Voters Pick School, City Officials

Trustees Are Self, Abeyta, Gamble

Three new trustees were named to Slaton School Board as a record vote total of 1,127 was recorded here Saturday.

Leading the ballot in a field of seven candidates was Clark Self Jr. with 450 votes, Rev. Emilio Abeyta was only one vote back, and Joe Gamble took the third spot with 433 votes.

The three-year terms on the board went to the top three vote getters. The third and fourth-place candidates were not far off the pace -- Alex Bednarz polled 410 votes and Jake Wendel 405. They were followed by P. C. Kitchens with 273 and Sharon Head with 92.

The school board met Tuesday night to canvass the returns of the election. The three new trustees will take their oaths at the next regular meeting. Retiring from the board are Ted Swanner, Jack Clark and Dr. M. J. McSween.

Self, 36, is owner and manager of Self Furniture, a past president of the Chamber of Commerce and active in community and civic affairs. He has three children in school. Abeyta, 28, is a Catholic priest and is believed to be the first Spanish-American to serve on the board. He is a

member of Slaton Lions Club. Abeyta was reared in Littlefield, Gamble, 48, is a farmer and resides at 750 S. 23rd St. He has two children in school.

Voters were asked to select three candidates from the ballot, but the vote total reflected the fact that all persons did not choose to mark three. Approximately 435 voters voted only for one or two candidates. One tally counter estimated that about 350 voters marked only one candidate.

The previous high vote total in a Slaton District election was reported to be 894 recorded in 1962. Officials said a large turnout of Spanish-Americans helped push the total to 233 over the previous high.

The school board is composed of seven members. The holdovers are Don Kendrick, Tommy Davis, Bettye Burks and R. C. Hall Jr. Three were elected this year, and two will come up for election the next two years.

Swanner was president of the board the past year. The board will re-organize and elect officers at the next regular meeting.

Neill Re-elected By Ward 2 Voters

Otis Neill, incumbent commissioner, was re-elected by a better than 3-1 margin over Johnnie Moore as Ward 2 (northwest) Slaton voters turned out in large numbers Tuesday.

Neill polled 293 votes to only 89 for Moore. The 382-vote total was a big turnout for a single ward, possibly a record city vote there.

In the other ward election, F. D. Conright polled 78 votes in winning the Ward 4 (southeast) city commission seat in an uncontested election.

The Ward 2 vote apparently

stirred up plenty of interest, as reflected by the big vote. Neill, 74, was finishing out one year of an unexpired term after winning the post in a special election last April. A partner in an insurance agency before retiring, Neill had also served on the commission some years ago.

Moore, 37, is minister of the First Christian Church and was making his first bid for political office. Both men and their supporters waged spirited campaigns for the city post. Conright, the Ward 4 winner, is a 62-year-old minister. He resides here but is pastoring a church in Floydada.

The 382-vote total in Ward 2 compares with a total of 256 votes cast in the special ward election last year. In regular elections in 1968 and 1966, the totals were only 165 and 171, respectively.

Some political observers estimate there are about 650 registered voters residing in the Ward 2 boundaries, which takes in residents north of Divisions and west of 9th streets. Ward 4 includes citizens living south of Division and east of 9th streets.

Police Critics At City Session

They could have changed the sign on the Slaton City Commission meeting room to "Complaint Department" for a Monday-night session. The commission meeting drew 19 guests at the start and a half-dozen more were on hand at times. Some registered complaints, while others came as spectators.

About nine persons registered complaints about police actions, and several more were on hand to protest a zoning board decision. Two local plumbers were present to request a reduction in bonds required for plumbing work. Another citizen complimented the police and asked for consideration of putting traffic-control lane stripes at the intersection of Division and 10th.

In other business, the commission decided to study the feasibility of making Panhandle Avenue -- heading northwest off the city square -- a one-way street for one block only. The possibility of installing a traffic light at 9th and Division is also to be studied. Monthly bills were approved, as were the minutes of the last meeting.

Mrs. Ruth Longtin appeared at the commission meeting, along with several others, to protest a decision by the Zoning Board to allow a used-car lot to be located in the neighborhood.

