The May 30th date is one of the five holidays approved by Slaton Retail Merchants Association, and most firms and offices are expected to observe the holiday.

The five holidays which were voted by the retail merchants are New Year's Day, Memorial Day, July 4th, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

### Schools Ready For Head Start Program Again

The Head Start program will be conducted in Slaton Schools again this summer, starting Monday, June 2, it was announced this week by Supt. P. L. Vardy.

The eight-week program is designed to help prepare beginning students, who are from families with limited incomes, for entrance into the public schools.

All children who are eligible to start school in grade one in September, 1969, and meet the financial limitation of income as imposed by the Office of Economic Opportunity are eligible to attend.

These children will be given dental and medical care. Each student will be fed at noon of each day, as well as receiving a snack in the morning. All expenses are paid by the Federal government and all supplies are furnished free.

This is the fifth year for the Head Start operation, and officials say the program has proven beneficial to children eligible to attend. The progress of the students in the regular school term is accelerated by the training received in Head Start.

The program is to be conducted in the Slaton Junior High building this year. It will start at 9 a.m. each day and sessions will end at 1:30 p.m. each day.

### Wilson Man Is Hurt in Crash

A truck-pickup collision about 4 1/2 miles southeast of Slaton resulted in injuries to Billy Fred Weaver, Rt. 2, Wilson, about 11 a.m. Wednesday.

Police reported the pickup Weaver was driving rammed into the back of a City of Post truck driven by Bob Harper. The Post vehicle was hauling cold asphalt. Weaver, who was pinned in his vehicle for a short time, was taken to Mercy Hospital. The pickup was estimated to be a total loss, but there was only slight damage reported to the truck.

Police also reported two minor accidents in the city the past week, made 14 jail arrests on various charges, and issued 25 traffic tickets.

An accident Monday at 9:45 a.m. involved vehicles driven by Joe S. Walker Jr. and Beverly S. Klud. The mishap occurred at the intersection of FM-400 and the US-84 access road. Total damage was estimated at about \$600.

In a minor accident Sunday at 2:38 p.m., vehicles driven by Bobba J. Eddings and A. W. Weir collided on FM-400.

### Thornton To Be Veterans Day Speaker Here

Dan Thornton, former governor of Colorado, will return "home" as principal speaker of the second annual Veterans Day observance in Slaton Nov. 11.

Thornton was invited to be guest speaker by Slaton Chamber of Commerce, and last week notified Chamber manager Ted Weaver that he would accept the invitation.

Thornton calls Slaton his home town, having attended school here and elementary school at Posey. His parents resided in Slaton until their deaths.

The city held a "community-wide" observance on Veterans Day last year with former Atty. General Waggoner Carr as the guest of honor. The Chamber, along with the American Legion and VFW, hope to have another big patriotic day observance this year.

In his letter of acceptance, Thornton said he was "honored and pleased that my home town of Slaton has invited Mrs. Thornton and me to be there for the 'patriotic' day observance. The former governor added: "Slaton has a particular interest for me...many friends and memories. Slaton was most instrumental in giving me a good start in life. My attendance at Slaton and the help I got from people were the finest things that ever happened to me."

Slaton City Commission, in a lengthy session Tuesday night, approved purchase of a \$18,990 maintainer; appointed Dr. S.H. Jaynes as city health officer; set a tentative price for industrial acreage at Slaton Airport; scheduled a meeting with the Cemetery Board to discuss two issues; discussed emergency ambulance service; heard a report from the mayor on spraying of mosquitos and garbage disposal, and discussed appointment of various city boards.

The commission reviewed eight bids on the maintainer--with prices ranging from \$15,846 up to \$22,600. On the basis of specifications and the machine best suited to the needs of the city, the contract went to Plains Machinery for a 120 h.p. maintainer at \$18,990.

Bill Smith, president of Slaton Industrial & Development Foundation, and Carroll McDonald, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce industrial development committee, appeared at the session to discuss the price of lots on industrial tracts at Slaton Municipal Airport.

McDonald explained that an industrial prospect had been found who was interested in about a five-acre tract. He and Smith expressed belief that it would be to the best interests of the city to price the acreage at a reasonable amount in order to promote development of the area. After discussion, the commission set a price of \$600 per acre on the land.

S. Q. Heary, local monument dealer, appeared at the meeting to request another day a week to set monuments in the city.

### Swimming Pool Opens Tuesday

Slaton Swimming Pool opened Tuesday with a good "first-day" crowd, with swimmers enjoying the newly remodeled features at the city pool.

The pool will be open from 1 to 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and 1 to 6 p.m. on Sundays. Admission is 50 cents for age 12 and above, 35 cents for age 11 and below.

