

#### Police Seeking Clues in Holdup

A strong - armed robbery and vandalism cases high -lighted the Slaton police docket the past week.

H. B. Meeks, an employee of Becker Bros. Mobil, was robb-ed of more than \$200 Monday afternoon by an unknown assailant who sprayed tear gas into the victim's face.

The robbery occurred about 6:25 p.m. Monday at the Becker office and warehouse on Industrial Drive. Meeks was locking the office door when the bandit came up behind him, threw a cloth sack over his head and pushed him back into the building.

From Meeks' story and finding a small discarded container, police said the bandit sprayed tear gas into the sack and in Meeks' eyes. The bandit then took the victim's billfold, which contained only \$1, and found receipts which Meeks had collected during the day in another pocket. Meeks was blinded by the tear gas and was unable to give a description of the man or the vehicle, which he heard speed away.

Meeks was not injured, ex-cept for the temporary blindness and irritation to his eyes

caused by the tear gas. Police said about 7 or 8 vandalism cases were reported around the city the past week, and investigations are being conducted.

#### **Dividends Total** \$183,561 Here At Co-Op Meet

Slaton Cooperative Gin Co. held its annual membership meeting Tuesday at the Clubhouse, featuring the distribut-ion of dividends to stockholders and the election of two new

directors.

Dividend checks and stock totalled \$183,561, or an average of \$12.66 per bale. The gin company listed 14,488 bales of cotton ginned last fall.

Walter Heinrich and Joe Walker were elected as new directors, replacing Ray Kitten and J. B. Lamb. At the meeting of the new board, Ed Moseley was named as president; Alex Bednarz, vice president, and A. A. Wimmer, secretary.

Jay Gray is the gin manager. About 75 persons attended the Tuesday membership meeting. A financial report was reviewed by the auditor, and several regional cooperative representatives made brief re-

marks. was pointed out that the dividend checks would boost the local economy as thousands of dollars are "pumped back into the community."

To be eligible to attend kin-dergarten in the Slaton Public Schools the child must be five years of age on or before Sept-1971 and meet at ember 1, least one of the following qualifications: 1. Low family income; 2. Speak English as a second language; and 3. Determined by school personnel to need special help in order to perform well in first grade.

## Eagle Awards Go To Five Slaton Scouts

In very impressive services on the part of South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America, five young men from Slaton, Sunday received the highest rank award that Boy Scouting offers, the coveted Eagle A-ward. The Eagle Court of Honor took place at First Methodist Church of Lubbock at 3 p.m. last Sunday.

The five youths from Slaton were among 23 scouts from all over the 22 county area which comprises the South Plains Council, who Sunday received Eagle badge. From the Mackenzie Trail District of the Council of which Slaton is a part, there were a total of seven scouts receiving the award, the other two being from two different troops in Lubbock. The five young men from Slaton honored, all of whom are members of Troop No. 123, sponsored by First Christian Church, here, were: Dan Butler, Carter Lankford, John David Moore, Mike Van Meter, and Charles Waugh.

Parents of the boys, along with their scoutmaster, Johnnie Moore, who is minister of the sponsoring organization were recognized in the ceremony. The father of each of the boys was given the honor of actually pinning the medal on his son, and the mother was pinned with a miniature replica of the Eagle

Badge by her son. Making the presentation of the awards and the address leading up to the presentation was Col. Haynes Baumgardner, Commissioner, South Plains Council, and Air Force ROTC

advisor at Texas Tech. Each boy, in order to be considered for the rank of Eagle Scout, has a large number of specified things he must do, There are five ranks in scouting below the rank of Eagle, They are Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life

and finally Eagle. To be an Eagle a boy must first have become each of the previous five; he must have been a Life scout for at least six months; he must have earned a minimum total of 21 different Merit Badges in various fields of knowledge and interest, eleven of which are specified by Boy Scout of America and are required of every candidate for Eagle.

These required badges in clude such things as Citizenship in the nation and community, first aid, swimming, life - saving, safety, camping, outdoor cooking, personal fit-ness, etc. Finally, for the rank of Eagle, each boy must submit a personal project for the good his community or for the unit's sponsoring organization,

## Plan for Cinder Track **Endorsed by Tiger Club**

School District secure a cinder track near the high school was endorsed by the Tiger Club in a special meeting last week.

