Automobile Damage In October 50% Less In Slaton Limits

Traffic citations and warnings issued by Slaton City Policemen took an upward climb in the city limits of Slaton during the month of October, but the decrease in property damage caused by auto accidents declined compared to the previous month of September.

Property damage in October caused by auto collisions was \$2,145.00 as compared to \$4,275.00 in September.

Locations and amounts of damage during October were the

following: 8th and Division, \$1,000; US 84 and Floyd, \$75.00; US 84 and Crosby, \$150.00; US 84 and Garza, \$160.00; 7th and Garza, \$225.00; US 84 and Division, \$200.00; 7th and Geneva, \$50.00; US 84 and Railroad Ave., \$35.00; US 84 and Garza, \$175.00; US 84 and Jean, \$75.00. A total of 10 accidents, and a total of 151 traffic warnings were issued.

According to the monthly report submitted by Slaton Police Chief Joe Martin, of the 39 of-

fenses reported during the month, 34 of the infractions were cleared. Offenses reported included: lost property, dog bite, vandalism, theft over \$50, found property, aggravated assault, theft under \$50.00, investigation of arson, stolen auto, theft of animals, runaway, attempted auto theft, missing person, abusive language, burglary, destruction of private property, forgery and passing, and malicious mischief.

There were 107 persons who

inhabited the jail during October for being drunk, drunk in a car, disturbance, vagrancy, traffic warrants, abusive language, simple assault, affray, drunk, vagrancy, and destruction of private property. A total of \$2,048.00 was paid in corporation court and prisoners elected to lay out \$530.00 in fines.

Traffic arrests included excessive noise with mufflers, speeding, driving in a dangerous manner, no drivers license, permitting unlicensed driver to

drive, run stop sign, failed to obey audible signal, parked on roadway, defective brakes, negligent collision, improper left turn, following too closely, no motor inspection sticker, and no license plates.

Other duties performed by the local police department included holding prisoners for other departments, and arrests for juvenile court.

A total of 685 gallons of fuel was used in the city patrol cars

College President Tells Lions Bureaucratic Control Is A Threat To Private Ownership

The secret of prosperity in America is the preservation of private ownership.

We must fight the next 10 to 20 years to preserve our great way of life or else succumb to bureaucratic control.

More government control and less individual initiative can be fatal to our country.

These were the opinions of Dr. F. W. Mattox, president of Lub-

bock Christian College. He was guest speaker at the Lion Luncheon Tuesday at Bruce's Restaurant.

The college president gave Lubbock Christian College, the youngest of 11 non-tax-supported colleges in Texas but now the

largest in enrollment, as an example of individual initiative.

"It is a demonstration of the freedom of individuals to use initiative and plan an institution," Dr. Mattox said.

The speaker said the fact that the number of tax supported schools now exceeds non-tax supported schools shows a decrease in individual initiative. He said the two were "fifty fifty" up to World War II but the tax-supported schools are now 20 per cent greater in number.

Dr. Mattox warned of the dangers of communism, socialism and bureaucratic control in the face of such indifference.

"Anyone who is not concerned is not aware of what's going on," the speaker warned in pointing out that communism now occupies half the earth's surface and a third of its population.

"It is very disturbing when we hear someone say our president doesn't have enough control," the college president said. "This is a complete reversal of the concept of our forefathers and stems from socialist and communist governments with their centralized controls."

Bureaucratic control, with its civil service protection, is "very disturbing," the speaker said. I allowed to persist, it soon will have control of our land, manufacturers and wages, he added.

"The only way we can preserve private ownership is by individual planning and individual management of economy," Dr. Mattox added. "We must consistently be alert and never afraid to speak out for our rights."

The group was en route to the farm home when the wreck occurred at 12:55 a. m.

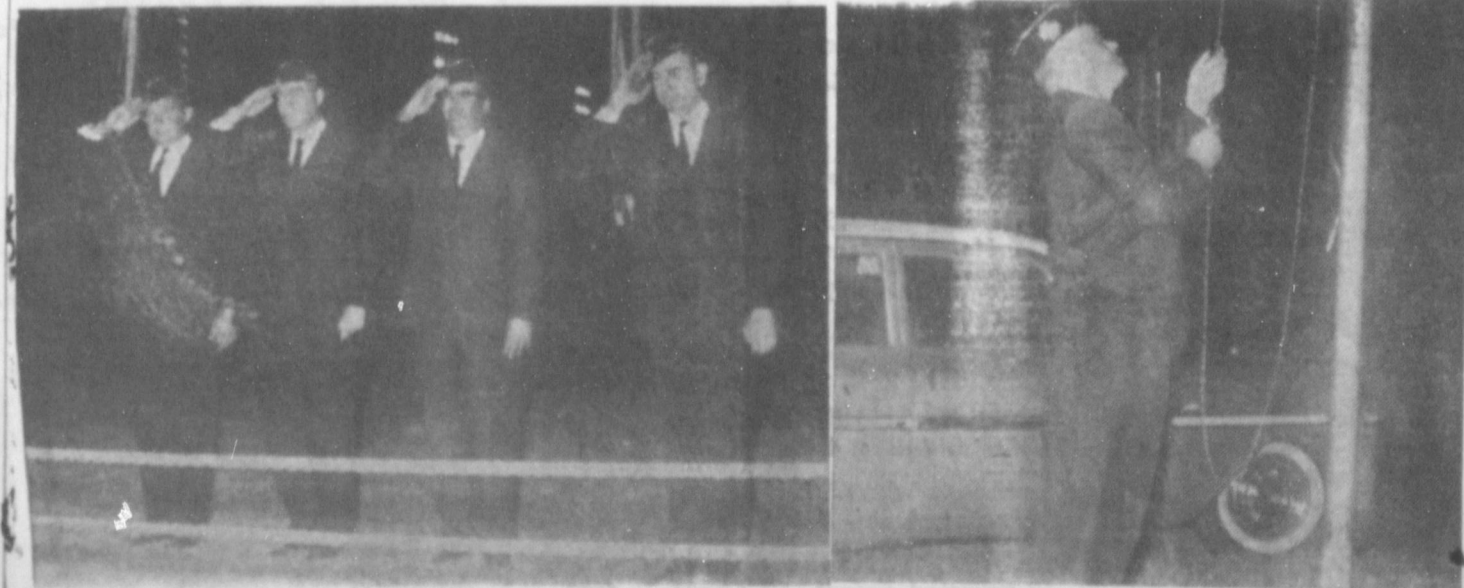
New Home Rites Held For California Youth

