'School Week' Events Set Here

Public Schools Week will be observed by the Slaton Public Schools from March 6 through March 11. This is the 17th year in which Public Schools Week has been observed by the schools.

This week has been proclaimed by the Governor, Lt. Governor, and Speaker of the House of Representatives, and all city officials throughout the state of Texas. The primary purpose of this week is to motivate more visitation by the parents of children to the school which the children are attending.

Throughout this week parents and other interested citizens are urged to visit one or more of the public schools. Some special events are being prepared for this week.

On Tuesday, March 7, in the afternoon, parents will be given an opportunity to attend classes in Slaton Junior High School with their child or children. This will enable the parents to see first-hand the activities and programs in which the child participates in an educational system.

The West Ward Elementary School, in cooperation with the Parent-Teacher Association, will present a program Thursday, March 9, at 7:30 p.m., in the high school auditorium. This program under the direction of Mrs. Anita Perkins, will be a dramatization of two musical stories, "The Little Red Hen" and "The Gingerbread Boy."

This program will be presented by the first grade students of this building. In addition, the fourth grade pupils will present a series of folk songs and musical games. There will be a small admission charge of 25¢ for adults and 10¢ for students for the purpose of defraying the cost of production and music.

On Friday, March 10, the Baptist church will honor the seniors of Slaton High School with a banquet.

Saturday, March 11, students entering the band and vocal solo contest of the University Interscholastic League will compete in Lubbock. The high school track team will participate in a track meet in Denver City.

Since the last observance of Texas Public School Week, The Slaton schools have added the following facilities: a new stadium, lighting system, and fence at the football field; a gymnasium addition to the Slaton High School; and are in the process of adding a new cafeteria to the West Ward School.

Scout Cookie Sales Begin

Girl Scouts of Slaton and the Caprock Council will begin their annual cookie sale today announced Mrs. Joe Fondy, cookie chairman for Slaton.

Girl Scouts in the 18 county council will be selling the cookies through March 16. The price will be 50 cents per box. The more than 5,000 girls will be selling five kinds of cookies: chocolate mint, assorted sandwich, butter cookies, peanut butter sandwiches, and spice cookies.

Burglars broke a glass window out of a door to gain entry to the school building. The burglary was discovered Tuesday morning.

Police recorded a one-vehicle accident on US-84 near the intersection of FM-41 early Monday morning. A big tractor-trailer jack-knifed and overturned. The driver, Charles J. Fremont of Lubbock, escaped serious injury. Damage was estimated at \$4,010 to the rig, which was hauling groceries and produce.

ANC Plan Here Is Postponed

A new telephone numbering plan, known as All Number Calling, scheduled to come to Slaton this year has been postponed until May, 1968.

Announcement of the change in schedule was made by Bob Davis, manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, who said the company plans to make some equipment changes and re-arrangements before ANC goes into effect here.

"As a result," the manager said, "we decided to delay the changeover until we have completed our equipment changes." Davis said that customers who have already ordered printed material showing the prefix of 828 instead of Valley 8 should use the material as they planned.

"The dial positions of Valley 8 and 828 are the same," the manager said, "and the only reason for our making the change in 1968 will be to conform with a nationwide numbering plan which will make all telephone numbers uniform -- and in that way allow us to come up with additional combinations of telephone numbers to meet the constant demand for telephone service across the United States."

Farmers Attend Quality Meeting

A group of Slaton farmers attended a cotton quality conference in Lubbock Tuesday, coming back with even more confidence concerning a local program aimed at growing better cotton and securing a premium price.

Textiles executives were special guests at the conference, sponsored by Plains Cotton Growers. Textile leaders at the meeting represented firms which buy 40 to 45 percent of the total domestic consumption of American cotton.

A local steering committee, working with the Slaton Co-Op Gin board, has announced plans to grow a long-staple cotton--Acala 1517 variety--and use one gin plant exclusively for the program.

