

ABSENTEE VOTE, SLATON'S STATUS UNDER FIRE

'Drys' Seek Court Action on Election

The wet-dry controversy in Justice Precinct 2 hit the headlines again last week when a petition contesting last month's local option election was filed in 137th District Court at Lubbock.

The suit, filed on the afternoon of Feb. 15, alleges irregularities in "bringing about" and "in holding" the Jan. 14 election, and violation of the Constitutional guarantee of equality of votes.

The petition asks the court to declare results of the election null and void, or to declare Slaton wet and the remainder of Justice Precinct 2 dry. The suit was filed on "deadline" day by leaders of the "Drys of Justice Precinct 2."

The petitioners include Jimmy Davis Jr. and Earl Hammett, both of Acuff, and the Rev. W. Q. Daley, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Roosevelt.

Respondents named in the suit are County Judge Rod Shaw and Commissioners Arch Lamb, Max Arrants, L. C. Derrick and Alton Brazell.

The "wets" scored a decisive victory in the recent election, voters approving the sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption by the margin of 1,567 to 1,009.

Although the margin was a substantial 558 votes, dry forces were particularly disturbed about the 468-77 defeat showing in the absentee box. Twenty-one percent of the votes were cast in the absentee boxes, with 405 of these 545 votes coming from the special absentee box in Slaton.

After filing the petition last week, an attorney for the drys indicated they would take dead aim on knocking out the absentee box, if not the entire election. The spokesman cited some unusual incidents in connection with absentee voting. He added "the ratio in the actual election was close, but it doesn't make sense the absentee box would be that one-sided if everything was as it should have been."

Atty. Dan Hurley, who recorded the suit, also questioned an attorney general opinion that

indicated Slaton would remain dry regardless of the outcome of the precinct election.

Hurley and attorney Madison Sowder, who also represents dry forces, said the alleged irregularities made it impossible to determine a "true result" of the election.

They pointed out that although the election was "less than countywide," the commissioner's court failed to appoint a clerk for absentee voting and failed to designate the place for

conducting the absentee voting; that one of the absentee boxes was located at a private business in Slaton and was not in a public place other than the courthouse; and that the county clerk acted as election judge of the absentee box without having been appointed to the position.

The attorneys said that there is a "special statute" outlining these requirements in "less than county wide elections."

Mahon Cites Urgent Need To Improve Cotton Quality

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- Representative George Mahon reports that officials of the Department of Agriculture may soon announce an arbitrary reduction in the loan rate on short staple cotton.

Officials complain that there is a heavy accumulation of short staple cotton in the loan and that unless better staple and quality is grown the accumulation of hard-to-sell government stocks will continue to rise.

Mahon has cautioned Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman that an arbitrary reduction in support rates would be unfair and unacceptable. He asserts that he believes that the differentials reflected by the spot markets provide a sufficient spread between cotton qualities to encourage the production of better cotton.

"I have been encouraged," Mahon said, "by reports which have come to me indicating that West Texas farmers are aware of the threat to their economic welfare and are planning to make a major effort to improve staple length and quality."

Mahon said indications are that unless something dramatic is done within the next three years to improve the quality and uniformity of Texas cotton, the industry would sharply deteriorate and the economy of many producing areas would suffer great loss.

In a statement on the subject of cotton quality Mahon said, "My discussions with farmers lead me to believe that many producers are quite uncertain as to what particular strain of cotton seed should be selected for planting. Farmers need more information and clarification as to what the best varieties actually are. Another question relates to the availability of adequate seed supplies. Nevertheless there seems to be much expectation that significant progress will be made this year. It would be difficult to exaggerate the importance of better quality and more uniformity."

Local Farmers Seek Solution

Faced by the threat of arbitrary reduction in the loan rate on short-staple cotton, a group of Slaton area farmers launched a program this week to produce a long-staple cotton, gin it all in one plant, and seek a market for the crop.

The board of directors at Slaton Co-Op Gin appointed a steering committee recently to study the project and make recommendations on the program to be used.

Members of the advisory group are Walter Heinrich, Glen Akin, Donald Jones, Joe Walker and Floyd Kitchens. Some of the committee members and directors met with a cotton broker Tuesday afternoon to discuss potentials in producing a long-staple cotton.

The gin is announcing plans to have such a program with Acala 1517 as the variety of cotton to be grown. Alex Bednarz is president of the board at Slaton Co-Op.

The advisory group reported some 3,000 acres already signed up for the program, with substantial more acreage anticipated.

PARTY DESSERT FOR 9

Dissolve one package Strawberry Jell-O in one cup hot water. Add one cup pineapple juice, chill until slightly thickened. Line bottom of 8x8x2 inch pan with graham crackers. Whip 1-1/3 cups cream (or one package of Dream Whip), fold in 2/3 cup drained canned crushed pineapple, 2/3 cup chopped nuts, 2 tablespoons sugar, and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Spoon into pan. Top with more crackers. Add Jell-O; chill.

SKILLET MACARONI AND BEEF

1-1/2 lbs. ground beef
1/2 lb. uncooked elbow macaroni (2cups)
1/2 cup minced onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1 T. Worcestershire sauce
2-8 oz. cans tomato sauce
1 cup water
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper

Cook beef in large skillet until it loses its redness. Remove from pan and cook macaroni, onion, and green pepper in meat fat until macaroni is yellow. Return meat to skillet along with tomato sauce, water, salt, pepper, and Worcestershire. Cover and simmer 25 minutes or until macaroni is cooked to suit your taste. Makes 6 servings.

FRENCH CAN-CANS

1 stick margarine
1 cup graham cracker crumbs
1 package chocolate chips (6 oz.)
1 cup chopped nuts
1 can Eagle Brand milk

Melt margarine in 9 x 9 - inch pan in which you are going to bake the Can-Cans. Over the melted margarine sprinkle the graham cracker crumbs, then the chocolate chips, then the nuts, and last pour Eagle Brand milk over the nuts. Medicare Data

Medicare protection for hospital bills and doctors' bills can start with the month you reach age 65. To get this immediate coverage for doctor bills, however, you must enroll during one of the three months before the month you reach 65.

Your medical insurance, which pays doctor bills, is not retroactive, and if you do not sign up on time you will lose months of coverage.

Your first enrollment period ends three months after your 65th birthday. If you do not enroll before the end of the third month after the month you reach age 65, you won't be able to sign up until October 1967. Your coverage would not start until January 1968.

If you sign up in your first enrollment period your monthly premiums will be \$3. Should you wait until October 1967, your premiums will be at least 10 percent higher.

By not visiting your social security office promptly you can lose over a year of this valuable protection against the cost of doctor bills. You are eligible for medicare even if you continue working after 65.

 One of the lawyers was quoted as saying that there is no precedent, no cases to settle some of the issues" involved, but "maybe we can get a lot of law written on this."

The drys were hoping for early action on the matter, pointing out that elections take precedence over other cases. The alternative solution of reversing the current wet-dry status of the precinct and the City of Slaton was based on voting trends in the two areas. The drys contend that Slaton voted wet and the rural area voted dry, but that the status was exactly opposite, thus violating "equality of votes in that each voting unit has been denied the results of a majority of the ballots cast."

According to the attorney general ruling, however, the wets point out that the rural area does not constitute a "voting unit" in itself--that is, in a precinct election there is one entire area in question, not "city" and "rural" areas. The suit reportedly alleges that more than 180 voters were cast by persons who were not residents of the precinct; that more than 400 persons who voted absentee had no intentions of being absent from the county and did not expect to be absent from the county on Jan. 14; that several persons who were not qualified to vote were actually induced to cast a ballot.