Cotton Grade Down In County From Last Week

The average grade and staple for the cotton classed in the Lubbock Classing Office was down from the preceding week reports the U. S. D. A., Agricultural Marketing Service. The majority of the cotton is still white with the percentages of light spotted cotton increasing.

The predominate grade was MIDDLING with 38 percent, the other white grades totaled 29 percent. The light spotted grades accounted for 32 percent of the cotton classed. This was an increase of 11 percent over the preceding week. All other grades accounted for the other 1 percent.

The average staple length for the past week was 30.4 thirty-seconds of an inch as compared to 30.8 a week ago. The percentages for the staple lengths were 1/8 inch 2 percent, 29-32 inch 11 percent, 15-16 inch 49 percent, 31-32 inch 28 percent, 1 inch longer 9 percent.

The micronaire readings dropped slightly this week. Thirteen percent "miked" 3.4 and below,

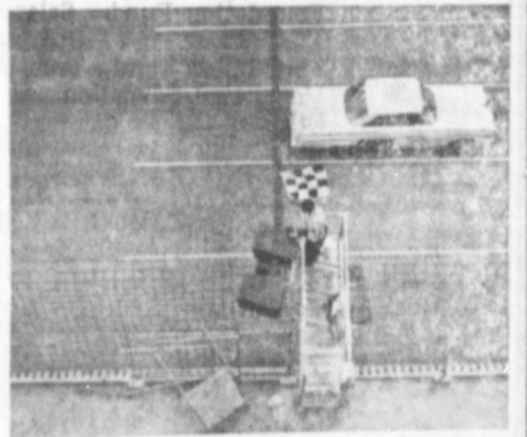

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

SLANT HOLE PENALTIES — An Austin jury fined four East Texas oil operators with \$304,800 in penalties in the first slant-hole oil suit tried before State Court jurors.

H. M. Harrington Jr., Charles Lutes, Reid Allgood, and J. W. Beton, all of Gregg County, were directed to pay the penalties to the State.

A total of 77 civil penalty suits seeking \$22,000,000, filed by the Attorney General following slant-drilling scandals, remains on the docket.

Jury found the four Gregg County oilmen operated a well which bottomed under a neighboring lease for 10 years. BANK TURNED DOWN — State Banking Board found "no public need" for proposed Merchants State Bank at Houston and Lone Star State Bank at Lone Star.

Board postponed action on an application for charter of Industrial Bank and Trust at Lubbock.

OIL PRICE CUT PROBE—Reps. George Cook of Odessa and Maurice Duke of Wichita Falls have announced hearings by the House Interim Study Committee on oil and gas matters.

They scheduled a committee meeting with the Railroad Commission for Friday to get directions and guidelines for the crude price probe.

Hearings to be held soon in Wichita Falls and Abilene will concern North and West Texas cuts.

Representatives of companies which instigated cuts will be invited to testify, Cook said. If they refuse, the committee will use its subpoena powers.

"I want the people of Texas to know that the members of the Texas legislature are not standing idly by while certain isolated companies are allowed to make a shambles of its most important industry," Cook said. Hearings will result in "recommendations for immediate action."

Duke said cuts, which have ranged from 10 to 48 cents per barrel, would cost the State half a million dollars in tax money and damage the State's economy to the unhappy tune of \$9,000,000 a year. "Cut came" charged Duke, "while major importing companies are running up record profits and independent producers of Texas are being 'bankrupted'."

FARM-ROAD IMPROVEMENTS — State Highway Commission ap-

proved one of the most extensive farm-to-market construction and improvement programs in many years.

It okayed and \$18,144,500 program to protect state investment in 3,056 miles of F.M. roads.

About 67 per cent of the money will go for reconstruction and reconditioning of existing roads and upgrading the safety factor. Work is proposed on more than 500 projects, covering in excess of a thousand miles of F. M. highways.

THE COURT SPEAK — Texas' new small loan control law successfully weathered its first court test. Supreme Court denied three loan firms permission to attack constitutionality of a section requiring at least 51 per cent of a company stock be owned by Texans.

Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell had refused them State licenses because of that restriction.