She said a number of property owners appeared at the zoning hearing Monday afternoon, and a petition signed by 25 property owners was presented in opposition to the action. Mrs. Longtin said she "did not blame the man who requested the change, nor the used-car man, but I do blame the board for ignoring our petition."

The commission agreed to review the case with the zoning board, holding up action until the study was made.

Plumbers E. W. Ham and Al Schwartz appeared at the meeting to request that the city plumbing bond be reduced from \$5,000 to \$1,000. They reported that all local plumbers favored the proposal. The mayor said the commission would study the matter.

Concerning the police criticisms, Commissioner J. S. Edwards was joined by Otis Neill in assuring the citizens that a complete study of reports would be made in connection with the complaints. Edwards said the commission wanted to make sure that no "harassment" of individuals was permitted on the part of city officers.

Chief Walter Head, present at the meeting, said he would "not tolerate such actions" by any of his officers.

Edwards said many times that complaints against law enforcement officers were unfounded but, he added, "police men can make mistakes."

Mayor David Hughes asked

Rites Held For L.B. Hagerman

Services for L. B. Hagerman, 77, Slaton resident since 1921, were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the First Baptist Church here. The Rev. J. L. Cartright, pastor, and the Rev. W. F. Ferguson, a retired Baptist minister, officiated.

Graveside rites were conducted by the Slaton Masonic Lodge #1094 of which he had been a member since 1931. Entombment was in the City of Lubbock Cemetery directed by Sanders Funeral Home of Lubbock.

An outstanding civic worker in Slaton for many years, Mr. Hagerman is probably remembered the most for his service to the Boy Scout program. He served as Scoutmaster along with other phases of the Boy Scouts. He attended three national Boy Scout jamborees and was a former Scout Commissioner of the Year for this area. His most coveted award in scouting was the Silver Beaver Award which was presented to him in 1949. This is the highest award on council level.

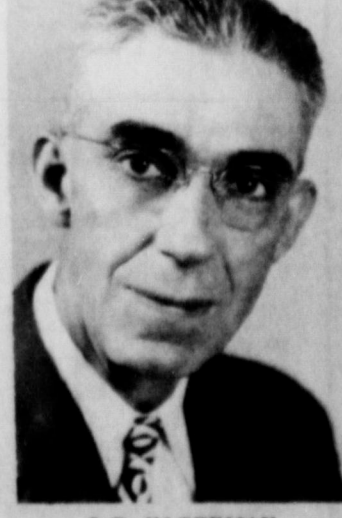
Mr. Hagerman was named Citizen of the Year by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce in 1952. He was a member of the Eastern Star No. 385, Volunteer Fire Department until his retirement, and the Santa Fe Retirement Club.

He was born July 21, 1892 in Bowling Green, Ky. He worked for the Santa Fe Railway from 1911 until his retirement in 1958.

His wife, Virginia, whom he married June 16, 1915 in Alva, Okla., preceded him in death as did his son, Merle.

He is survived by a brother, Fent of Fairview, Okla., and a sister, Mrs. Jay Tharp of Denver, Colo.

