## Turbulent Thunderstorms Roam Over Area

Ominous-looking thunderstorms swept over Slaton and the South Plains area Saturday, and again Monday and Tuesday evenings, leaving varying amounts of moisture with about 2 inches recorded in the city. The line of dangerous thunderstorms left heavy rain in spots, with high winds and hail accompanying the rain in some areas. Slaton had a heavy downpour of about 1 inch Monday just before 8 p.m. At least one funnel cloud was seen southwest of Lubbock Monday evening as the turbulent weather moved across the area. The tornado alert, coming two weeks after a disastrous twister hit Lubbock, sent residents there hurrying for cover. DPS officials reported sighting another tornado Tuesday night north of Muleshoe, but it pulled back into the clouds without causing damage. Light hail accompanied the thunderstorm here Tuesday evening, and some areas re-

ported marble-size hail. About .50 of an inch of rain was reported here. No heavy damage was reported around the South Plains, however. For the most part, farmers welcomed the moisture. Some, who have received slight amounts of rainfall earlier, would prefer their cotton was a little further along before more rain came. The rainfall appeared to be spotted--leaving only a trace in some areas to the south of Slaton. Good rains had been recorded north of the city. The chance of afternoon and nighttime thunderstorms remained in the forecast for Wednesday and Thursday. Temperatures in Slaton climbed to 91 on Friday before the cool front passed through, then the highs were in the 80's the rest of the week. The mercury was predicted to get near 90 Wednesday. Low reading was 58 degrees Sunday.

The Texas turbulence was caused by a cool front that stalled across the state's mid-section from Texarkana to San Angelo. Weather Bureau said the humid air pouring in from the Gulf of Mexico could be expected to touch off showers as long as the cold front remained in the state. All three rainfalls in Slaton were of the heavy--but-brief variety, coming in a downpour and then moving on out of the area.

## Swimming Pool Opening Delayed

Opening of Slaton Swimming Pool for the summer season has been delayed because of trouble with the filtering system, it was announced this week by Earl Bartley, Slaton Chamber of Commerce manager. Jerry Gentry, junior high teacher, has been named as pool manager this year. The Chamber sponsors operation of the city pool. The pool will probably open early next week.

## Two Slaton Youths Killed In Dune Buggy Crash Near City

Two 20-year-old Slaton youths -- Dale Harris and Roy Childress -- were fatally injured in a one vehicle crash on a county road about three miles southwest of Slaton last week. Harris was dead on arrival at Mercy Hospital last Wednesday night, May 20, while Childress died in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital Sunday afternoon. Both were students at South Plains College. Harris and Childress were in a "dune buggy" that overturned on a dirt road and smashed into a telephone pole. Investigating officers said Harris was thrown from the vehicle. Services for Harris were held Friday at 4 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Bruce Parks, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under direction of Englands. Childress graduated from Slaton High School in 1968 and had attended South Plains College the past two years. In Slaton High, he was recipient of the first Ag Scholarship presented by Citizens State Bank. Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Jim (Ordie) Gentry; his stepfather, Jim Gentry; a brother, James Paul of the home; a sister, Mrs. Barbara Brooks of Olton; and his grandparents, G. W. Gilliam and Mr. and Mrs. John Childress, all of Slaton. Pallbearers were Eddie Ethridge, Thomas Ethridge, Baxter Coffee, Rex Conner, Charles Underwood, and Gordon Graves.

