Head Start Gets \$18,850 Grant

Governor Preston Smith today announced his approval of an Office of Child Development grant of \$218,792 in new federal funds to Community Action Board in Lubbock County, Inc. in Lubbock.

Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, this grant authorizes Summer Head Start programs to be operated by five delegate agencies serving children five to six years of age.

It was announced that Slaton Independent School District will receive \$18,850. Slaton will operate six classes in one center

ONE DEAD IN CRASH

Slaton's first traffic fatality of 1970 was recorded shortly after noon Wednesday when a Lubbock man, Homer Harrison, 74, died in a car-truck crash at the intersection of Industrial Drive (U.S. 84 business route) and FM-400.

Slaton police reported the fatal collision occurred at 12:20 p.m. Wednesday. An investigating officer said the car hit the trailer portion of the truck-trailer and the victim was thrown from the car.

Officers said Harrison's car was going west on Industrial Drive, and the truck was headed south on FM-400. The truck driver, Able Smith, 44, of Houston, was not injured, according to the report.

The victim was the brother of Mrs. Lee Jones, who resides east of Slaton. No other information was available at press time Wednesday. Harrison was reported to be a special officer for the Lubbock Police Department and a well-known patrolman in Lubbock for many years.

Slaton City Commission, in a called meeting Monday night with all four commissioners present;

--Held a hearing on a proposed zoning change at 700 W. Division, then decided to meet with the Zoning Board before making a decision;

--Approved support "to an undetermined extent" of a proposed civic center in Slaton;

--Approved a one-way street on W. Panhandle, one block only off the city square, on a

trial basis. (To go into effect when the ordinance is drawn up and proper traffic signs have been installed);

--Approved payment of \$5,310 due on a note for the city ambulance;

--Moved to call for bids on re-roofing the Municipal Building and for door and window repairs at the Fire Station;

--Authorized the mayor to sign a contract allowing the Slaton Golf Course Association to lease the municipal

course;

--Tabled action on a request to reduce the plumber's bond required in the city.

The lengthy session, which ended shortly before 11 p.m., also saw discussion of other matters and the calling of another meeting next Monday--primarily to approve monthly bills. The commission recently decided to have only one regular meeting a month, and it will be on the second Monday of each month. Other meetings

will be called when needed. Some 16 citizens registered in for part or all of the meeting -- about 10 of them appearing in connection with the zoning issue.

Three members of a "civic center" committee appeared at the session to request that the city accept such a facility and maintain the building if the proposal is successful. Chairman Glen Akin, Jonas Cain and Earl Bartley presented the request.

Akin said the goal of the project -- if citizen support is indicated -- is to pay for the facility and give it to the city for operation and maintenance. Since the center will be a community and area project, he said the committee felt the city would be the proper governing body to assume control and maintenance.

The committee, it was reported, felt that a commitment was needed from the city commission before the drive continued. Committee members were optimistic about raising an estimated \$40,000 to purchase a building and make necessary remodeling.

One committee member estimated the city's maintenance cost at \$3,000 a year or less. Commissioner Otis Neill said he thought it was a liberal estimate.

Akin said the idea grew from talk of building a stock show barn here. Several interested men decided that a civic center would be a much greater asset to the community, and at a cost of perhaps twice the amount needed for an ag barn. The idea was to have a versatile building, available for all types of shows, conventions, banquets, seminars, and other such events.

Akin said the Slaton Chamber of Commerce was then approached, and directors initiated a study committee -- made up of people representing a cross section of the community. All four commissioners and Mayor David Hughes expressed a willingness to cooperate, but several felt that more details needed to be considered. After discussing the matter, the commission moved to "cooperate to an undetermined extent."

The city had contacted the Texas Highway Department concerning the one-way street on Panhandle, and THD officials approved, adding they had recommended this some years ago. The city also requested

IN PARTY PRIMARY ELECTIONS

Only 706 Voters Here

A light turnout of Slaton voters -- just 676 Democrats and 30 Republicans -- went to party primary polls Saturday to join the election trends over the area in picking the winners.

