## County Voters Favor Smith, Carr, Pool, Yarborough

County voters gave two Lubbock County residents the nod in the statewide voting in the major state race Saturday.

Three voting boxes located in the Slaton city limits, were cast, 325 less than the May 5 primary.

In the governor's race, Connally won by a margin over liberal Don Preston. He did the voters in Slaton to back the winning candidate.

Connally beat Connally 419 to 306.

Connally won the race for lieutenant governor. Slaton voters supported Smith, Lubbock County voters supported Carr, and voters in the Texas Panhandle supported Pool.

Connally's margin of victory was 113 votes.

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Latest returns from all 254 counties, with 231 complete, gave:

Governor — Connally 564,652; Yarborough 538,578.

Lieutenant Governor — Sen. Preston Smith 553,211; Texas House Speaker Jimmy Turman, 502,099.

Attorney General — Waggoner Carr 610,772; Tom Reavley 445,026.

Congressman-at-Large — Joe Pool 571,077; Woodrow Bean 448,767.

The Posey voting box, located just northwest of the city limits, was the only box in the Slaton vicinity that gave Connally the nod over Yarborough, and Posey voters did it by the narrowest of margins—30 to 29 in Connally's favor.

Posey voters also favored Wilson Bean over Joe Pool for congressman-at-large, 30 to 27.

The Roosevelt voting box followed the same pattern as the Slaton boxes — giving majorities to Yarborough, Smith, Carr and Pool.

Another-in-law of the Poyner family, Buddy Bloomer, operates a store in Earth.

Poyner brothers first met when they purchased the store in Earth.

was chosen number one in the Whites dealers store chain, which covers a seven-state area and includes 380 stores.

Earth was selected number five in the chain last year.

This year all five stores in the Poyner White Store Chain were selected to the top 10 in the large chain.

Bobby moved to Slaton to manage the store here in the latter part of 1959 soon after he and his brother Hanev purchased the business.

Before going into the retail merchandising field, Poyner served as an evangelist for the Church of Christ.

During the 10 years that he worked fulltime in the evangelistic field, Poyner visited 42 states, Canada, and Mexico.

Although he does not work fulltime in the evangelistic field any longer, Poyner is still one of the top lay leaders in the church.

The local Whites manager received his high school diploma from Lubbock High School and attended Texas Tech for three years.

Poyner is married and has three children, Daene Sue, 9; Terry Lynn, 7; and Randy, 4.

The Poyner family are members of the 17th and N Church of Christ in Lubbock.

He is a member of Slaton Rotary and committee chairman of Boys Scout Troop 128.

Poyner has three fulltime employees in the store. Howard Morris, salesman, has been with the firm since 1960. Bill Patterson is head of the service department, and Starlene Ellis is bookkeeper.

## Loke Assessed \$50 Fine, Cost In Trial Friday

Jurors in the Slaton Corporation Court disturbance of the peace case found the defendant Joe Loke, guilty Friday afternoon.

Loke, was accused of disturbing the peace Dec. 9, 1961.

The case first came to trial May 19, but a mistrial was declared by the judge.

Loke, who resides on a farm near Posey, filed a counter suit against the city of Slaton Feb. 26, asserting he was falsely arrested and claimed damages of \$10,000.

The counter suit will come to court later this year.

Representing Slaton in the court case Friday was Travis Shelton, former district attorney. Attorney Bill Gillespie, former county attorney for Lubbock County, was counsel for the defendant.

The guilty verdict was read to about 50 spectators who assembled in the chamber of commerce office in the city hall to witness the case.

The 8-hour trial is one of the longest continuous sessions ever recorded in Lubbock County.

The trial began at 2 p.m. and continued with only two 10-minute breaks until 9:30 p.m.

The jury deliberated for 30 minutes before reaching a decision.

City Judge L. R. Gregory presided.

## Bruce Pember Represents Slaton At Rotary International In L. A.

Bruce Pember of Slaton was among over 20,00 Rotarians to assemble in Los Angeles, Sunday for the opening of Rotary International, world-wide service organization.

Rotarians and their families registered from some 60 countries for the 5-day gathering. It was the organization's 53rd annual convention and the second one to be in Los Angeles.