High court also set for November 20 a "gentlemen's agreement" action to test eligibility of special 93rd District Judge J. H. Starley of Pecos to preside over the trial of a complex law suit which will litigate Rio Grande Water rights below Falcon Dam. Action is of vast importance to the economy of Starr, Hidalgo, Cameron and Willacy counties.

Attorneys for Billie Sol Estes told the Court of Criminal Appeals too much newspaper and TV publicity kept him from getting a fair trial on swindling charges at Tyler last November. They ask a reversal of the eight-year sentence.

UPHOLDS FARMER'S RIGHT — State Supreme Court upheld the right of a San Patricio County farmer, Walter Leber, to stop the flow of water through a drainage ditch on his land with a caliche block.

Leber's neighbors secured a district court injunction ordering him to remove the block and forbidding him from doing anything to stop the "natural flow" of water through the ditch. But the Supreme Court held that the waters reached his ditch through man-made routes, and said he was entitled to "self-help" to prevent damage to his land.

NEW LOOK IN NURSING — About 4,000 students in Texas are working to add "R. N." (Registered Nurse) to their names. Many are following via revised routes free of some of the old-fashioned restrictions that used to cause a high rate of drop outs.

Miss Bernice V. Johnson, secretary-treasurer of the State Board of Nurse Examiners, says many are studying under the so-called "Plan Two" system, which allows a nurse hopeful to take 36 weeks of academic work in the college of her choice, be-

fore assuming the added duties of a hospital trainee.

Texas To Dine With President AUSTIN, Tex. — Some 60,000 Texans soon will be getting invitations to dine with the President — for \$100 a plate — at Austin's Municipal Auditorium.

Presidential aides now are in Austin making arrangements with top Texas Democrats for a November 22 "Texas Welcome Dinner" for Pres. John F. Kennedy and Vice Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson.

Speakers list so far has been limited to the President, the Vice President and Gov. John Connally.

To assure a capacity crowd local party officials are being called on to help. Quotas are being assigned to districts over the state. Funds raised are to be divided between the National and State Democratic organizations.

Most of Texas' 21 congressmen are expected to attend the dinner and all members of the Legislature will be invited.

Early announcements indicate Sen. Ralph Yarborough will be with the Presidential party.

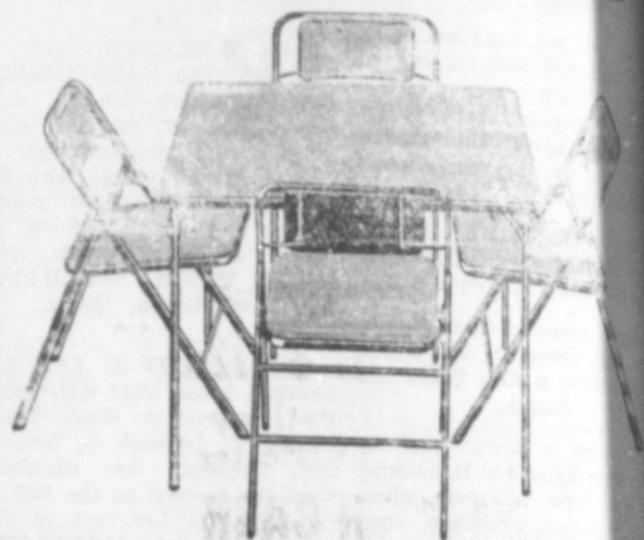

Letters to Editor

MR. KING

Last night's announcement that Secretary Freeman had reneged on today's Report and Review reception in Lubbock reminded me of the cold President Kennedy caught in Chicago just before the Cuban crisis. Recent disgraceful demonstrations in Atlanta, Dallas and Chicago might make one believe a Public Servant accepts a dare rather than an invitation to appear outside the Capitol and the United Nations.

One, sale of \$98 million in wheat and flour to Brazil under the Food for Peace program, which was announced while our Agriculture Department was in Russia. This was to be payable in Brazilian cruzeiros which were to be retained in Brazil to be used in our AID program. The cruzeiro has declined on the New York market from 500 to the American dollar to 1,000 per dollar in recent months. Last April Congress granted Brazil \$398 million American dollars, reducing State Department's request for \$440 million and promising Brazil would oust the Communist-infiltrated government.

The other was the disappearance of between \$25 and \$60 million of wheat that had been bartered to Austria. Since we were not receiving cash for it, it was reported we would lose nothing. Four Austrian government officials are being prosecuted for this deal — no Americans, so far as we've heard. Department of Agriculture seems to have missed an awful good chance to look into it while they were over there.

Mr. Freeman was quoted in August as saying there was no food shortage in Russia, and that the Communist Collectives could produce a sufficient supply of wheat.

We have been told the sale of \$150 to \$250 million in wheat to Russia will "save" us about \$200 million storage costs. If that be true, we "saved" about as much in the Austrian and Brazilian bargains, but it hasn't been said yet they stopped the drain on our Gold Reserve.

Should you ever have to report a fire either at your house or someone else's, how would you go about it? These 3 easy steps might save property or even lives so please read and remember:

1. Always give your name when reporting the fire. Should the address be taken down incorrectly, it might be possible to call back and correct the error.
2. Give the Street name or number and as nearly as possible the house address. The fire truck drivers are sometimes hampered by the lakes in the east part of town. Don't go into detail as this time might be wasted time. As an example,—"This is Careless Matches, I want to report a fire on Oklahoma St. three blocks north of Division." This automatically tells the resident fireman that he will have to go some other way rather than down Division St. because of the lake. (It's not the fences that bother Otie Baxley but sometimes the lake has water in it.)
3. Be prepared to repeat the street address and by all means keep calm. Fires have been reported in the past by well-meaning individuals who have given the wrong address. This mostly because of nerves.