Slaton Democrats followed the area and state trend in favoring Lloyd Bentsen over veteran U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, but it was only by a slight 337-327 margin here. Voting boxes 36 and 37 went to Bentsen, but Yarborough carried Box 38 at S.F. Austin School by a wide margin.

A similar trend was noted in the state representative race, where incumbent Elmer Tarbox

carried boxes 36 and 37, but challenger Horace McQueen took box 38. Tarbox was favored here, however, by a 351-241 count.

In the only other local race, Slaton Demos favored County School Supt. Roy Boyd by a large margin over challenger Vaudaline Thomas. Boyd carried all three boxes to take a 466-117 victory in Slaton.

Elected without opposition were local Demo candidates Max Arrants, Lubbock County Commissioner, Precinct 2, and Arvin Stafford, justice of the peace, Precinct 2, Place 1. The Lubbock County vote total for both primaries was 19,365 with some 18,350 coming under the Democratic banner. Bentsen upset Yarborough in the statewide race and will face GOP nominee George Bush in the general election in November.

The only other county race saw incumbent Precinct 4 commissioner Alton Brazzell go into a runoff with Pauline Jacobo. Brazzell had only a slight edge of about 130 votes over his next opponent in the four-man race.

Vote totals in Slaton showed Box 36 with 187 ballots; box 37 with 251, and Box 38 with 238, all in the Demo primary. The Republican vote here totaled 30 for all three boxes. The local GOP vote was strong for nominee Bush in the senatorial

race, and Paul Eggers in the governor's race.

The vote tallied slightly more than 1.4 million in Texas, with only one runoff election seen as a possibility. Justice James Denton was within 1,534 votes of winning a seat on the Texas Supreme Court without a runoff, the Election Bureau reported Tuesday.

The only other surprise in the state voting, to some observers, was the victory by "unknown" Bob Armstrong as land commissioner over Jerry Sadler.

IN JOINT MEETING

Zoning Request Is Turned Down

Slaton City Commission and its Zoning Board announced they were "in accord" in denying a request for a variance in the zoning at 700 W. Division, it was announced Tuesday by City Sec. Alex Webb.

The combined meeting came Tuesday morning on short notice, with no news media notified in time to attend the session.

The action followed two controversial hearings--one at a zoning board meeting on April 6, the other at the city commission meeting Monday night. The two bodies apparently decided to deny the "spot zone" change due to the number of citizens who opposed the move.

M. W. Kerr, owner of the property in question, had filed the request to change the property from B-1 to B-2 so that a car lot and office could be located at 700 W. Division. The area is zoned for some commercial

businesses -- such as grocery stores, drive-in cafes--but not a car lot.

Bill Adams Olds - Pontiac, proposed lessee, had written letters to citizens in the neighborhood outlining his plans to upgrade the appearance of the property.

The zoning board had approved the request at the April 6 hearing, and citizens appealed the decision to the city commission. A petition protesting the zone change had been signed by 25 citizens, and about 8 or 9 appeared at the commission meeting Monday night.

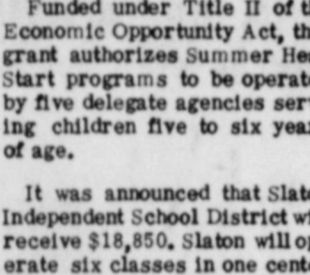
Speaking against the zone change were O. E. Lankford, Mrs. F. T. Longtim and Mrs. Carter Shaw. The only resident of the area to speak for the change was Bob Brasfield.

Lankford said he knew the street was zoned for B-1 businesses when he bought his property, and "we'll be happy to go along with any B-1 business at the location." He said he felt the car lot would be a traffic hazard and "devalue" adjoining property.

Mrs. Longtim pointed out that residents had nothing against the men requesting the change, "we just don't want a used car lot in the neighborhood." She felt such a business would be likely to draw more prowlers, and also pointed out the possibility of a traffic hazard.

Mrs. Shaw requested that the minutes of the zoning board hearing be read, and the letter which the city sent to property owners in the area. Mayor Hughes then read the requested items. She said the "spot zone"

Pre-Schoolers Register At Wilson School

Parents of children who will enter the first grade in the Wilson Public Schools next year are requested to meet in the Wilson High School Auditorium at 9 a.m., Tuesday, May 12, Dale Sides, elementary principal, will discuss procedures of the school in relation to beginning first graders and answer questions parents may have concerning the school program.

