## Accidents in County Reported

As Highway Patrol investigated 40 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County in the month of February, according to A. C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol supervisor. Accidents resulted in two persons killed and 23 persons injured. Traffic accident summary for this month shows 53 accidents resulting in five killed, and 28 persons injured. Traffic accident summary for the month of the Lubbock Department of Transportation for February, 1972 shows 78 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed, and 233 persons injured as compared with 77 accidents in February, 1971 with 521 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 251 persons injured.

## Estimated Tax Is Due April 17

If your total estimated income and self-employment tax for 1972 exceeds your income tax withholding by \$100 or more, you should file a declaration of estimated tax, Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said this week. Complete instructions on how to file can be found on Form 1040-ES, which was sent to everyone who filed a declaration last year and others who, according to IRS records, probably are required to make a declaration. Campbell said vouchers and pre-addressed envelopes were included in the tax return package for the taxpayers' convenience. Estimates for 1972 are due by April 17, the same date that 1971 Federal income tax returns are due. Campbell said taxpayers who fill out their tax returns early avoid the risk of making costly errors because of haste and carelessness. He noted that returns filed in April are more likely to result in errors than those filed earlier.

## Scout Fund Drive Completion Pushed

Campaign for funds for Boy Scouts in Slaton is 62 per cent complete. J. C. McClesky, chairman of the fund drive, said Wednesday, McClesky urged all workers to get their cards processed and turn them in as quickly as possible to complete the drive. "Also, we would urge those who have not given to reconsider in view of the needs of the scouts here," McClesky said.

## Three Vandalism Cases Reported

Three incidents of vandalism and one wreck in which two persons were injured headed police activity here this week. Joseph Allen Miles, 23, of Southland, remained in Mercy Hospital Wednesday for treatment of injuries suffered Monday in a collision at S. 9th St. and U.S. 84. His condition was reported as good. His wife, Mickey, was treated and released after the mishap about 7 p.m. Wahlecia Dell Solt, 71, a passenger in the other vehicle involved, was treated, but released Tuesday. Driver of the other car was George E. Sims, 71, of Roswell, N.M. Vandalism incidents during the week included a rifle shot through a Santa Fe train engine window, a rock thrown through a plate glass window at Gaydos Texaco, and a Coke machine damaged at Hwy. 84 Texaco. Jimmy Brooks, 120 N. 3rd, reported theft of a tape player from his car.

## Hospital Fund Drive Is At One-Third Of Goal

More than one-third of the projected goal of \$70,000 in donations needed to insure the continued operation of Mercy Hospital has been received or pledged, W. R. Sewell, chairman of the board of trustees of the Slaton Hospital Memorial Foundation, Inc., told the corporation's board of governors Monday night. Sewell told the group, holding its first annual meeting, that a total of \$25,889.23 has been produced by the fund drive so far, and expressed optimism that with the continuing help of organizations, businesses and individuals in Slaton and the surrounding area, the \$70,000 total eventually will be reached. After electing Howard Hoffman as new president of the board of governors, L. A. Haral vice president and Earl Bartley secretary, the group authorized the board of trustees to continue the fund campaign, and to borrow \$40,000 in the interim as soon as \$30,000 of the goal is reached, stipulating that money collected thereafter would be used solely to repay the \$40,000. This action was taken so that the trust action could go ahead with necessary projects and innovations

in the physical plant of the hospital without delay. Monday's meeting was the first for the board of governors, composed of contributors of \$100 or more to the hospital fund. The smaller board of trustees, the actual operating group for the corporation, meets monthly, and had its March session just prior to the meeting of the governors. Hoffman discussed problems involving the renovation of the hospital, and then the group heard motions from the board of trustees, approving each proposal by the trustees. Among these was a motion to stagger the terms of the seven trustees, who had drawn for various expiration dates. Terms of Harvey Morton and Dr. M. J. McWeen are to expire in 1973; terms of Sewell and R. C. Hall in 1974; and terms of W. B. Nesbitt, T. J. Wallace and Alex Bednarr in 1975. Phillip McDonald, new administrator of Mercy Hospital, was introduced, and expressed appreciation to those who have assisted him since he assumed his duties.

