Bale Count Passes 41,000 Mark

The cotton harvest in the Slaton area continued at a rapid pace under fair skies the past week, with 12 gins reporting a total of 13,357 bales ginned for the week.

The season's bale count total jumped to 41,331 bales with last week's addition.

The prospects of continued dry weather appeared good, but a new cold front was due in the area this morning. Forecasters said the front would be another dry one, with only the northern Panhandle having any chance for rain or snow.

A record low of 18 degrees was recorded for the season Sunday morning, but lows were mostly in the low 30's during the rest of the week. The high hit only 40 degrees Saturday, but climbed back to 78 degrees Monday.

The ginning output the past week was slightly below the previous week, due to a light drizzle last Friday. Some areas had their harvest interrupted more by rain and snow. However, the brief interruption enabled gins and the area classing offices to catch up on their backlogs of cotton to be ginned and classed.

The bale count made by THE SLATONITE the past week: Slaton Co-Op 9,000; Acuff Co - Op 5,200; Farmers Gin 3,382; Union Co-Op 3,430; Hackberry Gin 3,800; Wilson Co-Op 4,801; McClung Co-Op 2,720; Posey Gin 1,768; Wayside Gin 2,500; New Lynn Gin 2,000; Basinger Gin 1,230; Gatzki Gin 1,500. The U.S.D.A. classing offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland classed 215,000 samples during the week ending Friday, Nov. 13. Total classed so far this season now stands at 336,000. This is far ahead of the volume at the date last year when only 29,000 samples of the 1969 crop had been classed.

Estimates indicate that approximately one-half of this season's crop is now out of the fields.

Strict Low Middling was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 34 per cent of all cotton classed. Low Middling made up 8 per cent, Middling Light Spotted 18 per cent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 21 per cent.

Staple length improved slightly and averaged approximately 31/32. Sixty per cent stapled 31/32 and longer compared to 43 per cent the previous week.

Micronaire continued very good. Eighty - four per cent of all cotton classed at the Lubbock office last week had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9 and 7 per cent "miked" 5.0 and higher.

Ninety - three per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week had Pressley readings of 80,000 pounds and higher, compared to 88 per cent the previous week. Pressley is an indication of fiber strength and the most desirable Pressley reading is 80,000 pounds and above.

Trading increased on the Lubbock market but prices were \$2.50 to \$5 per bale lower.

Commission Still Studying Budget

Slaton City Commission, still working on the budget for 1970-71, has been holding a series of meetings with department heads, it was reported this week by City Sec. Alex Webb.

A group of businessmen attempted to meet with the commission Wednesday morning, when the commission was scheduled to discuss the police department budget. The group of six men left, however, when the closed-door meeting remained in session.

Mayor David Hughes later sent words of apology for keeping the group waiting too long. He explained the meeting lasted longer than he expected.

Slaton's junior varsity lost a 52-40 decision to the visitors, but the Tigerette freshman scored a 48-33 win over Canyon.

