Tigerettes Meet Squaws in Playoffs

Slaton's Tigerettes take their state playoff hopes to the Texan Dome in Levelland Monday night, clashing with the Friona Squaws in the first round of the regional playoffs.

Game time is 7:30 p.m. in the Dome at South Plains College, and The Slatonites this week urges all fans to observe Monday as "Tigerette Day" and wear red to the game Monday night.

With Slaton School Board and the Slaton C of C asking for a time to salute the girls, a big pep rally has been scheduled for 11:30 Monday morning at the SHS Gym. The public is invited to attend the rally.

Slaton Chamber of Commerce this week arranged for a charter bus, or buses, to

take fans to Levelland. Anyone desiring to ride the bus should make reservations with the Chamber office, 828-6238. Tickets are \$2 each.

The Tigerettes finished 4-AA action Friday night at Frenship with an unblemished league record, blasting the Frenship team by 78-20 and posting a 12-0 mark in the district. Marilyn Meeks pumped in 32 points in the victory, and Sue Brake and JaNette Gass added 17 and 10 points to the scoring attack.

The Tigerettes had a practice game with Meadow Tuesday night and lost a close 64-63 overtime decision to the top-rated Class B team. The game was played at Meadow, and Slaton lost it at the free-throw line where

Meadow hit 26 of 36 shots to Slaton's 15 of 22. Slaton had 24 field goals to 19 for the home team.

The Tigerettes had a balanced scoring attack against Meadow, with Brake taking scoring honors on 28 points. Gass hit for 22 and Meeks chipped in 13. Meadow was led by Johnnie Turner with 27, and the other two forwards had 24 and 13 points. The score was tied at 33 at halftime, and Meadow led by 50-46 going into the final quarter. The score was tied at 61 at the end of regulation play. Brake got a basket in the overtime, but Turner hit a basket and a free shot for the

Coach, Principals' Pacts Extended

City Calls Annual Election, Buys Two New Vehicles

In an eventful monthly session Monday night, Slaton School Board approved contract extensions for the athletic director and principals, approved slight salary increases for the two head basketball coaches, approved employment of a new business manager, and set the trustee election for April 3.

The contract extensions were for one year, giving the principals and coach three-year pacts. The five new holding renewed three-year contracts are M. W. Kerr, high school principal; Ernie Davis, athletic director; James Perkins, junior high; T.C. Martin, west ward, and Virgie Hunter, S.F. Austin.

The employment of Edwin Knight, who started to work Feb. 1, as business manager and tax assessor - collector, was approved by the board. He replaces Buford Duff, who resigned to take a post with the Berger schools.

The annual school election was called for Saturday, April 3, with two seats on the board coming up for election. Terms of Don Kendrick and Tommy Davis expire in April. Davis is the current board president and both are winding up consecutive three-year terms. They have not announced if they will seek re-election. Ted Swamer was named as election judge.

On the recommendation of Supt. J. C. McClesky, basketball coaches Kenneth Housden and Gay Benson drew slight salary increases of \$250 a year. McClesky said head coaches of the two major sports -- football and basketball -- customarily draw more pay than other coaches in the system. Coach Benson has varsity, jun-

ior varsity and freshmen girls' teams.

In other business, the board Monday night heard two citizens' request for employment of more black teachers, okayed a band trip to the State Fair this fall, and approved monthly bills.

Mrs. Inez Petty and Jack Walker were the two citizens appearing to voice a request for more black teachers. Walker said he would especially "like to see a black teacher in high school who could also serve as a counselor for black students."

Walker claimed there were "tensions" in high school. "We know some of our black students have a chip on their shoulder," admitted Walker, "but I believe we need a black teacher to straighten out some of the problems," he added.

At this point, several of the board members said the school apparently had more of a discipline problem at junior high than at high school. They said many parents had complained of bad situations arising at junior high.

Trustee Emilio Abeyta told the two citizens that he sympathized with their concern, adding that "Mexican-Americans are also having problems, and I think we need a Mexican - American teacher, too."

Board president Kendrick, after discussing the problem with the trustees and Supt. McClesky, told the pair that "we will attempt to place a qualified black teacher in the system when the opening exists. During the discussion, it was mentioned that a black coach might be desirable if a vacancy occurred, and if a qualified man could be found to come to Slaton."

