Tiger Footballers Slate Workouts

A new coaching staff, a new season and two new opponents will be facing the Slaton High School Tiger football team as they start workouts for the 1959 season next Monday.

M. W. Kerr, new head coach, has slated this year's first get-together at 8 a. m. Monday, when all boys will report to check out equipment and get organized for pre-season workouts.

A tough opponent is on tap in the Tigers' first game, the Canyon Eagles. Already, however, loyal Tiger fans are making plans to get a special train to the Panhandle town for the contest in anticipation of an "all-out" game by the local team.

Last year's edition of the Tiger footballers won four games and lost six and the team is shooting for a better mark this term. Eight returning lettermen will form the nucleus of Coach Kerr's double-a squad which has a 10-game schedule.

Returning lettermen include Randy Sanders, Bill Barry, T. L.

Blisard, David Bishop, Jerry Allen, James Cole, Gary Ward and Giles Smith.

The new coaching staff, besides Kerr, is made up of Dean Wright, formerly of Tahoka, who will be assistant coach and work with the line and B-Team; Paul Boswell, assistant who will also work with the line and the Freshman Team, who last year coached at Cooper; Tommy Lacey, Junior High coach who comes to Slaton from Frenship; and Victor Day, assistant Junior High Coach, who was here last year.

Rain Damages Furniture In Local Store

Self Furniture Company, currently in the midst of an expansion and remodeling project, suffered an estimated \$10,000 in water damage last Saturday morning when rain fell on merchandise in the store through an incomplete roof "tie-in" from their new warehouse and service department.

The new expansion for the firm will give it approximately 2,400 square feet of additional floor space. The new building, being constructed behind the store at 235 W. Garza, will house the firm's warehouse and service department, thereby giving more space up front for display area.

The damage, coming at about 5 a. m. Saturday during a rain of nearly three inches, was caused when an area where the new building and the front building were being connected was not completed. The rain poured off the roof into the display area causing damage varying from light to severe to various pieces of furniture, carpet, etc.

Commission Rescinds Action On Band Stand

The Slaton City Commission, meeting here Monday night, was advised by an attorney to continue to enforce ordinance 179, the drinking-in-public ordinance, in spite of the fact that it has been declared unconstitutional in county court at law.

Ralph Brock, a Lubbock attorney, appeared before the commission and advised them to continue to enforce the ordinance in order to get a constitutionality ruling on it by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The ordinance earlier was declared unconstitutional in the County Court-At-Law of Judge Pat Moore.

Brock advised the commission to continue enforcing the ordinance in order to get another case to the county court which could be taken to the Court of Criminal Appeals. Brock was authorized by the commission to proceed as necessary with the case as it becomes necessary.

The vote was 182 for, to 11 against on the first proposal, that of accepting a maintenance tax; and 179 for to 123 against on the second proposal, that of issuing the bonds.

Former Slaton Man Receives Citation

Colorado Springs, Colo.—Lt. Col. Eldon W. Schmid has been awarded the Department of Army Commendation Ribbon with Metal Pendant for "exceptionally meritorious service" as Chief of the Scoring and Analysis Branch, G-3 (Operations and Training) Section, United States Army Air Defense Command, with station at Red Canyon Range, N. M.

The United States Army Air Defense Command is the Army member of the team of United States and Canadian services making up the North American Air Defense Command. It provides Nike guided missile defenses of "target" areas throughout the country.

Red Canyon Range was until recently the site of annual firing practice by USARADCOM units.

The citation accompanying Colonel Schmid's award read in part, "His thorough knowledge of the guided missile systems, together with his tireless efforts and leadership, have been contributing factors in the high results achieved by units at the Annual Service Practice, thus enhancing the operational effectiveness of the command."

The colonel is a 1935 graduate of Mt. Pleasant High School and attended Texas Technological College.

He is married to the former Dolores Lancaster of Washington, D. C. They have one child, Carole, 9.

Slaton's 28-Member Swim Team Places Sixth In Midland Meet

Slaton's 28-member swim team with 196 points, placed sixth in the West Texas Invitational Swim Meet held Saturday and Sunday in Midland. Austin with 250-member team won first with 669 points. Fort Worth was second, Midland, third, Odessa, fourth and Lubbock, fifth. More than 300 swimmers from 12 cities entered the competition.