Wellman came back to score their second TD and lead 14-6 at the half.

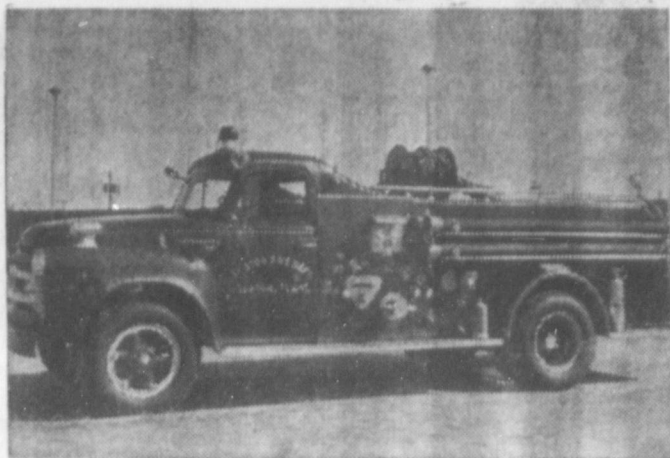
Ronald Saunders of Southland scored on a 20-yard run. The extra point try failed again for the Eagles.

- * Never start an outdoor fire on a windy day.
- * Burn trash or leaves in a covered metal container or, better still, in an approved waste burner or incinerator.
- * Don't start a fire near a building or fence.
- * Connect your garden hose for an emergency.
- * Keep children away.
- * Stay with the fire until it is out and the ashes are cool enough to test with your hands.

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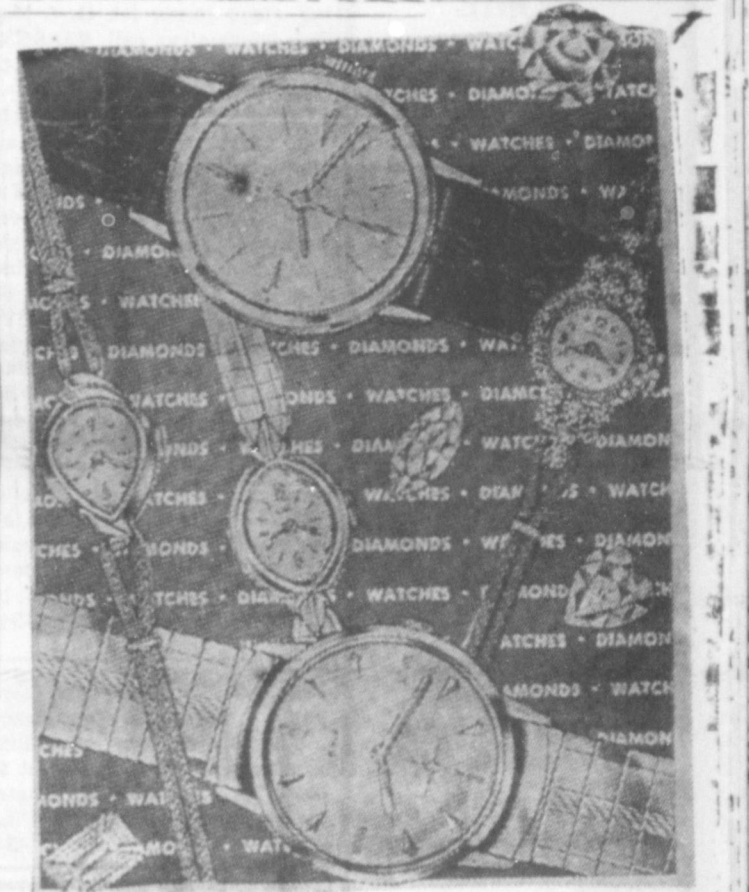

Here in Slaton, and in the entire area of the Plains, there virtually has not been any slowing down of the progress of the communities in the way of building, increase of commerce, or population growth.

In the present time, there doesn't seem to be any reason to think that we will not continue to grow for the next several decades. If this is fact, we expect to meet the needs and provide services that will be necessary for this growth in the future?

According to a national survey, it is a historical fact that before new highway systems are completed there is already a need for a larger system in the area just completed. One might surmise that the causes of growth, since in some areas of the state and state that haven't progressed have decreased and in some areas, communities no longer exist at all.

We feel open public meetings will accomplish what we all want without the danger of misinterpretation that sometimes arises from small group "walk" meetings. It's high time, we think, for us to pull together for the good of the present and future residents of Slaton.

