# '65 PLATES GO ON SALE

Vehicle registration plates for 1965 went on sale Monday and the "new-look" tags are not too popular with some citi-

Plates may be obtained in Slaton at the Drewry Insurance building, office of Mrs. F.A. Drewry, deputy tax assessorcollector, Vehicle owners are reminded to bring their title and license receipts.

Reason for the unpopularity of the plates with some motorists is the new three-letter. three-number system used. Passenger car plates now available here have the prefixes , "CCH" and "CCJ". These letters are followed by two or three numbers , 10 to

With the numbering setup many owners will not be able to secure their house numbers and none can match their telephone number. Prefixes are made up of consonants only; vowels are omitted to avoid spelling out words.

The registration period ends April 1. More than 3,400 passenger cars alone are expected to be registered in Slaton, Lubbock County received 119, 365 sets of plates are also on sale, of course, at the tax assessor-collector's office at the Lubbock courthouse. Passenger plate numbers begin with CBC 700 to 999 and end with CGC 10 to 999,







To most students, this editorial will be of some value; to others it may not mean very much.

All advice that tells you how to read, how to take notes, how to tackle problems, how to form good study habits, can help youbut only if you have a driving desire to learn.

If you have this drive, you can study even without knowing all of the fine points of how to study. If you don't have this drive, all the fine points of how to study won't help you.

You must have a desire to learn. If you refuse to sacrifice some of your time and effort, no person, no book, no information, is going to help you study. By desire, we don't mean that study is something you should like to do. Most young people would rather be doing something else. Desire means that you would like to be more intelligent about a lot of things than you are now.

You need not fear mental fatigue because of long, hard studing. What we think is mental fatigue is usually a combination of boredom and lack of real interest, plus possibly physical discomfort due to poor posture.

Do you realize that, if a student puts in half as much time and effort on study of different subjects as a boy puts in trying to make the football team, , how few failures we would have in our school.

Sure you say that is because a boy likes to play pfootball and you don't like to study. But most boys do not really enjoy the long, hard practice periods that are real drudgery. It is really hard work. Why not consider your subjects like football or any other game?

"He who knows not and knows that he knows not is a fool; show him. He who knows not and knows that he knows not is a child; teach him. He that knows and knows that he knows is wise; follow him.


