

MAYOR PLEADS FOR APPROVAL, COMMISSION WANTS MORE TIME

# Debates Comprehensive Plan With Federal Funds

Fate of a comprehensive planning project for the City of Slaton was left "dangling" by Slaton City Commission Monday night, after Mayor David Hughes had pleaded with the three commissioners to accept the plan.

The comprehensive plan was approved for a Federal grant of \$14,860 on May 2, 1969. The project is tabbed for a total cost of \$22,290 with the city paying one-third, or \$7,430, if the commission decides to proceed with the program.

The City of Slaton applied for the urban planning assistance grant in January of this year, however the three commissioners attending Monday night's session were not mem-

bers of the council at this time, Otis Neill, J. S. Edwards and Floyd Guelker were elected as commissioners in April.

Jim Delashaw, State Department of Health; Bennett Reaves, consultant engineer for the city, and Nathan Kiser, consultant planner, attended the commission meeting Monday night to explain and out the overall planning program.

After lengthy discussion, the mayor recommended the commission approve the contract for the project. His reasons included the fact that such a plan is needed in regional planning purposes and to be eligible for certain Federal grants; that it would provide for continuity of information and plans from commission to commission, and that it would provide for orderly

and efficient growth of the community in the future.

"I beg you to accept this plan," Hughes told the commissioners. "It may not be as important to you or to me as it will be to Slaton citizens in the future," he added.

Neill replied that he did not have sufficient information or ample time for consideration "to cast an intelligent vote," Edwards and Guelker agreed and asked for more time to consider the matter.

Edwards said the commission had not discussed the program in detail, in fact he didn't know the previous commission had applied for a grant. Guelker said he didn't remember hearing about the grant being approved. The mayor said the plan had been mentioned in

several commission meetings, and that the local newspaper had a story on the grant approval.

"The lack of information on what previous commissions have done further points out the need of a comprehensive plan," remarked the mayor. Edwards said the Monday night discussion "should have been held a month ago so we could have studied the matter better," Hughes agreed, but pointed out that the need for immediate action was brought to his attention only a few days ago.

Delashaw explained that the State Department of Health will undergo a transition Sept. 1, with administration being transferred to the Governor's office. He said if the contract

was not signed before that date, there might be some delay in getting the project started. His office, he added, was checking around to get as many contracts completed as possible before the change-over.

As explained by the three visitors, the comprehensive plan is proposed, generally, to include such things as: base mapping; base studies with economic analysis and population projection; land use studies and neighborhood analysis; circulation and transportation -- including master plan for central business district; studies and maps on public facilities -- water, sewer, drainage, schools, parks, public buildings; capital improvements and budget programs, and administrative controls.

The project would include a number of preliminary reports over the period of about a year to 18 months, with the city commission approving each report prior to the compilation of the comprehensive plan.

Reaves, when questioned about the need of such a plan, pointed out that a study by the engineering firm alone on water, sewer and drainage would cost the city almost as much as this overall plan. Since the city has the Federal grant, he said commissioners should decide if the other studies and information are needed.

Kiser, the consultant planner, emphasized that the project was a complex plan. "If it was simple, you would have done it last year, or 10 years ago."

He added that the plan was designed as one that could be used, not to be put on the shelf and forgotten.

The health department man explained that the city's share would be paid in three installments. An initial payment of \$2,480 would be made on the contract signing, and payments of \$2,475 would be paid when the project was 35 percent and 70 percent complete. The state agency checks and reviews the planner's work, he added.

Reaves reported his firm was currently working on comprehensive plans for Levelland, Friona, Brownfield, Lamasa and Colorado City. Delashaw said the State Health Department has completed some 100 plans and is working on another 100.

## Rain Finally Comes, Snaps Heat Wave

### Serious Injury Reported In Cycle Accident

Four accidents, one with serious injury, highlighted a report from Slaton Police Department this week.

A Lubbock man, Jodie J. Bergman, about 50, was listed in critical condition in a Lubbock hospital this week as a result of injuries sustained in a motorcycle accident Saturday evening.

The mishap occurred on the US-84, near Smith Ford, about 7:25 p.m. Saturday. Bergman was reported traveling north when his cycle ran off the single-lane highway which is under construction near the overpass. He was transferred to Lubbock by the emergency ambulance operated by Slaton Police Department.