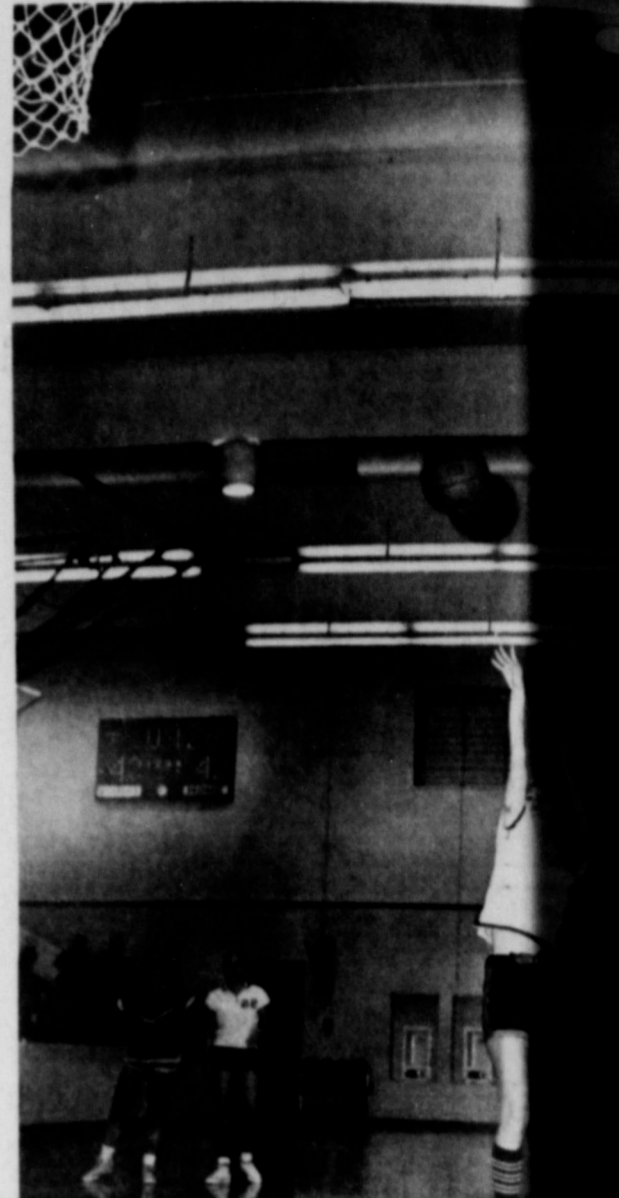

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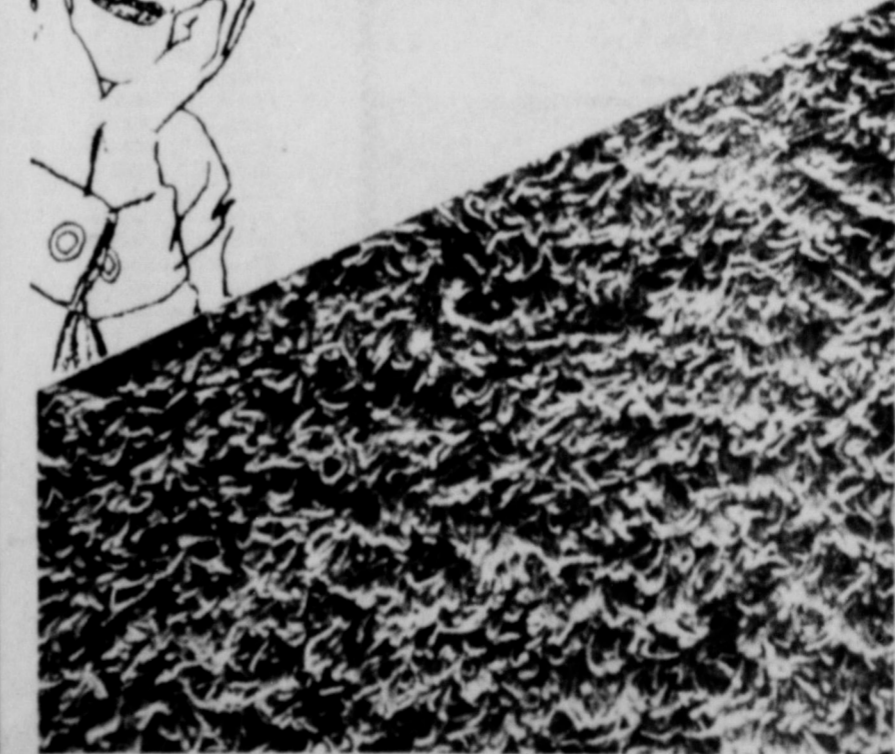

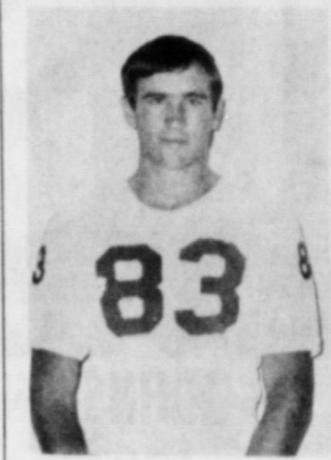

Tax Man Sam Sez:

April 15 is the deadline for filing your income tax return. If you owe additional taxes, waiting until April 15 might be good business.

