OVER THREE THOUSAND GREETED SANTA FE COW, SOW AND HEN TRAIN. DAIRY CALF CLUB ORGANIZED HERE

The Santa Fe Cow, Sow and Hen Special train arrived in Sla-ton at 4 o'clock last Friday afterton at 4 o'clock last Friday after-noon, and was greeted by an im-mense throng at the station. It was reported by those keeping tab at the end of the train that 3,110 people went through and in-spected the exhibits. Hundreds of others went away without vis-iting the exhibits on account of iting the exhibits on account of the large crowd present, and the lateness of the hour.

The train spent the night in Slaton going out on the Lamesa branch Saturday, returning here late in the afternoon.

Friday evening cars were fur-nished by local people and the entire party was given a trip over the city and expressed surprise at the growth of the town from a strag gling village into ropolitan city in the short space of eleven years.

J. D. Tinsley, argicultural agent of the Santa Fe Railway, opened the meeting here by stating that the farmer who kept a few cows, some hogs, and a bunch of chickens passed through the depression in better

shape than the one crop farmer.

"The Santa Fe Railway," said Mr.
Tinsley, "is a part of your community
and vitally interested in the welfare
of the community. We know the
splendid work that the Texas A. and
M. College is doing to make the farms
more productive. The Santa Fe is more productive. The Santa Fe is glad therefore to bring the College to the farmer's door because the College is able to tell you ohw to in-crease your production through bet-ter live stock and diversified farm-

Geo. P. Grout, head of the Dairy Department of the College, urged the importance of increasing the production of milk and butter and said this may be surely and quickly accomplished by the use of good dairy sires in the farm herd.

A. L. Ward, swine husbandman of the Extension Service of the College,

stressed the importance of the use of big type hogs which can be ready for market in six months. He said the grain could best go to market in the form of hog meat. It would bring a better price and also save time. Ten cars of grain could be moved to market in one car in the form of hog

cars of grain could be moved to market in one car in the form of hogs, saving time and a big freight bill.

Ross M. Sherwood, poultry husbandman of the College Experiment Station, said that good birds, well fed and cared for, were reliable money makers on the farm. Mr. Sherwood emphasized like the previous speakers in the importance of better breeding stock in bringing the farm flocks ing stock in bringing the farm flocks to a point of higher production.



Weather Bulletin

Washington, March 28 .- The imseasonal crop changes from winter to summer are changes from winter to summer are not regular; Bigelow gave them for April 20. For this year the principal storms of the month come during the week centering on April 7 and I expect the crop weather change to begin to take effect as those storms clear away. Last twelve days of the month will average more quiet than usual. No suck crop season has occurred No suck crop season has occurred within twenty years as that just ahead, but a little further back I have records of a number that were similar. Of recent months the Atlantic states have been hogging most of the moisture. That was because the moisture came from the Caribbean sea south of the Atlantic States. The old belief was that one extreme follows another; but it does not always work that way. I am sure that North America will not produce as much grain in 1923 as it did in 1922 and that one very important crop will fall very far short. Many well informed business men believe Europe is bank-rupt. But that will not hurt North Some people have plenty of money, and millions of them are coming to this continent.

The manner of holding said elec-ion shall be governed by the gen-ral laws of the state regulating gen-ral elections, except as otherwise provided by the statutes, above refer-sal to. d to.

There shall be an official ballot sed at said election, and all voters shall write or print on their ballots he names of the candidates voted for

A copy of this shall be sufficient notice in said election, and thirty iays notice of the time and place of holding said election shall be given by posting up three written or print-ad notices of the same at three public placs in said city and by publishing such notice in a newspaper of general circulation published for at least one

year previous to the date of this order in the City of Slaton, Texas.
