Mercy Hospital Receipt of \$7,000 Grand Champion Steer

Being donated twice, Mercy Hospital was given a steer Monday by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce worth \$7,000. Life Lewler of Lubbock was paid the high price for the grand champion steer at the Fort Worth Livestock show by Lone Star Distributing Corporation of San Antonio.

Star Distributing Company of Lubbock, purchased the animal from the Lone Star Brewing Corporation and in turn gave the animal to Slaton Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of giving the animal to some local worthy organization.

Douglas Galassini, president of the local chamber, said that the board of directors decided to give it to Mercy Hospital for the purpose of raising funds for equipment for the hospital that is so sorely needed.

Donations will be received by the hospital and on some future date one of the donors will be selected and given the animal.

The double donation, in essence, took place in front of the Slaton municipal building Monday morning.

Several local organizations are making plans for a donation drive in connection with the animal for the purpose of giving aid to Mercy Hospital which serves so many patients from a large area that includes Lubbock, Slaton, Tahoka, Wilson, Post and many other towns in the large South Plains area.

Mercy Hospital Purchases New Isolation Incubator

Mercy Hospital purchased a new isolation incubator that was installed in the nursery at the hospital last week.

Three hundred ninety-one babies were born at the hospital during 1963 and of this number, fourteen were premature babies.

Other life-saving and useful equipment purchased during the past months were a Cardiac Monitor, a Defibrillator, Standby Generating Equipment and an Air Conditioner.

These were made possible by the generous donations of civic and church organizations, as well as many personal donations of the good people of Slaton.

Ordinance 233 closing certain streets and alleys in west Lawn Addition was read and approved.

A lengthy and involved Ordinance 233 providing regulations for any newly created sub-division within a radius of five miles which might be annexed to the city was read by Attorney Cravens. This is one recommended by the state, and is the one jokingly referred to the reporter as prescribing the proportions of cement, sand and water to be used in sidewalks that may never be built.

Much discussion centered about installing water and sewer lines now under the new highways being built. Delaying action would probably result in costs two or three times what they would be at present, but the unused capacity might be a burden for several years. Questions of time limit for decision and recommendations from City Engineer Reeves were deferred until next meeting.

Perhaps the most explosive matter that came up was that of having two or more water users—in some cases six were mentioned—on one meter with one minimum rate. The present law was passed in 1929 and provides that additional minimum rates will be charged for each user from one meter, hotels, motels and rooming houses excepted. So many questions came up about duplex apartments, trailer houses, water deposits, and so on, that the matter was quite mixed up. The Water Superintendent said 139 meters at present were supplying two or more families, and there were probably 20 or 30 more. It was estimated one-family minimum rates on these would bring in about \$7,000 more per year to the city. Sewer and garbage removal charges also enter the picture. There are more water meters than sewer connections in the city, and sanitation charges are being collected in some instances where there are no sewer connections. It was also stated that fire protection and availability of water supply at times of peak demand ought to be considered.

At any rate, the City Secretary was instructed to notify those now supplying two or more families from one water meter that the existing laws would have to be complied with.

It is reported that Wayne Polk is recovering satisfactorily from a motor scooter accident that occurred Sunday afternoon about 4:00 in front of Mercy Hospital.

Mr. Polk is reported to have been thrown off the scooter when the front brakes locked.

He is confined at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, with a broken leg.

According to hospital attendants his condition is satisfactory.

Superintendent At Post School Speaks Out

The public schools of the United States are facing problems today never encountered by their earlier counterparts. The population is constantly shifting from East to West. New knowledge is being made available at such a rapid rate that it is being referred to as the "explosion of knowledge." Social minority groups are emerging from the dormant state that has characterized them since the days of the Civil War. Children attending school today are studying subject matter content that did not exist ten years ago. A number of the subject matter courses at the high school level are equal to or surpass the college courses of 15 years ago. The status quo is being threatened as never before in the history of the human race.

The schools of today are being asked to make advances in three years that formerly took 50. Man has learned more about himself in the past 50 years than he learned during his entire

previous history. The English language has changed accordingly. Anyone can pick up a dictionary with a copyright date of 1963 and find words that were not in the vocabulary of the English speaking people ten years ago. This country has committed itself to research and experimentation; the first time in the history of the world that man has intentionally tried to produce change. This act is mirrored in the economic index. In 1941, the United States spent \$1.2 billion for research and development. In 1961, the United States spent \$15.5 billion for development and research. This has resulted in new and unheard of products and a drastic change in the standard of living. We are now irrevocably committed to a course of tremendous change and growth; whether it be for good or ill.

