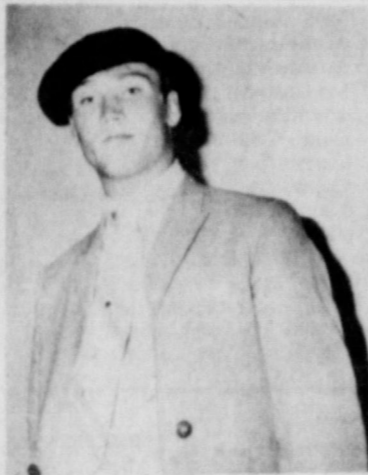
Showers Help, More Needed

Slaton and area residents sweated in temperatures over the 100-degree mark for five straight days the past week, before cloudy skies cooled things off Tuesday.

The high was only 93 degrees Tuesday under cloudy skies. Slaton had its first measurable rainfall in more than a month Saturday night, with most reports being about .25 of an inch. Heavier amounts were reported south and north of the city.

After a high of 104 degrees Saturday, the mercury climbed to 103 Sunday and made for an uncomfortable day with the high humidity.

A 20 percent chance of rain was forecast Wednesday afternoon, and area farmers were hoping for a general rainfall.



Highlights of Swedish Tour Told by Don Smith

Don Smith, who recently returned to Slaton after being a foreign exchange student to Sweden, reported the experiences and highlights of his trip to the sponsoring Slaton Lions Club Monday night.

"It was something else, and I can't thank the Lions Club enough for helping make it possible," he exclaimed during the special ladies - night Lions meeting Monday night at the Community Clubhouse.

Don, a May graduate of Slaton High and son of Mr. and Mrs. Elton Smith, was sponsored by the local Lions on the 38-day Scandinavian tour as part of the Slaton Lions Youth Exchange Program. He spent four weeks with his host family, the Leijons of Mora, Sweden. The tour also included stops at London, Paris and Rome.

Don presented the horse to the club here Monday night, and had a number of items on exhibit which he brought back from Sweden and other countries. One unlikely souvenir was a pack of Russian cigarettes given to him by a Japanese man in Paris!

In return, Don gave the man a pen and a key ring from Citizens State Bank. "I had a hard time getting him to take the gifts, because he kept saying they were too expensive."

And, while in Paris, Don found that he should not ask for directions to a "bathroom" unless he wanted to take a bath. The proper word, in most cases, was "toilet."

He was a little shocked, too, in Sweden to learn that the only difference in swimming and bathing was whether you wore a swim suit or not.

Don said his "father" in Sweden, Mr. Leijon, was about 49 and was manager of a power company. He and his wife have two sons and a daughter, and one of the sons was the same age as Don.

"They were an athletic and outdoors bunch," reports Don. He said he went hiking with the family a lot and picked wild strawberries. Mr. Leijon would run six miles to the swimming site, reported Don, who made the trip with him. The family's summer home had no running water, but did have electricity.

"I got cool enough for a fire in the evenings, and we spent a number of hours sitting in front of the fireplace talking," he said. Mrs. Leijon and her two sons could speak English fairly well, but the father and daughter were hard to converse with.

It probably varies with different families and in different areas, said Don, but he found many people did not seem too interested in religion. They are concerned with problems of the world, but don't seem to put much emphasis on religion, he added.

He said Swedes think Americans are "wasteful" with cars and gasoline. They think it's a waste to have big cars and use a lot of gasoline. The family with which he stayed pointed out that they buy a car to last 10 or 15 years, not two or three.

Don found another tradition which differs from America, and he liked this one. It seems the girl usually pays her own way to a dance or movie and meets the boy there. "Or, if you take them in a car, they think you've done your share and they try to buy you something."

His family was very impressed with Don's stories about playing football. An article in a Swedish newspaper dwelt to some lengths about the "football player from Texas."

Don thought his "family" in Sweden was great, the mosquitoes there the worst experience, and found Paris to be the most beautiful city he visited. He also found the 63 students in his group to be "tops", and they're planning a reunion as soon as possible.

There were just 17 boys in the group of 63, and Don recalls the young men had a tough time protecting the 46 girls in Rome--where the Italians are "very fresh" with women. He was not too impressed with Rome, thinking it "was a dirty city in comparison to Paris."

However, Don said the most "unfriendly city" he remembers from the trip was New York City. "The people in Paris were very friendly and tried to be helpful," he added.

Although his Swedish family

lived in Mora, they had a summer home in another village and this is where Don spent his time in Sweden. "Everybody seems to take summer trips and lots of places close up." He said the Lions Club did not meet while he was there, but the club president in Mora gave him a carved wooden horse to present to the Slaton club.

Registration for all grades is scheduled Aug. 19 in Slaton, where more than 1,700 students are expected to enroll for the new term.

