Airport, Paving Project Bids Set

Memorial Day, now a national holiday observed in honor of the dead from all wars, comes Tuesday and—although the day is one of the holidays voted by the Retail Merchants Association—some Slaton firms will close and others will remain open.

City offices, utility offices, insurance agencies and a number of retail stores will observe the holiday. Both financial institutions, however, will be open. Apparently most "Chain" stores will be open, too.

It was reported that several members of the Slaton VFW post will participate in a "loyalty day" parade in Lubbock on Memorial Day.

Water Balloon Vandals Warned

A series of vandalism complaints concerning the throwing of "water balloons" has brought a word of warning from Police Chief Robert Breedlove.

Slaton's police chief noted that about four car windshields had been reported broken as a result of someone throwing the water balloons.

"It will be necessary for us to start prosecuting guilty persons," cautioned Breedlove, and he added that parents are liable for any damage caused by minor children.

Survey Cards To Be Delivered On Rural Routes

Postmaster Rush Wheeler reminds rural patrons of the Slaton Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Wheeler explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Jack Clark Route 1; Paul Mosser Route 2.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Wheeler concludes.

Belva Irene Becker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Becker, has earned the honor of being named valedictorian of the Slaton senior class this year. She has a grade point average of 94.40.

With only a .04 difference in grade point average, Cynthia Ann Steffens, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Steffens, was named salutatorian by Slaton High School officials. Her grade point average was 94.36.

Kenneth Winchester, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Latham, earned the honor of being named the high ranking boy for the class with a grade point average of 94.04.

Baccalaureate services for the class are scheduled for Sunday at 8:15 p.m. in the high school auditorium, with graduation set for the next night, Monday, at 8:15, in the new high school gymnasium.

The baccalaureate address

will be given by Rev. J. L. Cartrite, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Rev. Robert Richardson, pastor of the Grace Lutheran Church will give the invocation; Rev. David W. Binkley, pastor of the First Methodist Church, will give the scripture reading, and Rev. Clinton L. Eastman, pastor of Westview Baptist Church, will give the benediction.

A girl's group will sing three selections, accompanied by Karlene Eastman on the piano. Diane Jaynes will play the professional and recessional at both baccalaureate and graduation services. 97 students are candidates for graduation.

The program for the commencement exercises includes the invocation to be given by Kenneth Winchester, songs sung by mixed choir and a girl's group, the salutatory and valedictory addresses, presentation of awards and class by M. W. Kerr, principal; presentation of diplomas by Joe E. Miles, president of the School Board; presentation of the American Legion Award by Ray Dickie, post commander; and the benediction by Rodney Farrell.

Belva, valedictorian, started to school here in the first grade and went all 12 years in Slaton, as did Cynthia and Kenneth. All three top honor students were born in Slaton.

When Belva graduated from Slaton Junior High School, she was one of the top 10 students. Slaton City Commission, in a productive session Tuesday night, set bid dates for the airport project and a paving program, gave a cost estimate notice and set a public hearing on 9th street curb and gutter project, approved installation on four blocks of sewer line, approved another day off for fireman Ollie Baxley, and discussed several matters.

The curb and gutter program on 9th extends from Murray street to a point 100 feet south of the Cloverleaf Liquor Store. The state will widen and pave that portion of the street while property owners will be assessed for curb and gutters.

Estimated costs of the project is slightly more than \$9,000. Estimated assessment per front foot for grading and curb and gutter is \$2.08. The commission set a June 20 public hearing date on the project, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Municipal Building.

Bids are to be opened June 12 on both the airport and paving project around the public housing area. Bid openings are set for 2 p.m. that date.

The airport bid consists primarily of a new 60 by 3,800 foot runway; a 150 by 300 aircraft parking apron; 20 feet of access taxiway, and a perimeter fence. Lights for the airport are to be bid at a later date, but have been approved by the Federal Aviation Agency.

The paving project around Slaton's new Public Housing Authority low-income dwellings will include some 24 blocks of streets. The project is in southeast Slaton.

Baxley, fulltime fireman for the city, will get three days off every two weeks. He had been receiving two days rest.

The commission discussed a proposal to close 15th street between Scurry and Division near the intersection where a fatal accident recently occurred. Further study was decided on by the commission and no action taken.

