## REVIEW OVERALL SCHOOL ATHLETIC PROGRAM

# Trustees Eye Superintendent Candidates

The search for a new superintendent of schools started with a screening of applicants during the regular monthly Slaton School Board meeting Tuesday night.

Besides reviewing some 14 applications for the school chief's post, the trustees approved a low bid on new band uniforms; discussed the school's physical education program, extended the contract of O. B. Allen as director of attendance and social services, discussed laundry service bids, and approved bills.

With the announced upcoming retirement of Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent, trustees started a serious study of applicants Tuesday night. No decision is expected for several weeks, however, Dr. Vardy has tentatively planned to retire July 1.

New band uniforms -- the first in many years -- were approved on a low bid of \$9,662.50 from the Sol Frank Uniform Co. of San Antonio. The contract calls for 110 uniforms with 12 extra jackets. Two bids were received, and the cost per uniform figured out at \$84.17. It was pointed out that the band had raised some \$2,000 toward purchase of the new suits.

Athletic director Ernie Davis appeared at the board meeting to discuss the school's athletic program. Trustees had requested an outline of the program at a previous session. The proposed program submitted by Davis included duties of all coaches, schedule arrangements for teams, and planned physical education programs throughout the schools. The board will study the proposed program to determine if any changes should be made, then return it to Davis to be carried out.

The board also discussed the recent decision to allow basketball coach Kenneth Housden to give full time to basketball starting Oct. 15 -- the UIL date to start organized practice sessions. Davis pointed out that the change would be detrimental to the freshmen football players, where Housden is the assistant football coach.

Trustees also discussed baseball in the high school program. After consideration, the board voted against adding baseball to the program for the next year.

Three bids were received for laundry service, with Slaton Steam Laundry the apparent low bidder. The board discussed dividing the business between local firms and left the matter open for a decision. If the firms do not want partial business on the basis of their bids, the full contract will go to the low bidder.

All members of the board were present for the meeting.

## Four Injured In Saturday Crash

Four persons sustained injuries in a one-car accident Saturday night north of Slaton at FM-400 and Gentry Lane, near Slaton Municipal Airport. The car was termed a total loss but injuries were not believed serious. Don Settle, driver of the auto, had lacerations on the face and a bruised arm. All four were taken to Mercy Hospital for treatment. Wanda Bailey had a broken ankle and lacerations, and Benny Bloxom and Sandra Rushing sustained cuts and bruises. The Texas Highway Patrol investigated the mishap, which apparently occurred when the brakes failed to control the vehicle at the intersection.

On the city police report, one minor accident was recorded. A car driven by Monte H. Armstrong was involved in a collision with a parked auto on W. Panhandle Monday night. Total damage was about \$225. Police made eight jail arrests the past week and issued seven traffic tickets.

## Slaton Sailor Wins Medal In Vietnam Action

John E. Todd Jr. of Slaton has been awarded the Navy Commendation Medal for meritorious service in Vietnam, it was announced this week by the Secretary of the Navy.

Todd, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Todd of Slaton, is an electronics technician 1st Class, attached to the communications division of the U. S. Naval Support Activity, Da-Nang, Vietnam.

The Slaton sailor was cited for coordinating and supervising efforts to restore a communications complex destroyed by enemy fire at Cua Viet. The citation stated that "despite frequent enemy artillery barrages, officer Todd had communications restored in 72 hours, showing outstanding leadership and devotion to duty in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

The medal, along with a Combat "V", was presented to Todd on May 27. He is scheduled to return home in November. His father is a deputy sheriff for Lubbock County.

## Mercury Hits 108 in Slaton

Slaton recorded its hottest day of the year Saturday when the temperature hit 108 degrees at the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. office here.

The high reading dipped to a mere 80 degrees Sunday, then climbed back to a high of 91 Tuesday. Minimum for the week was a low reading of 56 degrees early Tuesday morning.

Rain threatened the city Tuesday as thunderclouds moved in from the southwest, but no moisture was recorded in the city. The weather has been a big boost to cotton and grain crops in the area after heavy rainfall during the month of May.

## Pioneer Resident Honored Sunday

Mrs. A. R. Keys of 230 So. 5th St., was honored with open house Sunday afternoon in her home. A resident of Slaton since 1919, she recently celebrated her 76th birthday.

In conjunction with this occasion, the following article was written by her son, Ira Russell Keys.