The schools of the country and of Texas must work and plan unceasingly to keep up with the progress man has made. Texas, historically considered to be a young and vital state, ranks 49th in the number of illiterates when compared to the rest of the union. 697,000 Texans are considered to be functional il-

literate as they have not completed the fifth grade in the public schools. This group of people comprises 92 per cent of the unemployed and a large portion of the people on the welfare rolls. They have no saleable skill and are supported by the taxpayers of the state. This is in itself a statewide disgrace in a state that prides itself on its citizenry.

Mankind, during the million years of its existence, has resisted change. Yet, if we as a community and a state hope to be a part of the richest and most progressive country on earth, we must make reasonable plans for the future. It is not enough to be content with what we now are and what we now have. Through education we must insure the dignity of all men. Only dedicated communities such as ours will determine the place of the American nation in history. To fail as a community and as a country is to fail as a race. We must provide the leadership and the ideas that will continue to protect our freedom and our future.—Post Dispatch.

Frank Lawrence, Stays Busy in Slaton Office Of Justice Of Peace

Frank Lawrence was a supervisor in the county highway department and was ill many months before his death. Mrs. Lawrence had always worked, and Frank said during his illness that with her education and ability, she should have a job that would not keep her on her feet so much. She began studying the laws that govern the work of the Justice of Peace, and holds a certificate from Texas A&M stating that she completed their extensive course satisfactorily. She was first elected to the position of Justice of the Peace, place 2, Justice of the Peace, place 2, precinct 2, Lubbock county, in 1958 and was re-elected in 1962 to a second four-year term.

During the six-years she has served, the thousands of cases she has heard have all been subject to appeal to the county courts, but few have been appealed. She says one reason is police officers prepare proof of charges better now than when she was first elected. That may be, but she spends much time studying, conerring with other JP's, and attending their state and regional meetings. She feels each person who comes before her is an individual, each case is different in some way, and deserves individual consideration.

Looking through the record of cases heard in her court during one month, July last, one is impressed with their diversity. Most were violations of Motor Vehicle laws, but there were four for simple assault, three

Any one detained by an officer may demand to see a Magistrate at any hour, and she is often called in the wee small hours to set bond or give an offender an immediate hearing so he will not have to go to jail. possession of liquor by minors, forty fishing without license. Excessive speed cases decreased from 33 in January to only 9 in July, after the 70-mile daytime, 65-mile night limits became effective. Only one fine was assessed for daytime violation, a driver making 98 in a 70-mile zone. Perhaps the worst was a case of 110 miles per hour in a 65-mile zone at night. Mrs. Lawrence would not comment on it, except to say other charges were filed against the offender.

There were 26 cases of no diver's license, 1 no commercial chauffeur permit, 1 permitting unlicensed person to operate vehicle, 3 defective brakes, 2 unregistered vehicle, 1 fictitious license plates, 3 no inspection stickers, 1 truck over legal length, 7 over gross weight 10 over 32,000 lbs. maximum per tandem truck axle, 5 over 18,000 lbs. single axle maximum, 1 trash on highway, 5 running stop signs, and so on.

Mrs. Lawrence believes attempting to pass without sufficient clearance is the major cause of traffic accidents, and she should know having conducted enough inquests. If she is "tough" on any particular type of violation perhaps it's those.

Asked about being "squeamish" in investigating accidents and holding coroner's inquests, Mrs. Lawrence said she was at first, of course, but had schooled herself to forget the dead were living beings only hours ago, and to think only of what caused death.

Mrs. Lawrence says she loves her work and does not want help, though the load must be heavy as she writes her own warrants summons jurors, issues judgments, and keeps all records. Many justices having fewer cases require assistants to prepare the daily, weekly and monthly reports necessary.