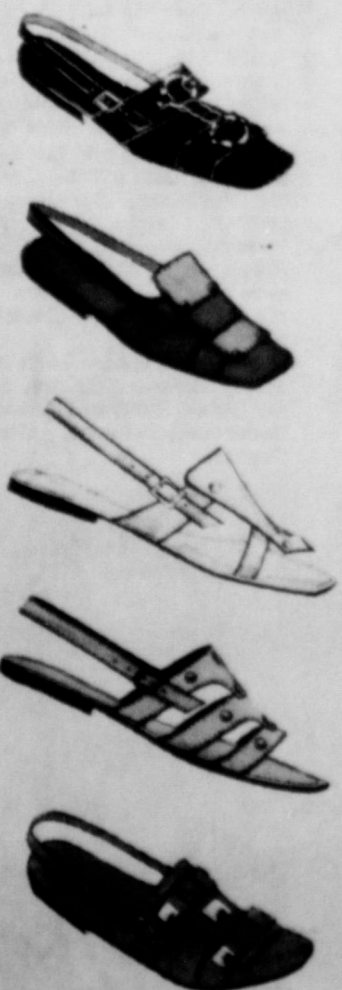

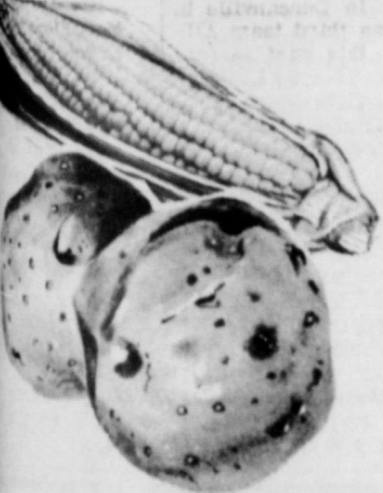

## Triangle ... Slaton's Million-Dollar Industry

Triangle's leading industry is probably better known for its products outside the community. Triangle Manufacturing, Inc., which manufactures and ships products all over the United States. Since most of the products are fabricated and manufactured for customers outside the community, many local citizens may not be too familiar with the corporation's business.

The name "Triangle" might bring to mind cotton baskets, or green boll separators, to

some local citizens. However, Triangle is much, much more. Manufacturing and fabricating various types of farm and industrial equipment, Triangle's gross business amounted to about \$1 million last year.

Headed by R. J. Schuette as president, the corporation also has Vic Zouzalik as general manager; J. B. Smith, sales director; Dalton Allison, service; Eldon Allison, production superintendent; and Ann Tucker and Pat Schuman, secretarial. Triangle has some 50 employees with a weekly payroll of approximately \$5,000. The company was founded by Schuette in 1960, starting operations in a building behind Citizens State Bank. Triangle had about \$90,000 gross business the first year.

The Slaton firm is a versatile and progressive one. Many of its orders are custom made to fit needs required by industry and agriculture. One such example is a broadcast cotton harvester now in production.

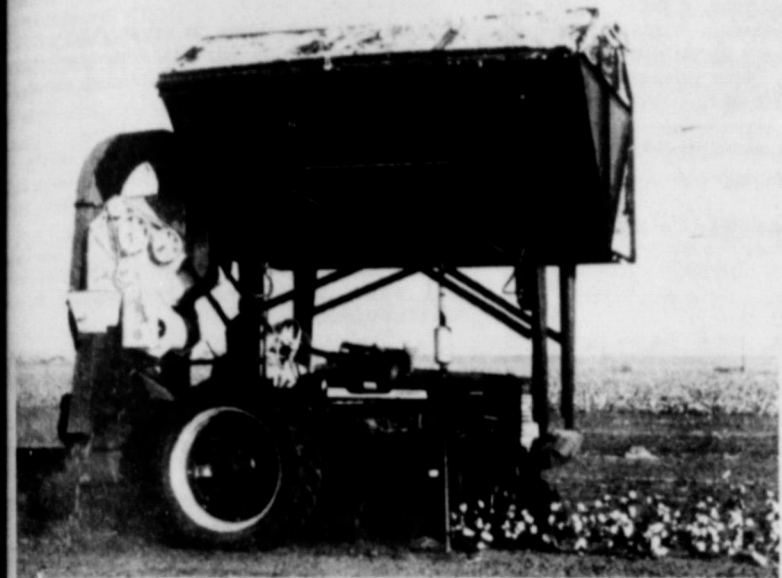
For those who planted broadcast cotton -- drilled in narrow rows -- the big problem came in harvesting. Triangle re-

cently manufactured a 160-inch header to be mounted on a picker chassis, or tractor, which should greatly speed up the harvest operation and reduce costs.