Noel Dickson is operator of the pool this summer, and he also offers swimming lessons in the mornings. The city-owned pool is managed under the Parks & Recreation committee of Slaton Chamber of Commerce.

## Lions Boost Two District Candidates

Slaton Lions are expected to give strong support to two candidates at the District 2T2 Lions convention in Levelland this weekend, and the club itself is among the contenders again this year for the coveted "Outstanding Club" of the district.

The two candidates are sweetheart Johnnie Sue Mosser, who will be entered in the queens' contest, and M.H. "Hack" Lasater, a candidate for state director of the Lions Crippled Childrens Camp.

Club president Cecil Griffin reports about a dozen of the local members are planning to attend all or parts of the Friday and Saturday convention. A golf tournament, business session and queens' contest are scheduled Friday, and business meetings and elections come up Saturday.

The South Plains College campus will be the site of most of the activities, including the queens' contest at 7:30 p.m. Friday. It will be open to the public. The queen, however, will not be crowned until the governor's banquet Saturday night. Slaton won the "top club" award in 1967 and was runner-up last year.

Lasater, "dean" of the Slaton club, has been nominated for the state office after holding every position on the district level except that of district governor. He has held all local offices, some more than once,

The Commission decided to meet with the City Cemetery Board to discuss the matter, along with an issue concerning curbing assessment for the Grady Wilson family.

Dr. Jaynes was appointed as city health officer to succeed Dr. M. J. McSwain. Local doctors "take turns" in serving in the city post.

Mayor David Hughes reported that an agreement has been confirmed with Lubbock County on complying with the new garbage disposal law. He said County Commissioner Max Arants confirm a policy of the county providing a man and equipment for the required sanitary landfill disposal, and the city would provide the site.

Hughes also reported that he had requested and was working with the county on a plan to have an aerial spray for mosquitos. The city has received numerous complaints on the mosquito problem in the past two weeks. The county units have sprayed the city at least twice in the past week, using a "fogging" machine on the back of a truck.

Bennett Reeves, the city's consulting engineer, met with the commission Tuesday night to outline the longrange program which the city has been studying, and to explain problem areas in city service. These included water and sewer lines and drainage problems. It was primarily a "briefing" session for the new commissioners.

Joe Cardenas, water superintendent, announced that Slaton will host the area Water Works meeting here in June. Site of the meeting is passed around to participating cities.

Discussion of a "Youth Council" suggestion submitted to the commission was tabled due to the long agenda. It is expected to be discussed at a future meeting.

Byron Henderson, Lubbock Aid ambulance service of Lubbock, appeared at the meeting on request of the mayor to discuss types of emergency ambulance service available to a city. He was asked to come back with figures on the cost of this type service.

Commissioners Floyd Guelker and Rudy Dominguez were absent at the Tuesday session, which was changed from Monday night due to the high school commencement exercise.

# Cathy Riney To Compete In State 4-H Roundup At A & M

Cathy Riney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Riney, will compete in the State 4-H Roundup at Texas A & M University next week, June 3-4. She is sponsored by Piggly Wiggly. She placed second in the senior division of Clothing Education Activity in the district contest held at Lubbock May 3. To qualify for the state competition, a team or individual must win either first or second place in the senior division which is for 14-year-olds and older.

Fourteen-year-old Cathy will demonstrate how she can have eight different dresses out of red, white and blue ensemble she has made.

A member of the Slaton Community 4-H Club, Cathy designed the dress of dacron polyester and the coat of rayon so that the suit is washable. In the contest she must demonstrate the use of jewelry, a detachable collar and a scarf tied three different ways. She can also wear the simple A-line navy dress or the red and

navy striped coat alone or together.

Cathy has served as a junior leader in 4-H and has helped to teach modeling. She has won local and county dress revues and leadership contests. She won three years in the county foods and nutrition contests. She has served as vice president of her club and is an officer in the county council.

"This coat and suit is the largest sewing project I have done," says Cathy. "I wanted to do it because I am still growing and I can save money by having several dresses in a few pieces. I enjoy sewing and feel that I gain self poise by making my own clothes."

Cathy graduated from Slaton Junior High School Tuesday night as an honor student. She served as head cheer leader this year and played the French horn in the SHS Tiger band. She played basketball on the eighth grade team which was district champion. She also ran track.

"I enjoy all sports and am

learning to play tennis and water skiing," said Cathy. "My parents and I attend all the school sports together".

