Weather Helps, Bale Count Hits 47,175

With clear skies and fairly warm temperatures, the cotton harvest in the Slaton area entered the home stretch the past week as farmers raced to finish one of the latest ginning seasons on record.

The bale count jumped more than 7,000 bales the past week, pushing the total for the season to 47,175 bales in 11 Slaton and area gins.

Farmers were able to go full speed ahead the past week after a wintry blast of frigid air and snow had stopped the harvest the previous week. A number of farmers had cotton stacked in the fields as they worked almost around the clock to strip the cotton. The usual shortage of trailers handicapped the harvest as cotton trailers stacked up in the gin yards.

The bale count Wednesday morning by THE SLATONITE showed these totals at the gins: Slaton Co-Op 11,250; Acuff Co-Op 9,100; Wilson Co-Op 4,865; McClung Co-Op 3,670; Union Co-Op 3,444; Wayside

Gin 3,305; Hackberry Gin 3,150; Farmers Gin 2,900; Posey Gin 2,396; Getzki Gin 1,675; Basinger Gin 1,420.

The South Plains cotton harvest was sixty to seventy per cent complete on Friday, January 7th, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing office in Lubbock.

The cotton harvest resumed on Thursday and is increasing daily.

Most of the cotton classed last week at the four Slaton U.S.D.A. Classing Offices was harvested before the snow.

The U.S.D.A. Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland classed 163,000 samples during the week ending Friday, January 7th, bringing the season's total to 734,000. At this date last year the four offices had classed 1,617,000 samples of the 1970 crop.

Grades of the cotton classed at the Lubbock office were lower than those of the previous week.

Low Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 44 per cent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted made up 15 per cent, Low Middling 8 per cent, and all Spotted and Tinged grades 23 per cent.

Staples were predominantly 29 to 31. Nineteen per cent had a staple length of 29, 54 per cent stapled 30 to 19 per cent was 31.

Only four per cent of the cotton "miked" in the Lubbock office was in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 8 per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 32 per cent 3.0 through 3.2, 41 per cent was 2.7 through 2.9, and 15 per cent was 2.6 and below.

The Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported increased trading on the Lubbock market but prices were \$5.00 per bale lower. Prices ranged from 30 to 32 1/2 cents with most cotton selling between 31 and 32 cents.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 - 4.9 micronaire range were: Low Middling, Staple 30-31.80, Low Middling, Staple 31-32.00, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, Staple 30-32.05, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, Staple 31 - 32.30, Low Middling Light Spotted, Staple 30-31.65 and Low Middling Light Spotted, Staple 31 - 31.85.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$40 to \$70 per ton with most prices in the \$48 to \$52 range.

City Considers Additional Man At Fire Station

Slaton City Commission, in a regular monthly meeting Tuesday night, had a relatively routine session with discussions on several items highlighting the agenda.

The accountant for the city recommended that paving liens be charged off, insofar as bookkeeping was concerned. The commission agreed to this move, but indicated that legal steps will still be taken to secure payment on the liens.

The commission also discussed another bookkeeping matter, one concerning the Harold Wilson escrow account. The escrow is in connection with sewer lines which were extended under US-84 bypass, with work paid by Wilson. An escrow account was set up to repay the cost of the project, but there has been some disagreement as to the method of repayment. Further study will be made by the commission.

Commissioners also discussed the need of a second resident fireman at the Slaton station. Mayor Bland Tomlinson was asked to meet with Fire Chief Don Kendrick and discuss a possible solution, since the budget does not include the addition of another paid fireman.

The mayor also reported that the water superintendent had recommended repairs to a storage tank and paint jobs for two overhead tanks. Only one bid has been received on the work, and the commission is awaiting bids from two more companies.

Tomlinson also reported that two more seats needed to be filled on the Planning and Zoning Commission. Commissioners will name two more candidates.

Commissioner Bart Diaz requested that stop signs and a crosswalk be placed near Guadalupe Church. Stop signs are already in the area, but are at the wrong place, he said. The commission agreed the signs should be moved.

Attending the session were the mayor and all four commissioners, City Sec. Alex Webb, and City Atty. Harvey Morton.

Legion Gives 'Hard Hats' To Policemen

City of Slaton police officers this week have some new hats to wear, but they aren't especially anxious to wear them.