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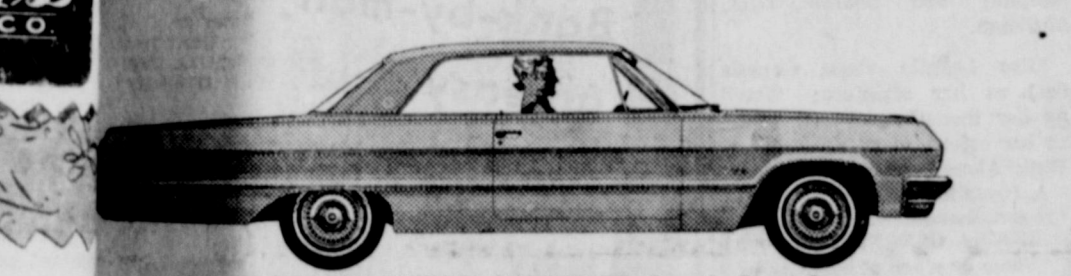

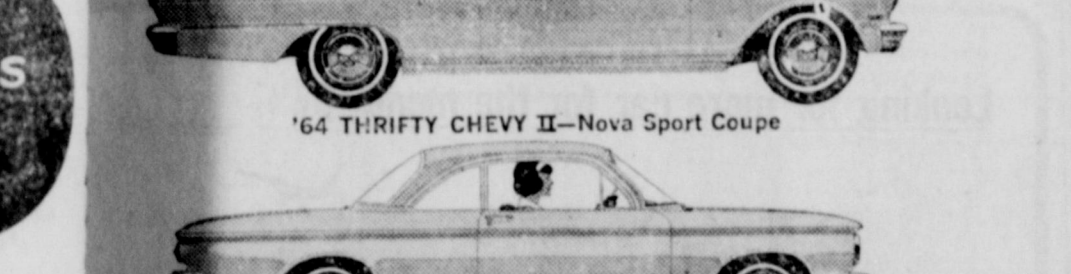

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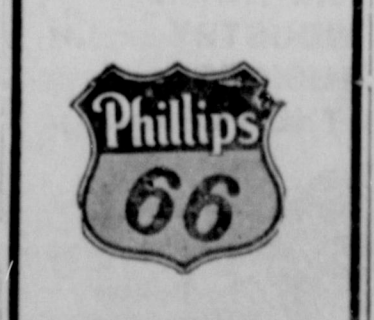

Slaton Masons Will Meet Tuesday Night

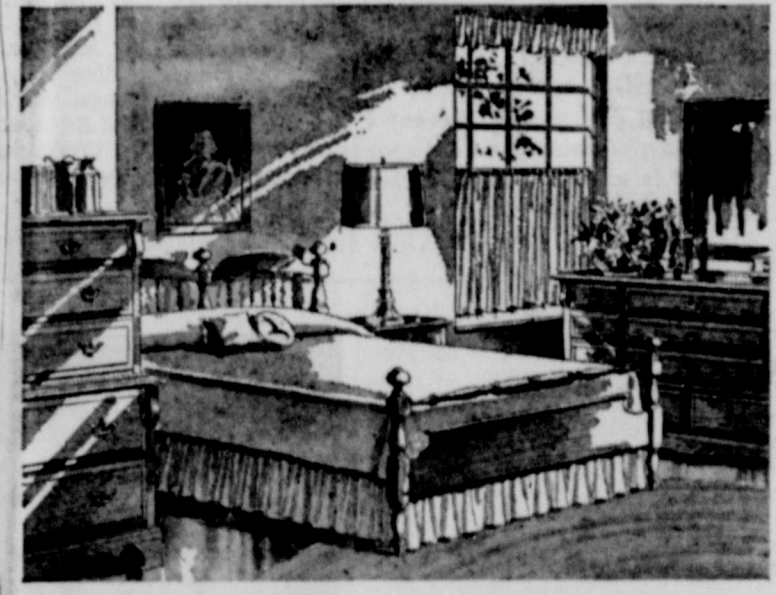

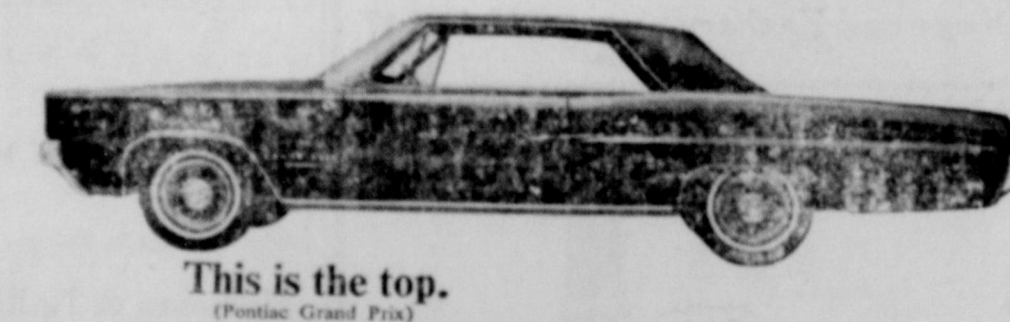