At Roosevelt, high school students will pick up their schedules Aug. 20-21, and junior high registers Aug. 21. Grades 2-5 and first graders who have not pre-registered should bring their parents Aug. 19. An enrollment of slightly more than 1,000 is expected when classes start Aug. 24.

Registration is scheduled Aug. 20 at Cooper for the 7th through 12th grades. School starts Aug. 24 with about 1,000 students expected, including about 280 in high school.

Wilson holds registration Aug. 21 for high school and elementary students. Junior high will register the first day of school, Aug. 24. About 220 students are anticipated in elementary and 180 in junior high and high school.

All grades will register Aug. 21 at Southland, with classes starting Aug. 24. Some 170 students are expected.

Here in Slaton, St. Joseph's Catholic School will register students Aug. 20 and start classes Aug. 21.

Students may not have given it much thought yet, but preparations for the 1970-71 school term are well underway and the first day of classes is only two weeks away for Slaton youngsters.

First day of school is scheduled Thursday, Aug. 20 in Slaton, while the first bell rings on Monday, Aug. 24 for public school students in Roosevelt, Cooper, Wilson and Southland. The five schools are expected to enroll about 4,500 students.

The early school bells result from state requirements -- which added five days of classes for students and 10 more duty days for the teachers. Besides the extra five school days, teachers are required to have another five days of in-service training.

Teachers go on a 10-month pay schedule this year and receive a pay raise, which averages about \$1,050 per year per teacher.

Several county and area schools will have teachers participating in an academic workshop Aug. 17-18, and local teachers will also have in-service training Aug. 19 and 22. Local meetings, orientation of new teachers and pre-registration is set for Slaton teachers Aug. 19, Saturday, Aug. 22, is set aside for teacher meetings on insurance, retirement, and professional organizations.

County To Test Budget Control

Lubbock County Commissioners agreed Tuesday to retain the present 78 cents per \$100 valuation tax rate and mapped plans for a court test on the adult probation department budget.

Commissioner Max Arrants of Slaton revealed the action to THE SLATONITE Tuesday evening. He also said he firmly believed "we will win the court decision" concerning the controversial probation department budget.

The tax rate will not officially be set until September, after the public budget hearing on Sept. 28. However, members of the county court concurred on retaining the 78-cent tax rate.

Lubbock's district judges notified the commissioners Monday that they "insist" on their request for \$59,000 for the probation department. The commissioners had set a budget of \$45,000 for the department.

Commissioners will test an attorney general's ruling that the district judges control the adult probation budget. They think the court question will be whether or not a statute establishing the adult probation department can take away from them authority on how county money is spent.



Area Cotton Crop Could Be Worth \$338 Million

Assuming reasonably favorable weather the 25 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. have current prospects for harvesting 1,840,000 bales of cotton this year, about 450,000 more than were produced in 1969. Including price support payments, lint and seed, such a crop would be worth in the neighborhood of \$338 million to area farmers.

Potential production was estimated in a joint effort by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and PCG. Each year the two organizations collaborate in compiling crop estimates on the first of each month, August 1 through December 1. The estimates, of necessity, are based on crop conditions of the moment and on the assumption that weather conditions for the remainder of the season will be "reasonably favorable."

PCG's breakdown of figures on the crop's value show that the lint from a 1.84 million bale crop, at about \$90 per bale average, would come to \$165,600,000. A total of 759,000 tons of seed, at a "guaranteed" minimum \$50 per ton price to the farmer, would net another \$37,950,000. Price support payments, most of which have already been made, are based on projected yields and this year add up to about \$134 million.

The LCE-PCG estimate sets planted acreage for the 25 counties at 2,218,000, of which it is calculated that 2,104,500 were "standing acres" on August 1. This leaves about 113,500 acres, a little over 5 percent, that has been abandoned because of hail, drought, wind storms or other weather phenomena. Acreage planted but never harvested in 1969 figured about 28 percent.

About 30 percent of the cotton on the High Plains is not irrigated, and reaching the 1.8 million bale estimate will depend much on rainfall. Most areas of dryland cotton are now reported to be holding up well but badly in need of rain within the next 10 days or two