Pat Taylor, president of the adult booster organization, said members voted to "undertake the project and lead the way in promoting the building of a track facility." Pete Williams, who has head-

ed up a study committee on the track project, reported that preliminary dirt work and installation of concrete curbing on the quarter-mile track would cost about \$3,400. It was proposed that clubs and individuals raise funds to cover this portion of the work. The plan was presented to

Slaton School Board by Williams and several other Tiger Club members earlier this month. The club asked the board to consider appropriating funds to take care of putting cinders on the track -- at an estimated cost of \$4,400.

Williams pointed out that Slaton was the largest school in the district, but one of the few schools without a track. He told trustees that the planned facility would cost about \$12,000 if contracted with a company. With volunteer work and community help, he added, the school might obtain the facility





Higher rates had been sought by the Post Office Department under both the current and previous administrations, but no action was taken. In addition to the long-stand-

ing Postal Service proposal for a two-cent boost for letters from six to eight cents, advertising mail (regular bulk rate third-class) would be increased to a minimum of five cents per piece, plus additional increases for heavier weights.

Substantial increases also are proposed for magazines, newspapers and other categories of second-class mail. These rather steep increases will be phased in over five years to soften the impact

nine cents each. Post cards will go from five to six cents, although the proposal provides for a full increase to seven

cents each. Concerning 'Priority Mail,' packages weighing more than 12 am es and receiving firstclass treatment-higher rates are proposed only for parcels weighing less than five pounds.

For a five-pound priority package sent across the United States, the rates would remain \$4.08, under the proposal. However, for a onepound package, an increase of from 80 cents to \$1 is proposed.

Regular second-class publications-those mailed for delivery outside the publisher's county, excluding certain categories - will be raised 1.9 cents per piece plus higher advertising rates ranging from 9.1 to 20.9 cents per pound. Non-advertising will be at a new rate of 7.2 cents per pound.

Controlled circulation publications-usually periodicals subscription fees mailed to specific audiences or markets-face an increase in only their minimum per piece rate to five cents from the existing 3.8 cents postage fee. The pound rate remains

#### **Tornado Season**

phenomenons is the tornado-a violent, destructive whirling wind that strikes almost without warning and seemingly at random, sweeping everything out of its path as its whiplash tail moves in a narrow path over the land.

The tornado that struck the city of Lubbock last year, like the earlier disasters in previous years in Dallas, Waco, and San Angelo, once again reminded Texans that disaster health planning is the difference between safety and catastrophe.

THE TEXAS STATE DEPARTMENT of Health has joined with other state and federal agencies and medical associations to see that all areas of the state are prepared in case of a disaster.

Consequently, Texas is meeting the 1971 tornado season with one of the world's most complete storm warning systems, and a well-oiled public health relief organization.

TEXAS' "local severe weather warning system", the first established anywhere in the world, now has radar storm warning

sets in almost all major cities in the state. These stations are all connected by teletype and radio. Any station is able to instantly appraise all other stations of a tornado traveling in their direction.

All communities in the vicinity of the twister can be warned of the tornado's approach through normal channels of

Mailers holding bulk third-class permits would find their rates per pound raised from 16 and 22 to 22 and 28 cents per pound, respectively, when the proposal is fully effected, and the minimum-per-piece charge would be raised to five cents.

Special delivery and registered mail fees would both increased. The minimum fee for a special delivery letter would rise from 45 to 60 cents, while the rate for registered mail valued at up to \$100 would be increased from 80 to 95 cents under the proposal. There would be proportionate hikes in the fees shipments registered at higher values.

The total yield under the proposal, when fully effective, is estimated at \$2,125.8 million, including all of the rates to be phased over a period of years. In the first year \$670 million of the \$2,125.8 million would be provided gress under the Postal Reorganization Act.

About 80 per cent of the nation's mail volume of nearly 90 billion pieces in fiscal year 1972 will be businesstype mail, and the bulk of the increase would be borne by these users.

The Rate Commission has the authority to recomm changes different from those proposed by the Postal Ser-vice. In that event, the Com-mission would need to offer an alternative package capable of producing an equal

amount of additional revenue. The U. S. Postal Service is printing and sending out billions of 8-cent stamps to post offices across the nation and postal sources say five billion new regular and air mail stamps will be delivered to post offices by May 15 even though at this point the proposed rate increased have not been approved.