"On May 28, 1892, Mrs. Ira Simpson of Carrollton, Mo., gave birth to a baby girl who was named Ruth Farris Simpson. 1906 saw this girl, now 14 years old, beside her mother in the family's Ford touring car headed for Lockney, Tex. Her father and two of her brothers each followed in a horse-drawn wagon. As service stations were all but non-existent, gasoline and oil had to be taken along. Food and water as high-priority cargo, were also sandwiched in with other possessions.

In 1910, Ruth married Arthur Russell Keys, proprietor of the broom factory in Lockney. In only a year and a half, Mr. Keys had manufactured enough brooms to saturate the local market, and so they moved on to Hereford where he took a position as telephone installer with Bell Telephone. It is not marked in memory why Mr. Keys transferred to Amarillo, but recollection marks plainly that it was a favor done for a friend with a new baby that awarded Arthur the job as division lineman with the Santa Fe Railroad in Slaton. 1918 discovered Arthur, Ruth and their daughters, Mary Imojene and Parrilee Olive, coming to Slaton.

It was a strange and almost alien place to Ruth with no pavement and its dirt paths. There was the Slaton State Bank. The post office was on the west side of the City Hall, and the grocery store on the dirt road going to the depot and Harvey House from town. Though Ruth and Arthur were making more money than they'd ever made in their lives, there were few places to spend it. In the long hot summers, it is to be imagined, many of the 600 residents of Slaton could be seen walking to the swimming pool southeast of town. Of course, people had their own contrivances for entertainment in those times. Arthur would play chess with his friends in the evenings; Ruth would sponsor a quilting party, while the kids played at their various games.

Summers are remembered as long, hot and dry, under one of those volving ceiling operated in most houses was a remembers no those days. 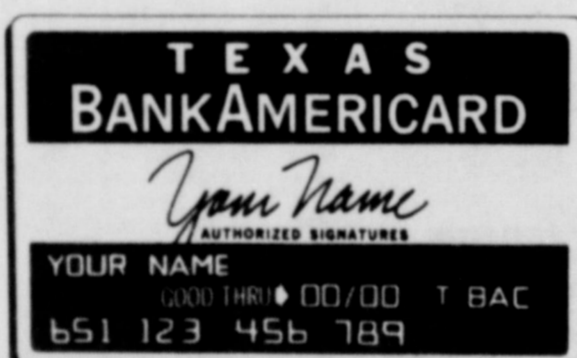

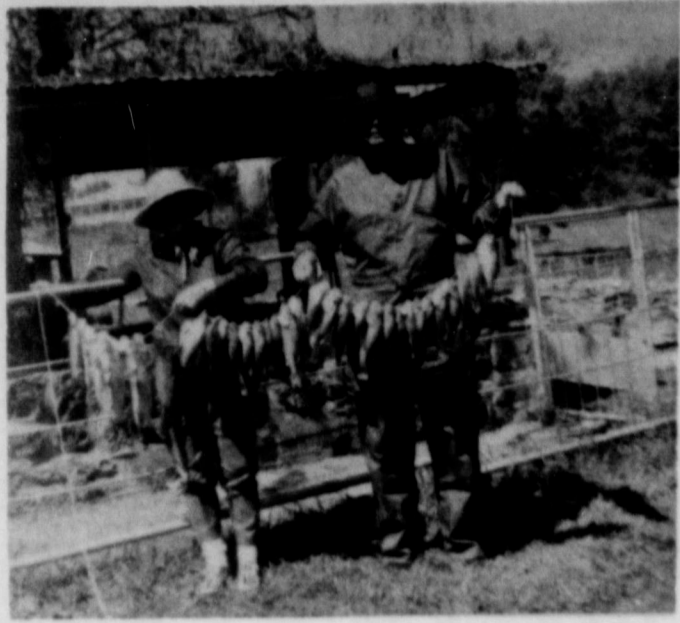

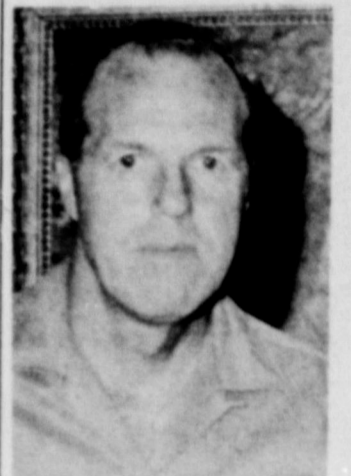
