City Takes Aim On Delinquent Taxes

Slaton City Commission met in regular session Monday night at the Municipal Building, taking care of routine business and discussing a course of action of collecting delinquent taxes.

The commission also discussed the possibility of condemning some uninhabitable buildings, but will first seek to get permission from property owners to destroy or remove the dwellings. A list of almost 100 houses or buildings has been prepared for study.

In routine action, the commission approved payment of June bills, approved an inter-department transfer of \$10,000 from the water and sewer fund to the general fund, and heard commissioners' reports. Commissioners noted that delinquent taxes totalled approximately \$45,000 and discussed action to take to secure some of the much-needed revenues. It was decided to send letters to the delinquent taxpayers, warning that the bill would be turned over to a collection attorney if not paid.

Mayor David Hughes presented a list of uninhabited dwellings around town—a list that he requested the police to compile while making their rounds. He recommended the commission

take some action to remove as many as possible during a clean-up campaign planned in the community during August. It was pointed out that many of the dwellings have been vacant for years and it will be

difficult to contact some of the property owners. The commission authorized the city secretary to contact all property owners possible, seeking vol-

DUFF'S SALARY HIKED

School Board In 'Closed' Session

In an unannounced, special meeting last Thursday night, Slaton School Board approved a salary increase for tax assessor-collector Buford Duff and awarded a typewriter contract to a Lubbock firm.

Duff's salary was increased from \$625 to \$700 a month, according to minutes of the meeting. One of the school trustees said the pay raise was recommended by retiring Supt. P. L. Vardy.

The press was not notified of the meeting, however members of the board said there was no intent of having a "closed-door session."

No official action was actually taken Thursday night on the typewriter contract, since a motion had previously been made to accept the bid and this motion was left on the books. The bid was held up after The Slatonite requested an opportunity to bid on the machines. No bid invitation had been extended the local firm.

Minutes of the meeting showed the bid totals as being \$3,707 for Lubbock Office Suppliers, and \$3,720 for The Slatonite—a difference of \$13. Total bid was for a three-year contract which called for replacing standard and electric type-writers with one-year-old models each year.

Although the board minutes reflected no discussion, trustees reported that they made their decision on recommendations presented by Vardy and Duff. It was reported that both typing teachers—Mrs. M. W. Kerr and Mrs. Buford Duff, preferred the brand of typewriter offered by the Lubbock firm.

New superintendent J. C. McClesky was not present for the meeting. A trustee said the meeting was called to "wrap up some loose ends" before the arrival of the new school chief. Attending were Ted Swanner, R. C. Hall Jr., Tommy Davis, Jack Clark and Betty Burks, and Dr. Vardy and Duff.

Airport Land Usage Is Clarified by FAA Rule

Due to Federal regulations, land at Slaton Municipal Airport can be sold only for airport-related businesses or industries, it was announced this week by a Federal Aviation Agency official.

Slaton had requested a hearing on the ruling, and an FAA official, Bill J. Howard of Albuquerque, chief of airports branch, met with officials here Tuesday afternoon.

Earl Eblen, chairman of the Slaton Airport Board, told the official that local authorities had not been informed about the "airport-related" clause in the city's 20-year contract with the FAA.

Bill Smith, chairman of Slaton Industrial & Development Foundation, also attended the Tuesday session and said the industrial group had been seeking prospective firms without regard to the "airport-related" factor. The matter came out, in fact, when the City of Slaton was preparing to sell some land for industrial development.

Howard said it was unfortunate that the misunderstanding occurred, but added

that the property "must be restricted for orderly and proper growth." He claimed officials would be happy about the restrictions in future years.

Howard also commended the city for its beautiful airport, saying it was well-planned, well located and the closeness to Lubbock would make it an important facility in the near future.

The airport operators have considered building a restaur-

ant at the municipal airport, and this would fall under the airport-related clause, it was reported.

Attending the Tuesday hearing with the FAA official were Eblen, Smith, Mayor David Hughes, former mayor Jonas Cain, C of C manager Ted Weaver, and Tommy Wallace, Eblen and Wallace are on the City Airport Board, along with Ted Swanner.

Forecasters at the Weather Bureau in Lubbock confirmed that this summer is the hottest on record, and the end not in sight.

Temperature readings at the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. office here the past week revealed a low of 74 last Thursday and Friday and a high of 109 on Sat-

urday. The highs the past week ranged from 104 to 109 degrees.

All of the state was feeling the heat wave, and water consumption and air conditioners were helping set records in many utility departments.

The heat wave left citizens seeking ways to escape the hot temperatures, and farm-area residents hoping for moisture for parched crops.

Weather forecasters offered no immediate hopes for relief, however.


Bingo Party At Rest Home

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

OPEN MEETINGS ARE FOR YOU

by design or not, Slaton School "closed-door meeting" Thursday night was not a secret. The trustees reported they were not informed of the meeting.

Publicly, meetings of the school board are held in our city have always been open to the public--which really means the press, since most citizens do not have the time or money to report the proceedings.

Trustees have held unannounced meetings before, but it would be misleading to say this was always the case, since we feel sure that the press was supposed to notify the public of such meetings.

to hide or wanting to manage the news. They could do this by meeting behind closed doors and reporting only what they wanted people to know.

In the recent 61st Legislature, a bill was enacted to close the loopholes whereby many state and local governing bodies held meetings behind closed doors, barring the press and public.

The new law goes into effect soon and will require that governing and taxing bodies must give three days notice of meetings where actions are taken involving the public interest. The principal exceptions to this are meetings in which the hiring or firing of personnel is to be discussed, or where purchase of real estate is involved.

The press is YOUR representative at the sessions of local governing bodies, and we think the public has a right to know. At the same time, we realize that the Open Meetings law puts a responsibility on the press to attend all these sessions possible, and to report them fairly and objectively.

Texas Highway Patrol Report

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 37 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of June, according to Sergeant O. C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed, 15 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$38,686.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1969 shows a total of 203 accidents resulting in four persons killed, 110 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$201,952.00.

During the first six months of 1969 in Texas there were 1,470 traffic deaths, or two less as compared to the 1,472 traffic deaths for the same period of 1968. However, if past trends continue the last six months will probably far exceed the first six months; as a matter of fact, the last six months of 1968 there were 2,609 traffic deaths.

The Sergeant stated, "With an all time record of 49 traffic deaths over the 4th of July weekend, we are not only well ahead in comparison to the beginning of the second six months in 1968, but well on our way to establishing a record year in 1969."