Parents are asked to bring a birth certificate and health record of their children. The health record should indicate the immunization shots or the childhood diseases the children have already had, such as chicken pox, measles, mumps, etc.

Receiving \$10,852, Roosevelt Rural High School will operate three classes in one center serving 46 children from June 8 to July 31 five days a week, four and one-half hours a day. Also involved are six teachers, three other professionals, nine non-professionals, and 60 volunteers.

Receiving \$6,706, New Deal Independent School District is operating two classes in one center serving 30 children from April 6 to May 29 five days a week, four and one-half hours a day. Also involved are two teachers, one other professional, six non-professionals, and six volunteers.

Receiving \$175,554, Lubbock Independent School District will operate 60 classes in 12 centers serving 900 children from June 6 to August 5 five days a week, four and one-half hours a day. Also involved in the program are 60 teachers, 17 other professionals, 125 non-professionals, and 180 volunteers.

Receiving \$6,830, Shallowater Independent School District will operate two classes in one center serving 30 children from June 8 to July 31 five days a week, five hours a day. Also involved are two teachers; one other professional, six non-professionals, and six volunteers.

Services for John W. Bagby, 67, were held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Bruce Parks, pastor officiating, assisted by the Rev. Johnnie Moore of the First Christian Church.

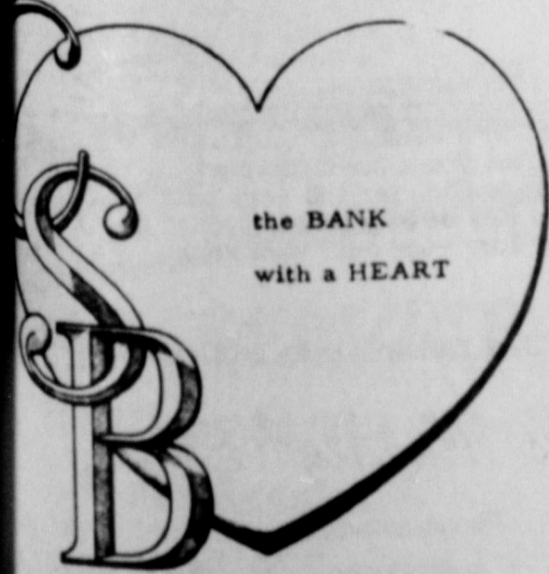

permission to install a traffic light at 9th and Division, and take one down at 9th and Lynn.

The highway department approved the removal of the light at 9th and Lynn, but said further study would be required for the light at 9th and Division. Since 9th street is a state highway through the city, the highway department must approve the traffic changes.

The authorization for the mayor to sign the golf course contract was a formality, as the change in management has already taken place. Commissioners reviewed the contract, which had several changes. One provision allows the city to call for excess water if the need ever arises.

City Sec. Alex Webb read a letter from an out-of-town property owner who wanted to pay two years of past due taxes if the city would waive the penalty and interest charges. City Atty. Harvey Morton reported the city could not legally do this. No action was taken.

Constable Allen Meurer was at the meeting and requested the city check out the flashing school zone lights, which were reported out of order at times. Another citizen requested a stop sign be placed at 4th and Floyd. Mrs. A. R. Abare appeared at the meeting to protest policemen checking the driver's license of persons who were passengers but not driving a car.

During the commissioner reports, Neill said a citizen had complained to him about the city ambulance driving at an excessive speed and lights flashing when not on an emergency run. A check of the records on the day in question showed that the ambulance was on emergency run with a heart patient. There was no further discussion.

On another matter, it was reported that Harry Stokes felt the city had charged him too much for air-hammer work the city was requested to perform. He was billed for \$190, and the city secretary said the \$10 an hour fee was considered low. Neill said he thought the plumber involved in the job should have been the one to pay the city bill, rather than the property owner, since he was supervising the job. He suggested the bill be reduced to \$60, and the commissioners approved the motion. Mayor Hughes then suggested that the city not perform this type work, pointing out the city had a policy against commercial jobs.