Another meeting of the advisory group was to be held here Wednesday night. Interested farmers have been invited to check with Slaton Co-Op about signing up for the program.

A local official said as far as known, Slaton is the only community planning this type of program where one gin plant is used exclusively for the long-staple cotton.

AT LIONS CLUB

Captain Talks About Vietnam

Capt. Conrad S. Biegalski, Reese Air Force Base, gave an informative talk on the Vietnam situation when he appeared as guest speaker for the regular weekly luncheon meeting of the Slaton Lions Club Tuesday.

Three Lamesa Lions visited the meeting, seeking support for their candidate for district governor, Charlie King. One visitor--Jake Wendel -- was introduced at the meeting.

The captain is a graduate of the U. S. Air Force Academy. He is 26 and a native of Washington, D. C.

The nine major problems listed by the captain: (1) basic Vietnamese nationalists, (2) the 1,000-year Chinese influence, (3) French and European influences, (4) Basic Asian personalities--no regard for human life or material wealth, (5) influence of armed conflict throughout lives of people, (6) tremendous ethnic and religious diversity, (7) history of revolt against current rulers, (8) weather and terrain make communications and national unity almost impossible, (9) American influence just beginning.

Children Need Measles Vaccine

Approximately 1200 measles shots were given during January and February by public health nurses at Lubbock's City-County Health Department Clinics. Many hundreds more were given in private doctors' offices. The measles vaccine is available for the protection of Lubbock's 26,000 preschoolers.

Local public health authorities urge parents to protect their children with the measles vaccine. Measles is a harmful, sometimes fatal childhood disease. All children between the ages of one and 15 years should be vaccinated. If your children have not yet received the vaccine, see your doctor at once. If you do not have a doctor, cannot see a doctor, call the Lubbock City-County Health Unit: P02-6411.

In Lubbock County's currently heavy emphasis on measles vaccine protection, as well as immunization against smallpox, diphtheria, and tetanus, the City-County Health Department maintains a clinic in Slaton the first Thursday of each month from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The clinic is located at the Triumph Baptist Church, East Geneva and Johnson Streets. The clinic is open today here.

Texas traffic will kill some 3,500 persons in 1967, unless something is done about it, according to "Texans for Traffic Safety." One thing that can be done is to update the driver license law which was written in 1941, as proposed by Governor Connally. The present law contains "loopholes" through which flagrant and dangerous law violators can retain a legal license to drive.



County Records 31 Accidents During Month

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 31 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of January, according to Sgt. O. C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 2 persons killed, 30 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$29,590.

April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past five and one-half months 230,000 or 33% of the approximately 700,000 registered vehicles in this region have been inspected. This leaves 470,000 vehicles to be inspected between now and the April 15 deadline.

If this number of uninspected vehicles were divided evenly among the 700 official inspection stations in this region, each would have approximately 672 vehicles to inspect in about 40 working days, or about 17 vehicles per day.

The inspection stations in heavily populated areas will have more than this average to inspect. In areas where there are only a few inspection stations you may have many miles to travel to get your vehicle inspected.

The sergeant urges motorists to have their vehicles inspected without delay to avoid the inconvenience of waiting lines.

Remember---no extension of the safety inspection deadline, April 15, 1967.

School Panel Discusses Bills Legislature, Teacher Needs

Public School administrators and teachers recently met in a panel discussion at the West Ward Hotel for the Texas Teachers' Association. The panel members discussed legislative needs, including the minimum wage, before the Legislature, several of which have been passed.

Members of the panel included W. Kerr, James Hill, James Hill, and C. Martin.

Some of the topics discussed were:

TEACHER SHORTAGE
 The 1966-1967 school year in May, 1966, did not have enough teachers for duty in September, 1966. This would be a problem to a community of one and one-half times the size of Slaton.

Of the 4,000 college graduates (Texas Colleges) of the class of 1966 who did not accept teaching positions in Texas, 1,200 vacancies and 1,200 teachers who were serving in ability and salary schedule which promises small annual increases for those who enter teaching and remain there. At the present time, approximately 25% of Texas teachers are men, but the low beginning salary is failing to attract young men into the profession; many of those who have started are forced to drop out.