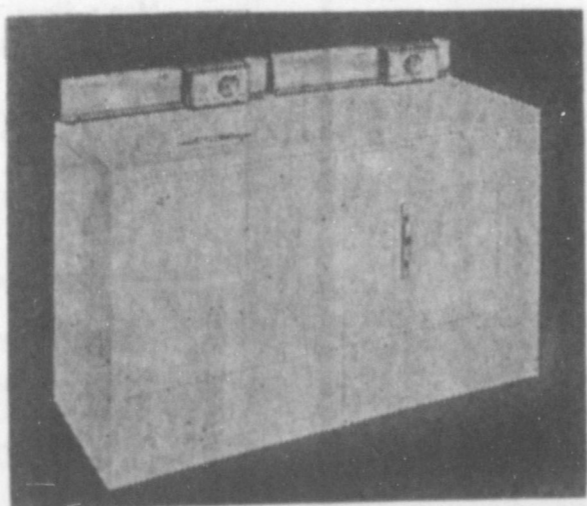

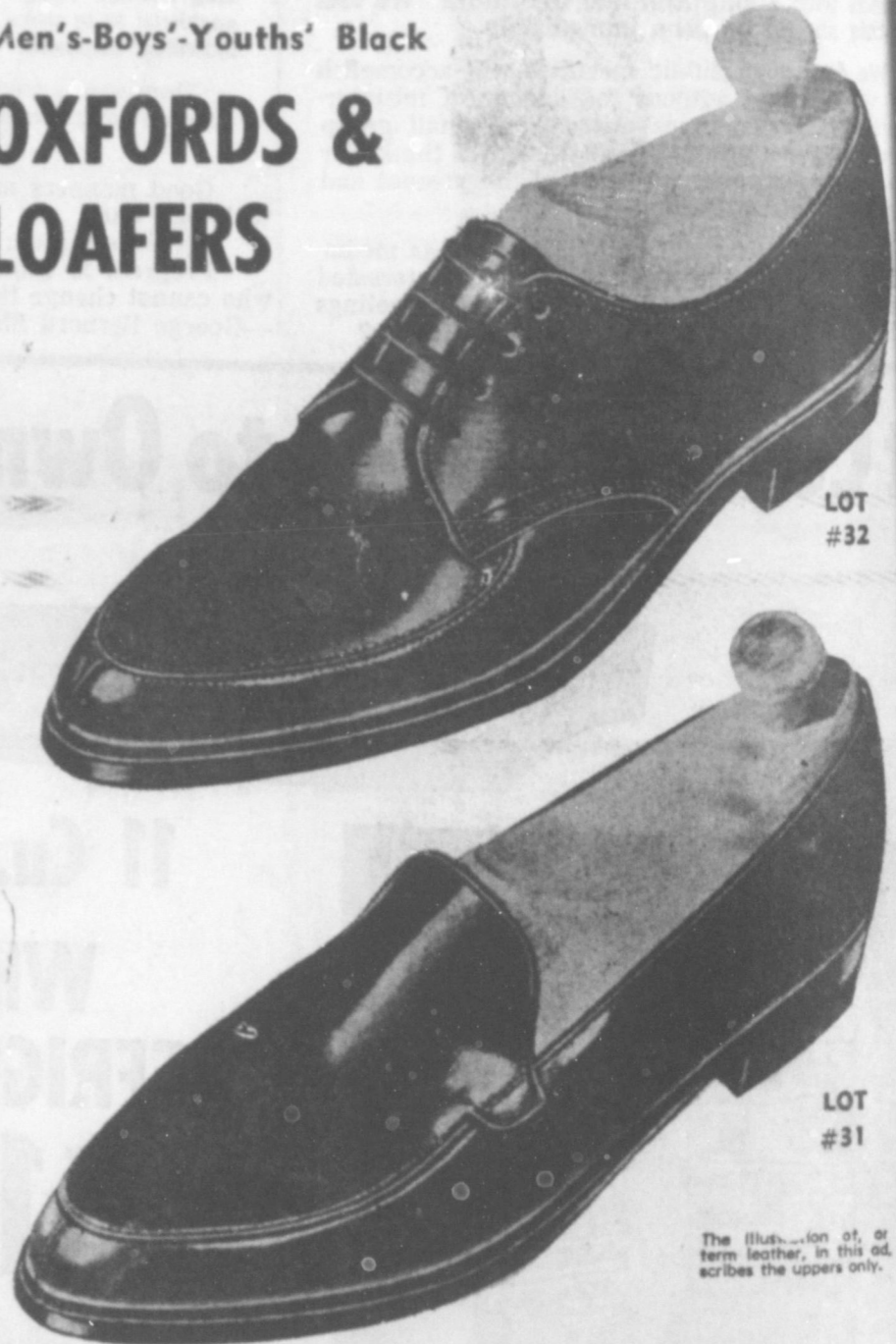

Livestock Owners Warned About Defoliating Poison

Livestock owners are once again cautioned against the deadly danger of allowing their farm animals to graze in cotton fields which have been defoliated by the use of certain chemicals.

This warning comes on the heels of new reports this fall of cattle dying from the effects of arsenic poison.

A North Texas farmer lost 20 cattle overnight after they had grazed in a field where an arsenic-containing cotton defoliant had been applied earlier.

The proper use of agricultural chemicals is of great significance to farm productivity in our nation today. However, lack of information or caution in their use can be disastrous.

Chemical manufacturers are required to take every possible precaution in the making, distribution and sale of their products. A wealth of information is provided on the proper use of the compounds. But there is no safeguard against carelessness of the applicator.

Many defoliants used on Texas cotton today contain arsenic acid which is economical and effective defoliation but can be dangerous to animals for a dangerous period of time. In many cases, cattle should not be allowed to graze the fields. Rather, the stalks should be plowed under as a normal farming procedure.