McClesky pointed out that the

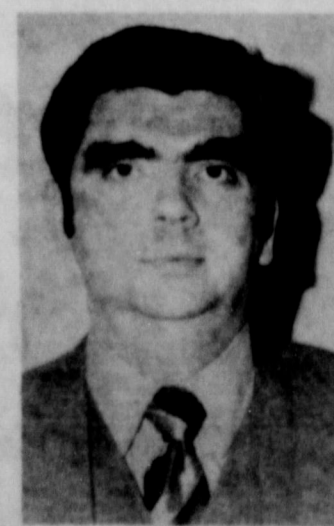
School Business Manager Named

Knight's employment with the schools was effective Feb. 1.

Former Mayor First Candidate To Announce

Former mayor Jonas Cain Tuesday became the first candidate to toss his hat in the ring for city elections when he filed as a candidate for the mayor's post.

Slaton City Commission had set the municipal election during a meeting Monday night. It will be held on Saturday, April 3--a change from the customary Tuesday election day for the city.

Three offices will be up for election in the city government. Mayor David Hughes has not announced his intentions as yet. Terms also expired for city commissioners in Wards 1 and 3. Incumbents are J. S. Edwards in Ward 1 and Floyd Guelker in Ward 3.

Candidates have until 30 days before the election to file for a city office, so the deadline will be March 3. Absentee voting will start on March 15.

Tiger Club Elects Taylor

Pat Taylor was named as incoming president of Tiger Club when the adult booster organization elected new officers last week.

Taylor, who farms south of Slaton, will succeed Jack Schuetz as president. Clinton Eastman, pastor of Westview Baptist Church, was elected as vice president, and Speedy Nieman was named secretary - treasurer.

Other outgoing officers include Bob Fondy, vice president, and Bud Englund, secretary - treasurer. The new officers are installed each year at the Tiger Club's All-Sports Banquet.

Club officials are now making plans for the annual banquet, which has tentatively been scheduled for March 13.

Slaton City Commission approved bids on two vehicles during a regular monthly meeting Monday night, heard a report from Cemetery Board president Ted Swamer, called the annual city election for April 3, and discussed several other items of business.

The commission chose to change the traditional Tuesday election date to Saturday this year, setting the election on the first Saturday in April--the same date as the Slaton school election.

Terms expiring in the municipal governing body this year are those of the mayor and commissioners of Wards 1 and 3. Mayor David Hughes has

announced his intentions, but immediately filed as a candidate for mayor Tuesday.

The terms of J. S. Edwards, Ward 1, and Floyd Guelker, Ward 3, will conclude in April. Both are completing two-year terms in office.

The commission approved a low bid of \$2,156 for a police car Monday night. Bill Adams Olds-Pontiac took the bid on a 1971 Pontiac Catalina. The city is trading in a 1970 Chevrolet. Other bids on the vehicle were Smith Ford, \$2,195, and Tom Sims Chevrolet, \$2,163.

The commission also took low bid on a new truck for the sanitation department. Smith Ford won the contract with a bid of \$6,943. Other bids were Bill Adams, \$6,995, and Tom Sims, \$7,147. The city had two bids on the specially equipped bed for the garbage truck and decided on the higher bid of \$5,990 by Patton Equipment Co. The bid was on a Leach Packmaster bed, and officials were more familiar with the equipment. The other bid was for \$5,376 from Pak-More.

Ted Swamer, newly-appointed Cemetery Board member, appeared at the commission meeting to present proposed rules to be included in a new cemetery ordinance. The commissioners requested Swamer to work with City Atty. Harvey Morton in drafting the rules into a proposed ordinance and bringing it back to the commission for action. Swamer was recently named to the Cemetery Board to replace Cecil Scott, who resigned. It was reported by City Sec. Alex Webb.

It was the first announcement of a change in the Cemetery Board. Other members of the board are Mrs. Bill Smith and Mrs. August Kitten. Commissioners briefly discussed a proposed "comprehensive city plan" again, but took no definite action. The council did ask Webb to send a letter to the regional planner and request that he submit a proposed contract for the city's consideration.

Mayor David Hughes reported that C. L. Hatch, manager of Slaton Housing Authority, asked that the city send a request to the Federal government for 20

to 30 more units to be added here. The commission postponed a decision, deciding to study the matter further.

Atty. Morton presented a proposed "mobile home ordinance" to the commission for study and consideration. The commissioners had previously requested that such an ordinance be drafted.