Following an opening-night entertainment feature at the famed Hollywood Bowl, Rotarians and their guests were welcomed to the city Monday morning by Edmund C. Brown, Governor of California; Ernest E. Debs, Chairman, Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors; Samuel Yorty, Los Angeles mayor; and George Bailey, president of the Rotary Club of Los Angeles.

With every part of the world represented by the thousands present, the internationality of the meeting was emphasized at all plenary sessions and at eight fellowship dinners and five international friendship meetings, each of which represented a different region of the world. At these meetings, Rotarians, their wives, sons, and daughters heard men talk about their countries and their countrymen and had an opportunity to submit questions to the panelists.

Following the addresses of welcome Monday, Luther H. Hodges, U. S. Secretary of Commerce, moderated a panel discussion on "Developing World Understanding through Trade." Participating on the panel were economic authorities from Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Japan, and the United States.

Among the speakers to address the convention are Arthur H. (Red) Motley, president and publisher of Parade, the Sunday newspaper magazine; Jeff H. Williams, lawyer, lecturer, and philosopher of Chickasha, Okla.; and Joseph A. Abey, of Reading, Pa., the president of Rotary International.

A popular hospitality feature at Rotary conventions was "Home Hospitality Night," when Rotarians of the convention city opened their homes to Rotarians and their families from other lands. On Monday evening, Rotarians of Los Angeles and outlying communities did this for all visitors from outside California who accepted invitations extended earlier. Some of these gatherings were in small homes and some in mansions, but all did enable people of different lands to know one another better.

According to Barron, officials of Santa Fe from the Amarillo office will be here and a film will be shown to honor Santa Fe officials and employees in Slaton.

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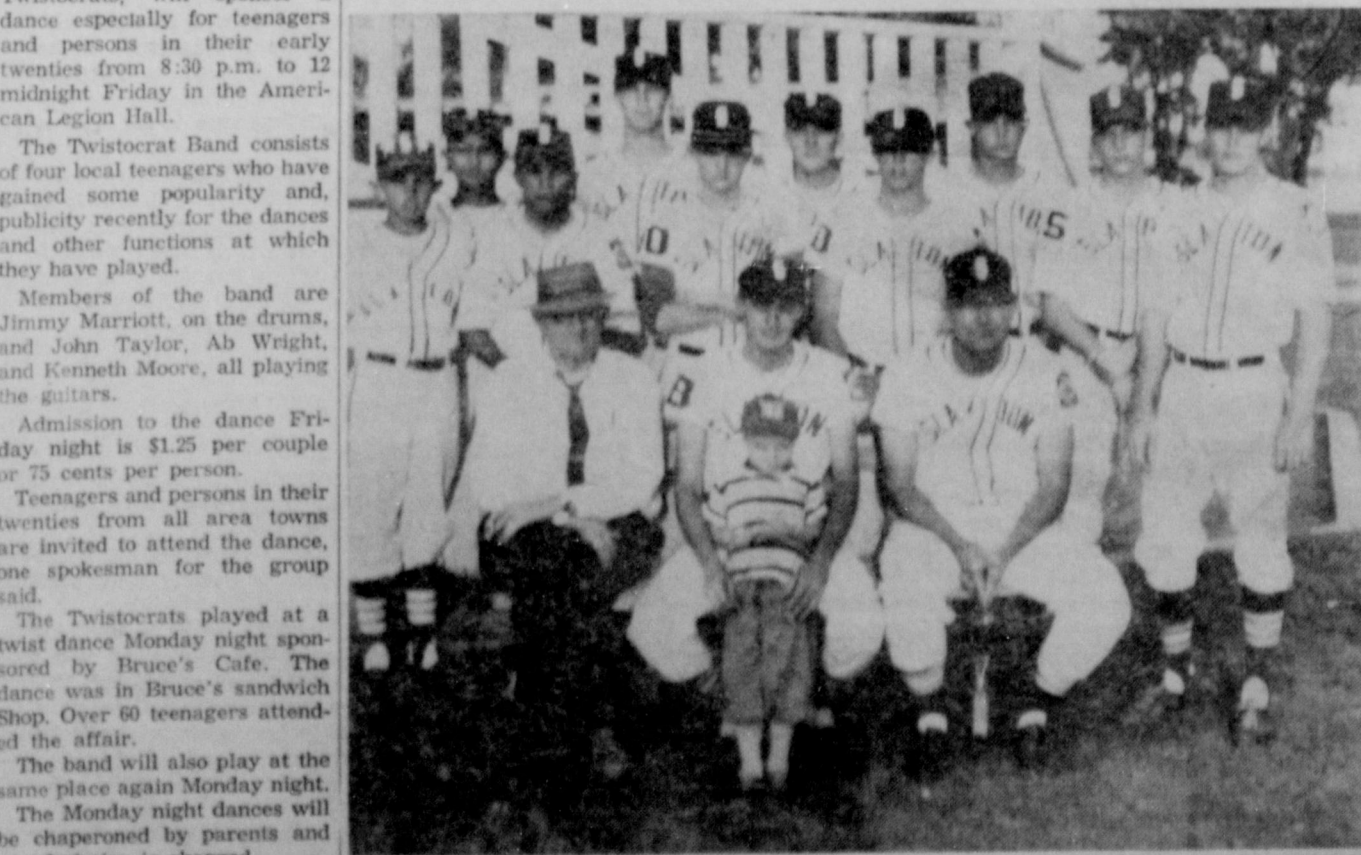