Farmers are urged to guard against possible animal losses by seeking full information before applying any chemical to their crops, take extreme caution during application and keep watch-

The Far View

As this column is being written, Slaton is preparing to hold an election concerning the city charter. As you read these words, you and I will both know how the citizens of Slaton have decided this issue. I hope that there were enough of us who voted to render a decision which worthily and adequately indicates the feelings of the entire town.

Two days from now, on November 9th, the citizens of this State will vote on other issues. We still have time to be sure that most of the people, in Slaton at least, go to the polls to indicate their feelings in the issues at stake.

It is hard for me to understand why we Americans find it so inconvenient and hard to go to the polls. One of the reasons might be that we are afraid of "controversy." In this day and time it seems that things that are "controversial" are supposed to be ignored or dealt with as quickly as possible. It almost seems that if we hear that one or more persons is opposed to something, that it indicates that something has an inherent weakness or evil quality.

Really, it is because that we don't all agree on something that we have elections in America. We have found that taking a vote is the best thing to do when there is a matter to be decided that is "controversial." It is better than retiring to the back alley to fight it out, or organizing a coup d'etat, or arming for a rebellion.

Sometimes we forget that all of our laws, and even our Constitution are a result of controversy and compromise. Our Founding Fathers didn't agree on everything, and so they had to compromise with one another and to vote on the wording and provisions of the Constitution. The marvelous document which resulted, along with the Bill of Rights, indicated that even out of "controversy" can come good. Let us not be afraid of controversy. Let us instead stand up and be counted for what we believe. Will I see you at the polls on Saturday?

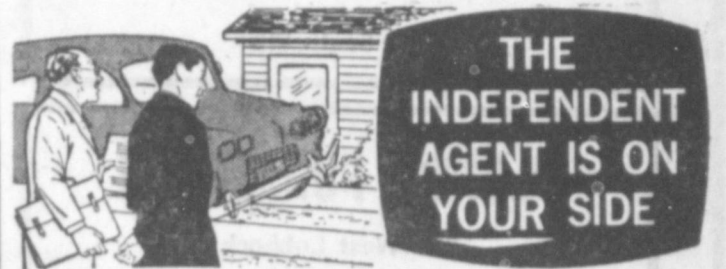

Denver City Mustangs Stampede Slaton Tigers 55 to 0

by BILL BALL Denver City merciless Mustangs continued their football supremacy over Slaton here Friday night, scoring twice in each quarter for a 55-0 victory over the hapless Tigers before 2,500 shivering fans.

The Mustangs, operating from a tight "T", chalked up 401 yards rushing while their rock-ribbed defensive unit held Slaton to only 39 yards.

The lopsided tilt, played in 32-degree weather, strongly resembled last year's 59-7 rout. The win was Denver City's sixth in eight starts. Slaton is 2-7 for the season.

In district play, the Mustangs own a 2-0 record while the Tigers stand at 1-2.

Pat Hubbard and Larry Rawls paced the Mustangs slaughter with Hubbard, one of the southwest's finest running high school backs, scoring three times and Rawls twice.

Most of the yardage was on the ground for both teams as Denver City hit only three of 15 passes for 43 yards and Slaton 7 of 11 for only 17 yards.

The Mustangs never were forced to punt until near the end of the third quarter and they turned it into a profitable maneuver.

The visiting Mustangs scored on their first series of downs with Hubbard plunging over from the 4. The Mustangs had entered Tiger territory on Hubbard's 30-yard romp after a double reverse.

Mike Martin kicked the first of five extra points he counted during the night.

Halfback Roy J. Henson swept the left side for 11 yards and the second Denver City score shortly before the end of the first stanza.

Martin kicked the extra point. In the second, Rawls plunged over from the 2 after a 38 yard drive. Martin added the point.

Hubbard got his second touchdown on a 2 yard plunge after a 56 yard drive but a pass for two points failed.

In the third period, Rawls scored on a 12-yard run and halfback David Mitchell ran the two points. The Tigers went to the air only to have Kenneth Brown intercept and run it back 39 yards to score. Martin added the point.

Hubbard scored in the last period on a 9 yard run with Martin kicking again. The final Mustangs mark came when David Mitchell ran 11 yards.

In Denver City's first punt situation near the end of the third quarter, the ball slithered through every would-be Tiger receiver and was pounced on by the surging Mustangs on the Slaton 35.

Tigers looked good in soots but never could sustain a drive long enough for paydirt. They excelled in the quick-kick department with Bruce Pember booting unexpectedly from the Slaton 37 to the Mustangs 25 in the first quarter and from the Slaton 34 to the Denver City 10 in the third stanza.

Pember also turned in the night's best defensive performance.

It was Slaton's last home game. They close out the season next Friday night at Friendship.

Letters to Editor

MR. KING

Last night's announcement that Secretary Freeman had reneged on today's Report and Review reception in Lubbock reminded me of the cold President Kennedy caught in Chicago just before the Cuban crisis. Recent disgraceful demonstrations in Atlanta, Dallas and Chicago might make us believe a Public Servant accepts a dare rather than an invitation to appear outside the Capitol and the United Nations. The so-called sale of surplus wheat to Communist countries for gold hasn't gone through yet. Two deals that went to countries Washington has ruled non-Communist seem not to have evoked much public interest; neither was for cash.