Mayor Jonas Cain discussed some possibilities of beautifying the city square, including improvement of curbing and planting flowers in strategic spots. No definite action was taken by the commission.

All of the city commissioners were present for the session. City Engineer Bennett Reeves was also on hand to review airport plans and specifications and to prepare bid notices.

Uranium Hunt Underway

Uranium project was unofficially underway in the Southland-Gordon area with some farmers in Lynn counties being approached for lease of recent weeks.

Confirmed source reports one major firm in uranium production is at least a 25,000-acre block in the Southland-Gordon area, much of it being in Lynn county. Mrs. Moore was recipient of the door prize and Chaplain Underwood reported having sent several sympathy and birthday cards.

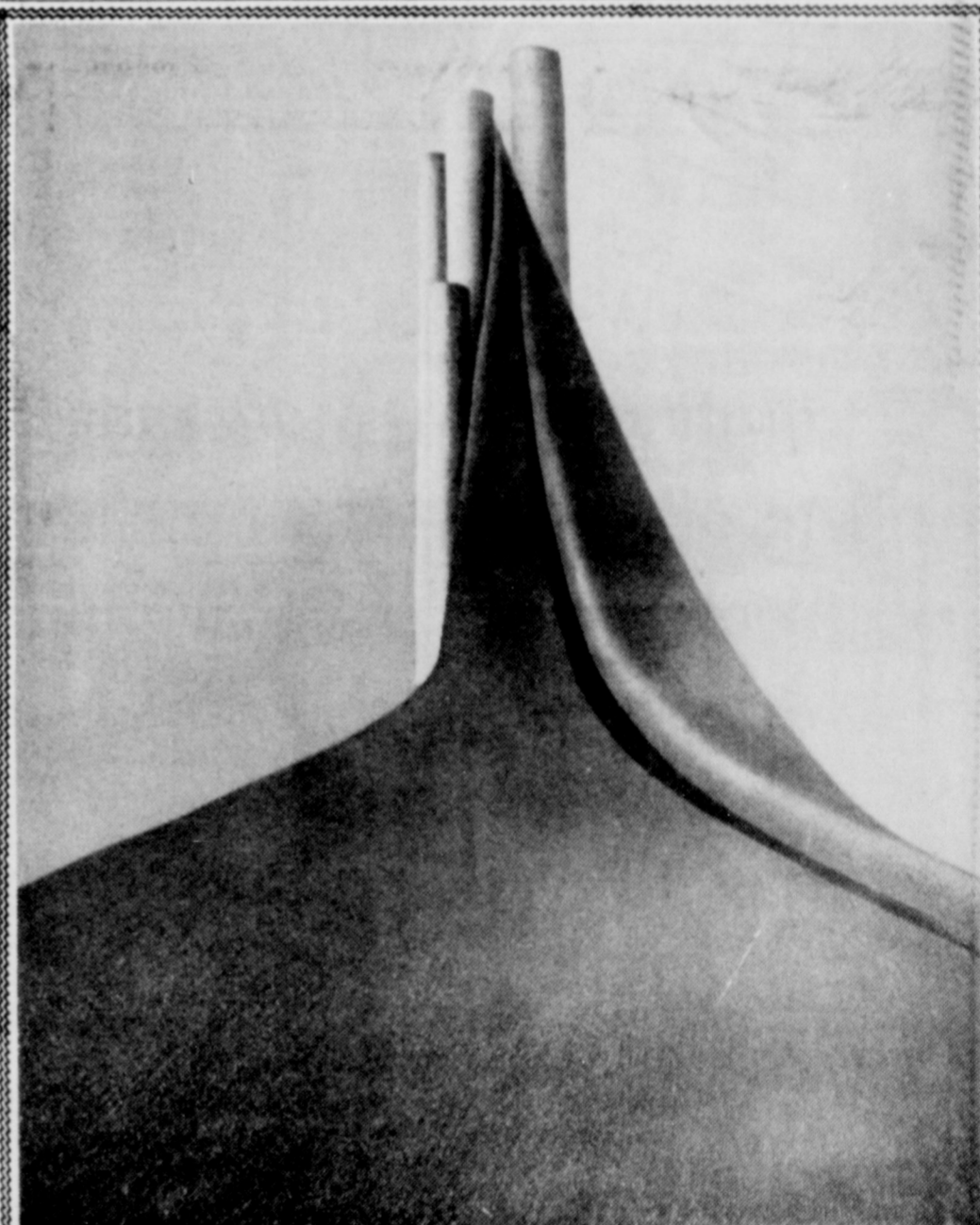

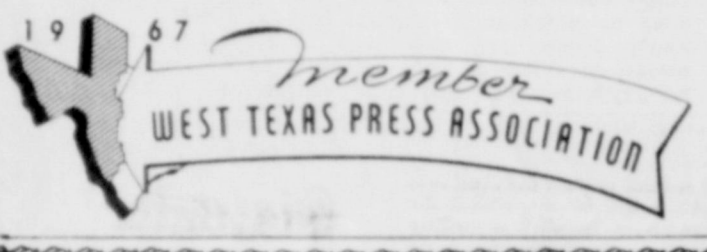

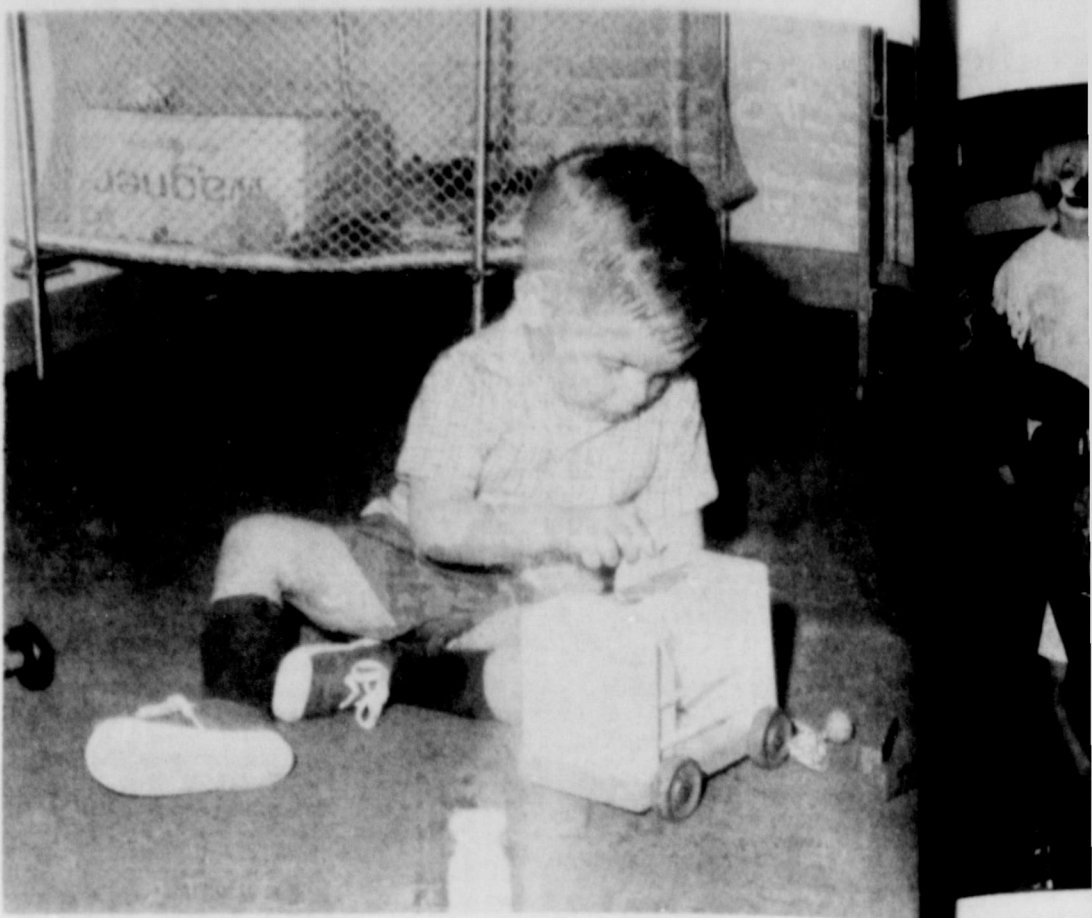

IMPORTANT YEARS--Toddlers, ages 1 to 3, are beginning to find out what life is about. Whether he becomes curious or indifferent, creative, uninterested, happy or frustrated, may depend on whether or not parents take time to encourage him.

