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# County Republicans Back Nixon Policies

Lubbock County Republicans in convention Saturday resolutely endorsed "President Nixon's efforts to win a just and honorable peace in Vietnam, including the Cambodian operation."

The GOP forces seated 163 registered delegates and named 48 delegates to the state convention set Sept. 15 in Fort Worth. Among the state delegates named were three from Slaton—Bill Klattenhoff, Claud Cravens and Ted Swanner.

The convention also passed resolutions endorsing forthright expressions used by Vice President Spiro Agnew, commended the "tireless efforts" of Sen. John Tower, and called for "all Republicans and conservatives" to band together to elect George Bush as U.S. senator from Texas.

The convention voted down a resolution under a law and order proposal to provide for more legal safeguards in controlling demonstrations and riots. Those against the proposal said laws were already on the books to handle the situations and urged stronger enforcement of existing statutes.

Despite objection, a resolution was passed that asked for the censure of U.S. Sen. William Fulbright for "improper conduct" in going beyond the limits of honorable dissent.

With a touch of humor, the convention laughed but voted down a resolution from Precinct 34 that "Daylight Saving Time" be disregarded in the precinct and residents there be allowed "to set watches and clocks as they please."

Dr. James Reynolds was chosen chairman of the convention, Joe M. Greenlee acted as temporary chairman.

A resolution labeling forced busing of public school students as "breeding racial discord" and calling for open registra-

tion in the Lubbock Public School system at the school of the pupil's choice was adopted by the county Republicans. The Rev. Jerry Bryan of Amarillo was a guest speaker at the convention.

## GOP Honors Klattenhoff

The name of W. J. (Bill) Klattenhoff of Slaton will be included on the Republican Memorial that has been placed at the Gettysburg Memorial site, it was announced this week by nation GOP officials.

The memorial was commissioned in 1952 commemorating those Republican National Delegates and alternates who were "entrusted with the awesome powers of decision which have so profoundly influenced the course of the Republican Party and world events."

Klattenhoff has been generally recognized as "Mr. Republican" in Slaton for many years. At the county convention this week, he was again named as a delegate to the state GOP convention.

# Liberals Gain Strength In County Demo Meet

Liberals gained a big voice in the Lubbock County Democratic Convention Saturday after a "test vote" saw liberal candidate Mrs. Marvin McClary Jr. win the convention secretary's post over Beverly Kercheval of Slaton, nominated by moderates.

Although the liberals turned the convention toward the left, they didn't get everything they wanted. The test vote on the secretary wound up on a count of 656 to 611, and the convention was evenly divided -- as reflected by the defeat of two resolutions.

One resolution supported President Nixon's actions in Southeast Asia, while the other called for "termination of our commitments" there. The liberal forces had a stronger voice on the important resolutions committee, however, and gained control of the committee to select delegates to the state convention.

The convention elected 116 delegates to the state convention, including four from Slaton -- Miss Kercheval, Max Arrants, R. F. Stansell and Father Emilio Abeyta.

Under an agreement made prior to the convention, County Chairman Madison Sowder announced that the test vote for

convention strength would be on the election of the secretary. He also tabbed the candidates as liberal and conservative. Ralph Brock, who nominated Miss Kercheval, asked that her backers be called "moderates", rather than conservative.

There were approximately 475 persons attending the county convention. Sowder requested that each delegate's vote be counted in direct proportion to the number of delegates present, rather than using the unit rule.

There was much discussion on the two defeated resolutions concerning the U.S. position in Southeast Asia. The one pledging support of President Nixon was defeated on a voice vote, with the chairman calling the vote twice before ruling.

There was more maneuvering on the resolution to terminate the nation's commitment in Indochina, but the resolution was defeated by a vote of 642 to 583.

The convention also: --Approved a motion of "appreciation" to Sen. Ralph Yarborough, of a weak voice vote.

--Approved, on a close vote, a resolution that no person be elected a delegate to the national party convention who

did not support the nominee for President --Called for delegates at precincts in 1972 from among attending the convention choosing others who are not enough present

--Approved resolution for a study in the basis of taxation of government, placed to all Demo candidates, and calling attention of discriminating places.

--Endorsed lowering age to 18, on a vote, and approved a that would make a first offense of marijuana a misdemeanor instead of a felony.

