## Burglary Cases Cleared

Burglaries, thefts and the clearing up of some of the burglary cases were highlights of reports on file at Slaton Police Dept. during the last week. Several residents and business owners reported burglaries Thursday, with the residential burglaries in the southeast part of town.

Three burglaries and one case of vandalism were cleared by police action this week, after two juveniles were picked up by officers Tuesday and another voluntarily came to the police station to make a statement.

Burglaries cleared by the statements of the trio were at Abare's Second Hand Store, Melba's Beauty Shop and Ham's Plumbing. A case of vandalism in which an obscene word was painted on a pickup was admitted by one of the youngsters.

Mrs. Gene Ethridge reported the break-in at Melba's, 177 Texas Ave. on Saturday night. Entry was gained by kicking a hole in the rear door of the building. Missing were a quantity of candy and soft drinks.

At Ham's Plumbing, 175 Texas Ave., entry was gained through the rear door on the same night. An undetermined amount of money was taken from a soft drink machine after the intruders found the key to the machine. Also missing were a letter opener, copper tubing and a plastic coke carrier.

H. F. Schilling, 920 S. 19th St., reported to police the loss of a change purse containing \$12 to \$15 from his home. He described a suspect to police, explaining that the man had come to his home the previous day purportedly selling a home fire alarm setup.

A car left Self Service Gas, 1400 S. 9th, without payment for \$4.50 worth of fuel on Saturday. A description of the car and license number was given to officers.

On Sunday at 6:43 p.m. a 1956 auto driven by Raymon

Pena and a 1961 pickup driven by Albert Louis Schwartz were involved in a collision at 9th and Scott, with damage estimated at \$550.

Pamela A. Gaeta, 1165 S. 6th, reported burglary of her apartment, with entry made through a window. Missing were a toaster, can opener and knife sharpener, three wigs, a holster and belt and green stamps. Total value of the stolen items was placed at \$130.31.

Edith McNeil, 210 E. Edwards, told officers someone entered her residence through a window and took a portable television set and some records.

At 240 E. Edwards, burglars entered the home of Harold Pursley, taking a fan valued at \$50.

The residence of Consuelo Ramirez, 1100 S. 4th, was entered through a window between 7 and 10 p.m. Thursday. Bedrooms were ransacked and missing were an RCA portable record player - radio, \$6, in change, records and a record carrying case, two women's watches and a silver ring.

Officer Darrell Denny spotted four youngsters attempting to force open a soap machine at Quality Cleaners and apprehended them a block away Thursday. A quantity of soap was returned to the firm, and the youngsters were released to their parents.

Bicycle theft reports continued this week, and one bicycle which has been stored in the police department for almost a year since being recovered was claimed. A bike was reported stolen from Robert Thorn, 505 W. Garza, taken from the front yard.

Capt. Jeff Cramer advised owners of bicycles to put them up at night, in the back yard or in sheds or garages, being sure to close the garages and lock them, if possible. Those riding bikes to school were urged to use bicycle locks.

The following immunizations are required by law for children in the first three grades: POLIO... at least three doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday.

DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS... Minimum of 3 doses, with at least one dose have been received since the fourth birthday. MEASLES... One dose of vaccine, or history of measles illness. RUBELLA... One dose of vaccine.

Any child who will be six years old before Sept. 1, 1972,

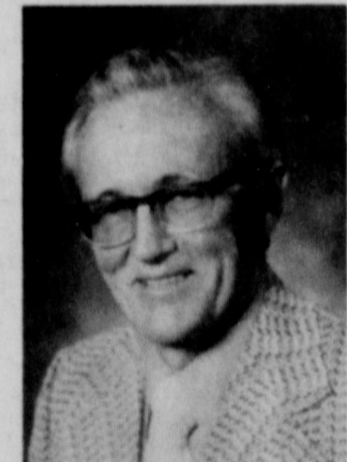

An election to replace three of the seven man Board of Directors will be held also. Those whose terms will expire are D. D. Davis, Max Barnett and G. H. Ragland.