Three minor accidents were recorded in the city. Willie S. Burleson was involved in a collision with a parked car on South 8th St. Friday morning. Total damage was estimated at about \$120.

Ollie V. Rainwater and John E. Taylor were drivers involved in a two-car accident on E. Geneva St. Monday afternoon. About \$300 damage was estimated for both vehicles. Eluid M. Rios and Clincy G. White were drivers of vehicles in a collision on the south side of the city square Saturday. Damage was tabbed at about \$125.

Police made 10 arrests the past week and issued 16 traffic tickets.

## Firemen To Assist Ambulance Service

Slaton Volunteer Firemen have agreed to serve as ambulance attendants under the new emergency ambulance service now being operated by Slaton Police Department.

Slaton City Commission approved the use of volunteer firemen on the ambulances during a regular meeting Monday night, after fire chief Don Kendrick had met with the council and the firemen.

In other action, the commission set the salary of the new city secretary and discussed purchase of some new city vehicles. The salary of City Sec. Alex Webb was set at \$325 a month--the same pay received by Gerald Kendrick who resigned to move to McKinney.

The need of one new truck and two dump-truck beds was outlined by street superintendent Grady Elder. The commission agreed to purchase a new truck, two beds, and a used pickup for the cemetery department. Mayor David Hughes was authorized to check into trade-ins, including the trade of a police car, and prices on used pickup, if necessary.

The commission had sought volunteer aid on the ambulances

in order to avoid increasing the size of the police department. After discussing the volunteer plan, the commission voted to pay the firemen a minimum of \$5 per call as attendants, plus \$1.60 per hour over one hour of time, and to provide "adequate" insurance coverage.

Kendrick said the initial list of ambulance volunteers included 12 of the firemen. All of them have first-aid training certificates. The ambulances are scheduled to operate from the police department with a patrolman as driver.

Kendrick emphasized that a "daytime" problem could be a drawback in the use of volunteers. Mayor Hughes said,

however, that Chief Walter Head reported that the police could probably take care of most calls during the day, unless patrolmen were involved in other critical activities. Kendrick said it would be no problem to have attendants on call at night.

Don Blackerby, assistant police chief, reported at the council meeting that the new ambulance was now scheduled for delivery Friday.

In answer to a question from one of the commissioners, Blackerby said it took about 20 minutes for the emergency ambulance to get to the scene of an accident Saturday evening. He said three calls were placed before an attendant was located to make the run with the driver. He reported the driver also had motor difficulties with the used vehicle.

Commissioner Floyd Guelker said he thought it should be made clear that the city ambulance service will not be for emergencies only -- not for transfers.

**Family Night Set At Swimming Pool**

"Family Night" will be held at Slaton Swimming Pool for the final time tonight (Thursday). The city pool, under operation of Slaton Chamber of Commerce, will not be open after Labor Day.

Family Night is set from 7 to 8:45 p.m. Thursday, and no children are admitted unless accompanied by at least one parent. Regular admission rates are charged.

Slaton's long, hot, dry summer ended over the weekend as thunderstorms roamed around the region leaving from 1.5 to 4 inches of rainfall in the Slaton area.

The most general and heaviest rainfall occurred Sunday night with most reports ranging from 1.4 inches to 2 inches of moisture.

The Southland and Gordon areas south of Slaton reported the most moisture since last Friday, with some totals measured from 3.5 to 4 inches.

Unofficial rain reports in Slaton totalled 2.4 inches since Saturday. This included .70 of an inch Saturday, 1.4 inches Sunday, .20 of an inch Monday and .10 of an inch Wednesday morning.

The Saturday rain was spotted, with some sections of town reporting only a shower while others had half an inch or more. A shower about 6 a.m. Wednesday left a trace or about one-tenth of an inch around town. The long-awaited rains came after temperature readings had been at the 100-degree mark or over for 35 straight days, according to a report from the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. office in Slaton.

The crop-saving showers were a welcome sight to many farmers, although some indicated that rains came "too late" to do much good on dry-land crops.

The cool down held the maximum temperatures in the 80's Monday through Wednesday. A high of 104 degrees was reported last Thursday and Friday, the mercury dipped below 100 (to 98) on Saturday -- marking the first time in 35 days that the maximum was below the century mark.

The minimum temperatures also dropped below 70 for the first time in many days. Readings of 68 were recorded Sunday and Monday nights, and the low was 70 on Tuesday night.