## EDITORIAL Observations

### Let Behind Town

What is one of the most important things that representatives of business and industry look for when they looking for new locations or locations for new branch offices?

According to a recent editorial in the Abilene Reporter-News, most of the representatives of industrialists who go around the country looking for new locations for various reasons, interview the man on the street before making a final decision on whether or not to locate in that particular town.

The representatives do not tell the persons the person for the interview. They merely stroll around and merely chat with persons in all walks of life.

Many times companies, according to the Abilene Reporter, have refused to locate in towns even though all available conditions were good, sometimes ideal, when they found that the people did not support the town fully or otherwise.

Industries and businesses do not want to locate in areas where people can find nothing good to say about the place they are living or the people they associate with in and day out.

What the man on the street has to say about the town, the way it is run and how he likes it as a place to live and to rear a family often is the most important thing that prospective newcomers look for.

Not long ago, states the editorial, representatives of a large industry were in a neighboring West Texas town checking out conditions that were both favorable and unfavorable for businesses and industries.

Everything seemed to check out all right. The taxes were low, the town was prospering, the labor supply was plentiful, transportation facilities were excellent, and the town was well located.

After finding all this out about the West Texas town, the representatives disappeared, and nothing was heard from them for several weeks.

The officials of the city and several important businessmen from the town were anxious to know the decision the company had made.

The townsmen, the editorial states, tried repeatedly to get an explanation as to what the company had decided about moving to their community.

Company officials kept "passing the buck" to someone else until finally one spokesman for the company told them his company would not move to a town where the people did not support the community.

"Nobody had anything good to say about the town. I don't want to move to a place where the people don't like where they are living," the spokesman said.

It was found out, then, that just because the people of a town don't talk up their town, they had lost all chance of getting one of the bigger industries in this part of the country.

The community above is only an example of what so many towns and communities are like.

How can any city or community expect more people, business, or industry to come into the town if the people won't support the businesses already there?

Another survey, made at Texas A&M, reports that 85 percent of the people looking for new sites would rather have one enthusiastic person in a community than 10,000 indifferent persons.

Enthusiasm is contagious. Let's all try to get the word out.

Although some people in the community continuously doubt the town, that number will never be too large. Let's all get on the band wagon.

The Slaton Chamber of Commerce has an Industrial Development Board which furnishes information to all kinds of industries and businesses in the country that they can be even remotely considering moving here.

Any citizen in the community who has a suggestion for improving Slaton as a prospective site for new industry should contact some member of the local chamber to let his views be known.

No town can grow and prosper unless the citizens, and citizens, not just a few, actively support it all the time. Let's not be timid. We need to do a better job at making our views known.

Also, it is each citizen's moral responsibility to boost his town. When we visit friends, relatives, and business associates in other towns, we should talk Slaton up.

#### Diet of Terror

All totalitarian regimes term themselves "Republics" or something equivalent. By this camouflage they attempt to make it seem that their primary objective is to advance the welfare of the masses, whereas the capitalistic states exist to provide luxurious living for the wealthy few.