--Endorsed a "down" version of an effective law which respects due the rights of individuals.

--Endorsed the Federal act of 1968, a move Precinct 5 into the Central Fire Station.

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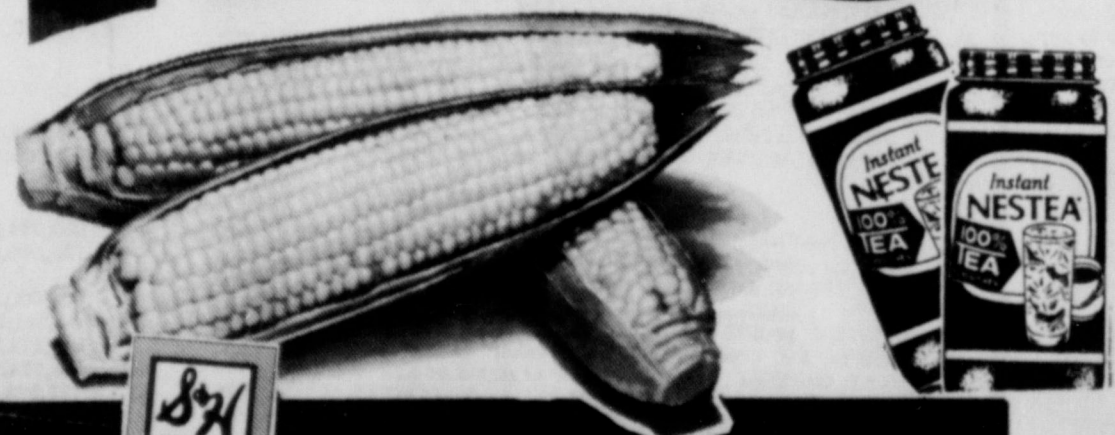

# Swine Industry Growing..

(Sp) -- Swine production is expanding rapidly in the South Plains, according to the May issue of Agriculture, official publication of the Texas Farm Bureau. The South Plains has traditionally been a two-crop producing area, mainly cotton and sorghum.

Gilbert Hillis, area swine specialist at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock as saying that prognosticators predict that 40 per cent of the total production of swine in the state will be on the High Plains by 1975.

attributes the growing interest in swine production in the area to the abundance of grain sorghum produced there, the relatively bleak outlook for cotton, and the favorable price of hogs for the past couple of years, according to the article. Texas Agriculture points out that there is a tremendous market potential for hogs in Texas. In 1969, a total of

1,496,000 head were produced in the state, and about 6,000,000 head were consumed. So Texas is producing only about 25 per cent of the pork consumed in the state.

grain is being fed to livestock, the state is still exporting grain and importing slaughter hogs and packaged pork. Specialists foresee a continued trend toward larger, more specialized pork production units and more confinement operations going in on a corporation basis. Minimal investment in physical facilities and equipment for a partially-confined farrow-to-finish system is in the neighborhood of \$600 per sow unit. Utilizing more sophisticated equipment and adding the investment in the breeding herd could run these

costs as high as \$1,000 per sow unit, Texas Agriculture explains. The total cost of producing pork is somewhere between 19¢ and 20¢ per pound, and hogs have been selling in the area at around 27¢ and 28¢ per pound, leaving a comfortable profit margin.

Yarbrough visited two of the newer installations on the South Plains and describes them in the article. They are the operations of the Plainview Pig Producers, Inc., of Plainview and the Brownfield Swine Producers, Inc., near Brownfield.

The Plainview facility will produce 40-pound feeder pigs to be fed out by local feeders, while the Brownfield plant is a farrow-to-finish operation. When completed, the Plainview Pig Producers, Inc., production center will have a capacity of 400 sows. Brownfield Swine Producers, Inc., now has 120 sows and will grow to a 600-sow plant. Both are totally confined, disease-free installations.

