Cain Retained as Mayor

Slaton voters returned Jonas Cain to the mayor's seat for a third term, but Ward 1 and 3 commissioners were not so fortunate in the city election Tuesday.

Cain scored a decisive 574-335 victory over Luther Gregory in the citywide mayor's race.

Upset in their bids for reelection were incumbents Curly Martindale and Jack Smith. In Ward 1, Hugo Mosser polled 159 votes over Martindale's 118. Henry Bollinger, former Ward 3 commissioner, reclaimed the seat with a close 109 to 97 decision over Smith.

A total of 909 votes were cast in the mayor's race, just short of the vote total of 944 in the city election two years ago.

City voters apparently gave Cain a vote of confidence as he carried all four boxes and won with a 239-vote margin. He won by a 90-vote margin in 1965 with Gregory running second in a three-man race.

Tuesday's turnout was better than some observers expected, since little interest was expressed several weeks prior to the election.

Mosser made his first bid for office a successful one, winning the Ward 1 post by a 41-vote margin. He is a longtime resident of Slaton and owner and manager of Mooser Radio & T.V. He and his wife, Alyce, have seven children -- ranging in age from 2 to 13. They reside on Union Road.

Bollinger, a retired railroad engineer, served three terms on the commission before losing to Smith two years ago. He and his wife, Emma, have six daughters. He has been a resident of Slaton since 1915.

All varsity and "B" team members on Slaton High athletic teams will be honored guests at the banquet.

Johnnie Moore, Tiger Club president, will be master of ceremonies for the event. New officers of the club will also be introduced at the banquet.

Athletic Director Ernie Davis will recognize the coaching staff and members of all teams. "The Fighting Tiger" award, sponsored by The Slatonite, will also be presented.

The award, which remains in the school trophy case, goes to the athlete who coaches think gives the most effort and sacrifices the most for his team. The "120 percent" is not necessarily the most outstanding athlete for the season, but the one who gives himself.

A graduate of Snyder High, Teaff went to San Angelo Jun-

EXCEPTIONS TO SUIT UPHELD

Precinct Dry Forces Get New Hearing Date

A 137th District Court hearing on the suit contesting the local option liquor election in Justice Precinct 2 was held Friday, with Judge James A. Ellis upholding exceptions to allegations, but giving "dry" forces a new date for amending their petition.

Judge James A. Ellis gave attorneys for James F. Davis Jr., Earl Hammett, both of Acuff, and the Rev. W. O. Donley, pastor of First Baptist Church, Roosevelt, who brought the suit, until April 17 to amend their petition in line with the exceptions.

The judge also gave attorneys

for the respondents until May 1 to answer the amended petition. The suit was brought against County Judge Rodrick L. Shaw and Commissioners Arch Lamb, Max Arrants, Les Derrick and Alton Brazell.

Judge Ellis also overruled a challenge to the jurisdiction of the court which was based on the alleged method of serving county officials named as respondents.

With the new dates of April 17 and May 1 set on filing and answering the amended petition, date of the actual trial of the election contest suits expected to be set after May 1.

In the suit contesting the Jan. 14 election in which the precinct retained the sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption by a vote of 1,567 to 1,009, the contestants held that a "true result" of the election could not be determined because of various alleged irregularities.

The petition alleged irregularities in some methods of holding the election and also alleged that unqualified persons cast votes. Other allegations covered the Supreme Court "one man-one vote" rule to charge that voters in Slaton

Wilson voters turned out in record numbers to elect A. N. Crowson as mayor and to name three councilmen. A total of 90 votes were cast.

Named as councilmen were C. E. Campbell, 67 votes; J. W. Lamb, 61; and Virgil Henderson, 54. Other candidates were Jerry D. Ross, 48 votes; and Charles Shaw, 35.

Crowson, a former city councilman, lost by three votes two years ago to A. L. Holder. Tuesday he defeated D. J. Hutcheson, councilman, by 74 to 16 for the mayor's post.

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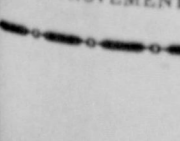

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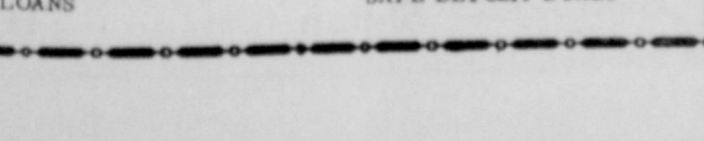

Jimmie Holder, chairman of the Lubbock County Savings Bonds Committee announced today that February sales of United States Savings Bonds in Lubbock County totaled \$127,032. During the first two months of 1967, sales in the county totaled \$303,981 which is 14 per cent of the 1967 goal of \$2,200,000.