The new eight cent stamps retain the basic design of two previous ones in the six-cent denomination - a portrait of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and a view of the White House with an American flag in the foreground. The colors will be different.





TALKS GOW PLYING COTTON GROWING ME.

the Governor's Advisory Panel on Use of Agricultural Chemicals can lead to the development and use of scientific fact as opposed to random opinion in regulating the use of pesticides by agriculture, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The panel, chaired by Dr. Perry Adkisson, head of the Department Texas A&M, was appointed at the request of the Texas Association of Cotton Producer Organizations. Johnson, TACPO Secretary, said the objective is to obtain maximum usage of pesticides, herbicides and other chemicals in agriculture with minimum effects on the environment and non target organisms, including ctional, unfounded claims."

The panel's report states that without pesticidal chemicals "it is doubtful that all other technology combined would be sufficient to provide the yield increases needed to feed and clothe the world's exploding human population."

But it is recognized that the entry of pesticidal chemicals into the environment may have adverse side effects through contamination of crops with excess residues, by presenting hazards to applicators, and by contributing to the decline of certain species of fish and wildlife. The panel therefore recommends more, but sensible, regulation and control.

Insufficient facts and figures concerning farm use of pesticides and other chemicals is one of the big stumbling blocks encountered by agriculture in efforts to counteract the sometimes emotional adverse effect claims of environmental pur-

To correct this deficiency Adkisson's panel suggests "Legislation to provide for agency responsibility and financial support to the Texas Department of Agriculture for developing statistical procedures for collecting data on the sales and uses of pesticides in the State, and that agents selling and - or dispensing pesticides be required to maintain accurate and complete records of sales with these records to be made available to the TDA."

The panel also recommends that standards and procedures be established and legislation passed for the registration and licensing of pest control agents, including airplane operators, commercial ground machine operators and sales agents.

Other recommendations the panel include proper disposal of pesticide containers, monitoring of residues in or on foods and wildlife, elimination of the present provision for registration of pesticides under protest, and expanded research activities.

To carry out needed research it is suggested that a "Texas Center for Pesticide Research" be established and given the basic responsibility for (1) the development of new methods of pest control which will minimize the use of chemical pesticides, (2) the determination of the long - term impact of pesticides on the total environment, and (3) the development of in-

struments, methods and educational programs necessary to insure competent pesticidal analysis and service the needs of other State agencies involv-ed in monitoring of pesticides.

Research to develop new and safe pest control methods, the report says, should include the developing and testing of non-persistent, bio-degradable chemicals, biological controls, insect resistant crop varieties, insect sterility and other cultural and mechanical control

Johnson termed the overall report as "excellent," and said "through its implementation agriculture can adequately respond to the legitimate concerns of the public and at the same time protect itself and the public against the loss of valuable production tools as the result of em-

Dr. Levon Ray, who heads up the cotton breeding pro-gram at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, points out that "varie-tal selection is the key to successful narrow-row cotton production. And, the right variety may not be the one which the producer has found best for conventional row spacing."

'Certain characteristics adapt a variety to narrow rows," explained Ray. "Our research program at the Center has identified some of these. First of all, the plant should be small in stature—short in height with short limbs. The variety should produce minimum vacatative growth. Small Small vegetative growth. Small leaves are also advantageous as they allow light to pene-trate into the plant canopy, thereby allowing normal de-

The type of row spacing to be used will affect varietal selection, contends the cotton breeder. Much of the narrowrow cotton will probably be planted double-row-two rows spaced 10 to 16 inches apart on the bed-or in rows spaced uniformly 18 to 26 inches apart. With these row spacings, producers have a much wider choice of varieties than with grain-drilled row widths (seven to 12 inches). In fact, most early maturing, High Plains varieties will perform satisfactorily in double-row or other intermediate-row spacing patterns, Ray points

"Varieties such as Blightmaster, Acala and Western Stormproof that are late maturing and vegetative will generally be poor performers in narrow rows," he said. "Even if these varieties did yield more in narrow rows, the large plants would be difficult to harvest."

For the very narrow rows (10 inches or less), variety selection is even more critical. According to the re-searcher, the full potential of narrow-row production cannot be attained with any of the presently available varie-However, several of the early, close-fruiting varieties have performed well in such row spacings."