Mrs. Clarence Buxkemper, president of the Hospital Auxiliary, reported that this group will observe its sixth anniversary this year and invited others to join the current 45 members. She also praised the work of 15 Candy Strippers, students who work after school as volunteer aides to nurses and the hospital staff. "They are very dedicated, and we are proud of them," she said. After making special mention of the contribution of more than \$700 by Negro citizens of Slaton, Sewell observed that the \$25,889 obtained so far has come from a variety of sources. He expressed appreciation "to the 17 organizations of various kinds who have had a part in contributing to this effort. It has been as widespread a community effort as Slaton has ever seen." He said that other donations have come from four memorial gifts, one labor union, one foundation, churches and individuals "and from as far away as New Jersey." The meeting at the Chamber of Commerce building was attended by 38 persons.

## County Community Action Board Funds Granted

Gov. Preston Smith has announced his approval of a community action grant of \$33,958 in federal funds to Community Action Board in Lubbock County, Inc. in Lubbock for

operation of the agency's programs. The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is effective March 1 through June 30, 1972.

the first four months of the agency's program year. Program accounts and the amount of federal funds allotted each are: Administration, \$10,054; General Community Programming, \$15,420; and Family Planning, \$8,484.

Four to six new neighborhood councils will be formed through General Community Programming, and these councils will participate in the formulation of neighborhood goals for self-improvement. Creation of economic development enterprises will be encouraged in each council, and technical assistance given to that end. In the neighborhood centers services such as tax help, consumer and health education and sewing and nutrition classes will be provided. Also, a county-wide housing program for the repair of delapidated houses will be conducted, and a youth development project will be established.

Also through General Community Programming an emergency food and medical services project will be conducted which will involve a special summer lunch program for 200 enrollees, assisting 30 families with gardening and canning and continuing operation of the Food Pantry for hungry, malnourished and temporarily destitute families, serving 10-30 families per week. The Family Planning program will involve 100 additional patients in the existing case load through neighborhood canvassing, publicity and provision of educational materials.