The beginning salary for a teacher with a bachelor's degree is established by law in the Minimum Foundation Program at \$4,104. The average salary in Texas for 1966-1967 was \$6,025; the national average was \$6,821. This ranked Texas 33rd among the 50 states in 1966-1967.

Across the nation, salaries and wages are increasing an average of 4 to 5 percent per year, and the cost of living has increased 3 percent during the past year. If Texas teachers do not receive salary adjustments before 1969, the recruitment of teachers and holding teachers in service will become increasingly difficult; the present shortage, already severe, will be compounded to a considerable degree.

Let us look briefly at the competition that faces a school superintendent who is attempting to recruit college graduates at an annual salary of \$4,100. Certain Texas cities have advertised that they will pay \$6,000 per year for an apprentice policeman or transit bus driver—neither of whom must have more than a high school diploma or its equivalent.

In June, 1966, the salary for beginning engineers ranged upward from \$7,500; for beginning chemists, physicists, and mathematicians, upward from \$7,000; for business majors, usually well above \$6,000. Many teachers are going west for good reasons. The salary of a beginning teacher in California is \$6,100.

Failure to provide a reasonable salary for teachers will be reflected directly in the quality of education provided Texas Youth, and the losers will be the children, their community, state, and nation.

PROPOSED BILLS
 Two bills proposed in the legislative program include the Continuing Contract, and the Minimum Salary Bill.

The continuing contract bill provides a contract for teachers and administrators with the discretion of the Board of Education. It provides a probationary period before the continuing contract becomes effective, but authorizes long-term contracts for experienced teachers before they reach continuing contract status.

It also provides orderly process for resignation of teachers to accept positions, and a penalty for teachers who break contract after deadline dates. Provisions are made for dismissal of probationary teachers.

Teachers under continuing contract may be dismissed for cause at end of the school year. Hearings are requested and appeals to State Commissioner of Education and the State Board of Education are provided.

The minimum salary bill provides an increase in the minimum salary base and adjustments in the increment schedule to provide a salary increase ranging from \$61 to \$100 per month for teachers holding degrees.

The schedule of the beginning teacher in a Texas school with a bachelor degree and no experience is \$4,104. With a master's degree, it is \$4,329.

Bill proposed by the Texas State Teachers' Assn. would increase salaries for a beginning teacher to \$5,004 and a teacher with master's degree to \$5,310.

A sick leave bill, already introduced, provides five days per year cumulative to 30 days in sick leave for a teacher's personal illness. In Slaton, the policy is now 3 days per year cumulative to 12 days per year.

Not yet introduced is a P-TA sponsored bill providing for a public school kindergarten, allowing 5-year-olds to begin their schooling.

A retirement bill provides an increase for teachers already retired in the amount of \$1.50 per month for each year they have been retired. It requires no current appropriation.


A constitutional amendment, to be voted on by the people in November, 1968, would provide that a member of the Retirement System may make deposits on the actual salary received. It requires no appropriation and, if approved, each member who increases his deposits will pay proportionally for his increased benefits.

Challenge for '67

Why Do Teachers Teach? Survey Reveals Reasons

AUSTIN — Why do young Texas men and women choose classroom teaching as a career?

Although population estimates show that not enough young people are choosing teaching careers in order that youngsters 10 years from now can be assured of a full-time teacher, bright young men and women are still choosing the schools as the scene of their life work.

Texas Future Teachers of America chapters throughout the state recently conducted an extensive survey of young teachers.

The survey sought to determine what influence student professional organizations have had upon teachers new to the classroom. But the survey also sought to discover basic factors which influenced the career choice of the young teacher.

More than 2,800 Texas teachers with five or fewer years of experience were interviewed. The results of the survey showed that a wide range of factors helped guide college students toward teaching careers.

The opportunity to work with youth was cited by 88 per cent of the teachers.