The new hats are protective helmets designed for use in potential emergency situations and which have been made part of each officer's arsenal of riot control equipment. Eight of the helmets were purchased and presented by Slaton American Legion Post 438 to the eight members of the Slaton Police Dept.

Presentation of the headgear was made Tuesday morning by Delmar Tucker, past commander of Post 438, in the absence of L. A. Reasoner, post commander.

Police Chief Glen Farmer expressed appreciation to the Legion for the new helmets and for other support of the law enforcement agency by the post during the year.

"These specially designed helmets are for protection of officers involved in any kind of riot or other possible physical confrontation," Chief Farmer said. "The helmets would be considered one of the paramount pieces of riot equipment to be used by officers. They will be carried in police cars to be used as necessary, although regular headgear will be worn by officers on normal duty," he added.

Trustees Set Election, Extend McClesky's Pact

Slaton Independent School District's board of education set a date for this year's school board election and extended the contract of Supt. J. C. McClesky at Tuesday night's meeting in the school business office.

McClesky's contract was extended one year to 1975, continuing the policy of keeping administrative contracts three years ahead.

Date for the school board election --actually set by law, but it must be acknowledged by the board -- was set for Saturday, April 1, with filing deadline to be March 1. Terms of Mrs. Bettye Burks and R. C. Hall are to expire this year.

Mrs. Bill Carnes was spokesman for members of Slaton Classroom Teachers Assn. who requested and were granted a minor amendment to a previously submitted agreement with the school board.

Supt. McClesky reported in detail current developments regarding a recent federal court decision which ruled illegal the currently effective system of financing schools in Texas. The judges ruled that the present system of disbursement of funds based on property tax collection discriminates against the poorer districts and their constituents. Subsequently it has been ruled that school districts in the state may sell no more bonds, pending an appeal by the State of Texas to the U.S. Supreme Court. McClesky pointed out that the entire school property tax-bonding system has been thrown into question.

The superintendent reported an increase in average daily attendance at Slaton schools running at 1829.79 pupils per day during the first semester, and increase of about 63 over the average for the previous year. He noted that 1,928 now are enrolled in the schools, about 100 more than last year, with the biggest increase in high school, where 541 now are enrolled, compared to an average attendance of 480 in 1971.

The increase has caused problems in crowded facilities, particularly in high school, McClesky noted. However, he pointed out, "until there is some clarification of this ruling by the federal courts, there will be no possibility of increasing space" in the school.

New Mobile Home Park Opens Here

Holiday Mobile Home Park was formally opened in Slaton Tuesday with Mayor Bland Tomlinson presiding at the ribbon-cutting ceremony at 2 p.m.

The new \$170,000 mobile home park is located at 20th and Hockley and contains 64 homesites--with 28 to "grow on".

Also taking part in the ribbon-cutting event were Cecil Jennings, owner-developer

from Lubbock; J. C. McClesky, Slaton C of C president; John Sudder, assistant director of the Lubbock FHA office; Bill Stracener, design architect; and Mrs. Vera Drewry, original land owner of Slaton.

Jennings said he hoped the park "will be a real asset to Slaton and the Lubbock metro area." He called it a "pilot project" for small towns in the region.

The paved and landscaped park is completely fenced with controlled access. Features include paved parking and walkways, concrete patios, individual storage units, community and laundry building, playground, off-street parking for visitors, underground utilities, and paved parking for boats, trailers and campers.

Jennings said he believes the mobile home park will provide needed housing space for Slaton, as well as attract some people who work in Lubbock and prefer to live in a smaller town. He believes the location will be an asset -- close to schools, the city park, and to Lubbock and Buffalo Springs Lake.

After Mayor Tomlinson cut the ribbon Tuesday afternoon, McClesky presented Jennings with his "first dollar of profit" -- a traditional framed dollar given to new industries and firms here by the Chamber of Commerce.

The park is developed for 64 mobile home spaces, with land for 28 more spaces to be added to the west. It took 2,931 feet of fence to enclose the park. Two spaces have already been taken in the park, both by young couples.

The charter night banquet has been scheduled for Jan. 21, with the time to be announced later. The Jaycee chapter was recently formed in Slaton under sponsorship of Lubbock Jaycees.

Police Working On Burglaries

Slaton Police Department reported a relatively "quiet" period the past week, with a burglary and vandalism at Slaton Golf Course at the top of the list.