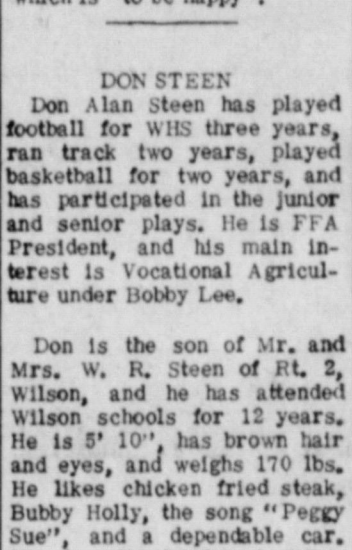

Roosevelt Coach Houston Powell -- who had to be more pleased than anyone -- said the new track was a big factor in the Eagles winning the District 4-A track title this spring. "Our participation in the track program doubled over the previous year," he pointed out, jumping from about 20 team members to 42 this season.

Powell had high praise for booster club members and other individuals of the area around the rural school district. He pointed out that all the labor and much of the materials were donated for the big project. Primary cost was for the cinders--some 315 tons at a cost of about \$3,000.

The project was financed through donations from boosters, receipts from football program sales, benefit cake auction and basketball game, and major receipts from football program sales, benefit cake auction and basketball game, and major contributions of material and equipment from Acuff and McClung co-op gins, and Ray Dickey Lumber Co.

While looking over the new track, Coach Powell was also quick to mention the volunteer labor from men in the community, including a major rock-moving job by students. Powell pointed to a huge rockpile south of the track where RHS students had moved rocks out of the base for the track.

"Just think of the man-hours those students put into moving those rocks out of the caliche base," he emphasized. Powell didn't say much about it, but the coaching staff also put in a lot of volunteer hours on the facility.

The Eagle coach said the project started the second week in December and was completed about March 1--just in time for the track and field season. He estimated the turn-key cost of a 7-lane cinder track like this one at about \$26,000.

The school already had an inside concrete curb around the football field, giving the boosters something to start on. Necessary grading and dirt work had to be accomplished, and the outside curb installed, before the cinders were put down. The cinders were shipped by rail from Idalou, trucking the cinders from Idalou to the Roosevelt school was also handled by volunteers.

Roosevelt school supporters are justifiably proud of their track -- a fine facility for a Class A school. It will still be one of the better tracks in the district when Roosevelt moves up to Class 4-AA this fall. The Eagles will be in the district with Slaton following a University Interscholastic League realignment this year.

The new district will include Roosevelt, Ralls, Idalou, Slaton, Post, Tahoka, Denver City and Frenship.

Jimmy Rogers, Slaton High's only entrant in the state track meet, won a sixth place in the pole vault Friday with an effort of 13 feet.

Rogers' best effort of the season was a 13-6 vault in the regional track meet. The state title was won by Terry Porter of Azle who cleared 14 feet, 3 inches. Mark Gilstrap of Snyder was fifth at 13-3.

Lubbock Estacado won the state team title in Class AAA by taking first in both relay events. The Matadors had 43 points, compared to 32 for runner-up Gainesville.

Track coach Gene Franklin and athletic director Ernie Davis accompanied Rogers to the state meet in Austin.

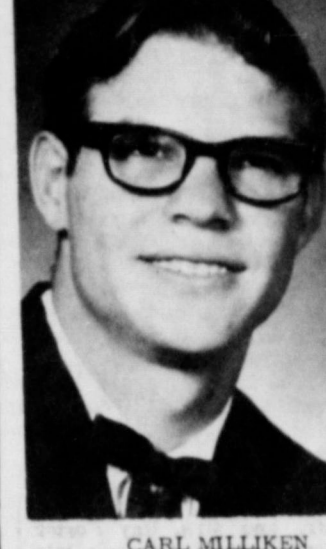

The fatality marked the first traffic fatality in Slaton so far this year and the 19th for Lubbock County.

In 1956, Harrison, who served under eight police chiefs, was patrolman of the department. He was presented an award at a city employes banquet that year.

Harrison was born in Indian Territory (Oklahoma), but had lived most of his life in Texas.

He came to Lubbock from Tahoka in 1939.

His retirement from the police department was in January 1964. At that time, police officials said: "Homer was never reprimanded or called on an assignment during his 24 years of service."

Since his retirement, Harrison had been employed as a security officer at Citizens National Bank.

Survivors include a brother, Ernest Harrison of Clovis; and three sisters, Mrs. Ethel Jones of Slaton, Mrs. Beulah Berry of Miami, and Mrs. Cleo Garner of Randolph.