Well, not long ago Fidel Castro, a confirmed Marxist, imposed the most stringent kind of rationing on the Cuban people. Soviet Russia, for all of its vast land area and population has an acute food problem, as no less an authority than Khrushchev has made clear in public addresses. And in Red China, according to Stewart Alsop, the people are actually slowly starving — and they're pitifully short of other necessities than food.

He writes: "Cloth . . . is rationed at the rate of three or four feet per year. A single chicken costs about one-fifth of a heavy urban worker's monthly wage, and one wadded coverlet costs a month-and-a-half's wages." He also says that protein, that vital source of mental and physical health and endurance, "has all but vanished from the diet of most of the people of China."

This is what communism, for all its empty glowing promises, gives the people — while supplementing it with a diet of terror and oppression.—Andrews County News.

#### Medical Benefits, Public Opinion

It has been said that the American people are in favor of the bill which would give medical services to everyone drawing social security benefits, and would increase social security taxes to meet or help meet the tab — and that the opposition consists only of relatively small, vocal, and selfish groups.

Well, there is factual evidence concerning that. Many members of Congress periodically poll their constituents to find out their attitudes toward controversial issues. Of 27 polls on the medical proposal taken some little time ago, the voters opposed the social security concept in 16 and supported it in only 11.

More recently, nine more such polls have been taken by members of Congress in their districts. The voters said No to the social security concept in six of these — Yes, in three.

It thus seems evident that there is heavy majority opinion in opposition to the plan. It is also significant that some of the polls asked if the voters favored voluntary and state-administered plans for caring for the indigent aged, and the response was extremely favorable. The Kerr-Mills bill, passed by the last Congress, is based on this idea and, while providing federal financial aid, places administrative responsibility where it belongs — in the states. Another long step forward is found in the plan sponsored by the Blue Shield organizations and the American Medical Association for providing voluntary health insurance to the aged at moderate rates.

The handwriting on the wall says that more and more of the American people, viewing apparently endless federal deficits in spite of back-breaking taxation, are becoming opposed to the Welfare State philosophy. And the social security approach to the medical problems of the elderly falls squarely within that philosophy.

Little Sheila Allen is no different than hundreds of other children who attend schools in Ballinger. She is trusting of the adult world around her. Most children are.

So that makes it the responsibility of the adults to teach our children one rule never to be forgotten—Don't ever get into a car with someone with whom you are not well acquainted. This isn't an easy task, and that makes the task even more necessary.

Sheila was returned to her family last week primarily because of the speed in which authorities were notified of her absence, as well as the all-out search which was made of the entire area for her and the man who took her.

It isn't a pleasant thing to talk about—there is nothing pleasant about the whole affair. But it brought close to home . . . it was at home . . . that things like this can — and did happen here.

It's a good feeling to be able to go to sleep at night and know that law enforcement officers like we have here are on duty, and ready to do whatever they can to keep our town and our life as safe as they possibly can. It's good to know that we live among people who are willing to turn out to help when one of their own gets in trouble. For that is what they did.—Richard Perry, Ballinger Ledger.

