## New Curtains Approved

Purchase of new curtains for the stage of the high school auditorium and adoption of a proposed professional consultation agreement between the school board and Slaton Classroom Teachers Assn. constituted major action taken Tuesday night at the April meeting of the board.

The new red curtains to replace the worn-out ones presently used in the auditorium will cost \$1,815, it was reported. Installation of the curtains possibly could be achieved by the end of the current school term, according to M. W. Kerr, high school principal, who appeared at the board meeting in regard to the purchase of the curtains.

Bill Carnes, presenting the proposed consultation agreement for the Classroom Teachers, assured the board that the document in no way attempts to alter or diminish the statutory authority of the board to establish policies and procedures for the school district. Rather, it was noted, the purpose is to establish a line of communication between the teachers and the board to promote better understanding and help each group to assist the other in matters of common interest.

Members of CTA have been attending board meetings as observers for several months. The board discussed at length

revision of a manual of policies regarding school employees and stipulating certain standards and requirements which teaching personnel must meet.

Also discussed was damage to the new track apparently caused by motorcycles being ridden on it, and possible means of preventing any recurrence of the damage.

The board certified Mrs. Betty Burks and R. C. Hall Jr. as winners of the recent trustee election, and they were sworn in. Then the present officers of the board were re-elected for another year. Annual membership drive of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce will begin on the morning of Monday, April 24, and continue through 10 a.m. April 28, it was decided Tuesday morning at the monthly meeting of the board of directors of the chamber.

A new group of Red Blazers will be organized by the chamber. Set up on an earned point system, the group will be limited to 18 persons, with any chamber member eligible to seek membership. Points are garnered by obtaining new members, and other considerations, such as attendance at chamber functions. Activity must be on a continuing basis to retain membership in the group, according to Earl Bartley, chamber manager.

The chamber now is in the process of compiling information for its annually-produced booklet listing the sizes, favorite colors and other information regarding all seniors at Slaton, Cooper, Roosevelt, Southland and Wilson schools. The senior size list should be in Slaton stores in about 10 days, it was reported.

Bartley this week requested that any persons with ideas concerning the use of Tiger Town, recently purchased by the chamber, contact him. The facilities are available for any reasonable purpose, he said.

## Warning System Is Mapped For Storms

Don Kendrick, civil defense director, announced that a meeting of all those involved in storm warning system was held recently to complete plans for operation of the system during this season.

Among those at the meeting were Kendrick, Chief of Police Glenn Farmer and Capt. Jeff Craeger; Pete Williams, assistant

civil defense director; and Bob Kern, representing Slaton Fire Dept.

Plans for storm watches and notification of public whenever necessary were discussed. "We will keep abreast of the storm clouds through our spotter organization, made up mostly of firemen and police officers," Kendrick said.

Whenever there is any imminent danger to Slaton, Radio Station KCAS will be advised and will come on the air to advise citizens, even if it is after the normal hours of station operation, Kendrick noted.

In the event that a tornado apparently is going to strike in the immediate Slaton area the sirens will be sounded. The signal is the same as the fire signal, except that the fire signal is only four blasts, whereas the storm warning will last from three to five minutes. "So if it blasts more than four times, you know it is a tornado warning, and should take precautions," Kendrick said. He also observed that if the signal was one long continuous sound, it usually means a malfunction of equipment, not a tornado about to strike.

## Ground Is Broken For Hamburger Stand In City

Ground was broken last week and construction begun on the Big B Burger, a new hamburger stand on the corner of 22nd and Division Sts., on the corner west of Handy Hut.

Buddy Hoffman, 635 S. 16th, is builder and owner of the new business, which he expects to have in operation by about June 15.

"I saw the need of an eating establishment for the kids in school, and I know the problem they have in getting food in limited time they have for lunch," Hoffman said. He reported that the business will employ six persons, and will seat about 40.

There will be no curb service, but there will be a walk-up window for orders, in addition to the inside service. Ken Cantwell, now of Albuquerque, will be manager of the facility, which Hoffman said will be constructed for about \$20,000.