However, on Jan. 1 about 2/3 of the taxpayers have a refund coming to them from Internal Revenue. The taxpayer can't file until Jan. 1 and Internal Revenue can't send out his refund until they get his tax return, Form 1040. The taxpayer must also wait until he receives his Form W-2 from his employer.

It is usually good business for all taxpayers to gather their records and figure their income tax as soon as possible after Jan. 1. Even if you owe money and don't have the money to pay, you need to know.

If you know or Jan. 2 that you will owe a lot of money on April 15 you can come a lot nearer raising the extra taxes owed than the fellow who waits until 11:59 p.m. on April 15 to figure his tax. It is always good business to find out where you stand as soon as possible.

Christmas Mailing Deadlines Are Near

Postmaster Rush Wheeler has urged residents of Slaton to remember that recommended mailing dates for civilian domestic Christmas mails start the first of December - only two weeks away.

It will be a big help to the local post office and insure fast and efficient delivery of parcels and cards if the following mailing dates are observed - Dec. 1, parcels for

distant states; Dec. 10, greeting cards for distant states; Dec. 11, parcels for local and nearby areas and Dec. 15, greeting cards for local and nearby areas.

There is still time to meet mailing deadlines required on military mail going overseas, as follows: Nov. 20 for "SAM" (space available mail) not weighing over five pounds; "PAL" (Parcel Air Lift) dead-

line is Nov. 27 for larger parcels overseas weighing up to 30 pounds for a flat \$1 per parcel plus the regular rate - much less than straight airmail service.

"SAM" Christmas parcels are charged only from here to embarkation points at the domestic rate though the parcel may be airlifted from that point anywhere in the world that our military personnel

are serving.

Several tips for efficient mailing of local and domestic articles are offered - all Christmas cards will again require six cent stamps, so you are asked to please seal them as the cost is the same as unsealed; remember the weight limit of 40 pounds and 78 inches in size, length and girth combined, for domestic parcels; address parcels on

only one side, preferably with felt pens, and use ZIP codes now required on all parcels. An address on a slip of paper inside packages is advisable. Separate "Local" and "Out of Town" Christmas cards and bundle with twine or rubber bands.

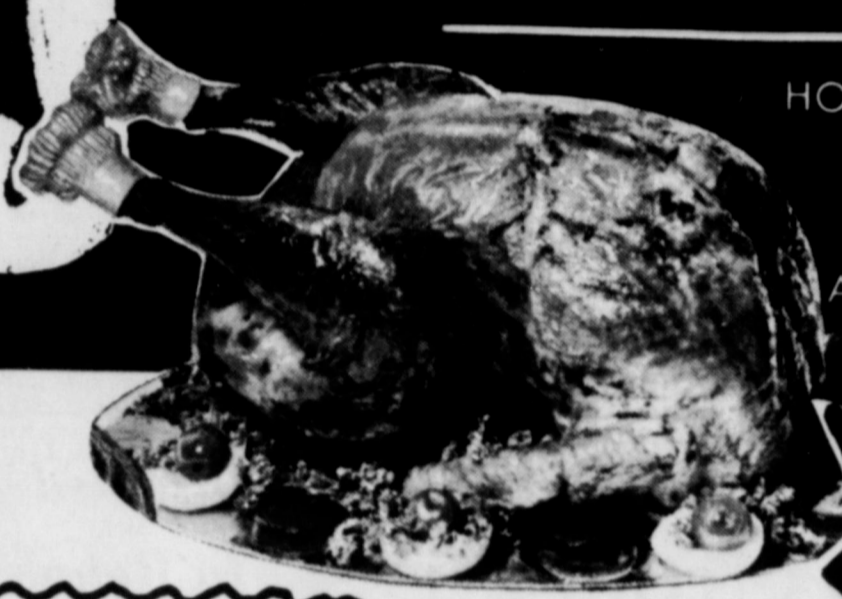
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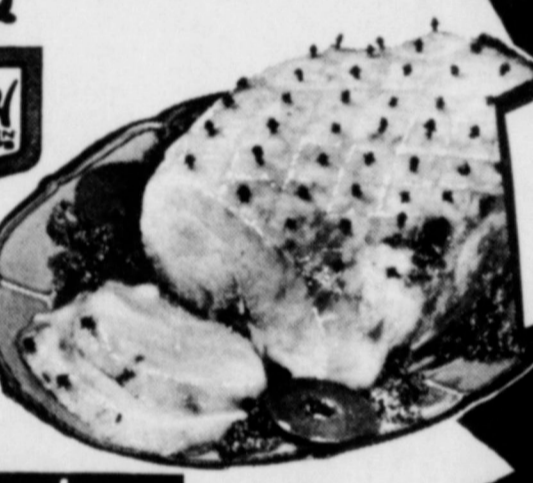
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Cooper Captures Crown, Dumps Seagraves, 21-8

