School Board Airs Tax Issue With Farm Group

A farmer group was scheduled to meet with Slaton School Board Wednesday night to discuss the recent tax appraisal and revaluation program.

The committee formed to study the revaluation program, after many farm owners were dissatisfied with the appraisals which were placed on some land. They had requested the meeting with school trustees.

Nester Kitten is serving as chairman of the group. Other members include Bill Alspaugh, Carter Caldwell, Walter Heinrich, J. S. Edwards, Marion Benton, S. G. Wilson and Victor Burkemper.

The school district last week invited farm owners to meet with school officials and tax appraisers and discuss the formula for valuating irrigated land.

No formal action has been announced in connection with the sessions, but the matter may have come up in the Wednesday night meeting.

The new appraisal and revaluation program was a joint venture by the school district and the City of Slaton. The program became controversial to many taxpayers when they received notices on the new valuations for assessment.

The school board last week authorized the issuance of two news releases which spelled out the financial needs of the school district, and listed factors leading to the rising operational costs.

The equalization board hearings, originally scheduled July 8-10, were postponed and now have been called for Aug. 7-7. The joint board will discuss only city property on Aug. 5-6.

School equalization board members will discuss only farm property (outside the city limits) on Aug. 7.

Positions are still to be filled on the equalization board. The city appointed Ford Stansell and still needs two members. The school appointed Joe Walker Jr., Bentley Page and Elbert Wilson. Three men had resigned from the joint board before hearings began.

MORE RAIN SOAKS AREA

Slaton and area residents -- already soaked by abnormal amounts of rain -- were not too surprised when showers roamed the region again last weekend.

Slaton measured about 1.5 inches of rain in showers Thursday through Saturday, with almost an inch occurring Thursday. Unofficial readings had some .40 of an inch Friday.

Commission Buys New Shredder

The Slaton City Commission voted to buy a shredder for the weeds that have grown as a result of the rains Slaton has been experiencing lately.

George A. Thomas, 37, was hired as a new patrolman for the Slaton Police Department replacing Ray Bagby, who recently accepted a position with the department in Cleburne.

New membership on the equalization board was discussed by the commission. There are still two places open on the board, which will meet August 5-7.

Commissioner's reports completed the meeting.

Uranium Leases Filed at Post

Interest in Garza County's uranium future took another big jump last week with the filing in the courthouse at Post of six mining leases by the Kerr-McGee Corporation.

About 3,718 acres were included in the leases, according to a report from The Post Dispatch.

The new group of leases in the extreme northwest corner of Garza County is just east of some 12,000 to 15,000 acres which the corporation leased in the Gorkan - Southland area in the spring of 1967.

Since that time, there were reports the company sought other mining leases into eastern Lubbock County and to have made lease offers in at least one other Garza County area.

The six leases were the first to be put on record in Garza County by the Oklahoma firm, one of the recognized leaders in the uranium mining industry.

An official of the company was quoted last spring as saying it might take several years to determine whether to undertake a mining project in this area.

Mayor Clarifies Weed Situation

In response to a report that several city residents were wanting the City of Slaton to do something about weeds in the community, Mayor Jonas Cain said Wednesday the city was "moving as fast as possible" to control the problem.

The mayor reported that the city has three mowers at work on cutting weeds on streets, alleys and City property. He pointed out that the City cannot mow weeds on private property without a request from the property owner. The city charges a small fee for cutting the weeds.

Cain further added that the City has a policy of not loaning equipment for private use. He added that the rain had slowed the city crews in getting to weeds in some areas.

By city ordinance, the City can cut weeds on private property if it is deemed necessary for "public health and welfare." Under this situation, the property owner is billed for the mowing fee and a lien placed against the property if he refuses to pay.

Train Ride Thing of Past... 'Old 76' Ends Colorful Era

After 57 years of passenger service ended in the departure of the last passenger train Saturday morning, the final chapter was not without the gay festivities which welcomed Santa Fe passenger train No. 76, headed for Slaton on June 15, 1911.

It was a typical summer day, hot and dry. People came by horses and buggy, by team and wagon, by train and on foot. A special train was run from Amarillo. This was the first passenger train to come into Slaton. J. F. Utter of Amarillo was conductor.

"Many of the people had brought their own lunches and, except for the few who improvised shade by means of wagon sheets and tarpulins, they ate in the hot sun or under the sparse shade of the mesquite trees. Others took their meal in the cafe, for which the railroad had provided a boxcar set off the right-of-way near the present station.