(4) INTRODUCING: A CHILD'S WORLD Take Time With Toddler, His Basic Talents Are Developing

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles on child development by Ruth Rucker, Texas Tech student from Roosevelt. She is majoring in home economics education and child development and is an honor student in college.)

The toddler is beginning to walk, learning cute tricks, laughing, saying words, and generally investigating everything within reach! He is exploring and discovering more things than you could ever know.

The toddler is finding out what life is all about--and he's loving it! But to the parent this may be a very frustrating and exhausting age.

The time that a child spends between the ages of one and three will be two of the most important years of his life. During this time he will become either curious or indifferent; creative or uninterested; loving or resentful; happy or frustrated; independent or dependent.

The basic talents, abilities, attitudes, and character of a child will be developed by the time he is three or four. Because of this, parents face a great responsibility to take time with the toddlers.

A parent must take the time to select toys and activities that will encourage his child to develop in every way: physically, mentally, emotionally, socially, and spiritually. If this is not done then the child will be lacking; he can never be

fully developed. For example--a baby's fingers are bound at birth, and remain so until the age of three or four. When the bandages are removed, one will discover that the fingers are useless to the child; they are no longer of any value to him. In the same respect, a child's sense of curiosity and quest for knowledge is not stimulated and developed before he is three or four.

When the child starts to school, he will be uninterested, indifferent, frustrated, and constantly dependent upon the guidance of other. Because it was never developed, his sense of learning is useless to him.

It is the task of the parents to provide opportunities for a child. A sensitive parent knows when to encourage a child to try new things on his own and when to offer him the protection he needs. To some, this comes naturally, but to most of us it is a struggle. So, let's talk about some "toy-tips" for this very special age group.

First of all, a toddler needs opportunities to develop physically. Certain toys help a child to learn many useful skills and develop his muscle power. At this stage of growing a child needs things with which to be very active--a low tricycle; a sturdy little wagon; all sorts of things to push and pull; something to climb, such as a low gym or slide.

Balls, big, little, and middle-sized, always have a place for active play. He needs to develop those leg and arm muscles to their utmost potential--remember, they got to last him a life time!

Then a child must develop mentally. This calls for manipulative toys--not complicated toys. By the age of three a child has learned to distinguish up from down and in from out. He needs toys that promote coordination, observation, imagination, and logical thinking. Simple wooden puzzles, a ring-toss, a peg board, and a hammer--pounding bench are perfect examples. The "universal" block is always a good toy for any child of this age, so if every in doubt--buy blocks! Also interlocking rings, rubber cubes, and nesting toys encourage mental development.

A parent also needs to encourage emotional development. At the toddler age, this means teaching a child who he is, how he fits into this world, and how to cope with his problems. An awareness of the nature--world is important. Raising plants and pets makes children realize that all living things need to be cared for if they are to grow and flourish. Provide him the opportunity to learn about water, dirt, animals--all the things around him.

Picture books are excellent sources of learning experiences, but children like to feel things. One parent jokingly asked what the books said about the child who continually had to be scolded for playing in the bathroom commode. After some thinking the answer came--buy the child a wading pool, he's ready to learn about water!

Social development is also very important to children. How else do they learn about the people around them? Three is the age of would-be cooks, nurses, doctors, and what not. For this reason it is helpful to have some old clothes handy for dress-up purposes. Taking different roles help children prepare for real events and allows them to play out feelings of anger, jealousy, or fear.

Dolls, animals, phones, housekeeping storekeeping toys are fun for the little girl. Toys need farm animals, fences, tractors, trucks and airplanes. This is a time when a little girl learns how to be a woman and little boys being grown-up men, is a means of learning.

One area where parents fail to encourage children is the sensory. Toddlers need squeeze, pound, and these things don't have "fancy"--dough made and salt is sufficient. Parents must encourage self-expression.

Some of the most materials children need are crayons, chalk, paper and clay. They have possibilities for expressing ideas and feelings, serve as a springboard for imagination.

