A Better Trend In South Plains Farming

Norbet Kitten, one of the most successful young farmers in the Slaton area, who like his Uncle Bill Kitten, whose land he cultivates, is one who is always willing and anxious to try new trends in crop production and believes, and has proven to his own satisfaction, that planting cotton in two rows and skipping four will produce more cotton either on dry or irrigated land than the customary method of planting all cotton on acreage allotments. He does not consider feed near as beneficial to the land as peas and if it is not feasible to plant two rows and skip four he has found that planting four and skipping four is the next best.

Considering the price paid for feed it is not a paying crop and unless the price ceilings on cotton are lowered he believes the benefit to the land and the increased production will more than make up for giving the cotton more space to grow.

The planting of peas between cotton rows and of allowing more space to cotton is not a new idea but it has not been practiced in this area to any great extent. It is becoming more and more accepted each year and if it proves as successful with other farmers as it has with Mr. Kitten it will eventually not only cause a big reduction in the over-supply of grain but will increase its price and should make the production of grains again profitable in this section particularly if the cattle feeding industry increases as many predict it will.

Although there is a hard drive in most every community to bring more and more industrilization into action the people of Slaton and the smaller communities do not realize how many advantages are enjoyed because the basis of the economy is on agriculture and not on the whims of labor unions or the increases or decreases in the demands for some industrial product.

The prosperity of Slaton is directly tied up with agriculture. The business interest and efforts of the future Slaton should be concentrate upon helping and catering to the needs and desires of the farmers. It is most likely that the town will develop a much stronger and far more dependable economy than can ever be developed by any other means.

No longer is the farm trade based upon overalls, calico dresses and iron bedsteads. The farmer, his wife and his children are financially able to demand the best and the merchant who is afraid to stock the best the market affords is fast losing a big share of his trade and unless he changes to meet the market the prosperity of many merchants and of the entire community will suffer. In the introduction to "The Family Fallout Shelter," a pub-lication of the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, Mr. Hoegh

says: "In an atomic war, blast, heat and initial radiation could

heat and initial radiation could kill millions close to ground zero of nuclear bursts. Many more millions—everybody else—could be threatened by radioactive fallout. But most of these could

be saved."

Mr. Hoegh pointed out that the Federal shelter policy is based on the knowledge that most of those beyond the range of blast and heat will survive if they have adequate protection from fallout.

The OCDM booklet contains building plans for five basic fallout shelters. One is a do-it-yourself project with solid concrete blocks. Cost of the shelters ranges from \$150 to \$1500.