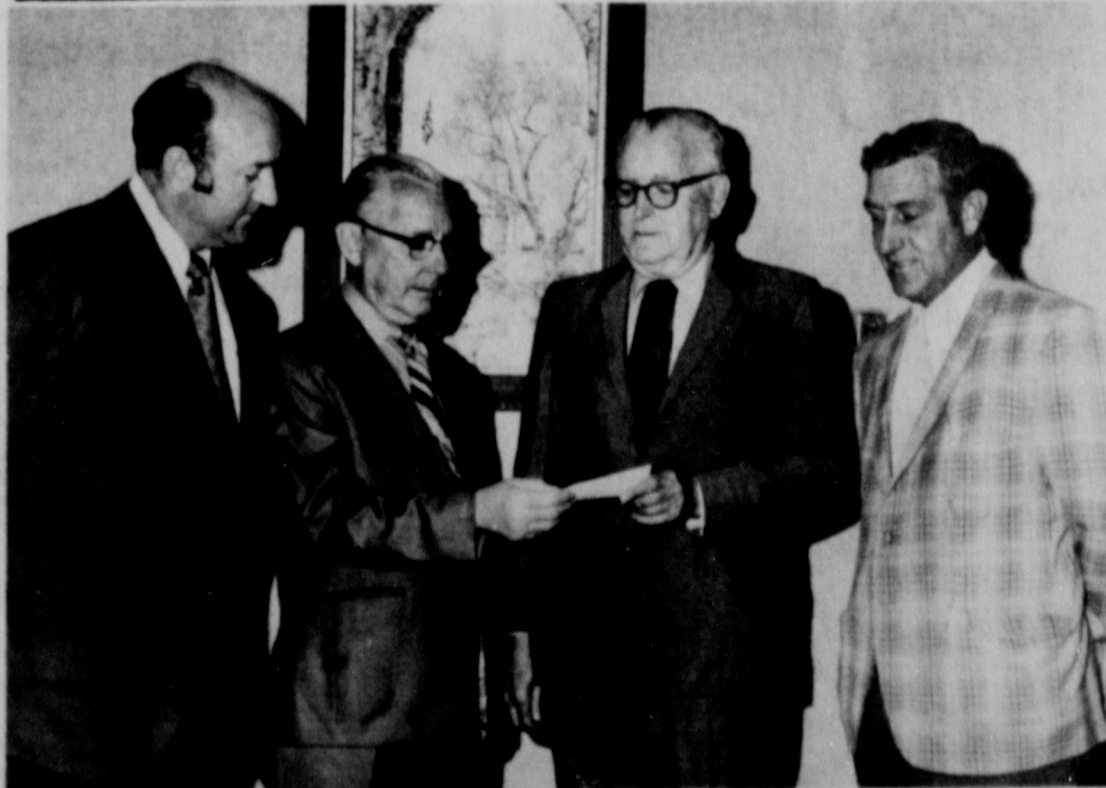

The Science Fair included

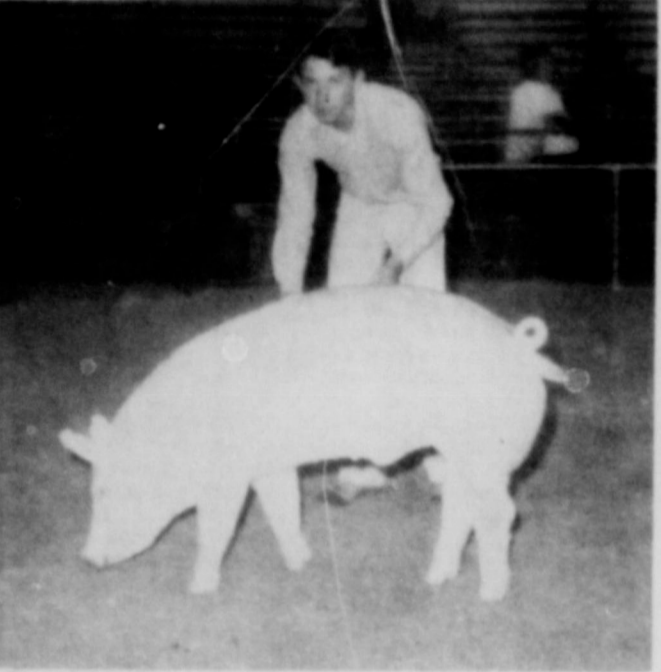
more than 100 elementary, junior high and high school students from a 20-county region.