WOODROW (Special)--Cooper's fired-up Pirates captured the District 5-A championship here Friday night, stopping the vaunted Seagraves Eagle attack while racking up a 21-8 victory.

The Pirates fought off two Seagraves' scoring threats in the final seven minutes of play, then drove 86 yards in 15 plays for the insurance touchdown.

The Pirates will advance into the playoffs Friday night, meeting the 6-A champion Van Horn team at Crane. Cooper and Van Horn officials met in Crane Saturday and agreed on the neutral site. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Friday at Crane.

Pirate coach Pete Hurst praised the "great defensive effort" by his team last week in stopping the big Seagraves attack. "We came out of the game in good physical shape, and I just hope we can get up mentally again this week," Hurst said. He reported that Van Horn was not as big as Seagraves, but had "an explosive and aggressive team."

Van Horn had an 8-1-1 record in winning the 6-A title. In last week's game for the 5-A crown, Cooper grabbed a 15-8 lead in the third period and then held off two Eagle scoring threats in the final quarter.

Cooper used a balanced ground and air attack to get its 21 points. Pirate quarterback Jack White hit 10 of 20 passes for 139 yards, and fullback Johnny Aleman led the rushing attack that netted 147 yards. Seagraves had a total of 197 yards, compared to Cooper's 286.

The Pirates had 16 first downs to 18 for the Eagles. Cooper was outwitted by an average of 20 to 40 pounds per man. Cooper finished the regular season with a 9-1 record--the only loss being a close 7-6 decision to AA Roosevelt in non-district play.

Cooper had recorded 7-3 seasons the past two years, but

Seagraves had captured district honors. This is Coach Hurst's fourth season at the helm of the Cooper football fortunes, and his teams have posted 26 wins and 14 losses. After a 3-7 mark the first year, the fortunes changed.

The probable offensive line-up for Cooper Friday night: ends Mike Bernea (180 soph.) and Gilbert Martinez (165 Sr.); tackles Keith North (200 Sr.) and David Angerer (155 Sr.); guards Gary Schaffner (190 Sr.) and Don Smith (150 Sr.); center Kenny Ehler (170 Sr.); quarterback Jack White (155 Sr.); fullback Johnny Aleman (175 Jr.); and running backs Jay Wimmer (145 Jr.) and Nathan Griffin (150 Sr.).

New faces on the defensive starting team include tackle Ken Cooper (180 Sr.), linebacker Kerry Crutcher (170 Jr.), and defensive backs Dennis Smith (160 Jr.) and Anthony Joplin (155 Sr.). Smith was back in the lineup last week after missing several games with an ankle injury.

In the big game last week, Cooper scored first when White connected with Aleman on a 16-yard touchdown pass. Crutcher's kick made it 7-0 with only 12 seconds left in the quarter.

Seagraves came roaring back with its potent ground attack led by Kent Crutcher, 198-pound fullback. He scored on a 14-yard run, then ran for two points to put the Eagles out front by 8-7 at halftime.

The Pirates cooled Crutcher's rushing attack in the third period, then White hit Martinez with a 42-yard pass to set up a score. Aleman tallied on a 2-yard plunge, and White passed to Bernea for two points to give Cooper a 15-8 edge with 4:28 left in the third quarter.

Seagraves drove to the Pirate 18 in the fourth period before the drive was stalled. After Cooper scored the insurance touchdown on a 1-yard plunge by Wimmer, the Eagles came back with a 57-yard pass play that carried to the Cooper 20. Martinez intercepted a pass, however, to kill that last threat.

