

# Remodeling of Old Capp Hotel Building Marks Passing of an Era



Remodeling of the old Capp Hotel building in Slaton this week, together with that of the city hall, has attracted comment and brought memories back to pioneers who recall the early days when these buildings were much in the life of the community and area.

Edwards Jr., and V. G. Browning recently purchased the site, 100 N. 8th, from Abe Kessel, and workmen are on the job remodeling a program that is designed to result in a modern building to house the Browning & Marriott insurance and the Retail Merchants Association offices. The insurance company will move there from its present location at 116 1/2 W. 10th and the merchants group is vacating its corner in the city

A. E. Whitehead, Slaton developer and resident since 1911, recalls when the Capp building was constructed, pinpointing the date as 1912. Whitehead himself had established the first hotel on what is now the Slaton townsite, that 26-room building burning some two years later. The Capp building was operated as a small hotel and cafe from 1912 until recently, a variety of owners and operators noted during its existence. Travelling salesman and railroad men were bulk of the first clientele, several oldtimers recall, with rooms a premium in sparsely populated Slaton.

Whitehead, in recounting transpiring events of those days, tells of a shooting that once occurred in the Capp hotel, a man murdering his father-in-law after a dispute on money and land purchase.

Likely unbelievable to the early passers-through who roomed at the bowl-and-pitcher establishment, eating from the wooden counter, are the plans now being executed for a modern office building. Browning reveals that the outside walls will be bricked upward for nine feet, plastering and scoring above. A modern glass front will frame the entrance. Ceiling is to be lowered to 8 ft. with acoustical tile utilized, together with birch paneling. Ducted air conditioning and panel ray heat will be provided.

Porter Lumber Company is prime contractor for the construction, and the future occupants are anticipating move-in date within a month.

The Browning & Marriott general insurance firm, was established here in 1948, real estate.

## Mail Theft Investigation, Drunk Arrests Top City Police Activity

Drunkenness arrests predominated in local police activity over the week-end, with 12 drunk charges filed. Other infractions disclosed since last Thursday on the city police records include six disturbance cases, two vagrancy, one possession by minor, one shoplifting, two theft and burglary under \$5 value involved, and two burglary and bicycle theft instances.

Reagan said the gun was taken from under a mattress at the trailer house, and the shells taken from a locker on the opposite side of the compartment.

Possible mail theft is being investigated, with someone breaking the glass window in a post office box between 7 p.m. last Wednesday and 6:47 a.m. Thursday at the local postoffice. The box was rented to Pioneer Natural Gas Co., records show.

## Water Resource Study Taking Local Priority

Both long range water planning and drafting of an interim program said necessary before tie-in with Canadian river water was discussed at length at the Monday night Slaton city commission meeting, and indications are for several weeks hard work on part of the local city officials and engineers. Every attempt is being made to insure a steady and adequate water supply at minimum cost, Mayor Lemon notes, the problem accentuated by growing population industrial and residential demands.

Twenty-three wells are now being pumped for city use, a four of these located within the city limits. Pumping call from these is maximum of 3,077,000 gallons per day, and consumption this year occurred on July 7th when 2,102,000 g were used.

Actually, water superintendent George Willis points out, a reserve of some 50% water supply has been recommended by city engineers, Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, to be adequate in case of excess drought, fires, or even for the normal growth of demand. Total storage facilities now total 1,372,000 gallons. Present average reserve, consequently, is only about 20 per cent.

Target date for receipt of Canadian river water is set for late 1967, though the Water Authority officials now state that the reservoir could be completed as much as one year in advance of original plans. At any rate, Slaton water supply, as presently engineered, will be insufficient to meet demands until that time; hence, methods are being explored for added facilities through new wells or other means. If the well route is pursued, seven more each, with a 100 gallon per minute production, will be necessitated, Mayor Lemon points out. Present wells pump from a minimum of 27 gpm to one with a maximum of 400 gpm.

Engineers for the city have emphasized that whatever measures taken for immediate needs will serve the long range problem also, the added supply being needed in addition to the Canadian water. First year contract with the Canadian authority calls for at least 60% use of the total 310,000,000 gallons

Few public opinion polls excite us, but one was conducted recently by Mr. Gallup that intrigued us. The question was: If a young man were to ask advice about which profession he should enter, which would you recommend?

Top three recommendations were doctor, engineer and teacher, in that order, followed by clergyman, government career, lawyer, business executive, dentist and banker.

When a tally was made of response of people in the 21-29 age group, teaching moved up to second place. Doctors still led.

To us, the poll was interesting, but little more. The real question that should have been meat of the poll was left unasked: "What was the motivation for the selections?"

