Patriotic Observance Planned Tuesday

Slaton and area residents will see another Veterans Day observed in patriotic fashion Tuesday, Nov. 11, when the event is celebrated here with a big "For God and Country" parade and the special appearance of a distinguished ex -Slatonite, Dan Thornton.

Thornton, two - time gover-nor of Colorado and former U.S. Ambassador to Paraguay, will be honored guest for the event and will address the Veterans Day crowd at 10:30 a.m. Tues-

day on the city hall square. The patriotic parade will follow at 11 a.m. Other dignitaries who have indicated they will be here include State Sen. H.J. (Doc) Blanchard, and state representatives R. B. McAllister, Elmer Tarbox and Bill Clayton.

Slaton's veterans organizations -- VFW Post 6721, and Luther Powers Legion Post 438 -- are co-sponsors of the observance along with Slaton Chamber of Commerce. Committee chairmen in planning the observance were Robert H. Davis, Bill N. Ball, Bud Englund and Carroll McDonald. While the Veterans Day address and parade are public

events, local civic and service leaders will hold a luncheon to honor Thornton, Slaton Public Schools will dismiss for the address and parade, and then classes will resume.

This year's parade is shaping up as a fine spectator event with bands, floats, service units, twirlers, beauty

queens, clowns and other attractions. Cash prizes of \$100, \$75 and \$50 will be offered for the three best floats in the parade,

Colorama Countess; several Slaton High sweethearts, and three girls from Girlstown, U.S.A., sponsored by the Slaton Lions and Rotary clubs and the Young Homemakers. The Toperettes, a young twirler group, is also scheduled to march.

The special patriotic day was launched in fine fashion last year when former Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr was honored guest for the event. Thousands lined the city square last year to view a parade and hear a short address by Carr.

The show included a newplane parade, a balloon burst contest, demonstration flights and the sky divers. On the ground, Dr. Wiener VonSchnitzel entertained youngsters with rides in his "funny buggy."

Roger Evans took first place in the balloon burst, popping his target in 1:01. Willard Turner of Lubbock was second at 1:02, and Bland Draper of Tahoka was third in 1:07.

Activities for the day began early when about 50 planes were attracted to a fly-in breakfast. Roger Evans said most of the planes were within an hour's flying distance. He estimated that some 1,500 to 2,000 people were around the airstrip in midafternoon, and there were per-haps another 500 to 1,000 persons in cars parked along the highway on both sides of the airport entrance.

The municipal airport project actually "got off the ground" in August, 1966, when Slaton voters approved an \$85,000 bond issue to help finance the construction of the paved strips and purchase of 320 acres of land, Total cost is tabbed at slightly more than \$200,000 with Federal and state grants providing a big share of the funds,

Dry, Sunny Weather

The high was 68 Tuesday, and it was expected to reach about 70 degrees Wednesday, According to Pioneer Natural Gas Co. here, the low was 32 degrees on Sunday morning, and 30 degrees Monday and Tuesday mornings. The low was recorded as 36 degrees Wednesday morning.

The Slaton area hadrecorded almost 8 inches of rain the past three weeks, before dry weather greeted residents Monday.

The Lubbock, Brownfield, and Lamesa offices classed only 551 samples during the week ending Friday, Oct. 31. This brought the total classed at the three offices this season to only 10,000. Through October 31st last year 92,700 samples of the 1968 crop had been classed

Predominant grades at Lubbock so far this season have been Strict Low Middling 45 per cent, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted - 25 per cent, Middling Light Spotted - 9 per cent, and Low Middling Light Spotted - 8 per cent.

Eighty - six per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock this season has had Pressley readings of 80,000 pounds and higher. Pressley is an indication of fiber strength and the most desirable Pressley reading is 80,000 pounds and above.

Prices offered for these early bales indicate a strong demand for South Plains cotton.

Three Slaton Scouts Receive Coveted Eagle



On the lone touchdown, the Slaton line had stiffened and held Snyder to a 4thand-6 situation at the Slaton 20. However, a pass got the visitors a first down on the 6 and they drove it across.

Snyder's other 2 points came in the third period, when a 4th-down snap was high and punter Alan Fondy was trapped in the end zone while retrieving the ball.

The great team effort on defense for Slaton was led by tackle Allen McDonald, guard Charlie Thomas, end Robert Englund, and linebacker Don Smith, McDonald -- always a steady performer on both offense and defense -- probably had his best game of the sea-

While taking nothing away from the tough Snyder defense, Slaton's offensive mistakes turned the tide in the second

the ball seven times and gave it up on four pass interceptions, two high snaps on fourth down, and one fumble.

An injury in the first half to Terry Mosser, Slaton's durable little quarterback, handicapped the locals, Although Mosser played most of the game, he was not able to operate at full speed after sustaining a hard blow in the first half.

The Tiger quarterback, who hit four touchdown passes last week, didn't connect on eight attempts and had four intercepted. Fondy tried three passes late in the game, and two of his were swiped by the swift Snyder secondary.