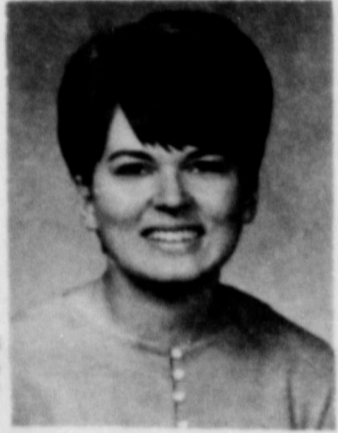

Her teachers never suspected it because she is a good student, but Jaime Foerster has a hearing loss in her left ear. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Foerster, said she was probably born with it, but they didn't realize it until she couldn't hear over the telephone. They discovered it when she was six years old, she is now eight.

"It never really seemed to bother her, she had adjusted so well, but now that Jaime has a hearing aid, she is hearing things she never was able to hear before," her mother said. For instance, after the tires of the car hitting the mud and water and she said she had never heard that sound before. Jaime visited the Luxury Living Show held in Lubbock recently. She and her parents were especially interested in the Sonotone of Lubbock display, knowing as they did that Jaime had a hearing loss. They, along with many others, dropped a card into a box from which the name of the winner of a free Sonotone hearing aid would be drawn.

Jaime's name was drawn from the box and a few days later Jaime and her mother were at the Sonotone Clinic where audiometer tests were made and an impression taken

rectible with a hearing aid. Even though Jaime had had her aid a scant half-hour, her excitement had translated itself to Mrs. Foerster, who looked forward to a whole new sonic environment for her daughter. Jaime's hearing aid is tiny, so inconspicuous as to be almost

invisible, and weighs less than one-fifth of an ounce. Mrs. Foerster said it is valued at \$369.00.

When Jaime's brothers put the hearing aid on to see how it worked, they couldn't stand the loud noises, but to Jaime it is "just right".

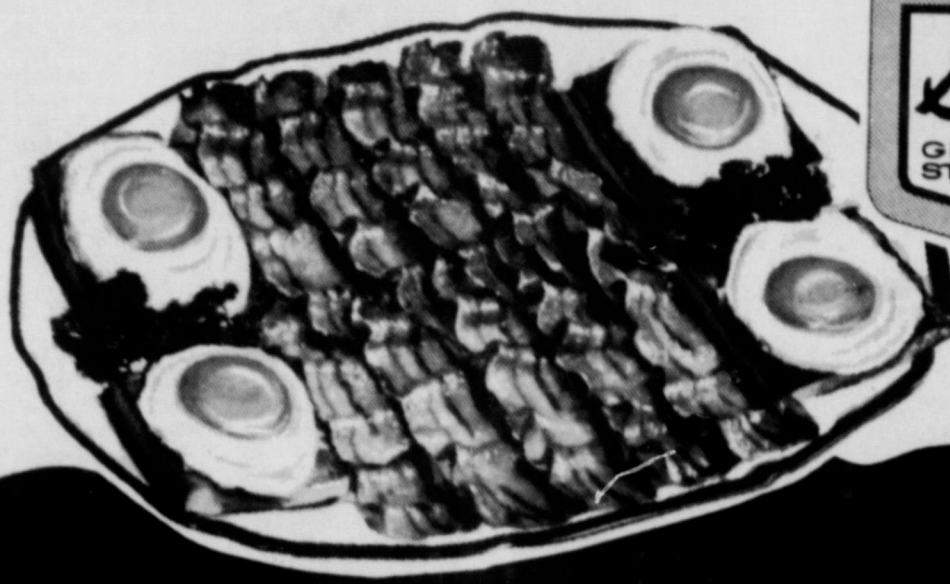

### Tax Man Sam Sez

One of the popular questions at Internal Revenue Service this year has been "Who must file an estimate?" The tax instructions spell out the rules quite clearly.

If you don't have tax withheld from your salary you are usually liable for filing an estimate, since this is the way Congress set up the pay-as-you-go system for you. If your withholding is not enough to pay all the tax you owe then you may need to file an estimate. If you are not going to owe more than \$40, you don't have to file an estimate in any case.

Since a large part of our Nation's taxpayers do have a salary or wages and do pay withholding, they simply drop exemptions by changing their Form W-4, or request their employer to withhold additional amounts to assure that they have paid enough through withholding to cover their tax bill for the year.

### Drunks Sock It To Sober Drivers

AUSTIN -- Drunk drivers may be taking the lives of more safe and sober Texans than many folks realize, the Texas Safety Association reported today, noting that several recent studies reported by the U. S. Department of Transportation indicate that most drivers killed in accidents caused by drinking drivers have not been drinking at all.

One two-year California study shows that 80 percent of the drivers killed by drunk drivers had no alcohol content in their blood. Another research report shows that the drinking driver runs into others four times as often as he is run into. The proportion of "rammers" among the drinking drivers was significantly greater than the proportion among the non-drinking drivers.