- The influence of older teachers upon the new careerists was listed by 64 per cent.
- A teacher's income proved almost no magnet at all in drawing people to the classroom. Only 15 per cent said salaries had anything to do with choosing a teaching career.
- Fifty-five per cent said they entered teaching because of the demand for teachers existing within the state, while 36 per cent said influence of their own parents was a factor.
- The security of a teaching career was cited by 45 per cent of the interviewees.
- Twenty-nine per cent listed the availability in teaching careers of unlimited areas of specialization as a factor which prompted them.
- The survey showed that 22 per cent of the interviewees had belonged to high school chapters of Texas Future Teachers of America, and 43 per cent had held membership in the Texas Student Association while attending college.

Texas Ranks 39th In Per-Pupil Cost

AUSTIN—Texas' expenditure for each of its elementary and high school pupils is more than 50 per cent less than New York state's and 27 per cent less than California's.

A nationwide survey released by Texas State Teachers Association here in Texas disclosed that New York is investing \$912 per pupil annually compared to Texas' \$449, California is spending \$613 annually.

The national average is \$564. The findings place Texas in 39th rank among the 50 states in per pupil expenditures. Among the 38 states having higher annual per pupil expenditures are:

Alaska, \$877; New Jersey, \$740; Wyoming, \$669; Connecticut, \$657; Oregon, \$645; Wisconsin, \$614; and Delaware, \$629.

And all of the states bordering Texas spend more: Oklahoma, \$461; New Mexico, \$556; Louisiana, \$554.

The state with the poorest rating in per pupil expenditures is Mississippi with \$315 annually. New York's is the highest.

The report, which deals only with public schools, shows that Texas:

- Ranks third in size of instructional staff with teachers, administrators, and supervisors totaling 114,000.
- Also ranks third in size of enrollment with 2.5 million children going to school; Texas enrollment is exceeded only by New York and California.
- Ranks sixth in number of high school graduates with 127,442 expected to receive diplomas this spring; Pennsylvania, Illinois, and Ohio will each graduate more high school seniors this year although these states have smaller total school enrollments than Texas.
- Ranks fourth in total number of school districts with 1,303; Nebraska, Illinois, and South Dakota have more school districts than Texas.

The survey shows that Texas' uneven performance in number of high school graduates compared to its total enrollment is probably tied closely to its relative low ranking in total annual per pupil expenditures for public schools.

Although the number of high school graduates in Texas is relatively low compared to the

other large industrialized states in the nation, Texas can claim better than average improvement in holding students in school until they graduate.

The national increase in number of high school graduates is expected to be up this year by 2.7 per cent.

But Texas' increase in number of high school graduates will rise by 4.6 per cent. This improved record reflects favorably on both the quality of the school program and efforts to cut the state's dropout rate.

School revenues in Texas show that the percentage of total revenue represented by federal aid funds have risen one per cent; this year 9.3 per cent of Texas school revenue is contributed by the federal government. The state contributes 49.3 per cent and local districts contribute 41.3 per cent of the revenue.

The survey showed that pupil-teacher ratios in Texas elementary schools compare poorly with several states. This year the average class size in Texas elementary schools is 32.2 students per teacher, while in New York it is 24.6 students per teacher, and in Connecticut it is 27.5 students per teacher in elementary schools.

Ideal class size for the best instruction in elementary schools is estimated by most educators to be 25 students per teacher.

The survey was conducted by the Research Division of National Education Association and the data enumerated in "Estimates of School Statistics, 1966-1967."





ITEM: Cabbage, especially green cabbage, is a rich source of vitamin C, with about as much of this vitamin as the orange. A cabbage wedge (3 1/2 inches by 4 1/2 inches) provides 70% of the recommended daily allowance of C, and a wide range of other nutrients in useful amounts. It is also ideal roughage.

ITEM: Labor-saving devices mean that the homemaker spends less energy for her usual work. That's why she needs less food. It used to take 240 calories to do the family wash plus 50 to hang the clothes on the line. Today it takes only 15 calories to put the clothes in the automatic washer.