Coloring books don't quite the same way. Some ideas have already been given shapes. Lots of don't approve what a green face or scribble on the page. Pictures on plain paper would be better.

Musical activity is encouragement. The rattle, a banging pan, of thunder, a sparrow all help develop appreciation. Bold, rhythmic are preferred. A child is feeling energy soothing music when the toddler is feeling energy. The toddler needs box, bells, rattles, drums, whistles, and of his own. So many become angry when they begin to clang the pans. All he wants is to own music! Give him--if the noise is more can take, then put him in the sunshine. He is conscious of sounds sensitive to noises, develop a sense of rhythm he is given this freedom.

The toddler is exploring his world. He is learning the experiences that means offer him. He means in which a child mind, and personality developed. Toys should assist a child's growth development. Too often parents set out standards to their child. They give them only what they want for them. The dreams of an athlete, a ballerina, and sports while the son is interested in science, or some other field.

Children should be allowed to find out for themselves what is appealing to them. It is the parent's job to help a child find his style, not to create interests that fit other's interests. Play is a vital part of a child's life. A valued talent for a child. Just try it and dare you.

COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS INC.

It now appears that cotton producers in some sections of the Plains this year may be forced by weather conditions to avail themselves of the "disaster relief" provisions of the current cotton program. Under certain circumstances these provisions permit farmers to plant certain other crops on acreage intended for cotton production. They apply when a farmer, after an "honest and workmanlike" effort, is unable to get or unable to keep a stand of cotton early enough in the season to allow for the expectation of a crop. Under these conditions the producer may apply to the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office for permission to plant certain other crops on the acreage intended for cotton. With ASCS approval soybeans or other crops on which no marketing quotas or voluntary acreage reduction programs are in effect may be planted, harvested and sold on cotton land without loss of cotton price support and diversion payments.

The date after which a producer will not be expected to plant or replant cotton is left to the discretion of each individual ASCS county committee and will vary from one geographical location to another. It is also the responsibility of the county committee to determine whether an honest and workmanlike effort has been made to plant and grow cotton. Walter Wells, Lubbock County ASCS Office Manager, says the important thing for growers to remember is that an application must be made to the county office prior to planting another income crop on cotton land. Otherwise, both price support and diversion payments may be denied.

Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., is voicing almost unbridled optimism on the future of High Plains cotton production. Businessman and farmer alike have a great concern for the well-being of this area's number one industry, and Johnson recently has been called upon again and again to assess the situation for banker, civic club and farmer groups throughout the 23-county area represented by PCG. He leaves no doubt as to his personal opinions on the matter. He summed up his remarks on one such occasion by saying "The High Plains of Texas will supply a substantial, increasing portion of the U.S. and world markets for raw cotton fiber probably for so long as such markets exist." His optimism stems primarily from faith in the area's superb physical production capacity, faith in the results of cotton breeding programs and other cotton research and faith in the progressive, never-say-die attitude of Plains cotton producers.

Soybeans Major Cash Crop on High Plains

LUBBOCK ... Soybeans have become firmly entrenched on the High Plains of Texas as a major cash crop and this year's outlook points to continued growth in the industry. Since the advent of soybeans on the Plains in 1940, total acreage has increased from a few hundred acres to approximately 120,000 acres last year. Improved varieties and cultural practices developed by long-time research since 1943, plus a favorable price and the need for an additional cash crop, have been the principal

factors for increased interest in soybeans. Headlining this research have been E. C. Fisher, Dr. Clark Harvey and Shelby Newman with Texas A&M University's South Plains Research and Extension Center here and Dr. Kenneth Porter and Dr. John Shipley with the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland. **HIGH YIELDS** Approximately 95 per cent of the soybeans produced on the High Plains are grown under irrigation on moderately

deep sandy loam to clay and clay loam soils. Yields are averaging about 30 bushels per acre with many growers consistently producing 40 to 45 bushels. A few exceptionally high yields of 60 to 67 bushels have been reported. Soybeans are a prime source of edible vegetable oil as well as protein for livestock and poultry feeds. Oil content averages about 20 per cent while protein normally reaches the 40 per cent mark. With greater amounts of soybeans being exported each year as well as more being consumed domestically, the economic outlook for the industry looks quite favorable. Soybeans, with their late planting date, offer several distinct advantages to farmers. First of all, they can be used as a "catch crop" for hilled-out cotton when it's too late to replant. Furthermore, weeds are less of a problem since mechanical tillage can be practiced up until planting time. **RESEARCH CONDUCTED** Last year six varieties of soybeans were grown at var-