Floyd Guelker reported another complaint concerning rats around some property in his ward. Another complaint was also received on a resident in Ward 4 who has no toilet facilities and throws waste materials in his yard. He had been warned to correct the situation and reported he was moving. Webb reminded citizens who desire to appear before the commission to report their business three days prior to the second Monday of each month. State Law now requires that notice of the meeting is posted with the agenda of matters to be discussed.

Ohnemus pointed out some of the reasons people are confused. "Being on pot means something entirely different today than when I was a boy," he gave as one illustration.

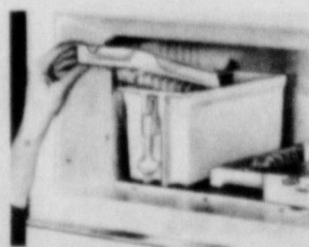

FHA Aids Housing In Rural Areas

A new program to help develop homebuilding sites in towns and countryside of the rural United States has been launched by the Farmers Home Administration, a Department of Agriculture credit agency, James V. Smith, Administrator, announced today.

Loans will be made to local public agencies and private non-profit organizations to buy and develop land as homesteads for sale to rural people of low and moderate income. The program was authorized in the Housing Act of 1969.

Mr. Smith said the program "is another step forward in solving the enormous problem of inadequate housing in rural areas, where we find half of all the bad housing in the United States."

"In many rural communities, adequate homesteads served by roads and utilities must be developed before modern housing can be supplied. This new program will enable rural communities to ease their problem of homestead development, either through their local public agencies or through private non-profit organizations devoted to that purpose."

Under terms of the program as outlined by Administrator Smith, the agency can lend qualified agencies or organizations up to \$100,000 for buying and developing tracts that can be sold as homesteads within two years. Sites may be sold to applicants who qualify for loans from the Farmers Home Administration and Department of Housing and Urban Development to build housing for rural people of low or moderate income. Sites developed under the program can be used for individual family-owned homes or for rented or cooperative housing.

Development organizations may use homestead loan funds to buy and clear land, build improvements such as access roads, streets and utility installations, and pay other costs involved in the development of the sites. A project will be scaled to the immediate need for homesteads of modest cost in a rural locality.

Development organizations will be expected to repay their loans within two years from proceeds of the sale of lots. The interest rate usually will be 6-1/4 per cent, a 3 per cent rate will be charged on loans to develop sites for sale to families building homes by the self-help plan. Under this plan low income families do much of the actual work of building new homes for themselves by the mutual exchange of labor.

Mr. Smith said that assistance in developing projects and

applying for loans will be offered through the 1,700 local county offices of the Farmers Home Administration located throughout the rural United States. The agency administers housing credit for both farm and non-farm rural people, including those living in rural towns of 5,500 population or less.

It is a fascinating time to be in the Law Enforcement profession. In a time of change, confusion, revolt, we are on the front lines. People who have been scornful of, or hostile to law enforcement are becoming genuinely interested in it.

Here is an excerpt from the resolution on law enforcement passed in the spring of 1969 by Americans for Democratic action: "We realize that during the past decade, the job of the police has become enormously complex and demanding. We ask them to be guardians of our peace, counselors of our troubled youth and troubled couples, recreation workers, traffic engineers, specialists in alcoholism, drug addiction, race relations, and community organization, and the ultimate weapon against rebellious students and rebellious blacks.

"The police are charged with more complex and delicate human decisions than any other professional group. Yet demanding so much of them, we continue to treat them like semi-skilled servants. Law enforcement is not a brutal, distasteful job to be relegated to men frustrated by isolation. Law enforcement is our responsibility, and the police are our guardians of our civil liberty."

When the ADA passes a resolution like that, can anyone doubt that we are getting our case across to the American people?

Bob Kral, SCS District Conservationist, has identified some of the more prominent species. The large yellow and white types (commonly called "buttercups") are Evening primrose (Oenothera spp.).

"We all recognize the great beauty of these flowers, but they have a very practical use as well," Kral noted. "This is nature's way of protecting soil from the driving wind and rain. Erosion along roadsides and abandoned areas would be quite a problem without this plant cover."

