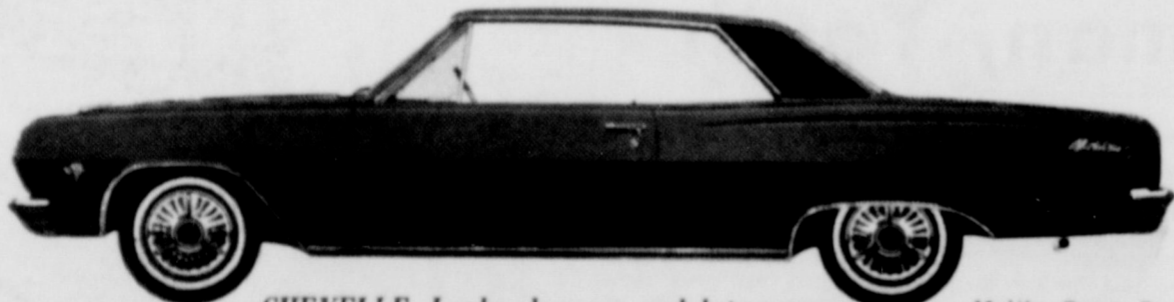

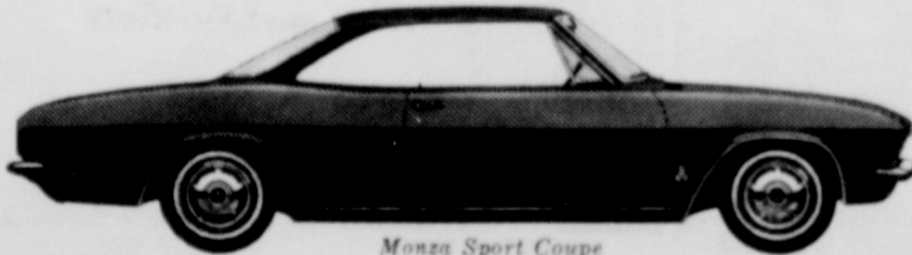

Regardless of your age, your employer must report your earnings and pay the social security tax if you earn as much as \$50 cash in a 3-month period. (Room and board do not count toward the \$50 wages.)

Your job does not have to be regular or full-time, if you are paid as much as \$50 cash wages in a 3-month period. Bus fare in cash does count toward the \$50 wages.

If you do baby sitting for your son or daughter, this does not count toward social security coverage. If you are under 21 years old, work you do for your parents does not count, either.

If you do baby sitting, for others in your home, you may be considered self-employed if your net earnings during the year are \$400 or more. All self-employed baby sitters have net earnings of \$400 or more must file tax returns and schedule C and pay the 5.4 percent social tax on the income.

If there is any doubt at all as to whether you are covered by the social security law, get in touch with the nearest social security office--someone there will explain your particular situation.

CITIZENS of Lubbock County, producer of some \$1 million worth of oil and gas a year, have a special interest in the "pooling" bill now before the Texas Legislature. James L. Sewell, Dallas, president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, reported this week.

"Although Lubbock County has production, the oil men who operate here, as well as the landowners and governmental officials, are interested in securing maximum development," Sewell said. "A pooling law will encourage a more efficient and more equitable approach to development of our oil and gas resources."

A measure, supported by all segments of the Texas petroleum industry after two years of intra-industry conferences and study, was recently introduced as Senate Bill 2 by Senator Galloway Calhoun, Jr., of Tyler, and as House Bill 2 by Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge.

Sewell stressed that the measure does not affect normal leasing and voluntary pooling arrangements between landowners and operators, nor does it affect in any way reservoirs discovered and produced before March 8, 1961 (date of Supreme Court decision that wells on small tracts could not produce at rates disproportionately higher than adjoining tracts.)

"The pooling bill is designed to make it possible for mineral owners--regardless of the size tract of land they may have--to get their fair share of oil and gas that may underly their acreage," he said.

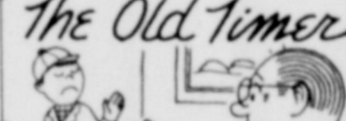

The letter added that Jung Hee is a sweet little girl and extremely friendly. She is quite clever and is anxious to begin her schooling. With PLAN aid, Jung Hee will be able to go to school.

Through the generosity of the Slaton Jaycee-ettes, PLAN provides this little girl with a cash grant of \$8 a month, medical care, some distributions of suitable new clothing, the chance to get an education and PLAN's friendly professional counseling to help her parents with their most difficult problems.

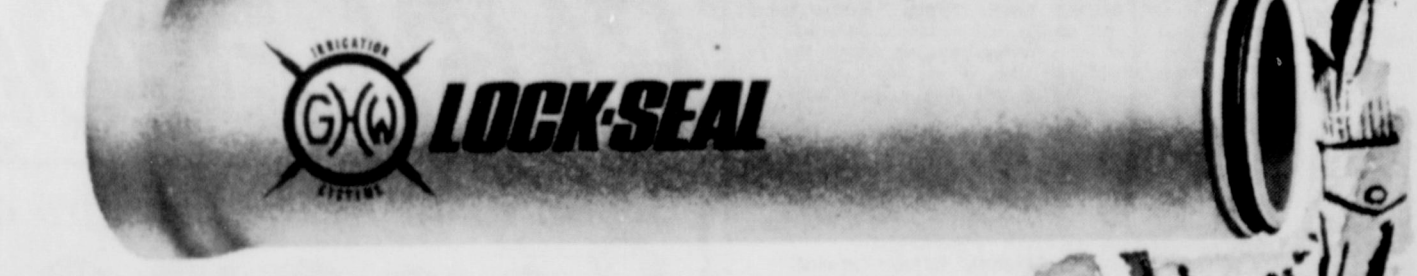