Chief Glen Farmer reported that a break-in at the women's building at the golf course resulted mostly in vandalism. An investigation is continuing in the burglary, which occurred Thursday.

Police reported that a burglary at Slaton Veterinary Clinic on Dec. 30 has been solved with the arrest of a woman in Lubbock. A male accomplice is still being sought. A checkbook was taken in the burglary, and police arrested the woman in Lubbock for passing some of the checks.

One ambulance call was made the past week, and police made several arrests on liquor law violations and traffic violations.

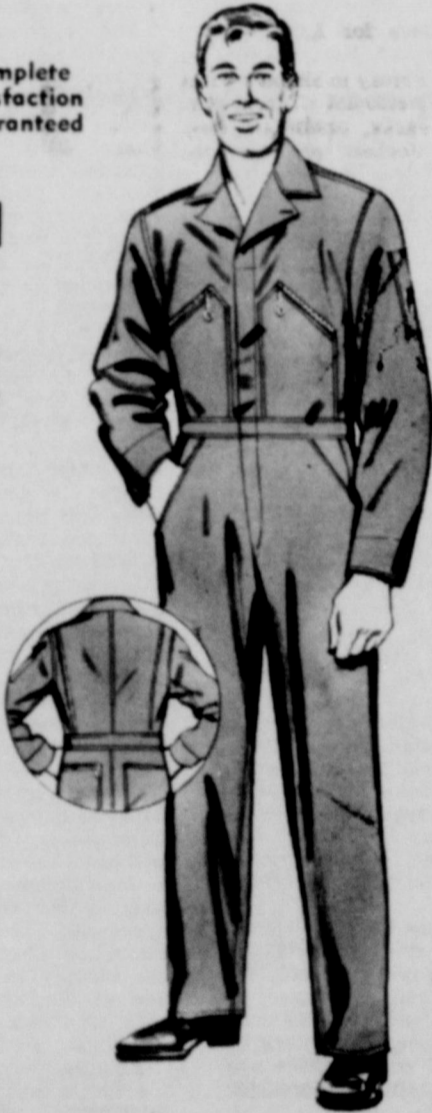

Artist to Present Lecture in Slaton

Dr. Emilio Caballero, well-known artist and head of the West Texas State University

art department, will present a lecture - demonstration at 7 p.m. Jan. 25 in Slaton.

The presentation is sponsored by the Slaton Art Club under auspices of WTSU's newly inaugurated Faculty Performance Series, which provides without cost cultural programs in music, art, drama and speech to fine arts groups in West Texas communities.

The project is supported by the Friends of Fine Arts, a non-profit corporation organized two years ago to offer financial assistance to the fine arts program at West Texas State.

The Slaton program is free to the public, said Mrs. J. S. Edwards, Art Club secretary.

Caballero, in his 16th year as art department head, has exhibited throughout the United States. His works are represented in numerous private collections.

Born in Newark, N. J., Caballero moved to Texas in 1938. He attended Amarillo College and received a Bachelor of Arts Degree from WTSU. He holds a Master of Arts Degree and a doctorate from Columbia University. He has been a member of the WTSU faculty since 1949.

He has conducted numerous art clinics and adjudicated art shows throughout the Southwest. His own works have taken top prizes in national competitions.

Caballero is a member of a number of professional art organizations, and is a fellow of the Royal Society of Arts of Great Britain.

Although he is considered one of the most noted artists of West Texas, Caballero says he is a "teacher before an artist." In this respect he was one of 12 WTSU professors who, in 1966, were cited for their excellence in teaching.

Recently Caballero was instrumental in creating an art therapy program for Northwest Texas Hospital's Psychiatric Pavilion in Amarillo.

He has developed a number of new art techniques, some of them patented, which utilize such everyday items as yarn, paper napkins and housepaints for aesthetic purposes.

In his most recent pursuit for what he calls "relevancy" in art, Caballero has compiled a number of books describing these new processes using commercial products and has sent them to the national producers of these items.

The knowledge of the unique application of their products at West Texas State has prompted several major U.S. corporations to send representatives to WTSU in search of new ideas for their products.