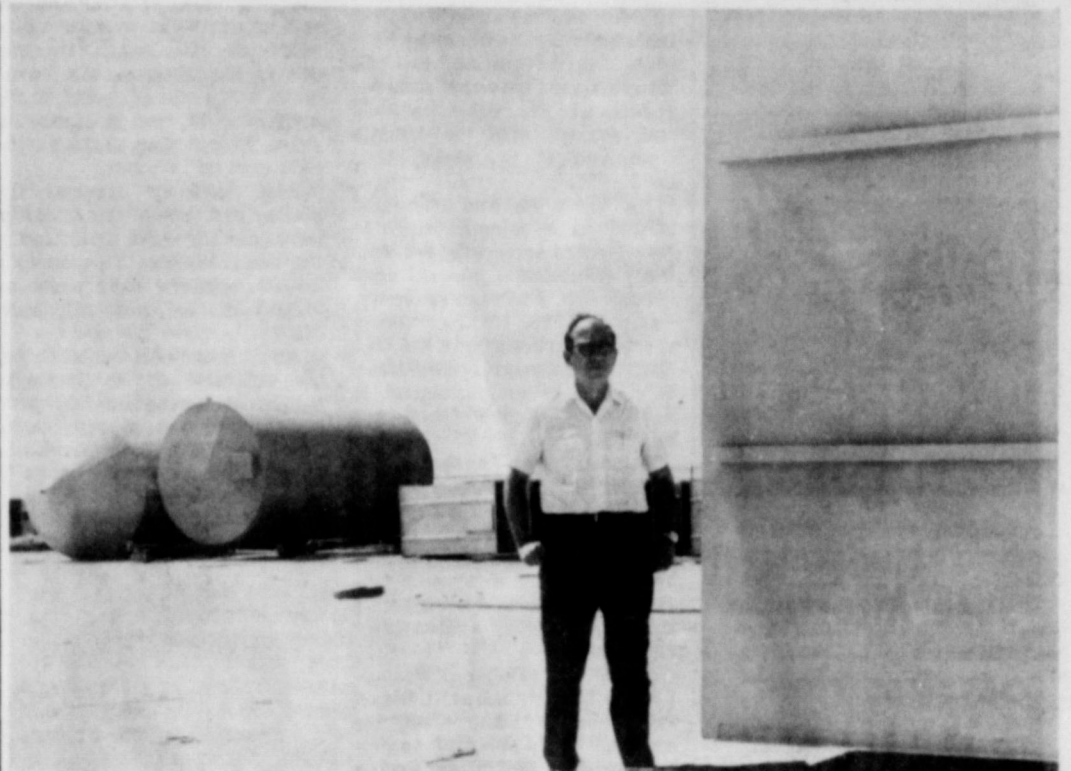
The company also recently produced special grain beds for trucks, and a hydraulic dump trailer. Triangle was also employed recently as a consultant for the Red River Land Co. of Stanfield, Ariz., where one of the owners is movie star John Wayne. They have been fabricating materials for that company and will soon ship 18 loads to Arizona.

Although most of its business goes out of Slaton, Triangle is very much a part of the community. Besides helping boost the local economy with a big payroll, the company is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and was a booster in the organization of the local Industrial Foundation. Triangle has also helped support other civic endeavors.

Schuette, the president, is an active worker in the Babe Ruth League baseball program, and is incoming president of the Slaton Tiger Club -- an adult athletic booster organization.

# Col. Eldon Schmid Dies In El Paso

Col. (Retd.) Eldon W. Schmid, 53, died at his home in El Paso Monday morning after an apparent heart attack.

He is the son of Mrs. F. A. Drewry of Slaton, and the twin brother of Ellis Schmid of Slaton. Services will be conducted Friday at 10 a.m. in the Main Chapel at Ft. Bliss. Burial will be in the Ft. Bliss National Cemetery.

A survivor of the famed Texas Lost Battalion, Schmid was a Japanese prisoner of war for more than three years and worked on the Burma railroad for more than a year.

He was a Legion of Merit recipient and other decorations, including -- the Purple Heart, Bronze Star, Army Commendation Ribbon, the Distinguished Unit Citation with three oak leaf clusters, Asiatic Pacific Service Medal, Philippine Defense Ribbon with battle stars, Korean Service Medal with two

battle stars, the American Defense Medal with battle stars, Philippine Distinguished Unit Citation, the UN Service Ribbon, and others.