High scorers for Slaton were as follows: David Cross, first, Intermediate 200-yard Individual Medley Relay; First, Intermediate 100-yard Breaststroke; Second, Intermediate 50-yard Freestyle; Richie Polk—Third, Senior 50-yard Freestyle; Guy Bowman—Third, Midget 25-yard Freestyle; Marilyn McSweeney, First, Junior 50-yard Freestyle. All received medals.

In the 100-yard Freestyle Mid-gate Girl's Relay, Slaton scored second. Members of the team were: Gay Bowman, Beverly Arants, Donna Hatchett and Holly McSweeney.

In the 200-yard Intermediate Boy's Freestyle Relay, Slaton scored third. Members of the team were: David Cross, Noel Dickson, Gregg Nowlin and Dickie Marriott.

In the 200-yard Junior Boy's Relay, Slaton placed third. Members of the team were: Bobby Harlan, Larry Smith, Alan Reasoner and Deanne Hatchett.

Right-Of-Way Tax Election Is Tuesday

Residents of Lubbock County will go to the polls on August 18 to mark ballots on a proposed 15-cent special right-of-way tax to assure construction of four-lane divided highways in the county.

Voting places in Slaton for the election will be for county wards 26, 27 and 28 with Ward 26 voters to cast ballots in the Retail Merchants office in City Hall, Ward 27 voters voting in the chamber of commerce office and Ward 28 voters casting their ballots in the city secretary's office.

The tax, which would bring in an estimated \$1,250,000 in the next five years if passed, was recommended by a county-wide citizens group composed of 64 representative citizens as the best method for financing the road program. Petitions calling for the election were presented to the county commission July 14.

In the resolution calling the election, the commissioners court wrote into the resolution a provision that it will be a moral obligation of their successors to see that the tax is removed after the five-year period.

Locally applied, the tax means a new by-pass highway to the west of Slaton.

'Haystack Ballot' Endorses Tax Proposal By A Slim Majority

The Chamber of Commerce "Haystack Ballot" last week saw local residents vote in support of the proposed right-of-way tax by a slim majority.

Supporters of the tax totaled 169 while those opposed totaled 160 in the election. Locally applied, the tax means a by-pass highway to the west of Slaton.

The "Haystack Ballot," while strictly unofficial, does bind local officials to work on behalf of the project while, if it had gone the other way, they would have worked to have the tax measure defeated.

Report On Cotton Insects

(Editor's Note: Here is the latest insect report from A&M Agents.)

Aphids continued to be the major pest on cotton in many localities. Heaviest infestations were found on late planted cotton or in fields which suffered earlier hail damage. Although beneficial insect populations have often built up to large numbers, such increases have rarely occurred before heavy damage was caused by the aphids in at least parts of plantings. Aphids should be controlled when heavy populations occur generally, and before leaves curl or honeydew shows on host plants.

Fleahoppers were not a serious pest in a majority of fields. Light to medium infestations were reported in most counties. Heavy populations were reported in some fields in Crosby and Floyd Counties. The heavier populations were found on older cotton which generally had a good set of squares and young bolls. In most instances infestations were not causing serious damage.

Bollworm egg and small worm counts were low in most fields throughout the area. Light to medium infestations were reported in Briscoe, Garza, and Howard Counties. Since bollworms often appear in damaging infestations in late July or early August fields should be checked frequently for eggs and small worms.

Cabbage loopers were generally found in large numbers than before. Noticeable ragging occurred in parts of some fields but infestations have rarely been sufficient to warrant control. Should heavy infestations develop the loopers should be controlled while small.

The information contained in the Cotton Insect Situation release has been compiled from reports received from county agents, voc. agri. teachers, personnel of Texas A&M College System, branches of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, commercial cotton inspectors, chemical

companies, and others. We hope everyone who does any field checking will again send us a report of the situation as you find it.

Extension Service Insect Report:

Infestations of most of the cotton insects did not increase to a marked degree over those of a week ago. While some increases were reported only scattered planting required control measures in most localities.