Panty hose facts. All panty hose, regardless of brand name, are made of nylon. The differences come from the finishing processes. Some companies put more twist into the yarns that make the panty hose. The more the hose will stretch. Although some hose have been processed to stretch considerably, they may not return to their original shape. This results in bagging. How much panty hose will run depends a lot on the knit. Plain or regular knit, such as sheer hose is most susceptible to running.

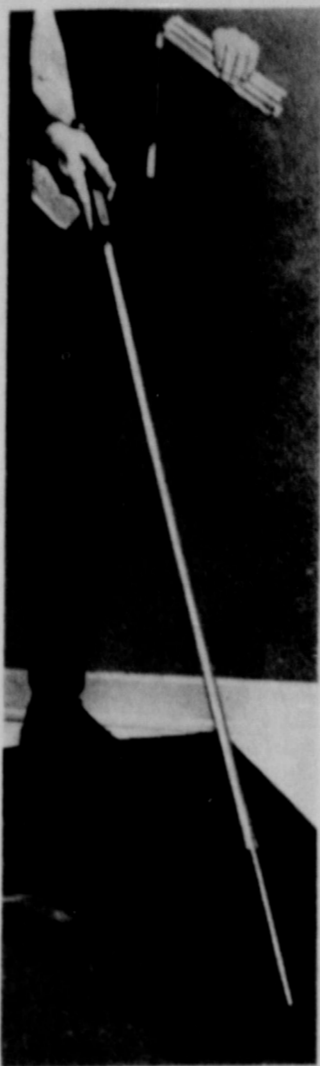

"I know that you new people on the board will find that Don will be a good president," he said. "I just can't say thank you enough for all you have done in the last year."

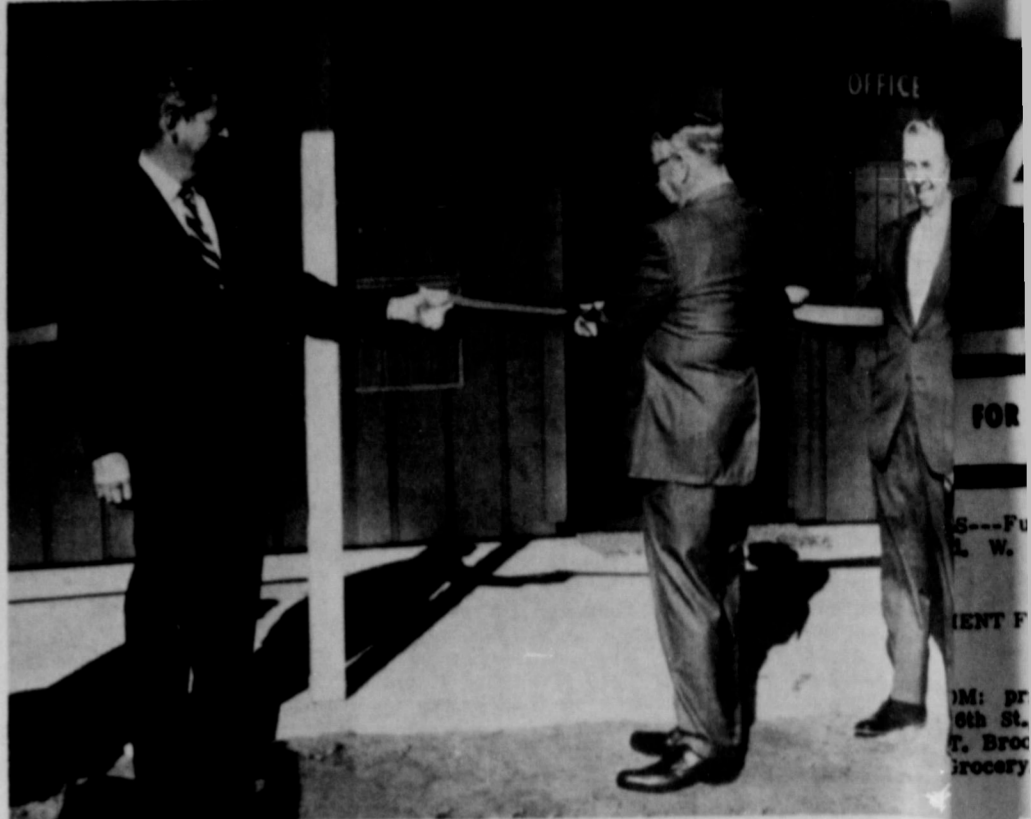