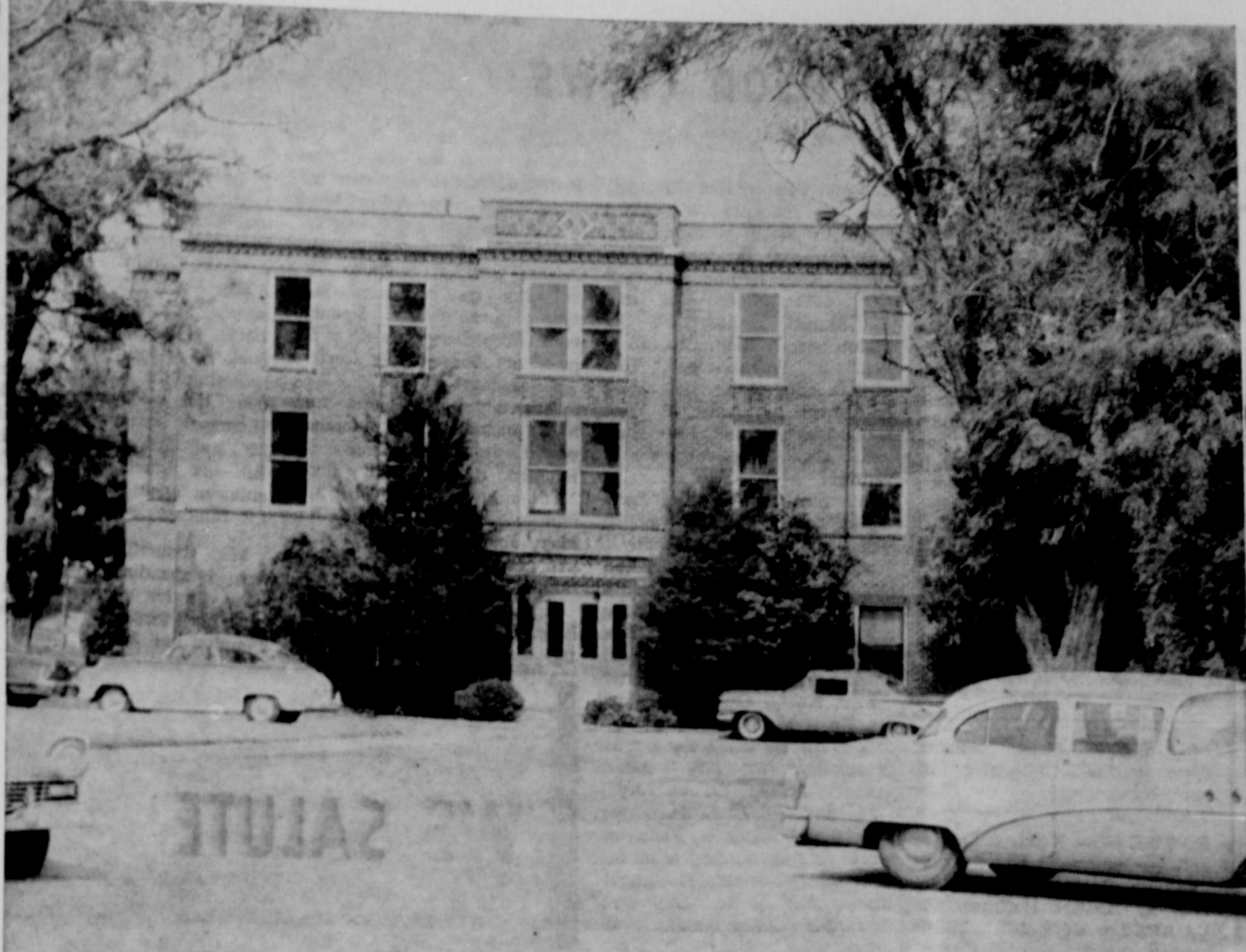
**Slaton Lady Given Disability Payments**