Police Remind Of Dog Rules

Slaton Police Chief Walter Head issued a reminder to citizens this week concerning the city's dog ordinance.

The ordinance requires that all dogs have city tags showing a current rabies vaccination, and that the animals be fenced or on a leash.

A city employee was bitten by a dog recently and, as required by law, the animal was impounded in order to be kept under observation.

I am sick of seeing law enforcement agencies and the laws of this nation emasculated by a supreme court and administrators who make their personal creeds the law of the land. . . . I am sick of dirty, unwashed, foul mouthed whether you call them hippies, beatniks, or pseudo poor people. . . .

I am sick of not being able to take my family to a movie because it is loaded with extraneous offensive matter whose only purpose is to shock. . . . I am sick of seeing the same phrases in the popular literature of the day that I see scrawled on the walls of public toilets. . . .

Sweetwater finished second last year with a 7-3 record and returns 8 offensive and 5 defensive veterans. The Mustangs were picked first due largely to the return of field general Aubrey McCain (6-2, 185), who guided the Hoosies to six wins in a row after moving in as quarterback last season.

Lamesa and Brownfield, the article reads, were both rebuilding last year. The Tornados return 9 offensive and 6 defensive starters from a 2-8 won-lost team last season. Tackle Pat Benton (220) is one of the standouts. Brownfield has 8 offensive and 5 defensive starters after a 4-6 record last season and calls linebacker Gary Baccus (6-4, 190) "one of the finest in the area."

Colorado City, moving back into Class AAA ranks, will rely heavily on AA all-state halfback Dan Steakley (170), who racked up 1,420 yards on 238 carries and played defensive safety last year. The Wolves return 7 offensive and 4 defensive starters.

Snyder, too, has a fine back-field combination among its 4 offensive and 5 defensive starters. The magazine predicts the interior line could be the key to the Snyder success this year.

The picture for Estacado is "cloudy," says the article, despite 22 lettermen -- 10 offensive and 10 defensive regulars. The Lubbock school posted a 9-1 record a year ago, but played an informal schedule. The play is for keeps this year, and the competition is rugged.

Lubbock Dunbar is termed to have more size but not experience. The defending champs have 14 lettermen, including two 2-way starters. All-state guard A. G. Perryman (6-0, 205) returns.

Slaton leaves District 4-AA, where Denver City is again the pick for the championship with only 4 offensive and 4 defensive returnees. Newcomer Tahoka is picked second, followed by Morton, Idalou, Post and Freshport.

Roosevelt is picked for runner-up honors in District 4-A, where Ralls is tabbed as No. 1. Petersburg, New Deal, Crosbyton and Lorenzo are ranked below Roosevelt.

SHS Will Offer Part-Time Voc Ag Training

The vocational agriculture department of Slaton High School will be one of approximately 40 vocational agriculture departments in Texas that are redistricting or initiating new units in Cooperative Part-time training in vocational agriculture during the 1968-69 school year. This will bring the total to approximately 150 ag departments in Texas offering this type of training which will be in its fourth year of operation.

The high school program of vocational agriculture education is designed to meet the needs of youth who plan to enter farming, ranching, or other agricultural occupations. The cooperative part-time training courses provide instructions for high school students who have an interest in and a vocational need for becoming established in an off-farm agricultural occupation. It is also designed to provide technical instruction, on-the-job training and work experience for high school vocational ag students preparing to enter employment in agricultural occupations.

Students spend one hour in class each school day to receive instruction in the occupations for which they are training and three consecutive hours each school day at training stations in order to learn the occupations. Training stations are agricultural businesses in the community that are cooperating with the local school in training students by providing work experience necessary to become competent employees.

Paul Johnson, vocational agriculture teacher in Slaton High School, will conduct this phase of the program and he recently attended a work-shop in Austin conducted by the Texas Education Agency under direction of George Hurt, Director of Agricultural Education, Texas Education Agency. The purpose of the workshop is to provide the vocational ag teacher with training in organizing and conducting the cooperative part-time program in off-farm agricultural occupations.