### Another Freedom - Grab

### Free Riders "No More" in Idalou

A crackdown aimed at free riders on Idalou's city was set by members of the city commission in a meeting Tuesday night.

In the same meeting, the commission also voted to block at the east end of 6th Street, providing details worked out with residents of the street.

However, after a lengthy discussion of the city's fire key rate in which Mayor Frank Guess outlined steps to save city residents many hundreds of dollars in insurance premiums, no action was taken.

Guess read a list of unpaid personal and property taxes of which date back several years. The list of residential personal and property taxes showed debts from \$3 to \$100 in some cases, and the commissioners noted that there were a few hardship cases on the list.

"The people who can't afford to pay their taxes are them every year while those who can afford to pay their taxes," one commissioner noted.

"We can't go on operating this city with the revenue from water works alone," another commissioner pointed out.

The total amount of taxes due reached about \$2,500, Guess said. After an extended discussion of the matter, the commission voted to start the tax collection drive by inserting a notice in this issue of The Beacon requesting that "all delinquent taxpayers make arrangements to pay taxes by November 8, 1962."

The commission also ordered The Beacon to publish a list of delinquent taxpayers in its November 9 issue, and the commission noted that tax liens could be filed against those who refuse to pay taxes.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Jack Cox and John Connally crossed paths on the campaign trail in Austin . . . and they waved at each other.

Connally was talking to the County Treasurers Association convention. He stepped out on the hotel balcony to watch Cox riding in a parade put on by Youth for Cox.

Inside the hotel, Connally was urging the county treasurers to pitch in and help support the Democratic ticket, else there might be Republican candidates for county treasurer next time.

Outside, Cox was urging youngsters to pitch in and help him change Texas to a two-party state.

Some of the legislators who get elected on November 6 will have office space at the Capitol. But some won't.

For two years now, space formerly occupied by State agencies has been in the process of conversion to offices for the 150 members of the House of Representatives. A few were occupied during the 1961 session.

Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont, chairman of the House Rules Committee, had the chore of assigning offices, with not enough to go around.

Finally he hit upon a solution. He has 90 offices ready. So he and the Speaker-to-be, Byron Tunnell of Tyler, agreed to assign the 90 offices to the representatives who will be returning.

There are 92 incumbents, including two Republicans, in the Nov. 6 election. One is Speaker-to-be Tunnell, who not only will have an office, but also an apartment.

If all incumbents but one are elected, there will be just enough offices for each old member to have one.

The 60 or so freshmen members will have to do what all representatives have done in the past — use their desks in the House chamber as their offices.

When the John H. Reagan State Office Building is completed next year, the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the Department of Agriculture will be moved out of the Capitol, leaving space for the other 60 representatives to have private offices.

Tickets are selling for 50c each, and the funds will benefit the Rotary-sponsored Boy Scout Troop 128, with purchase of camping equipment planned.

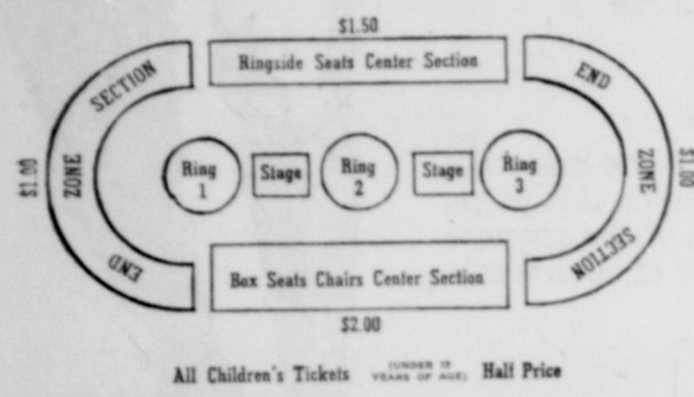

tate also being handled. Browning already was well known in Slaton, having moved here in 1923, and Marriott was a resident of still longer tenure, living here most of his life.

### EARLY DEVELOPMENT

Reminiscing on other and related incidents of early Slaton history, Whitehead recalls his own move here from Farewell in 1911, being unable to find lodging in any of the "less than half a dozen" houses here, consequently buying a tent and camping out. He contacted a lumberman at Friona who sent lumber and workmen here to build a house for him. Whitehead recounts that the lumber dealer didn't have the money to pay freight, so he paid it himself, and the dealer repaid by building the house without cost. This evidently paid off for the Friona man, however, as he soon had orders for more houses here than he could construct; he built and sold at least 12 houses in short order, finally building about 20 Slaton homes. Whitehead himself saw the opportunities here, noting the roundhouse completed in 1911, and he bought 24 lots even before the townsite was opened.