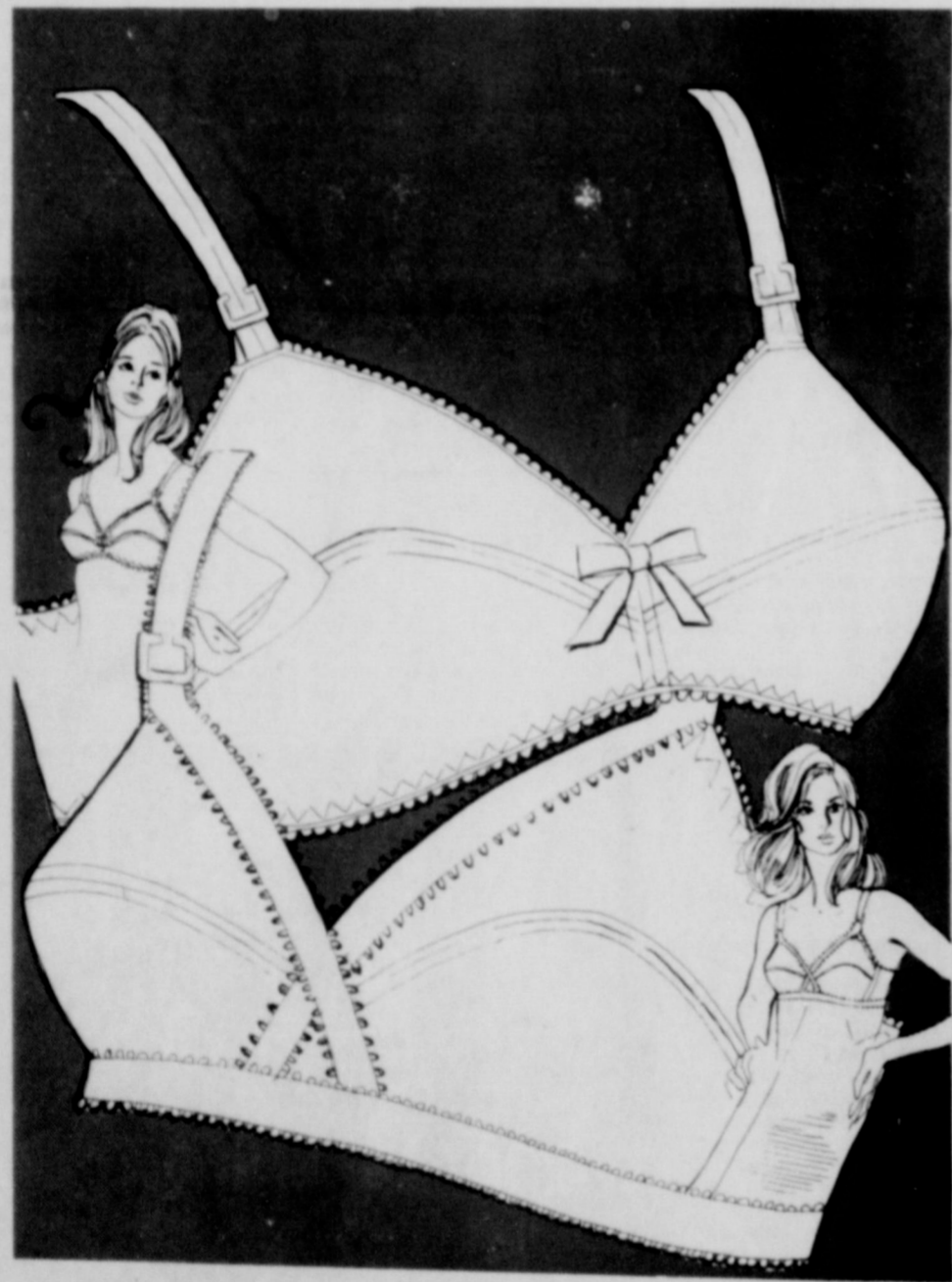

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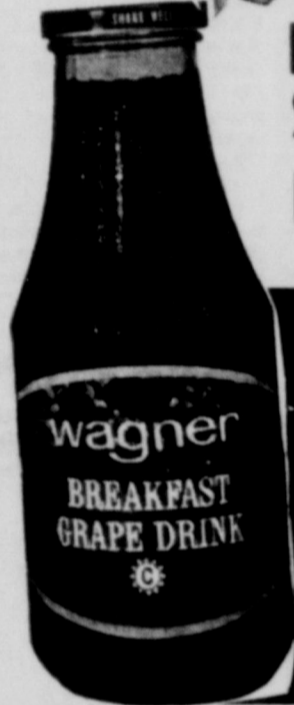