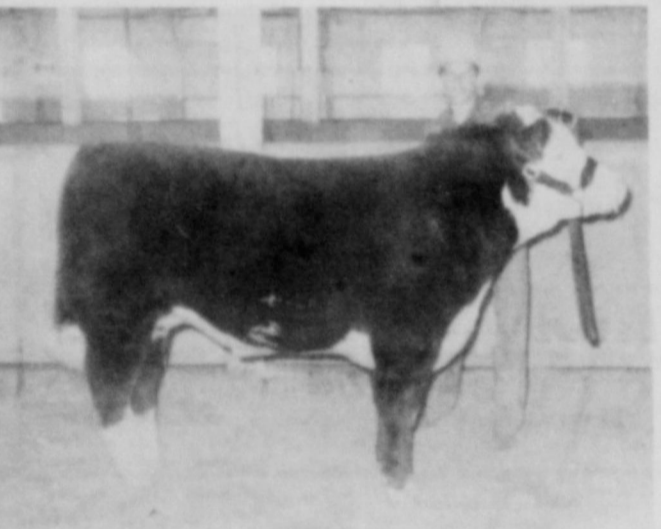

# Kindergarten Registration Set

Kindergarten registration and orientation for the 1972-73 school year will be held in the West Ward Cafeteria at 2:15 p.m., Friday, April 21, according to Joe Sparkman, circulation director of the Slaton Public Schools.

According to state law, any child whose immunization records are not up to date will not be registered. The following immunizations are required by state law for children in kindergarten and grades one through five.

**POLIO** - At least 3 doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday.

**DIPHTHERIA / TETANUS**: Minimum of 3 doses, with at least one dose having been received since the fourth birthday.

**MEASLES** - 1 dose of vaccine, or history of measles illness.

**RUBELLA** - 1 dose of vaccine. Not required past age 12 years.

Any child who will be five years old before Sept. 1, 1972 and who meets the following requirements, will be eligible to attend:

- (1) Family income less than \$3,000 per year.
- (2) Has a language problem that might handicap his progress in school classes.
- (3) Through interview and

locally administered tests, is believed to be educationally disadvantaged.

Tests will be administered locally to all children wishing to register before permission for admission is granted.

If you will not be able to attend orientation, you may bring the birth certificate and up-to-date immunization to Mrs. Longtin at West Ward Kindergarten before April 21.

## Transfer Request Deadline Nears

AUSTIN -- Parents who wish to transfer children from their home school to a nearby district for the 1972-73 academic year must submit their requests to the receiving school district by June 1, 1972, according to an announcement from the Texas Education Agency.

Once approved by the receiving school board of trustees, the request must then be cleared by the Texas Education Agency. This state approval is a requirement of the order issued by the U.S. District Court in Tyler.

The order is related to the desegregation of schools in Texas.

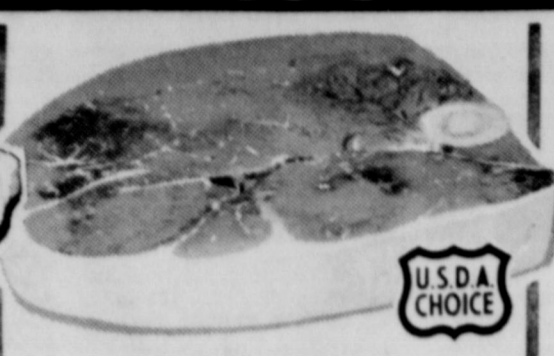