During the first two months of 1967 Savings Bond sales in Texas totaled \$29,451,247 which is 16 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.3 million and a 15.2 per cent increase over sales during the same period of 1966.

Nationally, the sale of Savings Bonds during February totaled \$426 million and were 23 per cent higher than a year ago, and the highest for any February in 7 years. The January - February total was \$917 million, 12 per cent over sales for the first two months of 1966 and the highest January - February sales since 1963.

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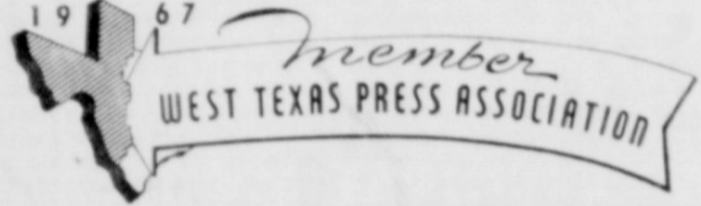

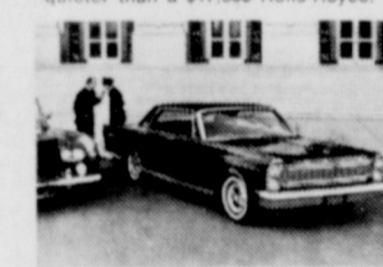

Future Jobs Important To Texans

Will the Texas economy and industrial expansion be able to provide job opportunities in 1970 or 1980?

Between 1960-1970, the U. S. Labor force will gain 22% from 69.9 million to 85.3 million (over 100 million in 1980), and the increase will be unevenly distributed both by geographical regions and by age. The major portion of the increase will be in the age group 14-24 years of age, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics labor force projections. This unbalanced distribution by age takes on a note of urgency when considering what job opportunities will be available in 1970 or 1980.

Regionally, the projected 1960-1970 increase in the number of workers 14-24 years old will vary from 56% in the Northeast to 94% in the West. The South, which includes Texas, will jump 64.2% in the 14-24 year old group. During the years 1970-1980 in the South, the labor force under 24 years of age will increase 15.3%.

Texas industrial growth will be maintained and increased by maintaining a good business climate. This is essential if the state economy is going to provide the job opportunities in 1970-1980!