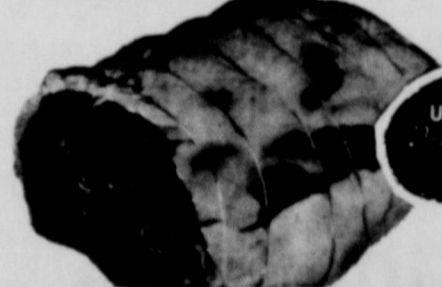

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## Farming Practices In Ireland Described By Ex-Area Resident

(Editors Note: This is a second in a series of articles on life in Northern Ireland as experienced by Mrs. Kim Young, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Crumley, Route 1, Lubbock. In this article, Mrs. Young describes Irish farming.)

Since most of the people who will read these articles are connected with the farming industry, I thought information about the Irish version of the age-old occupation would be of interest.

Ireland is several years behind in farming techniques and knowledge in many different areas. The once large tenant farms have, over the years, been split into very small plots owned by individual farmers.

Each plot is about the size of a football field. The farmer separates his "acreage" from the others by either planting a hedge or building a rock fence totally encompassing his farm. Naturally, these farms are too small for cash crop farming to prove beneficial so these farms are mostly grassy meadows for grazing livestock year round.

On the few small cultivated plots grow potatoes, carrots, cabbage, lettuce, turnips, brussels sprouts and various other vegetables. Tomatoes, etc., are grown in greenhouses. Needless to say, they are small and expensive though quite tasty during the summer months. Oh, yes, by the way, the farms are cultivated distinctly up and down the hills--a sight to startle

a country gal from Texas.

On the grassy slopes graze cattle, sheep, goats, horses, pigs and chickens. Closer observation reveals several differences between American breed and their Irish counterparts. For example, the horses have longer hair and a great deal more of it. The horses themselves are often much smaller than those that are "home on the range". The cows seem much lazier and perhaps as a result beef is extremely fatty and the milk unbelievably rich. Various breeds of pigs, goats and sheep (including Angoras) are also in abundance on the grassy squares.

The standards for produce leave much to be desired. Four out of six eggs I buy at the store are beginning to approach the embryo stage. The beef is not aged so the steaks, roasts and ground beef have a wild taste that "takes getting used to". The chickens, ducks and turkeys are very poorly cleaned and dressed. The pork here, however, is really super -- huge luscious chops and the best tasting bacon imaginable. (Though until recently processors did not remove the rind. That made a "bacon, lettuce and tomato" a bit crunchy!) Potatoes, carrots and other vegetables are rather inferior in quality due to disease, insects and moisture, but the prices are equally low! I'll explain more about the foods available and common in Ireland in a later article.

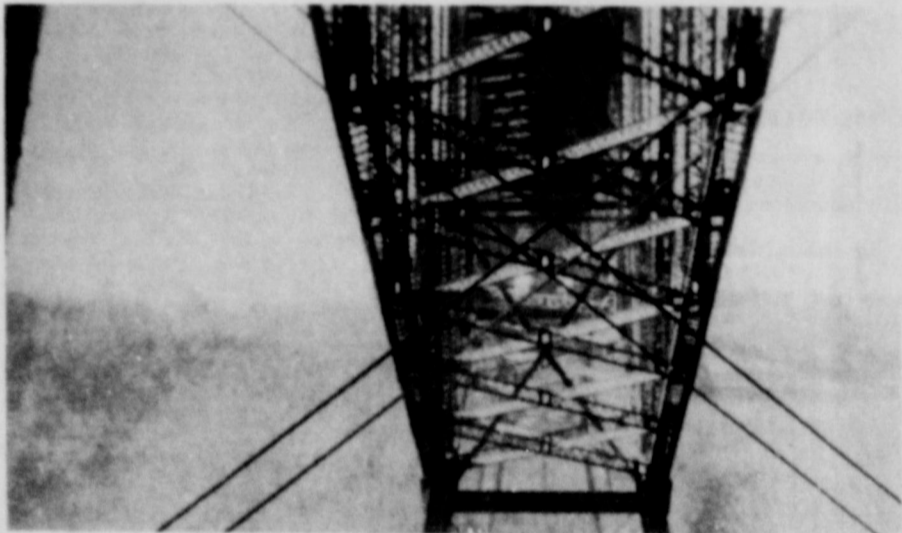