Researchers also conclude that the higher a driver's blood alcohol concentration, the greater the likelihood he has initiated a crash in which he is involved. The contribution of a driver with an alcohol content of .15 has been rated by one Canadian researcher as 42 times that of a non-drinking driver.

The Texas Safety Association, which has endorsed proposed legislation designed to remove drunken drivers from the streets and highways of the state, emphasized that there is no reason to believe that the Lone Star State's drunk drivers have more control behind the wheel than the drunk drivers of the other states and Canada.

TSA called Senate Bill 74, which would require breath tests for violators suspected of drunk driving, a first step toward saving some 500 lives a year in Texas.

The hours are from 2-4:30 p.m. and 7-8:30 p.m. Hospitals in Lubbock County include Highland, Methodist, St. Mary of the Plains, University, West Texas, Mercy in Slaton, Lubbock Osteopathic and Porter Clinic-Hospital.

Other visitor procedures remained the same as in the past. These include: visitors under 14 are restricted from any patient floor at any time, visiting hours in obstetrics limited to 3-4 p.m. and from 7-8:30 p.m. and visitation in the intensive care units limited to 10 minutes every four hours on an around-the-clock basis, restricted to members of the immediate family only.

Also visiting hours in the psychiatric care unit are from 2-3 p.m. and 7-8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and from noon to 5 p.m. on Sunday, immediate family only.

In the interest of the patient, officials emphasized that only two visitors may be with the patient at any one time during visiting hours and added that a visit of no more than 15 minutes would be more pleasant for both the patient and his visitor.

Observance of these procedures will enable patients to receive uninterrupted care, and at the same time those who desire to visit patients have an adequate schedule to do so. 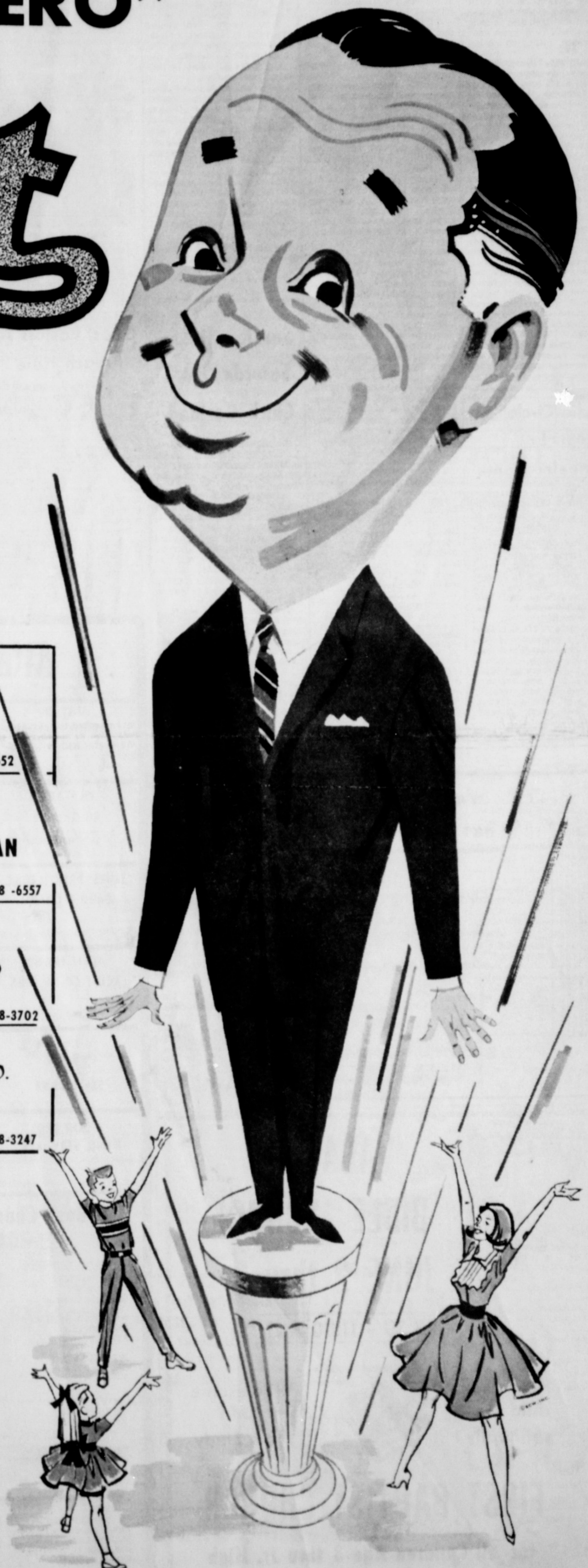