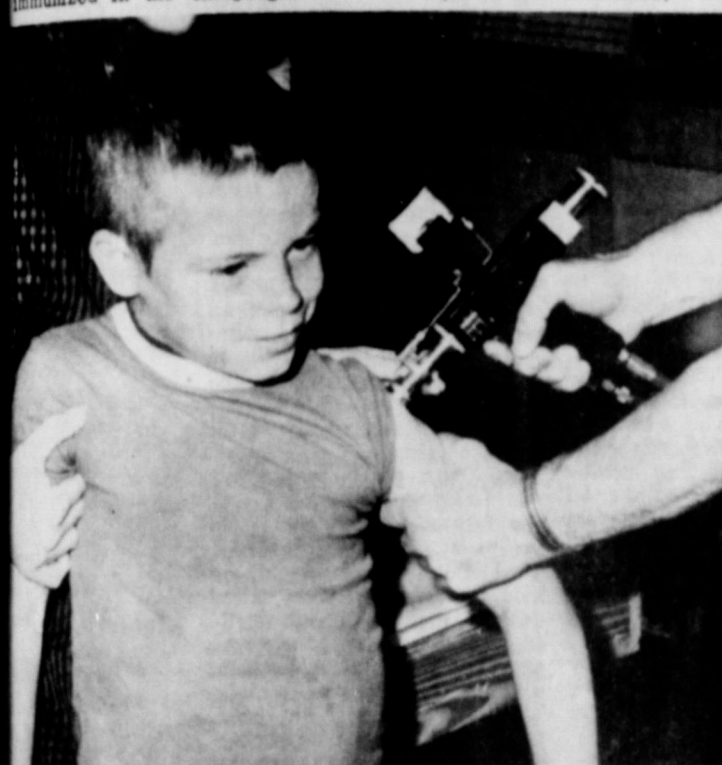

Drive Against Measles Set In Slaton Friday



The time is near to wipe out the threat German measles poses to unborn babies. The day is Friday (tomorrow) . . . April 10, and the place is the Well Baby Clinic located in the Federal Housing Authority office, 420 E. Powers.

Parents are urged to take their pre-school children from ages 1 through 6 to the clinic from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m. that day. All school children from ages 6 through 10 years old are being immunized at the school they attend.

A pre-registration blank can be found inside today's Slatonite for your convenience. Mrs. Grace Dodson, school nurse, has asked that these be filled out in advance and taken with you to the clinic.

This campaign is also being conducted today and tomorrow in Roosevelt, Wolfthorpe, New Deal, Idalou, Cooper and Shallowater. It will be held Monday in Lubbock.

The state is providing free

vaccine for use in inoculating all school-age children through 10 years of age. The city and county are providing the vaccine for all pre-school children. Although the shots are given free, a contribution box will be set up at the clinic for those persons who wish to donate toward the cost of the vaccine -- \$1.36 per dose.

The local immunization campaign is being sponsored by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce and BCD, with cooperation of civic clubs.

Many people think German measles is the same as "regular" measles. They're wrong. German measles and "regular" measles are two different things. The fact that a "regular" measles vaccination campaign has been conducted over the last five years has given many people the false impression that their children have already been inoculated against all types of measles. Vaccination against "regular" measles is no protection at all against German measles.

Incumbents dominated the election picture in most of the Slaton area city and school votes the past week. In the City of Wilson election, J. W. Morton and Carl Cryder were unopposed for re-election on the council. Only 12 votes were cast.

More voters turned out for the Wilson School election, however, where four candidates ran for two seats. Incumbent Loyd R. McCormick had 70 votes and Tommy Bednarz had 78 to win the posts. Incumbent A. N. Crowson polled 8 votes and Tommy Weaver had 50.

Three incumbents were re-elected on the Roosevelt School Board from a field of six candidates. The winners were D. D. Davis, Earl Hammett and Wesley Campbell. Other candidates were Jere Mimms, James Daniel and Bobby Poyner.

Incumbents Bobby Jones and Carlton Schaffner were re-elected on the Cooper School Board. Jones had 32 votes, Schaffner 26, and the other candidate, Leon Bukemper, had 15.

Three incumbents were unopposed on the Southland School Board. Only 20 votes were cast to re-elect Edmund Wilke, Spence Bevers and Arthur Smallwood.

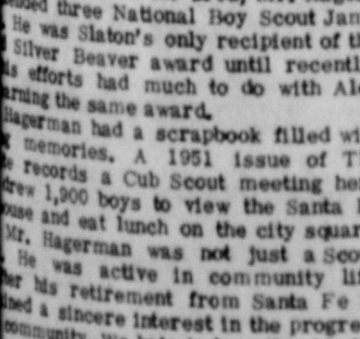
Police, Firemen To Be Honored

She was raised on a farm and says she remembers there was a lot of singing in her home. She said the neighbors would come to see them and she would play the organ as everyone sang.

She worked as a child, to raise the crops and do the house work, but with the entire family helping, it wasn't bad, she said.

