### Another Freedom - Grab

The so-called do-gooders and related clan keep hammering a way at one of our most cherished constitutional guarantees and have been making headway in some areas. That constitutional guarantee is the right to own and bear arms. Those who advocate the rigid control and registration against firearms ownership and sale, generally end up legislating against the gun and an owners rights to own it. To be forced to register a gun eventually means confiscation of that weapon and this has been amply demonstrated in every country in the world that has been conquered. Check the list yourself.

The greatest attack against the ownership of firearms usually omes through the guise of "controlling the criminal." These facts about firearms and criminals have been proven over and over but we still have those who fall for the line that crime can be stopped by gun laws. The facts are:

1. No legislation can prevent the criminal from getting a gun if he really wants one.

2. Trace . a criminal's gun and usually you'll find a stolen fuse to pay taxes.

3. Existing laws can be used to apprehend a criminal or criminal suspect where there is sufficient cause for such action without resorting to the unregistered firearms course.

4. Existing laws concerning the sale of firearms to minors, juveniles and even criminals have not been effective. How can additional laws solve the problem? -Claude News
