# Budget Hits \$1 Million

Slaton School trustees gave tentative approval to a \$1 million budget Tuesday night and approved several other items during a three-hour regular monthly session.

The board set a public budget hearing for Aug. 11 at 7:30 p.m., approved the employment of four new teachers and the resignations of four, approved a high school student handbook presented by principal M. W. Kerr, and adopted policies for a new kindergarten school in 1970.

The proposed budget calls for disbursements of \$1,081,846—up \$134,011 over the current budget. Most of the increase -- both in receipts and disbursements -- comes from state programs. Teacher salary increases on the new 10-month program, along with special and vocational education programs account for much of the new funds.

Revenue from local sources amounted to \$326,725 in the past year's budget and is projected for \$337,972 in the new budget. This is an increase of \$11,247 from local tax funds.

The board set a public budget hearing for Aug. 11 at 7:30 p.m. Any school district patron desiring to question proposed budget items may appear at that time. If there are no objections, the board is expected to approve the \$1 million budget as presented.

The past year's budget had a projected deficit of \$30,000, but Supt. J. C. McClesky announced Tuesday night that it had been trimmed to \$25,000 and might be less. Projected

deficit in the new budget is \$11,926.

McClesky, in going through the proposed budget, pointed out that it provides for new special education and vocational education programs, provides for a new custodian (total of five), provides for one new bus driver--in order to give supervisor Phil Corona more time for maintenance duties, and

provides for a salary increase for business manager Buford Duff.

Aside from teacher salary increases approved by the state and regular teacher pay increments, the pay adjustment for the business manager is the only one proposed, said McClesky. The superintendent said duties of the business manager have been expanded and

the office is being put on an administrative level with principals. Duff's salary -- increased from \$625 to \$700 a month a year ago--is proposed for \$827.50 per month.

Resignations were accepted from Gene Franklin, Sandra Cole, Donetta Gillis and Jay Bowman. New teachers approved were Jorjana Hipes, junior high science; Bill Shaha, high school coach and teacher; Barbara Gajardo, high school English and speech; and Beth Harlan, one-half time Home Economics.

McClesky reported all teaching positions filled at this time except for a first-grade teacher and a music teacher.

Kerr was at the board meeting to outline the text of a student handbook to be printed for high school students. He said most of the rules and policies were already in effect, but were not in print for students to read.

The handbook includes general information, student conduct, curriculum, organizations, student council by laws, special services, and honors and awards.

The Trustees adopted policies for the new kindergarten school program which will be initiated this year. The state requires the kindergarten program to be offered to certain students who qualify. This year it will primarily be for youngsters who are 5 years and 5 months old and come from low-income families. The program will expand in coming years.

The board also approved roof repairs at West Ward school and a complete re-roofing job on the old cafeteria building. Cost estimates were presented from a local contractor by the business manager. He was authorized to go ahead with the work after making a cost comparison. Duff reported that most of the interior of the high school plant had been re-painted this summer.

Trustees also reviewed the monthly financial statement, with McClesky reporting that all current bills were paid up to date. Bills and accounts were approved for payment.

Attending the meeting were board president Don Kendrick and trustees R. C. Hall, Tommy Davis, Rev. Emilio Abeyta, Bettye Burks and Joe Gamble. Absent was Clark Self Jr.

An interpreter will also go with them and they will have handbills to distribute.

Women on the trip plan to meet with Women Missionary Unions and the men at brotherhood meetings. They also plan to speak at civic organization meetings. Vise, a member of the Slaton Lions Club, will carry greetings to the Lions Club there from the local club.

Vise says he is looking forward to seeing a classmate who sang in the International Choir with him when they were attending Wayland Baptist College. She and her husband, both natives of Japan, plan to join them for the revival.

During the two weeks in Japan, Vise says he hopes they will be able to witness to many people. Tokyo has about 11 1/2 million residents and approximately 2% of the population are Christians.

"Most of the people have never heard about God", Vise said. A church group from Seminole recently returned from there. There were about 500 decisions made while they were in revival.

# City Okays Police Teletype, Cautions Ambulance Chasers

After several complaints of traffic interfering with emergency vehicles.

The council also appealed to citizens to comply with the law on this matter, "so as not to jeopardize the safety of all concerned," reported city secretary Alex Webb.

Webb said the city had received much "favorable comment" on new lane markings installed at 10th and Division to show proper routes of traffic at the intersection. After a short discussion, the council approved installation of similar markings in school areas for crosswalks.

Installation of the new teletype unit at Slaton Police Department was reported by Police Chief Walter Head. The city had a Federal grant approved for 60 percent of the cost of the equipment. Head explained that the teletype connects the Slaton department directly with 16 cities in the area, and statewide through another network.

Cost of the unit is about \$60 per month. The council felt that the savings in long-distance phone calls might offset the city's share in operating the unit.