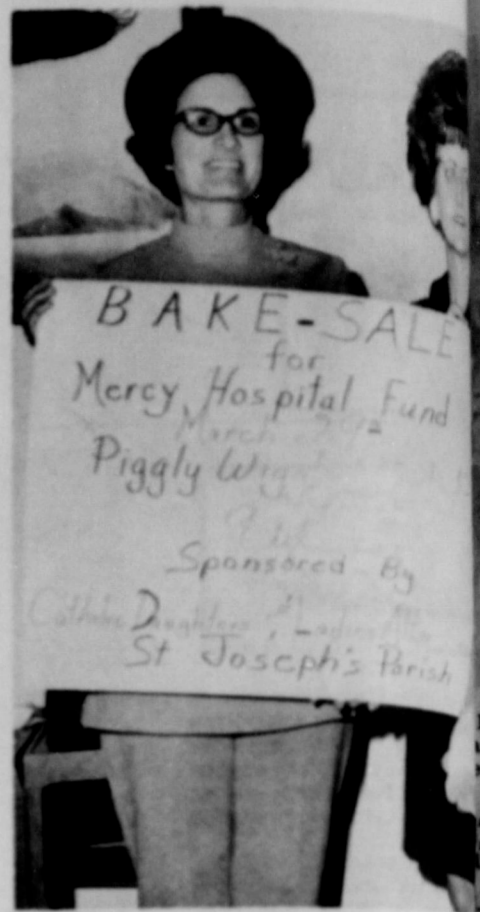
**TRACK SEASON IS HERE**

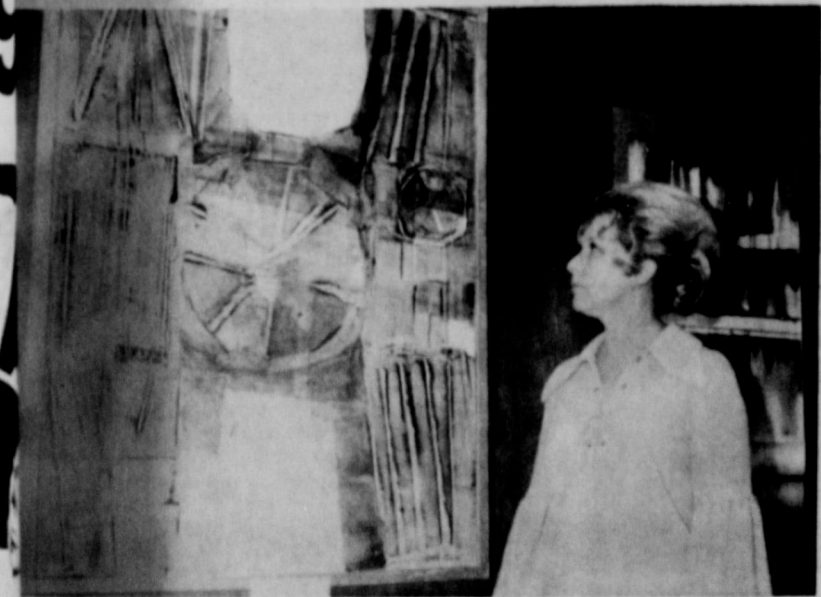

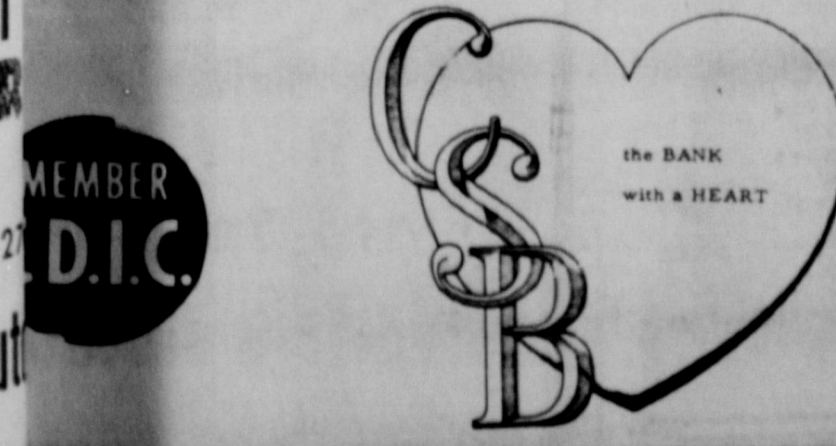

Rev. Boyce Evans, Lubbock evangelist, gives a dramatic account of his struggle with alcohol.

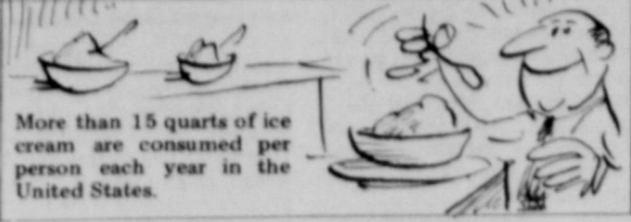
Mrs. Lynch's husband, Jimmy, is the subject of a chapter, "Death Slept Between Us", the story of his bout with cancer that struck him down three times.

## Pitfalls In Advance Contracting Cited

Advance contracting has become a more popular way to buy and sell cotton in the past few months, and this popularity makes it incumbent on the buyer and seller alike to be aware of possible pitfalls, the National Cotton Council has warned.

The grower has three options open to him in handling his crop. He may sell in the futures market; he may sell his crop forward; or he may hold it for sale in the spot market. The producer who contracts his crop in advance secures a known price, which permits him to plan his year's operations more effectively.

At the Memphis, Tenn., meeting, the group recognized two major problems with advance contracting: assurance that the buyer will be ready and able to take delivery on the quantity called for by the contract and make prompt payment when the seller invoices the cotton, and assurance that the seller will deliver the quality cotton ex-

pected by the buyer in the quantity called for by the contract.

It was pointed out that failure of either the buyer or the seller to perform satisfactorily would make it difficult for that party to make contracts in future years. The group also pointed out that contracts are only as good as the people who make them, and that no contract could be written which would give complete protection from an unscrupulous party to a contract.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates that by early this year about 31 per cent of the 1972 crop will be contracted, and with adequate contracts available it is generally felt that selling in this way will increase.

The group meeting in Memphis pointed out there are different types of contracts, based on whatever agreements the buyer and seller may come to. There are, however, some points to consider when making contracts which might reduce the risks for both parties. The committee suggested:

--Knowing the reputation and financial standing of those involved. If there is a lack of personal knowledge, banks or persons with whom the other party has dealt can often provide information, and if a broker is involved he should have satisfactory knowledge of both parties.

--Entering into mutual performance bonds or escrow accounts if not completely satisfied about the ability or desire of the other party to perform according to the contract.

What is to be delivered, when it is to be delivered, and where it is to be delivered, as well as the selling price and whether the terms agreed to are binding on both the purchaser and the seller, are points of the contract to be studied closely, according to the committee.