Aphids continued to damage late planted cotton in some fields and were reported in heavy infestations in some plantings in Hale, Hockley and Howard Counties. Heaviest populations were generally found on older cotton.

Bollworms were reported in somewhat larger numbers than a week ago. The worms were present in light infestations in a majority of the fields. Light to medium infestations were reported in Cochran, Bailey, Dawson, Lynn, Mitchell, Scurry and Yoakum Counties. Light populations were reported elsewhere. Since bollworm moths generally prefer tender growth for egg laying, cotton which has been recently irrigated should be checked for eggs and newly hatched worms.

Cabbage loopers and eggs were present in increased numbers in some fields while populations decreased in others. Disease is reducing infestations in some localities while loopers in other plantings show little mortality.

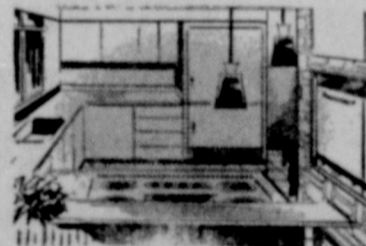
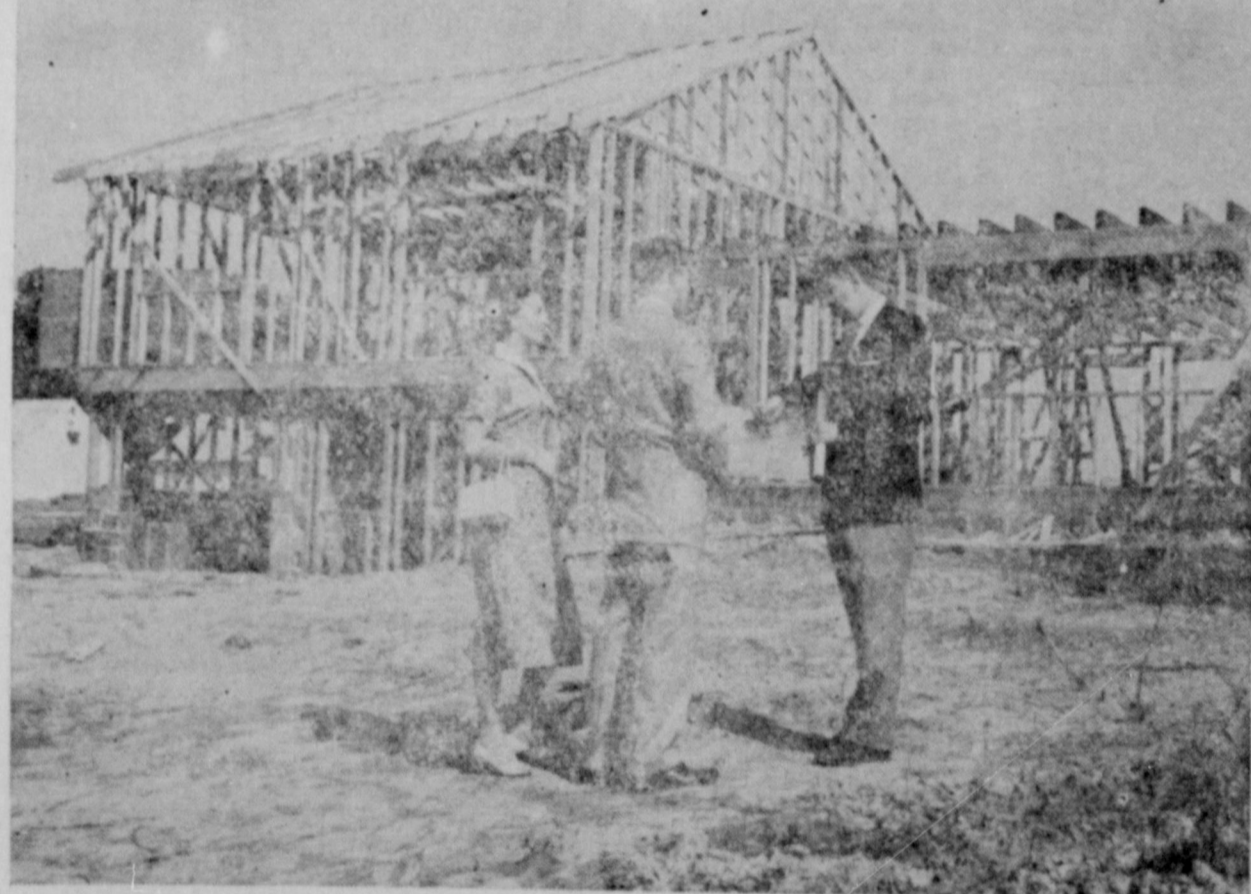