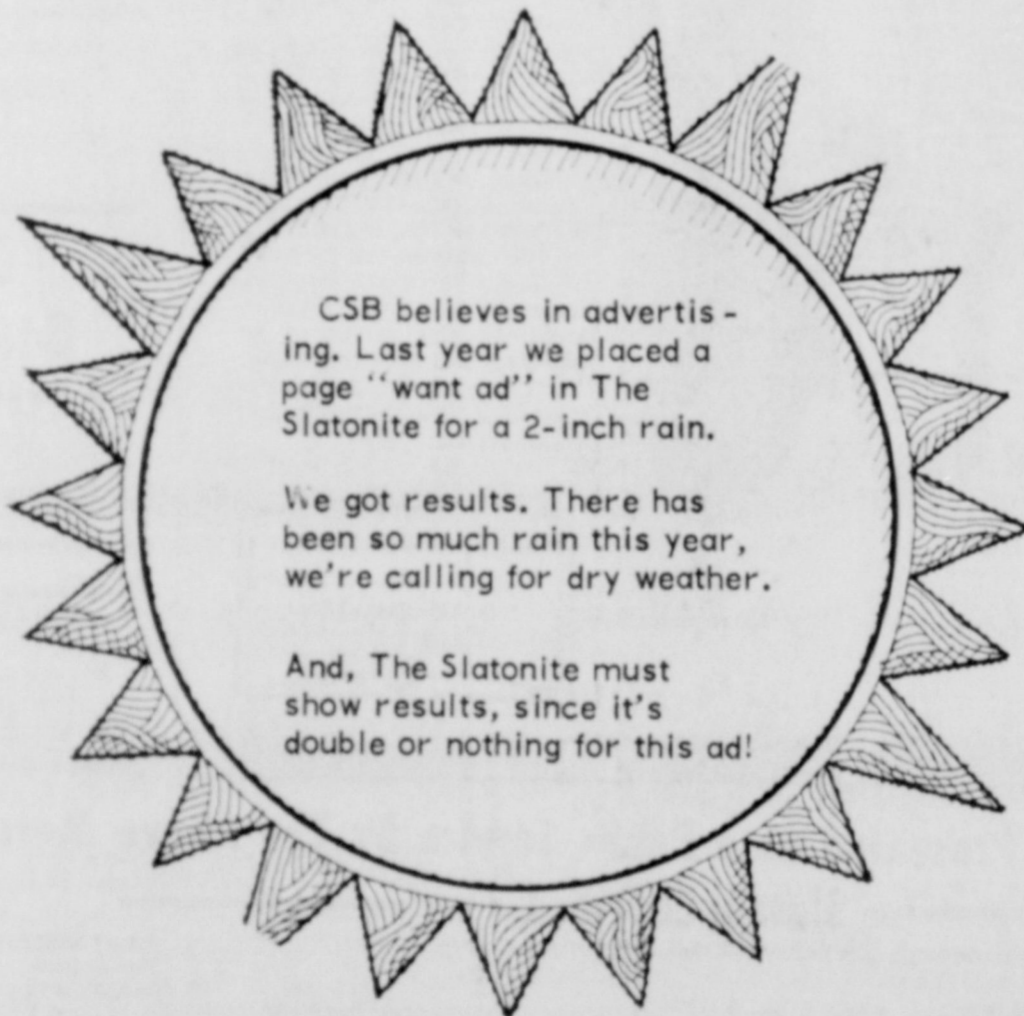
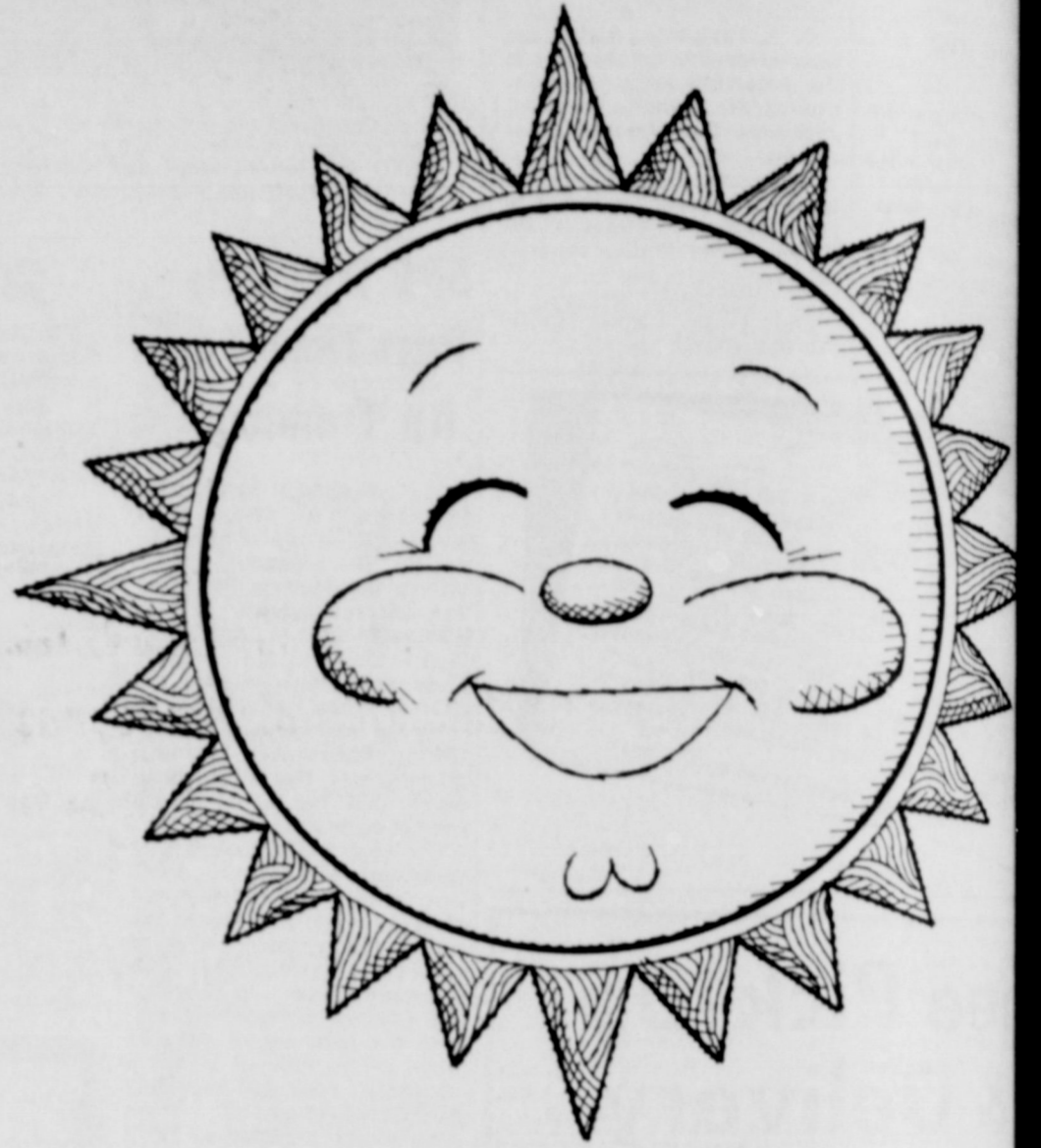