She said their wagon was their transportation. "A wagon full of young people was always a lot of fun", she said. Most of the entertainment was held at a nearby school called Double Mountain School. Spelling bees were one of the forms of entertainments back then.

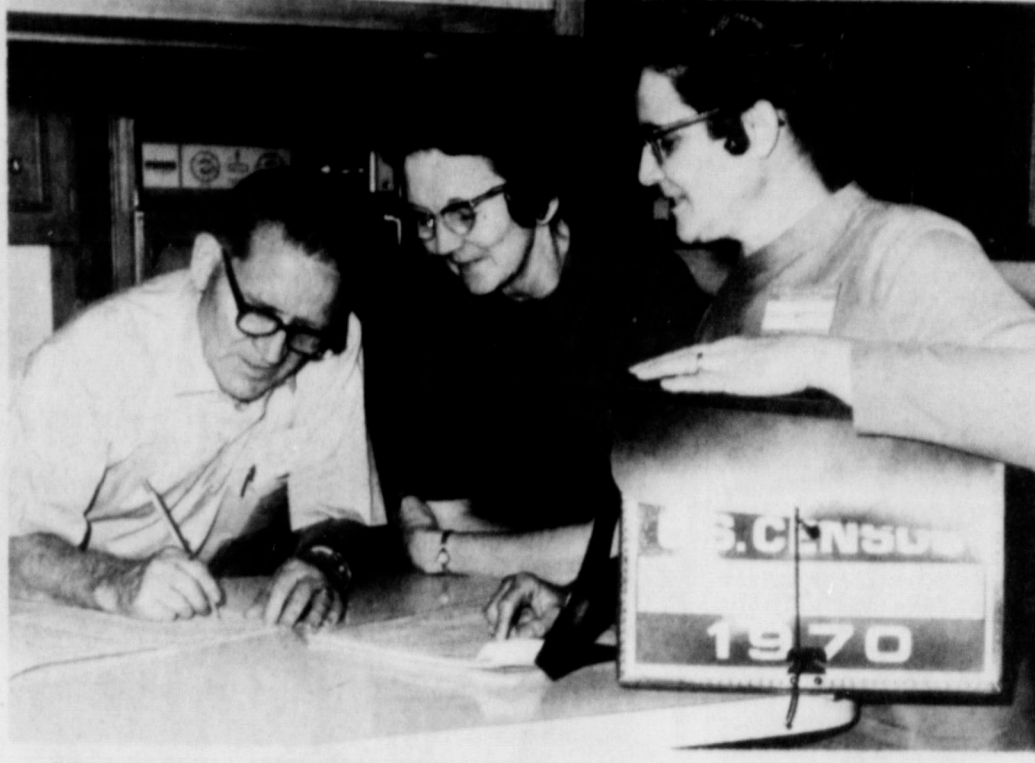

I have had the pleasure of flying over some beautiful country these past three weeks. The ranchers down in the Big Bend area were having trouble with coyotes killing sheep and hired your local flyer.

I flew with a boy that has been a trapper all his life, and I believe he is half Indian and half coyote himself. He could spot a coyote hiding in a bush or see their trail on the sand, as well as places they had bedded down or dug a den. When we jumped a coyote, he could tell if it was young or old, male or female. Myself, I wasn't sure if it was a coyote (or just what) the way they took off through the brush. At times we shot coyotes with a tranquilizer and once had two tied outside the helicopter and two inside. I was hoping he didn't let one loose in the chopper.

At noon time we'd stop along a river at old Indian camps and look for arrow heads. The camps were way back in the ranches and hadn't been disturbed, so we had good luck on finding relics. Seems the Indians would camp along the rivers where there was a close supply of water. They would pile a lot of rocks in one place where they built fires and cooked a local plant. Then they would have small piles of rocks out from the main pile for individual groups.

We saw white tail and mule deer, javelinas, antelope, bobcats, fox and other wild animals. The mountains fascinated me most. It's really something to hover along side of those mammoth rocks, stretching up several thousand feet into the air.

I had a good time, but am glad to be home.