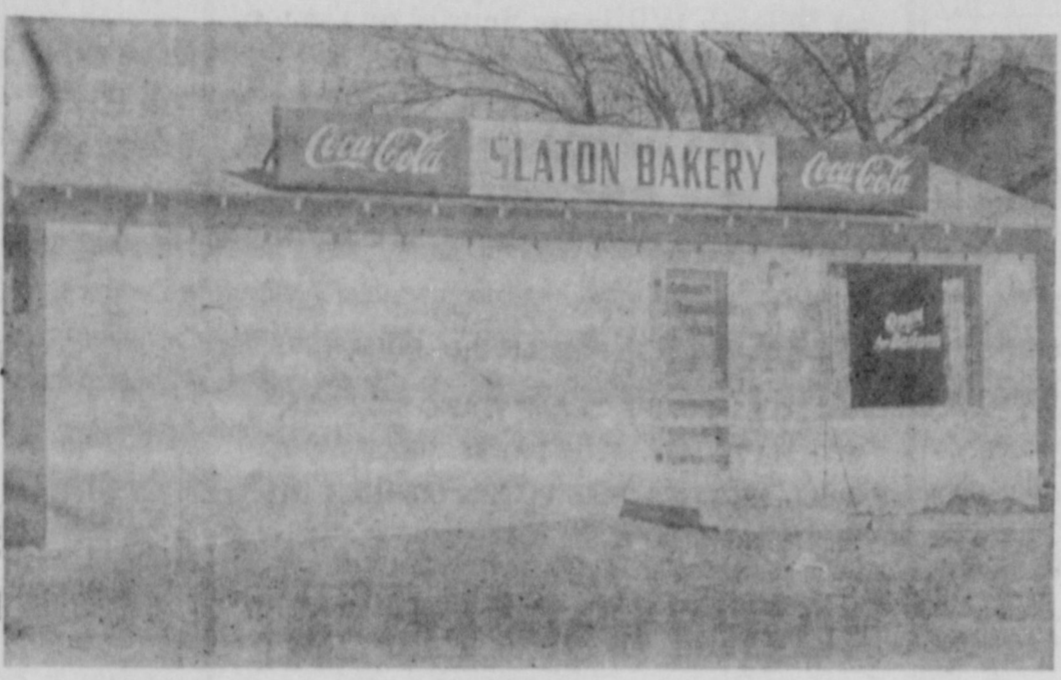

Supermarket Is Sponsoring New Television Game Called 'Orbit'

Slaton and area residents will "go into orbit" beginning August 13th, Ray Belt, manager of the Piggly Wiggly supermarket announces.

"Orbit" is a television game, not unlike the old fashioned, well-known Bingo. The Orbit program will be seen on Channel 11 at 6:30 p. m. each Thursday. Viewers participating will pick up Orbit cards at Piggly Wiggly or from the television station. Each week's Orbit cards will be a different color and each color card will be in effect only one week.

