Santa Fe RR To Reset Clocks April 30

Santa Fe Railway has announced it will move all clocks forward one hour at 2:00 a.m. Sunday, April 30, in compliance with the Uniform Time Act of 1966.

Since all states served by the railroad are complying with the Act, the change means that printed schedules and operation of all Santa Fe trains will correspond with the official local time in each community.

Under the new daylight time schedule the westbound San Francisco Chief will arrive Amarillo 10:15 a.m., 11:30 a.m. at Clovis and 4:15 p.m. at Belen. Eastbound, the train will reach Belen at 10:15 a.m., Clovis at 2:50 p.m. and Amarillo at 6:15 p.m.

Trains 75 and 76, operating between Clovis and Houston, will continue the same arrival and departure times. Train 76 will leave Clovis at 3:40 p.m. daylight time and arrive Lubbock at 7:00 p.m. On the return trip train 75 will reach Lubbock at 7:15 a.m. and Clovis at 9:30 a.m.

from back pains, too severe to allow him to work. However, it appeared that his condition could be greatly improved if he would diet off some excess poundage. Under these circumstances, a court held he was not disabled in the sense that the law meant - and therefore he did not qualify for disability payments. Another rule, illustrated by Mary's case above, is that you are not disabled merely because you can no longer do exactly the same job you have done in the past. The law expects you to take an alternative job, if you are fitted for it. On the other hand, the law does not expect you to seek work beyond your capacities. For example: A workman, forced by injuries to give up manual labor, was still physically able to do clerical work at a desk. But he had neither the education nor the experience for it. Therefore, a court held him sufficiently disabled to qualify for benefits. Nor must you seek a kind of work which you could do only at the cost of grievous pain and effort. As one judge put it, the law should not be applied so sternly that it would aid only the "totally helpless and bedridden" and "those at death's door."

**WATER RIGHTS LAW** -- After 50 years of effort, Texas now has a water rights adjudication act to help solve water disputes without prolonged and costly court battles.

Act follows the "Oregon plan" of administrative procedure in refereeing water wrangles, plus automatic judicial review.

Riparian users must file a record of their claims with the Texas Water Rights Commission, the administering agency, by Sept. 1, 1969.

Backers of the bill said they hope it will prevent repetition of cases like the Rio Grande Valley water rights suit which has cost an estimated \$10,000,000 (\$400,000 of that out of state funds) over years of litigation. Case now is on appeal.

**INDUSTRIAL AMENDMENT PASSES** -- Legislature has cleared for submission to voters next year the first constitutional amendment of this lawmaking session -- to permit cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development.

If approved by Texans in the November, 1968, election, bonds could be used to build industrial plants for private concerns and repaid through revenues of the corporations. No tax funds would be obligated.

**AG OPINIONS** -- Proposed law to prohibit sale of merchandise below cost "with intent to injure competition" would be constitutional, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

\*State institutions can adopt reasonable standards of clothing and attire for students, inmates or employees. However, "anti-beatnik" bill by Rep. Edwin Jones of Lubbock is unconstitutional because caption does not cover all provisions.

\*Court would have power under new bill to require presence in courtroom of parents or guardians of a minor charged with driving while intoxicated.

\*Law does not require an employee be given time off to vote while working overtime hours for which he volunteered.

\*Galveston County may use flood control funds to maintain seawalls.

\*It is responsibility of the committing county to physically return an escaped juvenile offender to Texas Youth Council custody.

\*Bill authorizing exchange of benches by justices of peace in the same county is constitutional.

\*Harris County commissioners court cannot enjoin a subdivider from selling lots on the ground that he has failed to complete roads to standards of county engineer.

\*Chattel mortgages filed prior to last July 1 should be renewed or extended by filing affidavit with county clerk as required by law in effect before the Uniform Commercial Code

## COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS INC.

Producers in 23 High Plains counties surrounding Lubbock and represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., have signed up to plant 1,430,384 acres of cotton in 1967.