The city was also presented with another ordinance request from the State Highway Department, proposing traffic control changes at the intersection of 9th and Division streets. The plan calls for a right-turn only

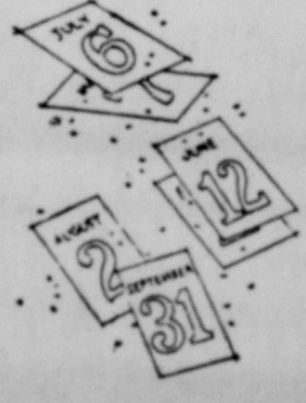

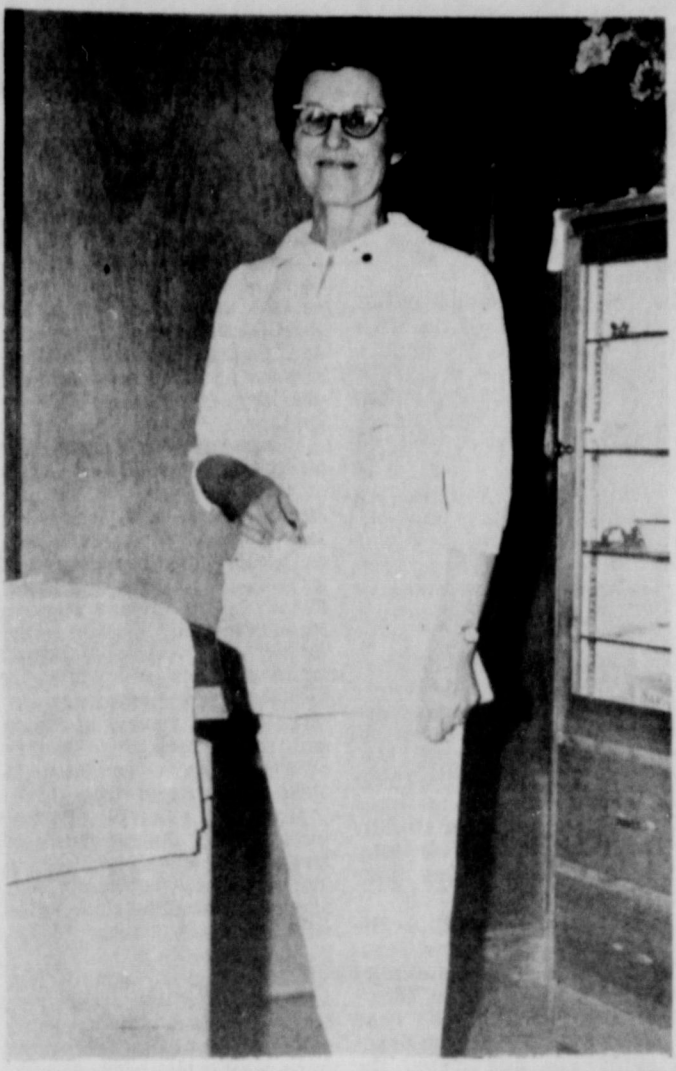

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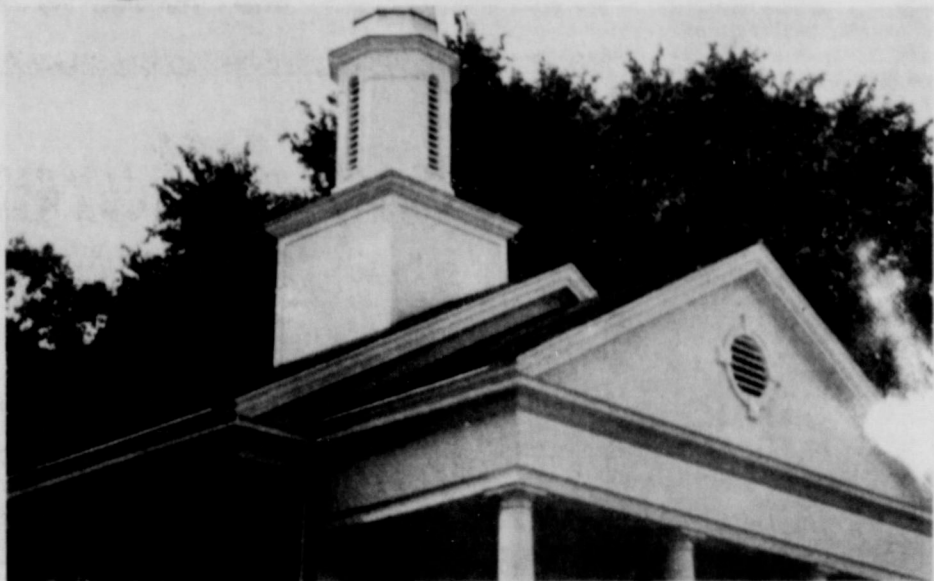

Sometimes we tend to forget, but we never do—not completely.