ITEM: Splattered or spilled foods come off range surfaces easily when they have just happened. Wipe them off with paper or a dry cloth. A wet cloth will steam-burn your fingers or crack the range enamel.

Texas PTA Co-sponsors Smoking and Health Project

Texas PTA will cooperate in a smoking and health project sponsored by the National PTA and the US Public Health Service, the February issue of "The Texas Parent-Teacher," state PTA magazine, has announced.

The National PTA campaign aimed at preventing seventh- and eighth - grade students from starting to smoke has been funded by an \$86,700 grant from the Public Health Service.

Texas was among 21 pilot states selected last August by the National PTA for participation in the campaign during the first year.

The central piece of material for the first year's program is a brochure on smoking and health, "His First Cigarette May Be a Matter of Life or Death," which PTA's in participating states have been asked to distribute to parents

of more than two million seventh - and eighth - grade students. By 1969, parents in all 50 states, including the District of Columbia, will be involved. US Public Health Service findings indicate that every day more than 4,000 young people try smoking for the first time; by the age of 18 half of the nation's teenagers smoke regularly.

According to the article, distribution of the brochure in Texas will be accomplished as soon as possible after a Feb. 7-8 meeting of the PTA State Board of Managers in Austin.

Although the prime purpose of this PTA program is to prevent students from starting to smoke, distribution of the brochure also may strengthen existing programs now under way to reduce smoking among persons who already smoke.

Funds granted National PTA will meet all costs, including the salary of a program director and necessary clerical staff, cost of preparing and distributing materials, and cost of meetings for program personnel at the national level.

In a statement prepared for the article regarding Texas' participation, Mrs. L. L. Ledger, state PTA president, says, "The Smoking and Health Project of the National PTA, a parent - to - parent, person-to - person campaign to make all parents of seventh - and eighth - grade youngsters aware of the possible health hazards of smoking, strikes a response in all of us.

"We know that statistics can change, can be misleading, are subject to different interpreta-

tions by different people, and that opinions vary. We acknowledge our limitations as laymen in areas of health and related scientific research. We respect the rights of individuals to choose for themselves. We recognize the authority of school boards to establish policies governing our schools and their administration.

"We believe that education based on scientific facts -- to be found, for example, in the Surgeon General's report of January, 1964 -- is in the public interest and, specifically, may help boys and girls live longer, healthier lives. This is one of our basic commitments in PTA, and I invite and encourage your enlightened participation," Mrs. Ledger writes.

Agricultural and economic leaders in Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Lynn and Garza counties are invited to attend the session to be at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, March 9 at the Koko Palace, Avenue Q at 50th Street, Lubbock.

Other similar meetings will be held at Plainview, Brownfield and Stanton.

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The session will be John Seibert, coordinator of the South Plains Development program and Extension Service farm management specialist serving the area from Lubbock.

Other speakers will include Dr. E. M. Trew, Assistant Dean of Agriculture at Texas A&M University, and representatives of agricultural agencies, colleges and groups who will explain their role in the program. Trew will discuss the effectiveness of other similar programs currently underway in the Panhandle, in the Blacklands, and in East Texas.

Seibert, who coordinated the year-long study of the area's resources which led to the SPD program, will discuss the findings of the study and the suggested objectives and procedures of the program.

The study indicates that South Plains farmers could boost their gross income by an estimated \$138 - million annually through improved use of resources and modern management, Seibert said.

Processing raw agricultural products could bring in an additional \$400-million per year,

he estimates. By comparison, grain coordinators received amount, about \$4 million for their efforts in 1966.

In the year-long study, resources of water and capital were about 150 area interviewed to get the region's opportunities, and researchers' profession guidelines adopted to increase and business retention.

The published findings were at a December meeting. Participants throughout the South Plains Development program.

Seibert said the meetings are the South Plains more of the area and opportunities Plains Development.