ious experimental locations on the High Plains ranging from Etter to Lubbock. Since blooming and pod set are largely determined by day length rather than age of plant, varieties have been developed that are best adapted to a certain number of daylight hours. Generally, the adaptation of a given variety changes within a distance of 100 miles from north to south. The Lee variety, medium to late maturing, and Hill, medium to early maturing, are the predominant varieties for the High Plains, according to researchers. Late maturing varieties for the High Plains, according to researchers. Late maturing varieties should be grown in the southern part of the area while quicker maturing varieties are better suited to the northern sector. Wayne, an early maturing variety, has done exceptionally well on test plots at Etter with a yield of 40.8 bushels per acre. Patterson, Clark and Hinn, intermediate maturing varieties, have also produced good yields at the northern location. Lee and Hill were the top producers at the Lubbock test plots. **PLANTING DATES** Optimum planting dates for producing maximum yields range from May 15 to 20 in the northern portion of the High Plains to June 1 to 20 in the southern sector. Only small differences have resulted in oil content of the beans due to varieties and planting dates although the protein content tends to correlate directly with yields. Soybeans

Making Ends Meet Is As Much A Problem Of Managing Money As Earning It

"Making ends meet" is as much a problem of managing money as of earning it.

Financial experts have been taking a fresh look at the old family budget. They find that although most families do have some type of financial planning, all too often the "plan" involves more record-keeping . . . mountains of paper that keep pace with your mounting frustrations.

Frequently the amount of income is not the most important factor. Earning money with which to meet your responsibilities is just the beginning; managing money so that it will respond to both present needs and future goals is the real challenge.

Of course, each family must first do the essential estimating of income and expenses. Figure your net yearly income . . . counting the sure things, only. Total your fixed payments—such as rent and/or mortgage payments—which have first call on your spending, and then tackle the day-to-day demands. Though, in these days, the day-to-day expenses may seem enormous, this is the flexible part of your budget . . . the area over which you do have a measure of control (sometimes called discretionary spending power).

A budget is a specialized plan for a certain family. Your plan will not be exactly like anyone else's, because you have different values and goals. The important thing is to plan your spending and savings, so that your income will provide the maximum for your family in terms of the things that are most important to you.

You can spare the entire family the feeling of being boxed in by the restrictions of money management, if each member (including children) is given a personal allowance for which he does not have to account to anybody. It not only provides youngsters with valuable training in managing their own funds, but it gives everybody the liberated feeling that once in a while he has a little money he can spend spontaneously, even frivolously, just because he feels like it. An occasional splurge makes financial discipline easier to live with. Most finance counselors at state-regulated finance com-

panies, which display the emblem of the National Consumer Finance Association, believe that dividing the responsibility for a budget is essential in attaining current and long-range satisfaction. Whether the husband is the only money-maker, or whether the wife contributes income, both share in the spending of the family money, as both share in single dreams of the future for the family.

Remember, too, that both will share in the disappointment if unwise handling of money prevents those dreams from coming true. If there are children old enough to take part in family decisions, they should have an opportunity to voice their needs and wants, also.

Budget income into broad categories of expenses and savings. The wife then assumes responsibility for spending the amounts budgeted for Food, Household Operation and Clothing, while the husband handles the money for Shelter, Transportation and the diversified category of Personal Advancement, where aspirations change to computations. The total of "Hers and His" expenses, plus savings, should equal net income.

As long as both of you can supply the needs of the family, within the amounts allotted for your areas of responsibility, there need be no detailed record-keeping. When the amount allotted proves insufficient to meet current or anticipated needs, however, a detailed account of all spending should be kept for a month or two to determine where the plan is breaking down and what steps should be taken to bring spending back into line with income.