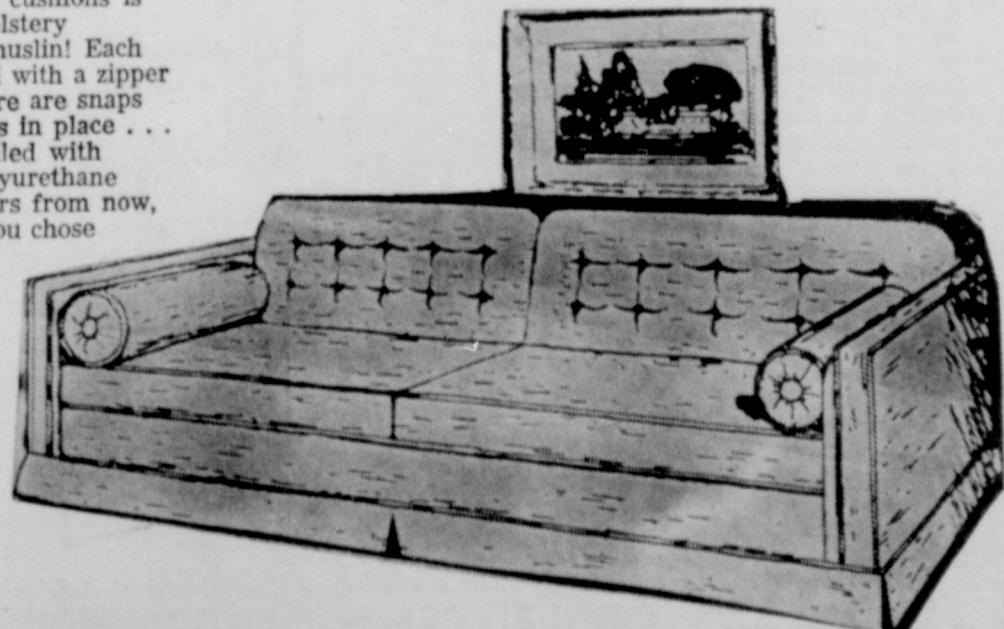

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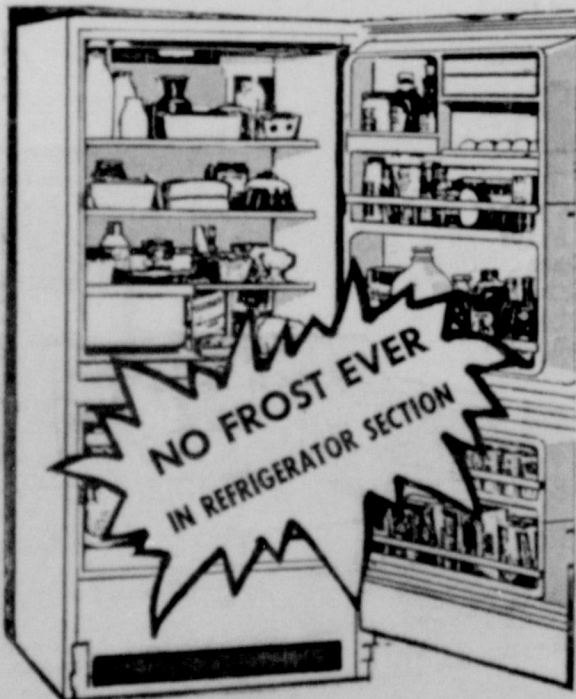

## IT'S THE LAW... in Texas

### PARENTAL CONSENT NEEDED FOR CHILD'S MEDICAL CARE

It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parent's consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal

technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid — but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot grant consent for a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Children cannot do this.

By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you come to a hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious, emergency care, yet later he should get your consent to further treatment.

Minors cannot consent to medical treatment, and except in dire emergencies their parents or guardians must give it for them.

The consent should not be broadly or loosely phrased, but

should be as specific as circumstances permit.

The principal reason for having the consent in writing is to avoid later misunderstandings. It is a protection both to the patient and physician.

Richard M. Riley, a well-known Travis county dairyman, is serving as Dairy Month chairman in Texas, according to Meekma. Riley is an immediate past president of the AA of Texas and currently a member of the Association's Board of Directors. He is also president of the Mid-Texas Milk Producers Association; vice president of the Travis County Dairy Herd Improvement Association and a member of the Travis County Dairy Program Building Committee.

Meekma and Riley point out that dairies throughout Texas and the nation will be holding "open-house" during June and that many special events ranging from a "three minute cow wash" to milk drinking contests will help acquaint the public with the dairy industry and make dairymen better known to the public they serve.

Food editors, nutritionists and others concerned with the American diet will emphasize milk as "nature's most nearly perfect food" during the month and point out that proper diets for every American should include milk and milk products.

The two dairy leaders extend an invitation to the public to take advantage of the open-house offer by dairymen and pay them a visit.

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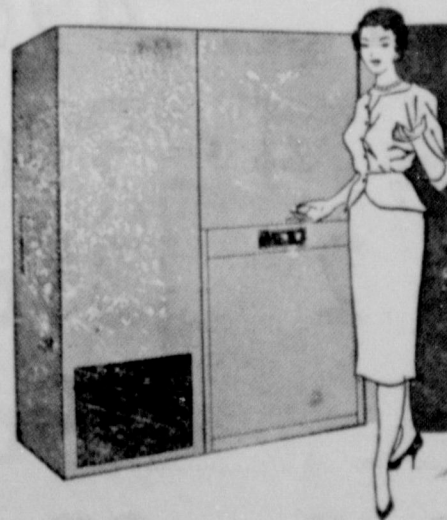