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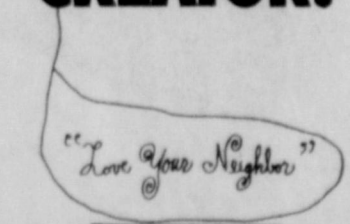

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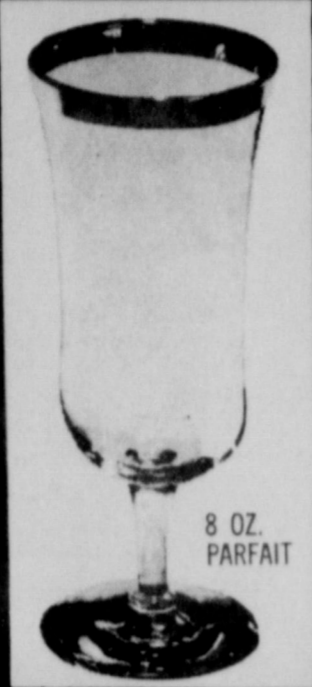

state rules on qualifications that a teacher must have to teach different subjects. He said the Slaton schools had only one black teacher apply last year. She was a home economics teacher and there was no vacancy there, he stated. He said no Mexican-American teachers applied last year, and pointed out that it was difficult to find them. Abeyta agreed that it was hard to locate these teachers, and to get them to come to Slaton.

McClesky reported to the board that the school had been approved for \$14,700 more in Emergency Assistance Act funds. These are funded for schools experiencing desegregation problems. The last grant came under health assistance, and the school employed another registered nurse and three aides. The school had previously received ESA grants of \$8,300 and \$10,000--making a total of \$33,000 under the program.

The superintendent also reported that a new school bus had been ordered and was to be delivered before June 30. The 72-passenger Dodge bus was purchased for \$7,739.

All seven trustees were present for the board meeting--Kendrick, Davis, Abeyta, Clark Self Jr., R. C. Hall, Bettye Burks, Joe Gamble.

The junior varsity team scored an easy 52-27 triumph at Meadow. Dru Ann Beard led the attack with 29 points, and Gretta Stricklin added 17. Slaton led by 27-11 at halftime.

Coach Gay Benson's fine Tigerette team ended the season with a 25-5 won-lost record, counting the Meadow game. Two of the losses were to the Wayland College Queen Bees, and other defeats came at the hands of Friona and Canyon.

Slaton met the Friona team in the Tulla Tournament in December, losing a close 47-43 decision. Friona, coached by F. G. Crofford, posted a 24-3 record for the season and won the 3-AA title. The Squaws lost to Spearman, Claude and Tulla during the season.

Time For New License Plates

It doesn't take "Pull" to obtain 1971 license plates. In fact, if you pull apart the three-part motor vehicle registration form mailed to you early this year by the Texas Highway Department it will make the process slower and unnecessarily complicated.

Even though the handy three-part form carries the warning "Do Not Separate or Detach Any Parts of This Notice" in large letters on the reverse side, many motorists are doing just that.

Highway Department officials and county tax officers report that many motorists in applying for license plates by mail detached only one part of the form and sent it in.

Department officials stress that the entire form must be mailed in or brought to the county tax office or substation. A stick down strip showing the new license number will be attached to all sections of the

form and the tax office will separate the form, returning the license receipt to the owner.

Motor vehicle owners still can obtain their 1971 license plates by mail if they send in the entire three-part form, their registration fee and \$1 for handling to their county tax officer during February. That allows the month of March for the application to be processed and the license plates returned before the April 1 deadline for displaying the new plates.

During the month of March, it will be necessary for owners to apply in person at the county tax office or substation for 1971 license plates.

In either case, owners will save themselves time and trouble by using the new computerized application. You won't need your title certificate or last year's registration receipt.

But, remember, leave the three parts of the registration application intact.

The Tigers lost a 64-55 game at Frenship Friday. Lloyd Kitten led Slaton in the losing cause with 20 points.