Giving up things is always hard on the morale. Much better to decide early in each year, after reviewing the economic facts of your life, that you will spend no more than so much for food, clothing, etc. Then make plans that fit into these limits; don't overshoot and you won't have to cut back. Of course, if there is a substantial increase in your income as time goes on, revise your plan and let your family benefit accordingly. Don't peg them to a hard-time budget, if things are looking up and you can afford to do better by them.

Financial experts at the National Consumer Finance Association suggest the following guidelines for the Divided Responsibility Plan:

HER BUDGET
Food; including cost of lunches and all meals out.
House operation; fuel, gas, light, telephone, water, household help, household supplies, cash or credit payments for furniture, household equipment and appliances, draperies, linens, etc.
Clothing; for all members of the family, dry cleaning and pressing, laundry, repairs and alterations, miscellaneous accessories.
HIS BUDGET
Shelter; rent, or that part of payment on mortgage applied to interest, repairs and property improvement, real and personal property taxes, fire insurance, etc.
Transportation; carfare, automobile payments, auto insurance, repairs, tires, gas, oil, upkeep on car, etc.
Personal Advancement; health, health insurance, education, recreation, vacations, newspapers, magazines, books, ho-

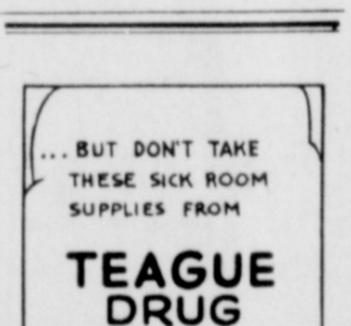

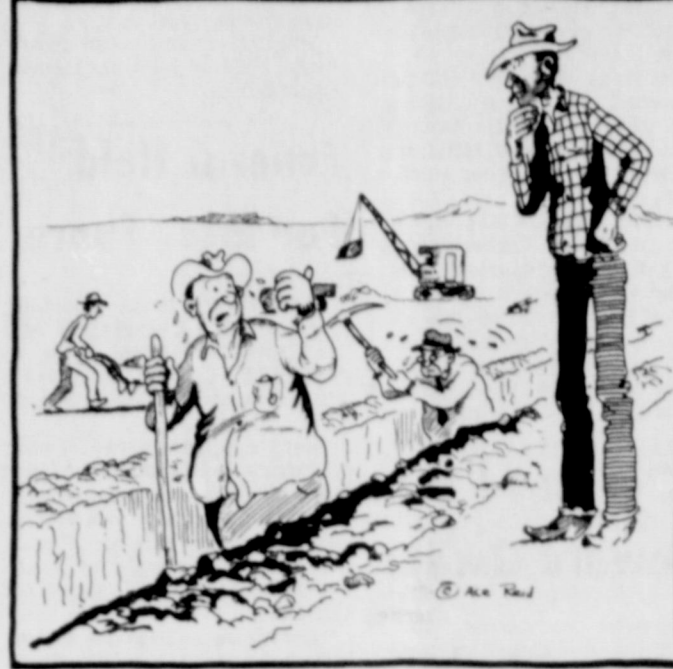

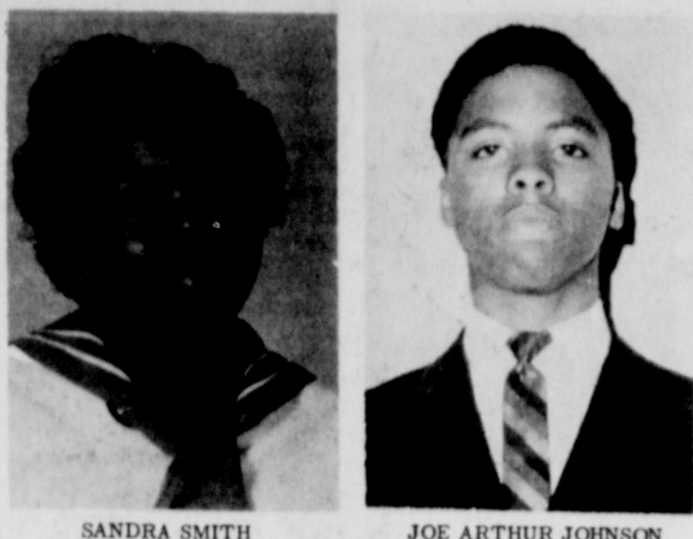
