

## One Dead, Four Hurt In Wrecks



MINOR INJURIES ONLY---Two Abernathy men miraculously escaped serious injury Saturday morning as a truck-trailer they were in collided with a Santa Fe train at a crossing on U.S. 84 a mile east of Slaton. The truck, driven by Milburn C. Vandegriff, 32, of Abernathy, with Hugh Hill as passenger, caught fire after the crash. The men were treated at Payne Clinic and released. The lower photo shows the truck and a farm tractor it was carrying. The 1964 International truck was owned by Struve Implement of Abernathy, and was headed east. The five-car train was headed south.

One man was killed and four others injured in two traffic accidents on U.S. 84 southeast of Slaton last weekend.

Gary Lee Scrivner, 21, who moved to Slaton about two weeks ago from Grand Prairie, was fatally injured about 4:20 a.m. Sunday when the car he was driving overturned near Southland.

Two Slaton passengers in the car, Walter George Wylie and Danny Wayne Beasley, both 19, were treated at Mercy Hospital for injuries and later released.

Two Abernathy men, Milburn C. Vandegriff, 32, and Hugh Hill, were hurt, but not seriously, when a large truck driven by Vandegriff was in collision with a Santa Fe train Saturday morning about a mile east of the city.

Scrivner was dead on arrival at Mercy Hospital. Justice of the Peace Arvin Stafford conducted an inquest in his death. Officers said Scrivner was driving southeast on 84 when his

car skidded broadside 500 feet down the median, struck a culvert and overturned, coming to rest upside down.

Services for Scrivner, who was employed by Crawford Chevrolet, were conducted in Grand Prairie Tuesday. Among survivors are his wife, Dianne of Grand Prairie, and a daughter, Melissa, of Mission.

In the Saturday mishap, which occurred about 10:35 a.m., the 1964 truck belonging to Struve Implement Co. of Abernathy, hauling an 806 Fernald tractor to be delivered to Justiceburg, was knocked off the road by the impact with the train and both the truck and its load were smashed. The truck came to rest upside down, and caught fire. Although the men were not thrown clear, they escaped from the cab, investigating Highway Patrolman Alvin Schmidt reported.

Clarence Heaton was engineer of the five-car train which was headed south. Vandegriff and Hill were treated at Payne Clinic and released.

## Three Men Charged With Conspiracy

Three Slaton men have been arrested and charged with conspiracy in a federal case involving government checks.

Arrested by Slaton Police Chief Glen Farmer and a U.S. Secret Service agent were J.B. White, 23; Charles Anderson, 19; and Johnny Richardson, 22. The investigation followed a report by a Slaton resident of receiving mail at his address which did not belong to him. Also involved in the case was an apparent attempt to cash a government check at a liquor store in Slaton.

Police this week also investigated a pair of apparent aggravated assault cases, a theft report, two collisions and recovered some stolen chickens.

A 28-year-old Slaton woman reported that she was awakened by a young Mexican male intruder in her bedroom about 4 a.m. Saturday at her residence in the south part of town. She told officers she screamed and the man struck her with his fist, threatened her and ordered her to undress. However, she managed to escape from the house and called police. She said the man had a knife, but she was not slashed.

The same woman two days earlier reported theft of two rings valued at \$125 from her home.

A collision at 9th and Scurry at 9:49 a.m. Friday involved vehicles driven by Mrs. Grace Dodson, 1335 S. 9th, and Roman Verkamp, 1120 W. Lubbock. At 8:28 a.m. Monday a collision at 11th and Scurry involved cars driven by Mrs. Linda Gill Bednarz, 1025 W. Crosby, and Mrs. Lena Seal, 330 W. Scurry. Parents of a junior high school student who was injured

in an altercation at junior high Monday advised officers they wished to file charges against a 16-year-old high school student who allegedly slashed the other boy with a knife. The incident occurred at junior high about 12:10 p.m. Monday.

Four Slaton police officers participated in a chicken roundup last Wednesday, recovering 16 chickens, some of which were identified as those earlier stolen from two Slaton residents, L. B. Roberts and Charles Hill.

Chief Farmer, Capt. Jeff Creager, Sgt. Antonio Chavez and Patrolman George Quintero spent considerable time chasing the chickens at a residence in south Slaton. No charges have been filed, as the party holding the chickens told officers she had traded for them from some juveniles.

## All-Sports Banquet Is Planned Here Tonight

Announcement of the winners of various awards for top football and basketball players will highlight the annual all-sports banquet sponsored by Slaton Tiger Club beginning at 7:30 p.m. tonight in the junior high cafeteria.

George Kirk, offensive coordinator for the Baylor University football team, will be principal speaker at the banquet. Formerly coach of Palo Duro High School in Amarillo and at Littlefield High school, he is married to a former Slaton resident, his wife, Barbara, is the daughter of Mrs. Fred Stephens.

Dee Bowman will be master of ceremonies, and dinner will be served by freshmen athletes. Dinner music will be by Glenna Jones, pianist.

Outstanding boy and girl basketball players will receive

special awards, as will the outstanding football player. In addition, the Fighting Tiger award will be presented.

At Palo Duro, Littlefield and Cameron, Kirk compiled a 67-27-5 record before joining the Baylor staff of Coach Grant Teaff.

The 41-year-old Littlefield native played at New Mexico Western and McMurry College, then spent four years in the Air Force before getting his degree from TCU in 1956. He later received his M. A. from Baylor in 1960.

Kirk began his coaching career at Fort Worth Diamond Hill in 1956 and moved to Temple High School the following year as assistant to Jay Fikes. In 1963 Kirk was named head coach at Yoe High in Cameron and won district in 1964 and bi-district in 1965 while compiling a 22-8-3 mark.

In 1966 he returned to his home town of Littlefield as head coach and won bi-district with an 8-2 record. In 1967 he was named Amarillo Palo Duro coach and won the district in 1969 and went to the Class AAAA quarterfinals in 1970. He was named District 3-AAAA "coach of the year" in 1968 and 1970.

The Kirks have a daughter, Renee, who will be a junior this fall at Baylor.

## Man Burned In Plant Mishap

Mike Seeley, 22, who lives with his wife at 1330 S. 10th in Slaton, was severely burned Tuesday morning in a mishap at Modern Castings where he is employed.

Seeley, who has been employed by Modern Castings about one year, was moving away from an open fire after he had spilled cleaning fluid on his clothing, when sparks ignited his clothing. He suffered second and third degree burns over 100 percent of his body. He was rushed to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital, and then transferred to Parkland Hospital in Dallas for further treatment. A report from that hospital Wednesday morning was that he had rested well, but was still listed in critical condition.

Adoption or rejection of a new city resolution regarding wrecker service calls in accidents heads the agenda set up for next Tuesday's meeting of city commission.



Now we have about \$20,000.00 raised.

We have only three doctors in town and they have been working very hard. The people in Lubbock are building a medical school to teach students to be doctors, and if we can keep Mercy Hospital for a few more years, young doctors will come and help our doctors. We'll have a safer, happier, and healthier town if we can keep Mercy Hospital open. Let us have Mercy and Keep Mercy. Give me a town to live in where there are good schools, churches and a hospital.