This is 64.6 per cent of the 2,198,908 acres available for planting in the area, and is 21,023 acres less than was planted in 1966.

Area figures were compiled by PCG from figures released by the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office at College Station. The sign-up period for the 1967 cotton program extended through March 17.

Of the total acreage available for planting in the area, producers indicated they would divert 750,846 acres to conservation uses. This is 34.4 per cent of the total acreage enrolled in the program, and compares with a 32.7 per cent rate of diversion in 1966.

Accounting for most of the 17,578 acres not enrolled in the 1967 program are allotments signed up in the Cropland Reserve or Cropland Adjustment Program, but there are also some small acreages which producers simply didn't bother to enroll and probably won't bother to plant.

Original cotton allotments on the Plains in 1967 totaled 2,165,872 acres. The additional 33,516 acres in the total "available for planting" came to the Plains through purchases or leases of allotments or from

acreage transfers between farms of the same ownership. Such transactions were permitted under the Agriculture Act of 1965 for the first time in 1966, when the Plains had a 46,770 acre net gain from acreage transfers.

By far the biggest gainer of acreage under sale or lease and transfer provisions has been Gaines County, with 12,996 acres moved in the first year and 8,940 gain acres in 1967.

Not included in the acres producers intend planting in 1967 are 300 that went to Francis Cunningham in Cochran County under the export acreage provisions of the program. Production from these 300 acres must go into export markets at the world price without benefit of price support or government loan. According to State ASCS officials, these were the only export acres issued in Texas.

The 1967 cotton program, as in 1966, gave producers a choice of diverting between 12-1/2 per cent and 35 per cent of effective allotments. The government payment for this diversion in 1967 will be 10.78 cents per pound times the farm's projected yield.

In addition cooperating producers will receive a price support payment on production from domestic allotments (65 per cent of effective allotments) of 11.53 cents per pound times projected yield. Diversion and price support payments, re-

spectively, were 10.5 cents and 9.42 cents per pound in 1966. With this economic incentive almost every county on the Plains this year will come close to diverting the maximum 35 per cent. The only two Plains counties to fall below 34 per cent diversion were Swisher and Deaf Smith. Swisher County farmers signed up to divert 33.9 per cent of allotments, but Deaf Smith County signed to divert only 30.3 per cent.

The low level of diversion in Deaf Smith County is probably accounted for by the large number of allotments below ten acres in that county. Producers with less than ten acre allotments, or with an aggregate projected yield of less than 3,600 pounds, can receive the 10.78 cent diversion payment without actually diverting any acreage.

Despite slightly reduced acreage in 1967, Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of PCG, believes that area can reasonably expect to produce over 200,000 bales more in 1967 than in 1966.

Adverse weather conditions last year cut High Plains production on 1,451,407 planted acres to approximately 1.25 million bales. "If in 1967 we can reach the 519-pound per acre average yield achieved in 1965, total production would come out to over 1,488,000 bales," Johnson said.

Discussing income to the area from the 1967 crop, Johnson said this too should be considerably above that of 1966. He pointed out that while the loan price in 1967 is 75 points below 1966, basis middling inch cotton, and discounts on some of our lower quality cotton will be greater, the increased payment rates will slightly more than offset these decreases, even assuming a similar quality crop.

## Telephone Co. Mails Cards To Customers

A simple post card will soon be used for an unusual job: helping Southwestern Bell Telephone Company improve its service in Slaton.

In the next few days, every telephone customer here will receive a post card from Bob Davis, local manager for Southwestern Bell. On one half of the double post card, the customer will be asked for comments and criticisms.

The other half of the card can be torn off, filled out and returned - postage free - to Davis. "We're not seeking compliments," the manager pointed out. "If any of our customers have criticisms or service difficulties, we would like to know about them so we can try to remove the causes. Comments and criticisms help us give customers the kind of service they want."

The manager said everyone who replies unfavorably will be contacted in an effort to clear up the source of dissatisfaction.
