VFW Supports "Operation Speak Out"

Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 6721 of Slaton today called on all community organizations to join with the VFW in "Operation Speak Out" which is a program designed to encourage the "silent majority" to show their support of the government on the Vietnam question the week of November 9-15, which includes November 11, Veterans Day.

For this program to be effective and reflective of the community mind, it is my hope that all other civic, fraternal, patriotic, labor, religious and other organizations here will join with us and make this a true community effort."

Commander Nelson also stated that Raymond A. Gallagher, V.F.W. Commander-in-Chief, is calling on all other national organizations to join with the VFW in this undertaking.

Waste Material Topic At Lion Meeting Tuesday

Ted Dutton, branch manager of the Commercial Metals plant in Lubbock, presented a program on the "Secondary Mat-

erial industries" at the Slaton Lions Club meeting Tuesday in the Community Clubhouse. Speaking on behalf of the National Association of Secondary Material Industries, Inc., Dutton explained the far-reaching economic scope of the industry. He said insufficient recognition has been given the secondary materials industry through the years.

Dutton pointed out that industries engaged in processing secondary materials are presently operating at a level of \$5 to \$7 billion annually. He also pointed out the import-

ance in conserving and reclaiming scrap metals, paper and textiles.

The speaker emphasized that reclamation of secondary materials helped to conserve our mines and forests. Dutton asked his audience to consider what could happen if all the

secondary materials picked up and recycled.

Dutton was introduced by G. Nieman, Lion Club President at the meeting. Several other members were introduced.