Considerable emphasis was given to the fact that while discounts for poor quality cotton are not very significant in this

time of short supply, buyers remember growers who fail to do a satisfactory job of preserving quality, and the word gets around in the trade, just as it does among growers when a buyer reneges on a contract. Buyers either refuse to enter into agreements with these producers in the future or discount offers they may make.

## Farm Program Changes Urged

According to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., at least three changes in 1972 farm program regulations should be made, each of which would be of benefit to High Plains farmers and to the accomplishment of program objectives.

cotton and feed grain acreage is necessary, Johnson says, because County ASCS offices will be hard pressed to supply measuring service to all producers between the time crops are planted and July 15. Under some Spring conditions many producers may be unable to plant feed grains until near the first of July. To a lesser extent, the same situation could exist for cotton. And should this happen over all or a significant portion of a county, ASCS office managers state it will be "next to impossible" to get all acreage measured, notify farmers of measured acreage and get them "certified" by July 15.

The certification deadline in previous years has been Aug. 1, and USDA changed to July 15 this year "so we can get payment checks out earlier." But it stands to reason that producers are going to certify acreage as soon as practical, whatever the deadline, Johnson says.

As regulations now stand, farmers with wheat planted are required to designate all set-aside acreage, including cotton and feed grain set-aside, by May 1. In almost all instances this date will fall ahead of cotton planting and in many cases before grain sorghum or corn is planted.

The third regulation which needs revision is explained by Johnson as one which will force producers with both barley and feed grain allotments to plant more feed grains and less cotton -- precisely what USDA does not want. The rule is that farmers with an allotment of both crops will have to plant to either feed grain or barley 45 percent of the acreage total in both allotments. Otherwise they will lose 20 percent of both allotments.

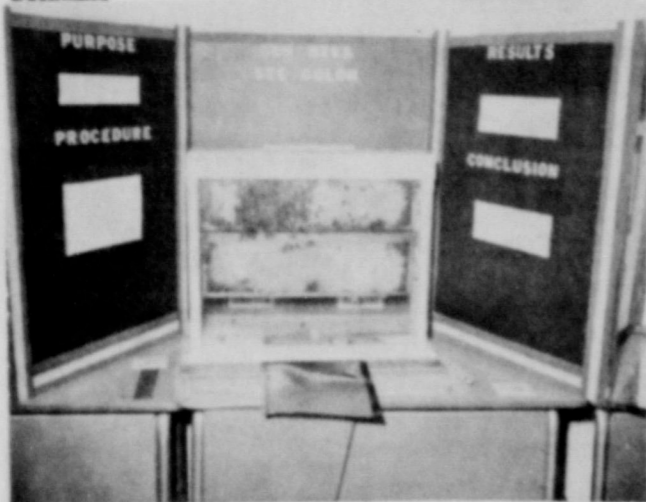

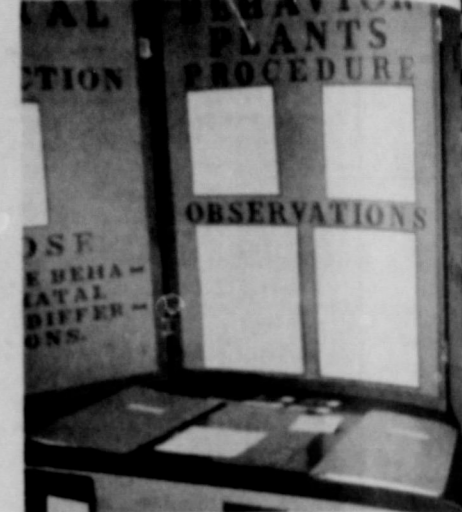

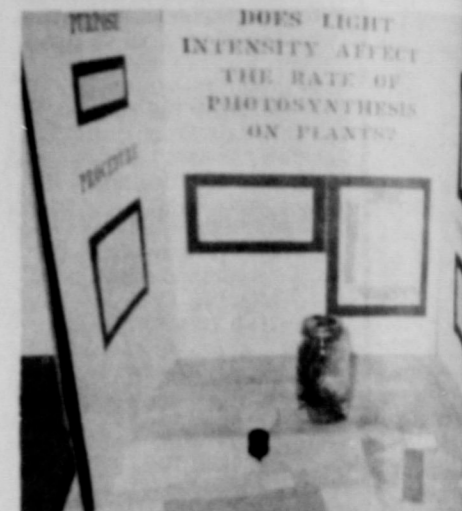