Three women representing the Slaton Women's Golf Association appeared at the meeting to discuss a building on the municipal golf course. The building is owned by the women's association, but since it is on city property, the group needed a release in order to make improvements. The request was granted. Appearing were Mrs. Pat Ivey, Mrs. Earl Eblen and Mrs. Beth Gill.

Billy Biggs also appeared at the meeting to discuss a property damage matter. In cleaning up a lot belonging to the Whitehead estate, the city apparently destroyed a two-room building owned by Biggs on adjoining property. Webb reported a "congenial discussion with the council indicating a desire to satisfy damage claims in the matter."

In response to a request from two plumbers for the city to lower the plumber's bond from \$5,000 to \$2,500, the council indicated it would approve if the majority of city plumbers desired the action. It was pointed out that the bond was set at that figure at the request of local plumbers in order to protect them against "fly-by-night" operations coming into the city.

The police department reported that 26 stray dogs had been turned into them since the city adopted a \$2 bounty fee recently. Chief Head said he was not sure the city was getting the stray dogs which had been causing most complaints, however. He said most of the dogs so far had been brought from the southeast part of town.

Following a question about the city's operation of an emergency ambulance, the city secretary reported the unit was averaging about 15 calls per month. The city has collected about \$1,600 and has \$1,200 on the books in 10 months operation.

Webb estimated the operation was "about breaking even, but not paying for depreciation of the equipment."

Mayor David Hughes and three commissioners attended the regular meeting. Ohs Nell, J. S. Edwards and Floyd Guelker were present, but F. D. Conright was absent.

## Shaha Named Tiger Coach

Bill Shaha, 27, former Petersburg coach and an all-conference guard at Texas Tech, has been named as the new assistant coach for the Slaton Tigers.

Athletic Director and head football coach Ernie Davis announced the employment of Shaha this week. Slaton School Board officially approved his employment Tuesday night.

Shaha was named to the Tiger coaching staff to replace Gene Franklin, who recently resigned to accept a coaching job at Grapevine. A native of Dumas, Shaha graduated from Dumas HS in 1960 and went to Texas Tech. He was selected an all-conference guard in 1963.

Shaha graduated from Tech with a major in accounting and served as a graduate coach one year with the Raiders before going to the Army for two years duty. He was in the accounting business in Lubbock for a year before going to Petersburg as an assistant for one year.

The new coach is married to the former Susan Reynolds of Odessa. She is a high school physical education teacher at Roosevelt High School. The couple has already moved to Slaton. They have no children.

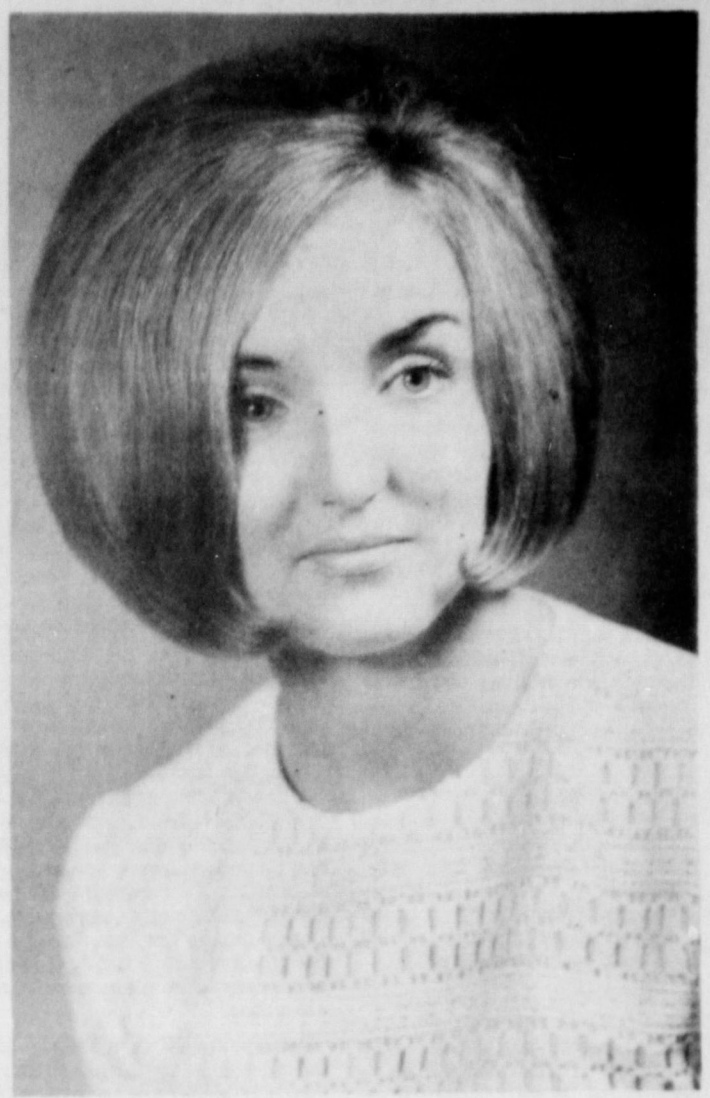

## 4-H Project Helps Span Generation Gap

SPECIAL - There does not seem to be a generation gap between 4-H youths and their parents, according to reports from 4-H sources.

