Shaha Named Tiger Coach

Bill Shaha, 27, former Petersburg coach and an allconference guard at Texas Tech, has been named as the new assistant coach for the Slaton Tigers.

Athletic Director and head football coach Ernie Davis announced the employment of Shaha this week. Slaton School Board officially approved his employment Tuesday night.

Shaha was named to the Tiger coaching staff to replace Gene Franklin, who recently resigned to accept a coaching job at Grapevine. A native of Dumas, Shaha graduated from Dumas HS in 1960 and went to Texas Tech. He was selected an allconference guard in 1963.

Shaha graduated from Tech with a major in accounting and served as a graduate coach one year with the Raiders before going to the Army for two years duty. He was in the accounting business in Lubbock for a year before going to Petersburg as an assistant for one year.

The new coach is married the former Susan Reynolds of Odessa. She is a high school physical education teacher at Roosevelt High School. The couple has already moved to Slaton. They have no children.

Budget Hits \$1 Million

tentative approval to a \$1 million budget Tuesday night and approved several other items during a three-hour regular monthly session.

The board set a public budget hearing for Aug. 11 at 7:30 p.m., approved the em-ployment of four new teachers and the resignations of four, approved a high school student handbook presented by principal M. W. Kerr, and adopted policies for a new kindergarten school in 1970.

The proposed budget calls for disbursements of \$1,081,-846--up \$134,011 over the current budget. Most of the in crease -- both in receipts and disbursements -- comes from state programs. Teacher salary increases on the new 10-month program, along with special and vocational education programs account for much of the new funds. Revenue from local sources

amounted to \$326,725 in the past year's budget and is projected for \$337,972 in the new budget. This is an increase of \$11,247 from local tax funds.

The board set a public budget hearing for Aug. 11 at 7:30 p.m. Any school district patron desiring to question proposed budget items may appear at that time. If there are no objections, the board is expected to approve the \$1 million budget as presented.

The past year's budget had a projected deficit of \$30,000, but Supt. J. C. McClesky announced Tuesday night that it been trimmed to \$25,000 and might be less. Projected

The handbook includes general information, student conduct, curriculum, organizations, student council by laws, special services, and honors and awards.

The Trustees adopted policies for the new kindergarten school program which will be initiated this year. The state requires the kindergarten program to be offered to certain students who qualify. This year it will primarily be for youngsters who are 5 years and 5 months old and come from lowincome families. The program will expand in coming years.

The board also approved roof repairs at West Ward school and a complete re-roofing job on the old cafeteria building. Cost estimates were presented from a local contractor by the orized to go ahead with the work after making a cost comparison. 4-H Project **Helps Span Generation Gap**

SPECIAL - There does not seem to be a generation gap between 4-H youths and their parents, according to reports from 4-H sources.

One of the reasons, observes a 4-H spokesman, is that 4-H boys and girls are always doing things, a requirement of 4-H membership.

Since 4-H is a "learn-bydoing" educational process, the youngsters decide what they want to do, talk it over with their parents, and DO it. And parents get involved, too.

For example, members working on a field crops science project are learning how to make things grow where they did not grow before, or improving crops on the family

Whether 4-H'ers live on a .000-acre spread or a 1-acre place, they study soil testing, planting, weed and insect control. They experiment with seed germination, effect of weather and light on plant growth, and different types of soil.

During the course of the project, parents learn new things, too. County extension agents and other specialists working for the Cooperative Extension Service supervise the 4-H program. What's more, dad or mother frequently volunteer as a project leader.