A forecast for cloudiness and possible rain was announced Wednesday. The high Wednesday was not expected to reach 100 degrees.

### Chest X-Ray Unit Scheduled

The West Texas Tuberculosis Association will bring its Christmas Seal Mobile X-Ray Unit to Slaton on Thursday, Sept. 4, under sponsorship of the Slaton Rotary Club.

Rotary president J. S. Edwards announced that the x-ray unit would be located on the Piggy Wiggy parking lot.

The chest x-ray program discovers many abnormalities other than tuberculosis. A fee of \$1.50 is requested for the chest x-rays.

A post card is mailed to those having a normal chest film. The ones who have abnormal readings are notified by a first-class letter which urges them to contact their private physician for further examination.

The unit will be open from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., and from 2 to 6 on Thursday, Sept. 4 at the Piggy Wiggy parking lot. No children under 12 years of age will be x-rayed.

### Pool Budget Approved

A \$865,000 budget for the 1969-70 school year was approved by the Slaton School Board Saturday.

The board opened with a public budget hearing at 7 p.m. No one appeared to discuss the budget, and trustees approved calls for expenditures to be \$865,000 over last year.

Pay increases, as approved by the board, are on a state minimum scale, and include all the increase. Pay for teachers last year was \$9,187, and the salary has been raised to \$9,337. Slaton schools pay \$300 a month for local schools.

McCluskey reported that he and the school buildings and grounds are in relatively good condition. He said there appeared to be some damage to the school buildings, but these would not definitely affect school starts. He said additional work on the curriculum have been going on with enrollment, in creating new courses.

Principals met to discuss school calendar dates, subject to board approval. Thanksgiving, Nov. 27-28; Christmas, Dec. 23-24; Easter, March 30. School will end on May 15.

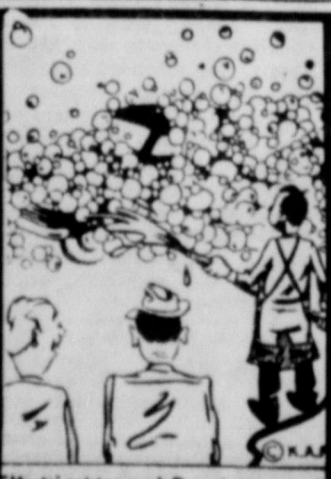
### Candy Strippers Elect New Officers

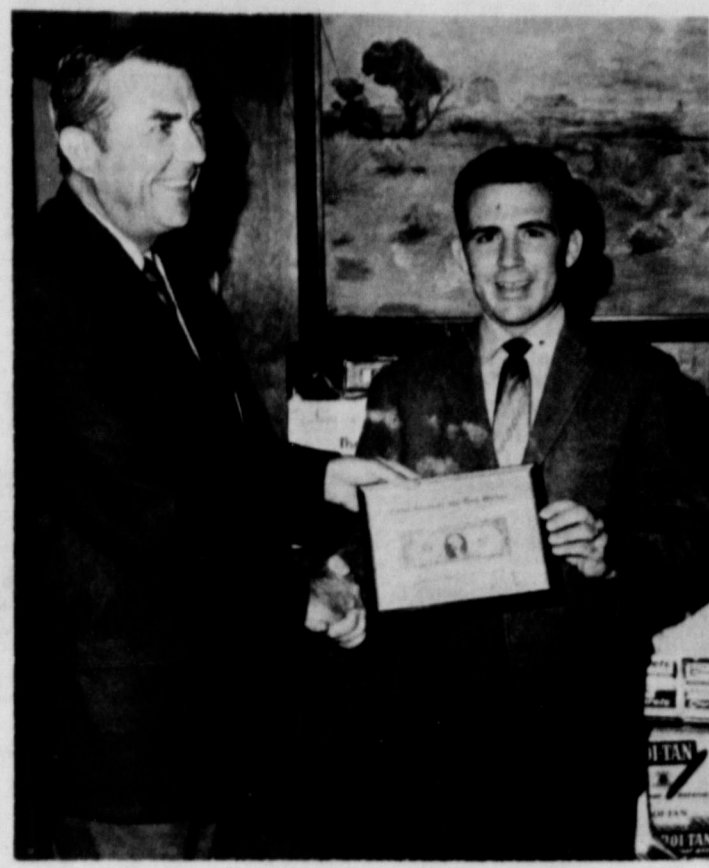

## School's Open, Drivers Urged To Use Caution

Thousands of children are headed back to school full of nervous excitement -- but with little thought for safety. And so again, joining with law enforcement officials throughout the state, the American Automobile Association urges extra care during the first few weeks of school.