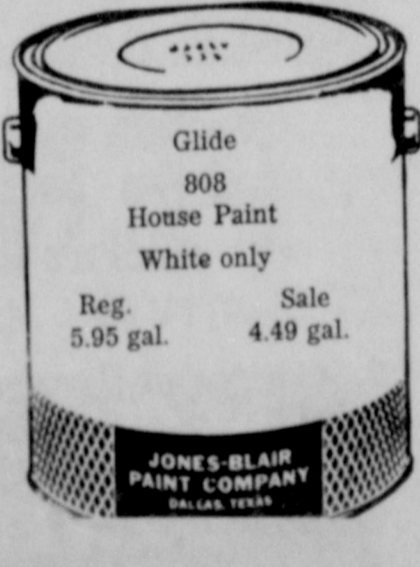

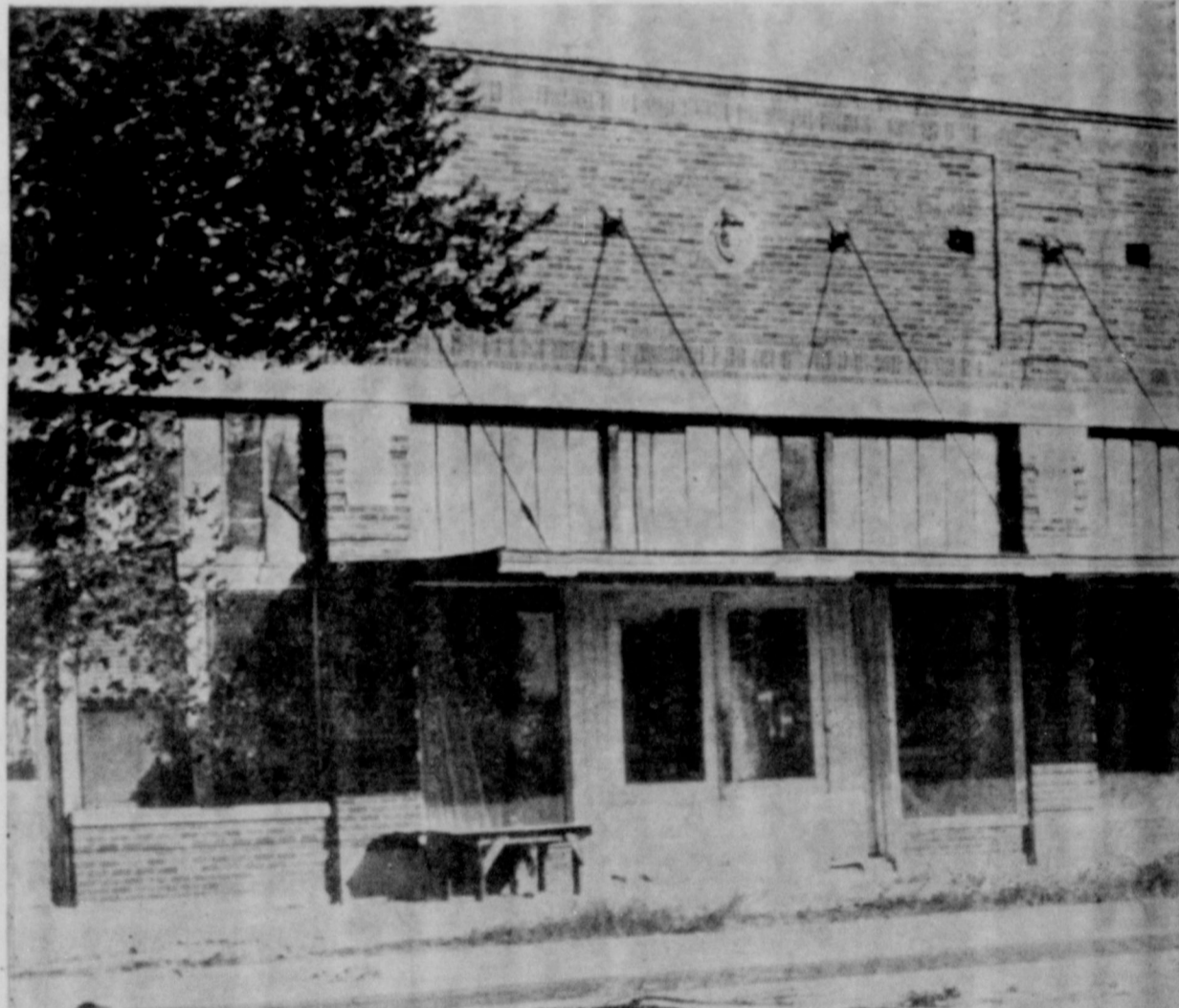

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN—Quiet has settled over Texas' Capitol Hill after 202 days of hubbub.