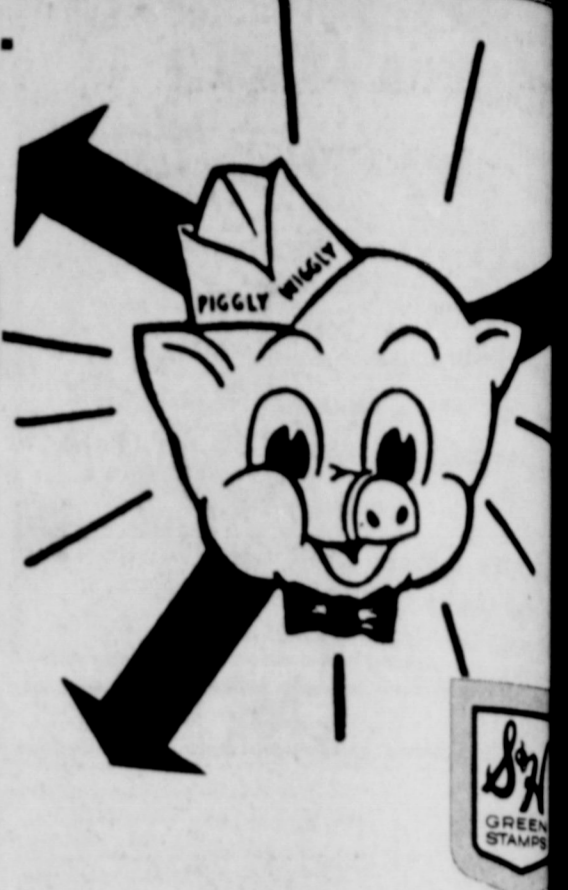