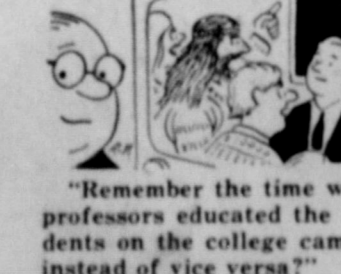

Blue Star Day Comes Friday

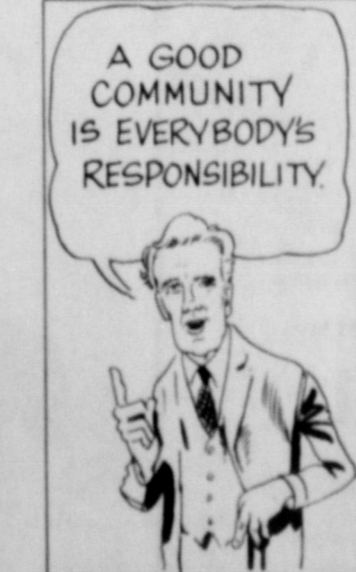

Duff Discusses School Budget At Rotary Club

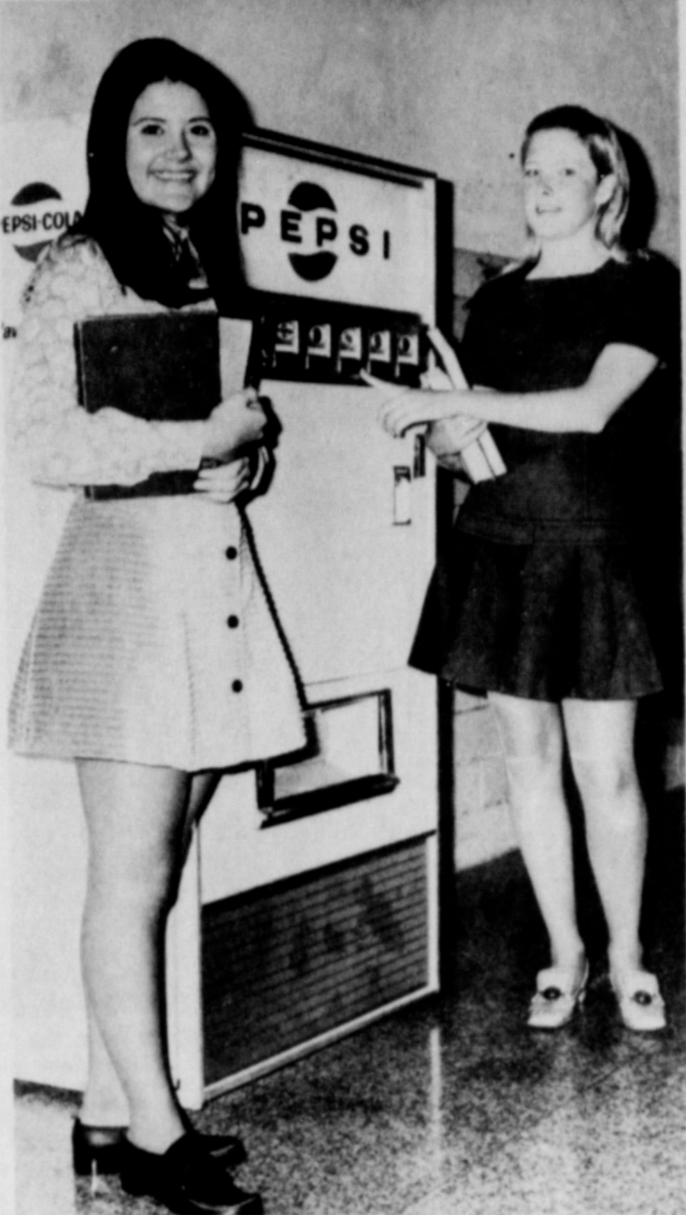

The Dove Survey Trimming Underway

44,000 Texas hunters receiving questionnaires from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department this week as part of the first statewide mourning dove harvest survey for this September.

The project leader for the survey urged that hunters who receive the questionnaires complete and return them as soon as possible so that sampling can be completed.

Information is required on the number of birds killed, the date of the hunt, and whether or not the hunter plans to hunt during the next year in the south.

Hunters who indicate they will form the test of the day-by-day survey actually began last month, Clark said. Department officials took the first hunting license sale last year as a running start. The hunters' addresses were typed on computer tape for processing the current phase of the survey.

This September, each hunter in the survey group will receive 10 numbered IBM cards on which he is asked to record daily the county he hunted, number of hours spent hunting, number of doves bagged and the date of the hunt.

"We want to determine when, where and how many birds are killed in the State each year," Clark said. "Information from the harvest survey added to our ongoing banding program should give us an indication of the total mourning dove population."

Department studies have shown that there has been a significant decline in mourning dove nesting populations during the past decade in Texas. Disease, droughts, predators, pesticides, loss of habitat and hunting all are possible factors in this decline, Clark said.

The harvest survey should determine the number of birds killed during the season and, in turn, provide the basis for assessing the effects of hunting pressure on the dove population. Hunters picked at random for the survey are encouraged to cooperate so that future management practices will improve hunting for this important game species.

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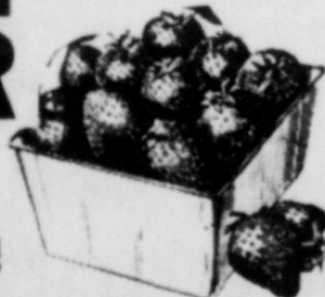
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