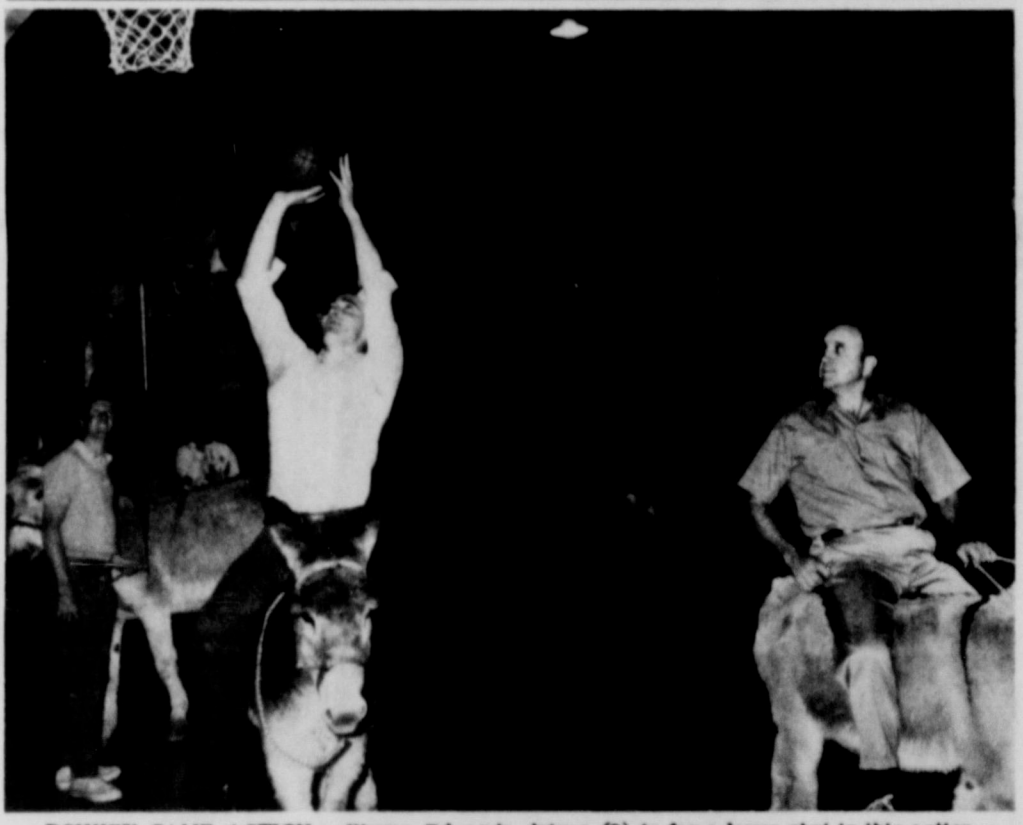

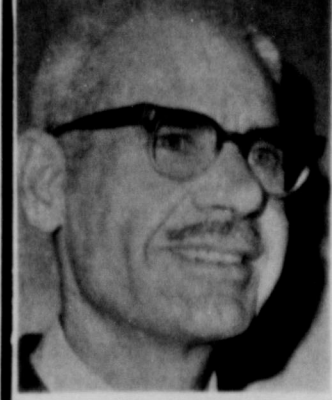

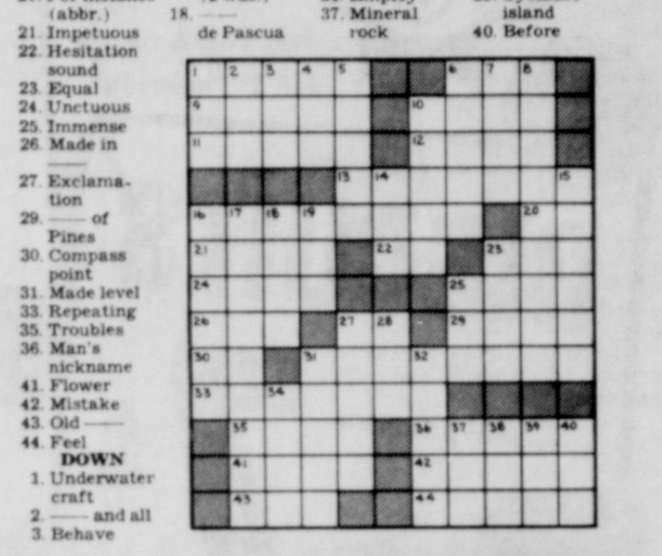
