Since the introduction of the Salk vaccine in 1955, the incidence of polio has been cut back sharply. But even one case of a crippled child, or of a striken parent is one too many, Schmid pointed out.

Salk vaccine is a killed virus vaccine. Although three types are combined into one vaccine, four shots are given over a period of 9 to 15 months. With Sabin oral vaccine, each type is given seperately by mouth, four to eight weeks apart. This vaccine works fast, usually within against poliovirus as well as antibodies in the blood-stream. Thus, it is expected that the vaccine will help prevent vaccinated persons from carrying the disease as well as help protect them against poliovirus.

fully informed, we urge study of each proposed measure in its A brief digest of the 14 proposed Amendments follows: NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 25) - Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all

political subdivisions. NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 9) - Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 22) - Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT HJR 46) - Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 51) - Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36) - Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years

or more. NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 13) - Insured continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of

the Legislature. NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7) - Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and perman-

NUMBER NINE ON THE BADLOT (HJR 70) - Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Bra-

NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 12) - Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof. NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 25) - Autho-

rizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 19) - Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of

Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof. NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6) - Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 32) - Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of govern-

# No Saturated Press for Us

Upon scanning the front page of a well-known daily newspaper this morning, we suddenly were awakened to the appalling fact that five of the six articles on the front page were releases from government bureaus or were stories about government services, investigations, controls, projects and theories.

Only other "story" on the page was that of a murder. Now why are so many dailies monopolized by government "news"? It conceivably could be one of three rea-

(1) Bureau publicity agents are doing a stellar job of convincing the press of the importance of their particu-

(2) These are the tidings the public wants to read, prefering such to the old fashioned headlines of people and events in the several walks of life.

(3) Government is now so big that every facit of our existence is contigent upon information from "higher up", that we may be a good, law abiding, loyal and conforming proletariat.

We do not like any part of the trend of governmentspawned items taking over any news publication. Continuation of the practice can prove only one thing: - the

bigness of a power-happy hierachy. Thank goodness we are pubishers of a hometown weekly paper, one in which we feel people still like to read about the deeds and accomplishments of people about us, our neighbors and children, wholesome and good news of the familiar institutions of our community.

Last week the Slatonite had 21 front page news stories, not a one of them sensational for sensationalism sake; not a one was dictated by any individual or bureaucratic

For better or for worse, the Slatonite still is an independent paper with its ownership and employees dedicated to the task of providing local news in an impartial manner. . .a family newspaper. We are proud of this responsibility, and we jealously guard our right to keep the Slatonite wholesome and independent.

Until the time arrives when we know without doubt that the public prefers the printed details of government guardianship on one hand, of tragedy and rape and carnality on the other, we'll continue to provide a balanced, if dull, paper you can hand your children without apologizing or blushing.

We are "agin" it! Indications now are that imitations threaten to replace the cow.

Take a look on the grocery shelves and you'll see what we mean. . .imitation milk. . .imitation whipped cream .desserts of a sort. . .and a special coffee "cream"

Could be that our grandchildren will never have the 'pleasure" of lifting bossy's hoof from the milk pail or swatting her aromatic tail from their eyes! We have a fond memory of childhood days when we thought we had problems - all dissolved when bossy came ambling into the stall with a new-born calf. . . how pleased dad was with a heifer calf, but so upset when it was a scrawny Jersey bull.
