Police Chief Glen Farmer expressed appreciation to the Legion for the new helmets and for other support of the law enforcement agency by the post during the year.

"These specially - designed helmets are for protection of officers involved in any kind of riot or other possible physical confrontation," Chief Farmer said, "The helmets would be considered one of the para mount pieces of riot equipment to be used by officers. They will be carried in police cars to be used as necessary, although regular headgear will be worn by officers on normal duty," he added.

Jennings said he hoped the park "will be a real asset to Slaton and the Lubbock metro area." He called it a "pilot project" for small towns in the region.

The paved and landscaped park is completely fenced with controlled access. Features include paved parking and walkways, concrete patios, individual storage units, community and laundry building, playground, off-street parking for visitors, underground utilities. and paved parking for boats, trailers and campers.

Jennings said he believes the mobile home park will provide needed housing space for Slaton, as well as attract some people who work in Lubbock and prefer to live in a smaller town. He believes the location will be an asset -- close to schools, the city park, and to Lubbock and Buffalo Springs Lake.

After Mayor Tomlinson cut the ribbon Tuesday afternoon, McClesky presented Jennings with his "first dollar of profit" -- a traditional framed dollar given to new industries and firms here by the Chamber

of Commerce. The park is developed for 64 mobile home spaces, with land for 28 more spaces to be added to the west. It took 2,931 feet of fence to enclose the park. Two spaces have already been taken in the park, both by young couples.

A number of farmers had cotton stacked in the fields as they worked almost around the clock to strip the cotton. The usual shortage of trailers handicapped the harvest as cotton trailers stacked up in the gin yards.

The bale count Wednesday morning by THE SLATONITE showed these totals at the gins: Slaton Co-Op 11,250; Acuff Co-Op 9,100; Wilson Co-Op 4,865; McClung Co-Op 3,670; Union Co-Op 3,444; Wayside

City Considers Additional Man At Fire Station

Slaton City Commission, in a regular monthly meeting Tuesday night, had a relatively routine session with discussions on several items highlighting the agenda.

The accountant for the city recommended that paving liens be charged off, insofar as bookkeeping was concerned. The commission agreed to this move, but indicated that legal steps will still be taken to secure payment on the liens.

The commission also dis cussed another bookkeeping matter, one concerning the Harold Wilson escrow account, The escrow is in connection with sewer lines which were extended under US-84 bypass, with work paid by Wilson. An escrow account was set up to repay the cost of the project, but there has been some disagreement as to the method of repayment, Further study will be made by the commission.

The mayor also reported that the water superintendent had recommended repairs to a storage tank and paint jobs for two overhead tanks. Only one bid has been received on the work. and the commission is awaiting bids from two more companies.

Tomlinson also reported that two more seats needed to be filled on the Planning & Zoning Commission. Commissioners will name two more candidates. Commissioner Bart Diaz requested that stop signs and a

crosswalk be placed near



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The presentation is sponsored by the Slaton Art Club under auspices of WTSU's newly inaugurated Faculty Performance Series, which provides without cost cultural programs in music, art, drama and speech to fine arts groups in West Texas communities.

The project is supported by the Friends of Fine Arts, a non - profit corporation organized two years ago to offer financial assistance to the fine arts program at West Texas

The Slaton program is free to the public, said Mrs. J. S. Edwards, Art Club secretary.

Caballero, in his 16th year as art department head, has exhibited throughout the United States, His works are represented in numerous private collections.

Born in Newark, N. J., Cab-allero moved to Texas in 1938. He attended Amarillo College and received a Bachelor of Arts Degree from WTSU. He holds a Master of Arts Degree and a doctorate from Columbia University. He has been a member of the WTSU faculty since 1949.

He has conducted numerous art clinics and adjudicated art shows throughout the Southwest. His own works have taken top prizes in national competitions.

Caballero is a member of a number of professional art organizations, and is a fellow of the Royal Society of Arts of Great Britain.

Although he is considered one of the most noted artists of West Texas, Caballero says he is a "teacher before an artist." In this respect he was one of 12 WTSU professors who, in 1966, were cited for their excellence in teaching.

Recently Caballero was instrumental in creating an art therapy program for Northwest Texas Hospital's Psychiatric Pavillion in Amarillo.

He has developed a number of new art techniques, some of them patented, which utilize such everyday items as yarn, paper napkins and housepaints for aesthetic purposes.

In his most recent pursuit for what he calls "relevancy" in art, Caballero has compiled a number of books describing these new processes using commercial products and has sent them to the national producers of these items.

The knowledge of the unique application of their products at West Texas State has prompted several major U.S. corporations to send representatives to WTSU in search of new ideas for their products.