One, sale of \$98 million in wheat and flour to Brazil under the Food for Peace program, which was announced while our Agriculture Department was in Russia. This was to be payable in Brazilian cruzeiros which were to be retained in Brazil to be used in our AID program. The cruzeiro has declined on the New York market from 500 to the American dollar to 1,000 per dollar in recent months. Last April Congress granted Brazil \$398 million American dollars, reducing State Department's request for \$440 million and promising Brazil would oust the Communist-infiltrated government.

The other was the disappearance of between \$25 and \$60 million of wheat that had been bartered to Austria. Since we were not receiving cash for it, it was reported we would lose nothing. Four Austrian government officials are being prosecuted for this deal — no Americans, so far as we've heard. Department of Agriculture seems to have missed an awful good chance to look into it while they were over there.

Mr. Freeman was quoted in August as saying there was no food shortage in Russia, and that the Communist Collectives could produce a sufficient supply of wheat.

We have been told the sale of \$150 to \$250 million in wheat to Russia will "save" us about \$200 million storage costs. If that be true, we "saved" about as much in the Austrian and Brazilian bargains, but it hasn't been said yet they stopped the drain on our Gold Reserve.

November 2 at 12:45 p. m. a grass fire on N. 6th St. was reported but was under control when the fire truck arrived.

Total fires for the month of October stood at 6 with 5 being in the city limits and 1 outside of town. This brings the yearly total to 88 in town - 26 out of town. This, incidentally, is short of the number of fires at the same time last year.

Should you ever have to report a fire either at your house or someone else's, how would you go about it? These 3 easy steps might save property or even lives so please read and remember:

1. Always give your name when reporting the fire. Should the address be taken down incorrectly, it might be possible to call back and correct the error.
2. Give the Street name or number and as nearly as possible the house address. The fire truck drivers are sometimes hampered by the lakes in the east part of town. Don't go into detail as this time might be wasted time. As an example, "This is Careless Matches, I want to report a fire on Oklahoma St. three blocks north of Division." This automatically tells the resident fireman that he will have to go some other way rather than down Division St. because of the lake. (It's not the fences that bother Otis Baxley but sometimes the lake has water in it.)
3. Be prepared to repeat the street address and by all means keep calm. Fires have been reported in the past by well-meaning individuals who have given the wrong address. This mostly because of nerves.

Some Seasonal Fire Hazards and Prevention Tips

- * Never start an outdoor fire on a windy day.
- * Burn trash or leaves in a covered metal container or, better still, in an approved waste burner or incinerator.
- * Don't start a fire near a building or fence.
- * Connect your garden hose for an emergency.
- * Keep children away.
- * Stay with the fire until it is out and the ashes are cool enough to test with your hands.

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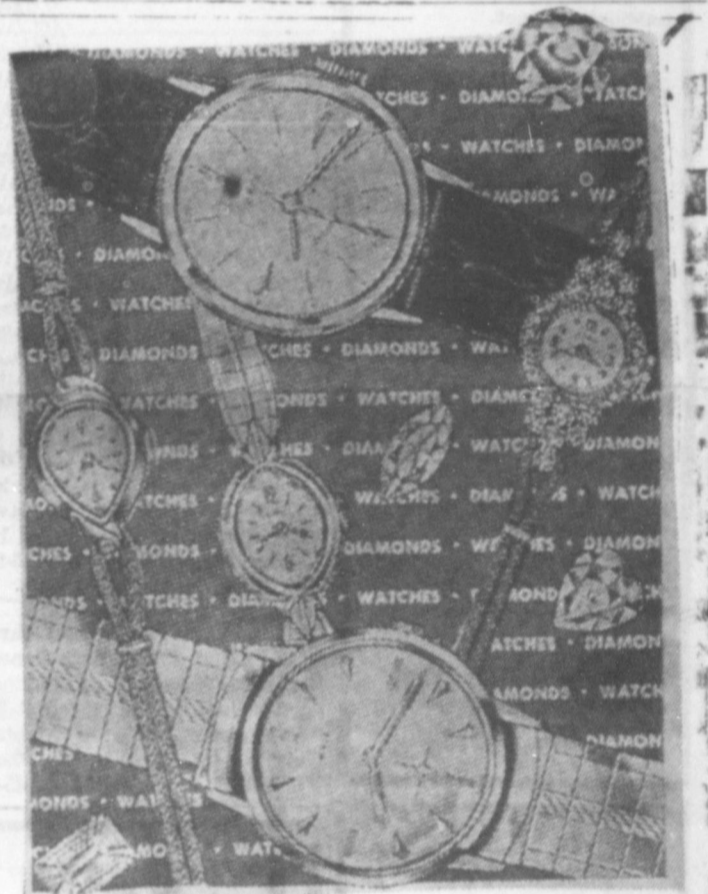

Far Should We Plan?

Part of the state we have seen growth at tremendous rate of speed, as has occurred in parts of the state and nation, since the end of World War II.

Here in Slaton, and in the entire area of the Plains, there virtually has not been any slowing down of the progress of the communities way of building, increase of commerce, or population growth.

At the present time, there doesn't seem to be reason to think that we will not continue to grow for the next several decades. If this is fact, we expect to meet the needs and provide services that will be necessary for this growth.

According to a national survey, it is a historical fact before new highway systems are completed there is already a need for a larger system. Also Taking Shots

Ten persons who live near the western edge of Menard County were taking anti-rabies shots this week after a small child was bitten by a dog which later was proved rabid.