As legislators packed up to go home, directors and employees of state agencies were filling scratch pads with figures. For most state-supported activities, the new budget which goes into effect Sept. 1 will mean more funds. Altogether, \$300,000,000 more.

There were some disappointments, of course, in the appropriations bill. Many programs got less than had been asked for, some salaries were cut, and there were riders and restrictions in other activities.

But, overall, there was more relief and rejoicing than tears and complaining. Most seemed to regard the new budget as the best that could be hoped for in such a "hard year."

For their parts, lawmakers were eager to get home and "mingle with the folks." Ahead lie probable showdowns on new spending for welfare and public schools, and, always, the inching up every two years in general spending.

Budget Breakdown— Texas' new record high budget of \$2,418,000,000 was haggling out after 95 days of haggling in a committee.

It slipped out, it slipped out, it slipped out, with only a few votes in the Senate vote in the general state's multi-million kitty, to

Girls. It will also cover some salary increases and cost of some repair and remodeling in the vast hospital and school systems. It does not allow for setting up the juvenile parole system ardently desired by the Youth Council and recommended by Gov. Price Daniel.

STATE EMPLOYEES—Lower-bracket employees, from \$2,400 to \$6,000 annually, will get a \$180 a year raise. It's not a lot—\$15 a month more in the employees' pay envelopes—but it will cost the state about \$14,000,000 for the two years.

JUDICIARY—Will receive \$9,336,769 from general revenue, a \$312,779 increase. Most of this goes for new district courts plus briefing attorneys and secretaries for the Supreme Court.

PRISON SYSTEM—Operating budget increased by \$2,800,000 plus \$7,720,000 to provide additional buildings for a prison population soaring toward 11,000.

LIVESTOCK DISEASE—A new program to control brucellosis was tabbed for \$239,960, considerably under the \$2,170,000 requested.

STATE ADVERTISING—State Highway Department was authorized to use \$100,000 to lure tourists and the Texas Industrial Commission \$20,000 to seek new industries.

CONSTITUTION—Texas Legislative Council was given \$50,000 for a study of the State Constitution with a view to revising it.

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT—All the furor over top officials' salaries brought little change. Commissioner of Insurance William Harrison was cut from \$20,000 to \$15,000 a year; the three board members, from \$15,000 to \$14,000.

BUILDING PROGRAM—To further the Capitol expansion program, \$2,753,000 was appropriated for buying land, \$2,924,000 for a second state office building.

WATER PLANNING—Board of Water Engineers was allotted \$2,037,000, an increase of \$200,000, but nearly \$800,000 less than requested. It will allow for some salary increases for board members and engineers and mapping to locate future dam sites.

Rio Grande Navy—Sen. Abraham (Chick) Kazen, Jr. of Laredo, Texas' fourth "governor for a day" this year, used his time in the spotlight to call attention to needs of his South Texas border country district.

As Senate president pro tempore, Kazen served as chief executive in the absence of the governor and lieutenant governor. He proclaimed Good Neighbor day, created the Navy of the Rio Grande and urged Congressional approval for construction of Diablo Dam west of Del Rio.

Sen. Frank Owen, III of El Paso succeeds Kazen as president pro tempore for the interim between sessions.

Reprive For Church—St. Martin's Lutheran Church, a beautiful, classically designed building one block north of the Capitol, was to be destroyed to make way for the state building program.

Texas Employment Commission's new building has already gone up within a few feet of it.

But the Senate, in a resolution sponsored by Sen. Charles Herring of Austin, has asked TEC to study the possibility of putting the church to some use, such as a non-denominational chapel, before deciding to level it.

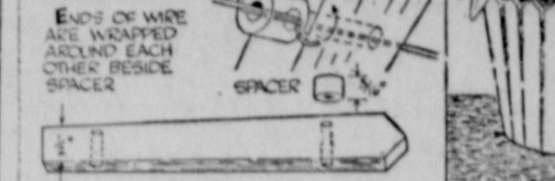
Short Snorts—