Born in Groesbeck July 31, 1916, Col. Schmid graduated from Mt. Pleasant High School in 1935 and attended Texas Tech until he entered the Army Nov. 25, 1940.

He entered the 131st Field Artillery, 36th Division and served at Camp Bowie from 1940 to 1941. He was taken as a prisoner of war by the Japanese on Java on March 8, 1942, and was held until Sept. 3, 1945.

With the Texas "Lost Battalion", he worked on the Burma railroad in 1943-44 and was moved to Thailand from 1944 until the close of the war. After hospitalization for several wounds, he graduated from Army Intelligence School at Ft. Holabird in Maryland in 1947. He graduated from Armored School at Ft. Knox, Ky., in 1948.

Schmid served in Korea in 1950-51 and was a regular Army instructor for the Kentucky National Guard from 1952 to 1955. He graduated from Air Defense School at Ft. Bliss in 1956 and served with the Missile Command at Ft. Mead, Md., until 1958.

He was a test and evaluation officer at a missile range in New Mexico and graduated from the command general staff school at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., in 1959. He spent three years in Germany with the Nike Missile Command, and returned to Ft. Bliss and assigned to Air Defense School from 1963 to 1965.

Schmid was range commander at McGregor Range, Ft. Bliss, when he retired Dec. 31, 1966. He retired with 30 years service. He was employed by Raytheon as a system engineer instructor at a missile range in Saudi Arabia after retirement.

He was a member of the Retired Officers' Club at Ft. Bliss, the Skeet & Trap Club, the Amateur Trap Shooting Association, the Ft. Bliss Rod & Gun Club, and the National Rifleman's Assn., and the Lost Battalion Assn., Luther Powers Post of the American Legion, and V.F.W. Post 6721.

Survivors include his wife, Delores; one daughter, Mrs. Wayne Burton of Rapid City, S.D.; his mother, Mrs. F. A. Drewry, Slaton; and his twin brother, Maj. (Ret.) Ellis P. Schmid, Slaton.

According to Rev. McGraw, the objective of MI Casita is to provide counseling for persons living in poverty conditions who have been moved to proper housing. The goal is to develop pride of ownership.

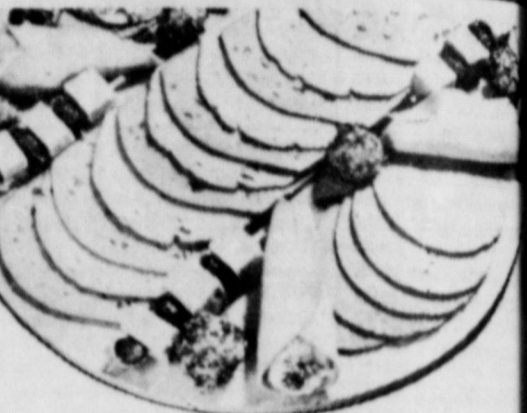
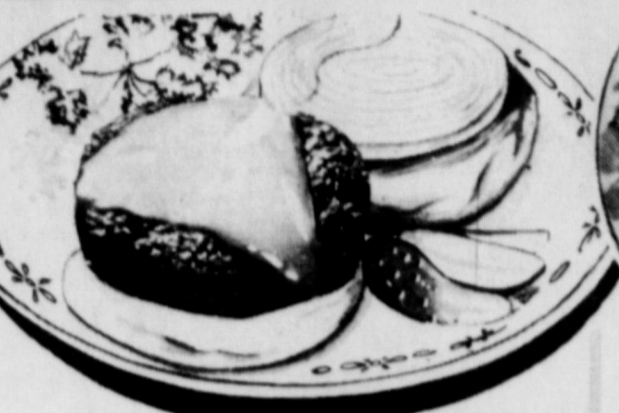
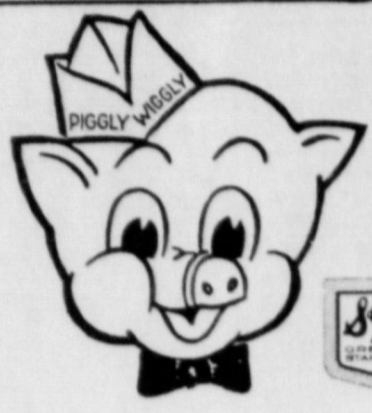