One of the reasons, observes a 4-H spokesman, is that 4-H boys and girls are always doing things, a requirement of 4-H membership.

Since 4-H is a "learn-by-doing" educational process, the youngsters decide what they want to do, talk it over with their parents, and DO it. And parents get involved, too.

For example, members working on a field crops science project are learning how to make things grow where they did not grow before, or improving crops on the family farm.

Whether 4-H'ers live on a 1,000-acre spread or a 1-acre place, they study soil testing, planting, weed and insect control. They experiment with seed germination, effect of weather and light on plant growth, and different types of soil.

During the course of the project, parents learn new things, too. County extension agents and other specialists working for the Cooperative Extension Service supervise the 4-H program. What's more, dad or mother frequently volunteer as a project leader.

Helping to close the generation gap between industry and youth is the field crops science program sponsor, Amchem Products, Inc., of Ambler, Pa. Amchem officials, through the National 4-H Service Committee, are kept informed of achievements in the nationwide

### County Records 39 Accidents During June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 39 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of June, according to Sgt. O.C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, 19 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$42,445.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1970 shows a total of 223 accidents result-

ing in nine persons killed, 171 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$233,437.

During the first six months of 1970 in Texas, there were 1,482 traffic deaths which was twelve more as compared to the 1,470 traffic deaths for the same period of 1969. However, if past trends continue, the last six months will far exceed the first six months; as a matter of fact, the last six months of 1969 there were 2,081 traffic

deaths.

The sergeant stated, "With a record of 38 traffic victims over the July 4 weekend, Texas is well on its way to establishing an all time record of traffic deaths in 1970".

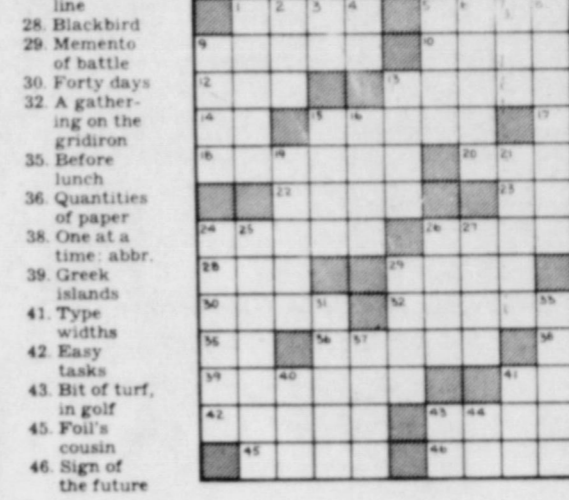

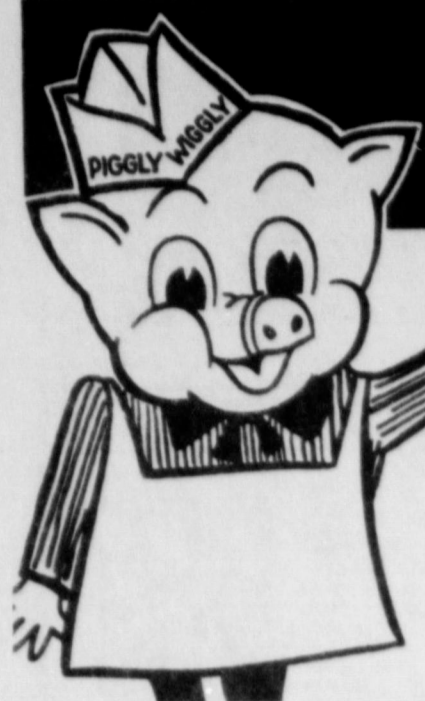

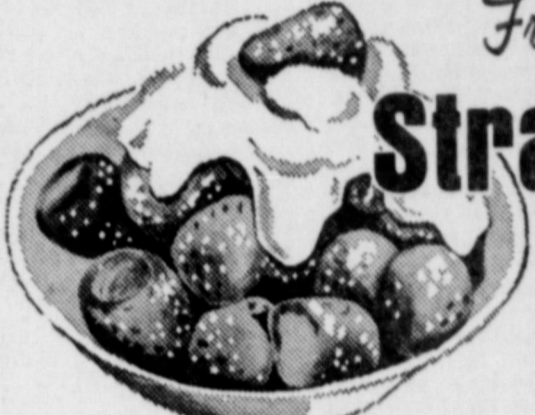