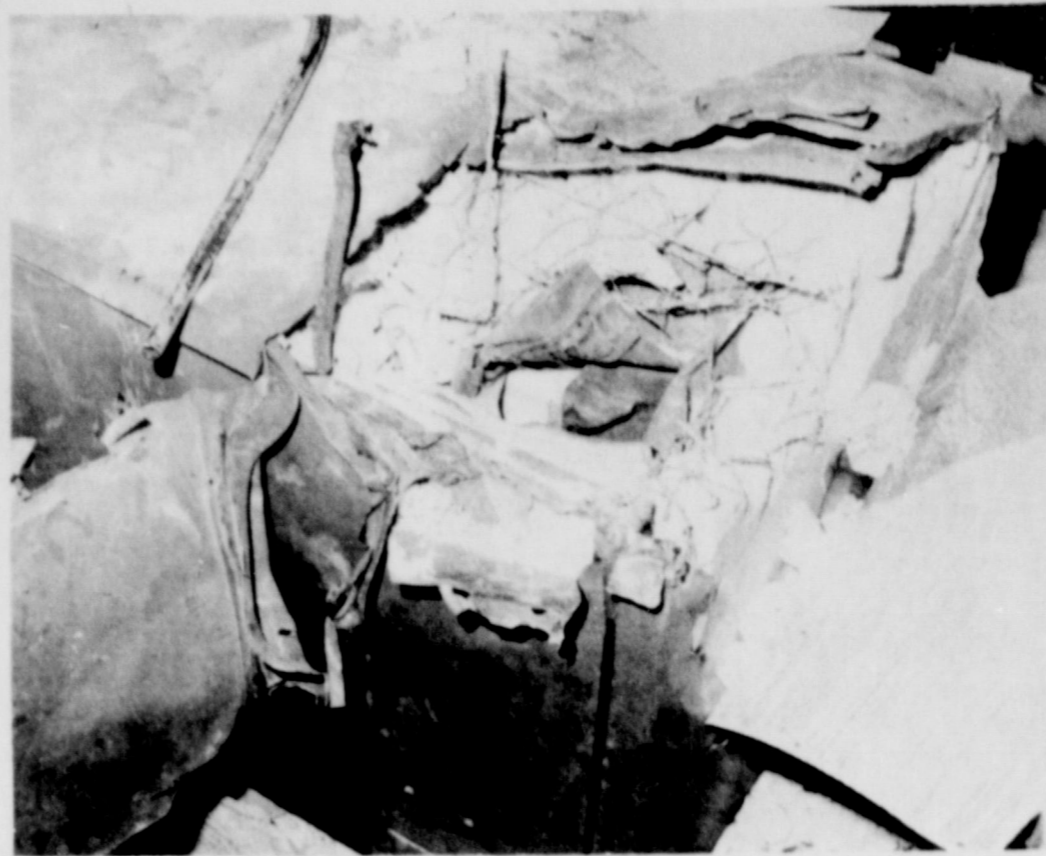

\$79,646 IN DIVIDENDS PAID

Union Co-op Has Meet, Starts Cotton Program

Dividends in the amount of \$79,646.65 were passed out to patrons of Union Cooperative Gin when the gin held its annual membership meeting last Wednesday, March 29 in the Slaton Clubhouse at 2 p.m.

It was reported at the meeting that the gin showed a profit of \$18.48, per bale ginned. Bobby Jones and W. L. Bednarz were re-elected to the board and also re-elected president and vice-president. Other officers and directors on the board are Clarence Kitten, secretary, Joe Gamble and E. D. Patterson, directors and Jesse M. Johnson, manager and treasurer.

Representatives of Plains Coop Oil Mill, Farmers Coop Compress, Plains Coop Marketing Association and Plains Cotton Growers made brief remarks at the meeting.

Gin manager Jesse M. Johnson reported to members that the LSM (length, strength and mike) Cotton Improvement Program is getting underway at an excellent start in the community. He said: "To date, we have booked between 21,000 to 22,000 pounds of planting seed. This is sufficient seed to plant 1,000 acres."

He went on to say, "We feel that the program is being approached in a sensible and rational manner. No one is risking all his eggs in one basket. The modest acreage that our customers indicate that they will plant will give a clear indication of the possibilities of growing quality cotton in this area. If the program is profitable, it can be enlarged from

year to year as efficient farm management dictates. If it is not profitable, it can be modified or dropped without a substantial loss to our producers.

"By ginning this cotton in blocks, after properly cleaning and adjusting the gin, the quality of both lint and seed can be preserved just as effectively as though it were ginned on a one variety gin."

Johnson explained, "This cotton can be marketed in ac-

cordance with the desires of producers. If a favorable price can be obtained from some mill or other textile firm, the cotton can be sold directly to them. If a favorable contract cannot be negotiated, it may be marketed through the marketing associations quality lint program." He said the board feels this gives a considerable advantage in seeking out a favorable market for this quality lint.

Texas Industry Grew 56,100 Jobs In 1966

Increases in manufacturing jobs in Texas during 1966 generated additional jobs, businesses and establishment of households which were the equivalent of building a new city slightly bigger than Waco.

The 34,000 new manufacturing jobs in 1966 in turn created 22,100 more jobs in non-manufacturing, representing the total establishment of approximately 56,100 households. These household units would mean approximately 187,000 increase in population, comparable to a city the size of Waco.

AUSTIN -- Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texans to review tornado safety precautions.

"While tornadoes can occur any time of the year," Garrison said, "April, May, and June are the peak months."

U. S. Weather Bureau records indicate that Texas leads the nation in total number of tornadoes per year. The annual average of 80.7 is based on a record of 1,210 confirmed tornadoes from 1951 thru 1965.

"It is especially important for every school, church, hospital, hotel, business house, and industry to establish an emergency plan," Garrison said. "To know what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death."

A circular on tornado safety is available from most local Civil Defense offices.

Alphabetical signs and numbers of the times greet you everywhere. The government has its GOP and DEM political parties. Then there's ASCS, TVA, REA, CCC, an CIA, just to mention a few. To file your tax you must affix your SS no. to form W2 or 1040A. Before you decide whether to attend TT, SMU, A&M, or WTS, you'll have to have your SAT or ACT rating. Also, you probably belong to one of the following: FFA, FHA, YMCA, YWCA, MYF, or CYO. When watching TV it's usually KCBH or KLBK. 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
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