Traffic accidents kill more children between one and four years of age than any other cause. Because kindergarten and first grade youngsters, many on their own in traffic for the first time, suffer most of the school route injuries, AAA suggests that parents walk with their children on the opening day of school, making sure that their children are familiar with traffic aids and regulations and use guarded crosswalks whenever possible.

Driving children to school only adds to the confusion around school areas, creating more hazardous conditions. Even though children should learn traffic rules, the major traffic responsibility consistently falls on the driver.

AAA pleads with all drivers to help protect the lives of school children this year by driving with particular care everywhere children might be playing or crossing - and especially near school areas.

## 1,500 Scouts Take Part In Summer Program

Some 1,500 Boy Scouts and more than 100 of their adult leaders took part this year in the summer program of camping and special events provided by the South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America.

Camping chairman Howard Schmidt reports that 13 weeks of summer camp were conducted at the Council's camps at Post, Texas and Tres Ritos, New Mexico, including special weeks for Forestry Camp and Aquatics Camp and training for the camp staffs.

Local Scouts also participated in the Seventh National Jamboree in Idaho with sight-seeing tours enroute. They flew to Minnesota to paddle canoes in the stormy waters of that state and Canada, and they challenged the vast reaches of the Philmont Scout Ranch at Cimarron, New Mexico.

Listed high among the summer adventures for Scouts has been a new Mountain Man Camp at Tres Ritos which took boys and leaders on week-long backpacking trips into the mountains of New Mexico in the Carson National Forest.

Men and boys in the South Plains Council traveled more than 750,000 man - miles to participate in Scouting events this summer.

**Police Summary In July Shows Heavy Fines**

Slaton Police Department recorded a busy month of activities in July, according to a monthly summary released by Chief Walter Head.

Police investigated 56 offenses during the month and cleared 37 of them. These ranged from dog bites and minor theft to aggravated assault and burglary.

City Court showed a total of 50 jail arrests, and fines amounted to \$1,380. Alcoholic beverage violations led the list, with 14 drunks or drunk-in-car charges filed. There were eight arrests of minors for poss-

ession of alcoholic beverages, and seven charges on making alcoholic beverages available to minors.

Police issued 91 traffic violation tickets during the month, and fines totaled \$1,328. Speeders led the list of traffic violators with 30 being charged. Fourteen were charged for driving without a license.

Police recorded eight traffic accidents during July, with property damage estimated at \$2,110. Two of the accidents were at US-84 and FM-41, and they accounted for more than half of the property damage.

Since today's record high interest rates are beginning to hit most of us on our sensitive pocketbook nerves, we were interested in an article received this week from a New York bank.

"Whatever Happened to Interest Rates?" is the title of the brief article. The answers all have to do with inflation. Simply put, whenever the supply of money grows faster than the supply of available goods, prices go up.

That's what's been happening in this country for the past few years--the money supply has grown faster than we have been able to produce goods and services, despite galloping economic growth. The money supply has in-

creased because Uncle Sam has been spending more money than he takes in, and the Federal Reserve in effect printed the money needed to cover the deficit in 1967 and 1968.

What makes the situation worse is that when prices are rising, people borrow more and more money. The Government and Federal Reserve are now taking action to brake inflation. Uncle Sam is trying not to spend more than he receives in taxes, and the Reserve is slowing the growth of our money supply by taking money out of the system.

This makes it difficult for banks to get money to lend, and the banks are caught between the Federal Reserve and their customers. The idea is that the more it costs to borrow, the less borrowing will be done. Eventually, business activity will level off and price increases will slow down. When that happens, say the economic planners, interest rates should also come down.

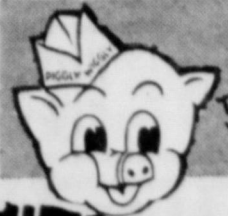

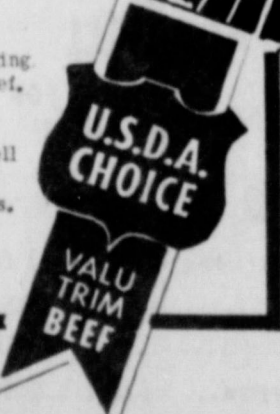