"Since they are neither a true buttercup nor a primrose, the name is a bit confusing," Kral said. "Buttercup is probably as good a name as any, but a different flower that grows

Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall have no dates.

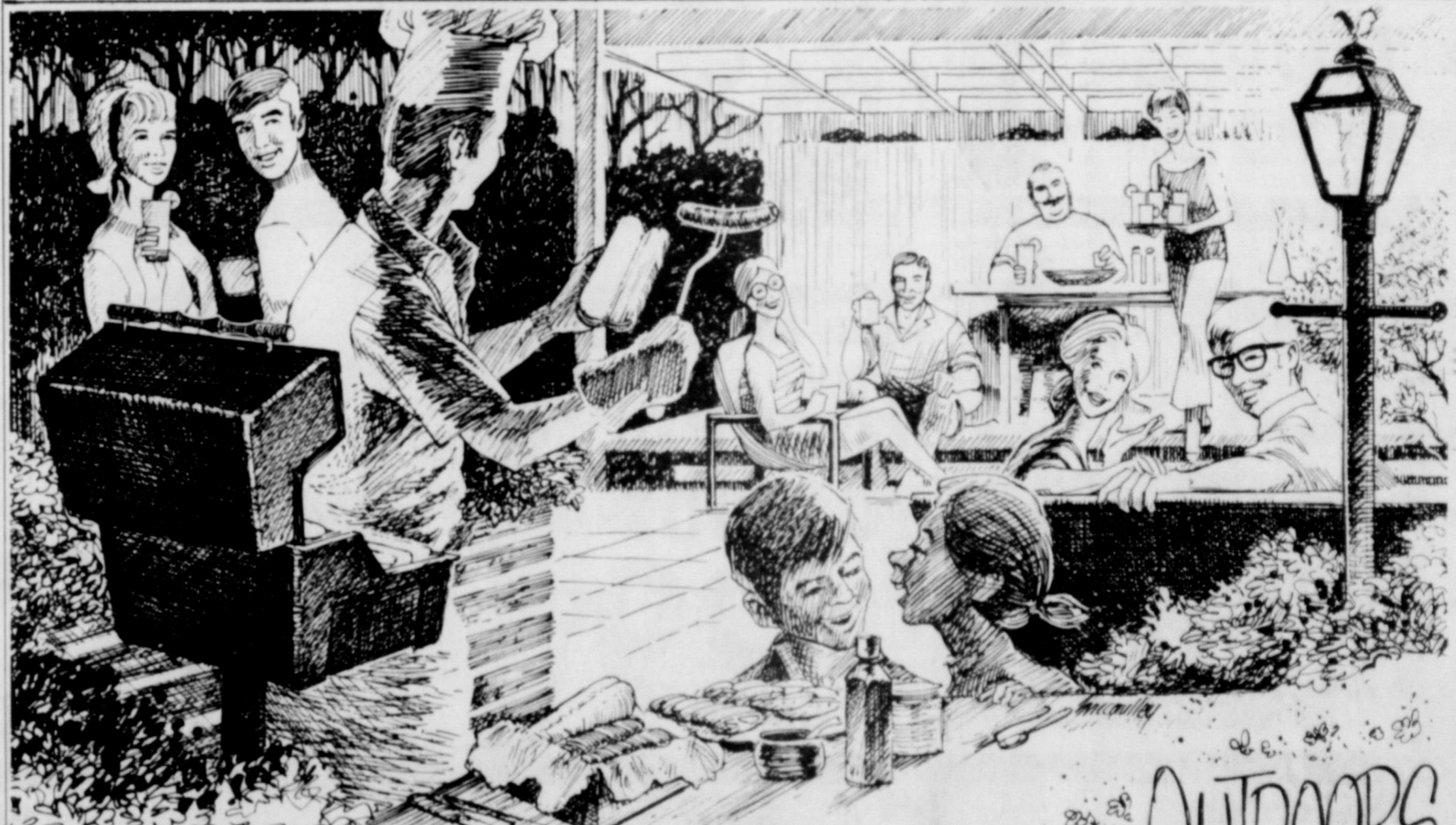