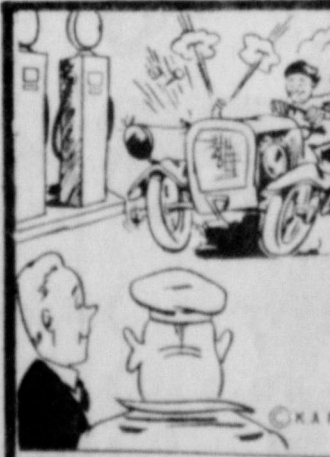

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Disabled Vets Are Enrolling In Rehabilitation Programs

The number of disabled veterans in vocational rehabilitation programs increased 29 percent in the last fiscal year--from 19,000 to 24,500 according to Jack Coker, Director of Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

Discussing a trend of generally higher enrollments since 1967, he noted that 750,000 disabled veterans have trained under the rehabilitation programs since World War II.

Coker said 16,749 disabled veterans were in training in April this year, the peak at this time. In the peak month of April last year, 12,179 participated in vocational rehabilitation programs.

Figures for both months include those who trained at college and below college level, and those who participated in on-the-job and on-the-farm training.

He also said 10,801 disabled veterans were in training in July, compared to 7,824 in July a year ago. The number of on-the-job trainees remained relatively unchanged at about 1,000 during the April through July period this year.

Coker explained that in addition to a monthly allowance, veterans in vocational rehabilitation programs also receive full tuition payment, books, supplies, and any equipment required in their training programs.

He urged disabled veterans interested in entering vocational rehabilitation programs to contact their nearest VA office. The VA office in Lubbock is located at 1612-20 Nineteenth Street.

CHICKEN OREGANO

Mrs. Alex Zotos, 3622 Maple, Odessa

Quarter 2 fryers. Wash and dry; and squeeze juice of one lemon over pieces. Salt, pepper and paprika chicken on both sides. In large skillet melt 1 stick butter and quickly brown chicken pieces. Place in oblong pan. In butter left in pan add 1/2 cup red wine, 1/2 can tomato paste (3 oz.), 2 cups water, 1 tablespoon celery flakes, 2 cloves garlic. Bring to boil. Pour over chicken. Sprinkle about 2 1/2 teaspoons oregano over chicken. Bake covered for one hour at 350 degrees; uncover last 10 minutes for browning.

Meat and Rice Dressing

Saute 2 onions, chopped, in 1/2 stick butter; add 1 cup uncooked rice; saute together until golden. Add 1 1/2 lbs. ground round and brown. Add 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon coriander, pepper to taste, 2 1/2 teaspoons salt, add 1/2 cup sliced mushrooms, 2 1/2 cups water and 1/2 cup red wine. Cook until done about 20 minutes. When cooked toss in toasted pecans and almonds, if desired. Serve sauce from chicken over all.

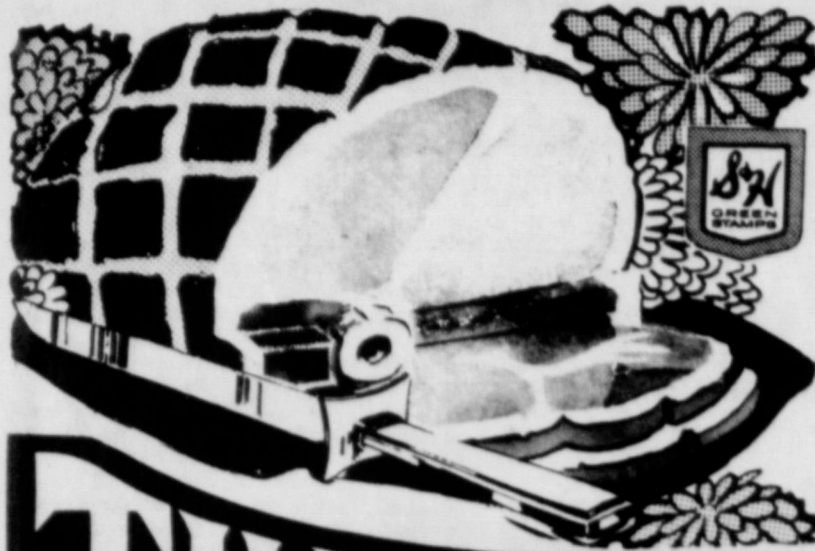