Roger Brown, 1 1/2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Brown, who live on the Tidale ranch near Ft. McKavett, was bitten by a dog while visiting Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Kothmann and children on Gene Whithead's Rocking Chair Ranch.

The dog was killed and the head sent to the state laboratory, where tests showed it to be rabid.

Mr. and Mrs. Kothmann and their five children and Mrs. Ronny Bingham and baby, all of whom had been in contact with the dog, also were taking the anti-rabies shots.

A new outbreak of rabies evident in several counties adjacent to Menard County.

In Kimble County, the Commissioners Court was cooperating in a countywide program to stamp out rabies in wildlife.

Poisoned fresh meat was to be distributed this week to ranchers at nominal cost to use against skunks, foxes, raccoons and bobcats.

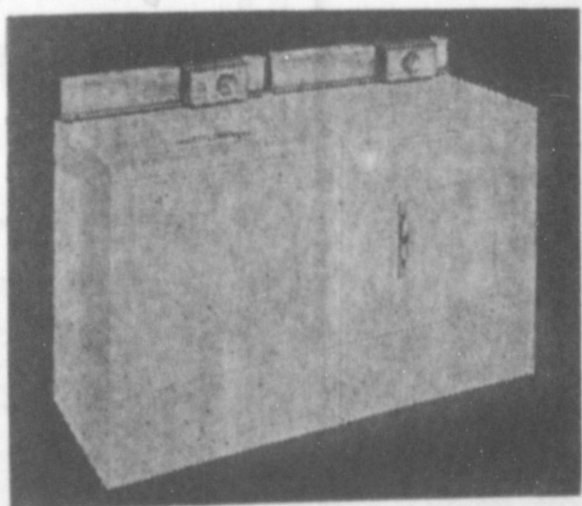

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

SLANT HOLE PENALTIES — An Austin jury fined four East Texas oil operators with \$304,800 in penalties in the first slant-hole oil suit tried before State Court jurors.

BANK TURNED DOWN — State Banking Board found "no public need" for proposed Merchants State Bank at Houston and Lone Star State Bank at Lone Star.

Jury found the four Gregg County oilmen operated a well which bottomed under a neighboring lease for 10 years.

OIL PRICE CUT PROBE—Reps. George Cook of Odessa and Maurice Duke of Wichita Falls have announced hearings by the House Interim Study Committee on oil and gas matters.

They scheduled a committee meeting with the Railroad Commission for Friday to get directions and guidelines for the crude price probe.

Hearings to be held soon in Wichita Falls and Abilene will concern North and West Texas cuts.

Representatives of companies which instigated cuts will be invited to testify, Cook said.

"I want the people of Texas to know that the members of the Texas legislature are not standing idly by while certain isolated companies are allowed to make a shambles of its most important industry," Cook said.

Duke said cuts, which have ranged from 10 to 48 cents per barrel, would cost the State half a million dollars in tax money and damage the State's economy to the unhappy tune of \$9,000,000 a year.

NEW LOOK IN NURSING — About 4,000 students in Texas are working to add "R. N." (Registered Nurse) to their names.

Miss Bernice V. Johnson, secretary-treasurer of the State Board of Nurse Examiners, says many are studying under the so-called "Plan Two" system, which allows a nurse hopeful to take 36 weeks of academic work in the college of her choice, before assuming the added duties of a hospital trainee.

Speakers list so far has been limited to the President, the Vice President and Gov. John Connally.

To assure a capacity crowd local party officials are being called on to help. Quotas are being assigned to districts over the state. Funds raised are to be divided between the National and State Democratic organizations.

Most of Texas' 21 congressmen are expected to attend the dinner and all members of the Legislature will be invited.

THE COURT SPEAK — Texas' new small loan control law successfully weathered its first court test. Supreme Court denied three loan firms permission to attack constitutionality of a section requiring at least 51 per cent of a company stock be owned by Texans.

Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell had refused them State licenses because of that restriction.

High court also set for November 20 a "gentlemen's agreement" action to test eligibility of special 93rd District Judge J. H. Starley of Pecos to preside over the trial of a complex law suit which will litigate Rio Grande Water rights below Falcon Dam. Action is of vast importance to the economy of Starr, Hidalgo, Cameron and Willacy counties.

Attorneys for Billie Sol Estes told the Court of Criminal Appeals too much newspaper and TV publicity kept him from getting a fair trial on swindling charges at Tyler last November. They ask a reversal of the eight-year sentence.

UPHOLDS FARMER'S RIGHT — State Supreme Court upheld the right of a San Patricio County farmer, Walter Leber, to stop the flow of water through a drainage ditch on his land with a caliche block.

Leber's neighbors secured a district court injunction ordering him to remove the block and forbidding him from doing anything to stop the "natural flow" of water through the ditch. But the Supreme Court held that the waters reached his ditch through man-made routes, and said he was entitled to "self-help" to prevent damage to his land.

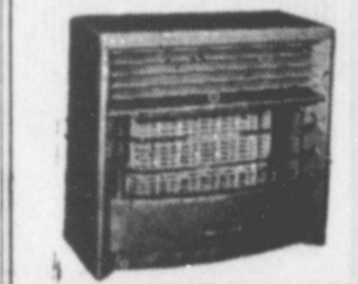
