

was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 44 per cent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted made up 23 per cent, Low Middling 11 per cent, and all Spotted grades 10 per cent.

Staples were predominantly 29 to 32. Ten per cent had a staple length of 29, 36 per cent stapled 30, 28 per cent was 31, and 15 per cent was 32. Only nine per cent of the cotton "miked" in the Lubbock office was in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 11 per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 36 per cent 3.0 through 3.2, 35 per cent was 2.7 through 2.9, and 9 per cent was 2.6 and below. Cotton prices increased on

the Lubbock market and were five to ten dollars per bale higher than the previous week. The Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported increased trading in the new crop cotton. Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Low Middling 30 - 29.95, Low Middling 31 - 30.15, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 30 -30.20, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31 - 30.35, Low Middling Light Spotted 30 -29.80, and Low Middling Light Spotted 31 - 30.00.







Expenditures Set for Santa Fe

Capital expenditures planned points. for Santa Fe Industries Companies in 1972 will approximate non-rail improvements include \$137 million, compared with an additional tractors and trailers estimated expenditure of \$122 and improved terminal facilmillion in 1971, John S. Reed, president, announced today.

Most of the increase is for Santa Fe Railway which plans to spend approximately \$100 million in 1972, compared with estimated expenditures of \$89 million in 1971.

The railroad previously announced it will acquire 52 new and 50 rebuilt diesel locomotive units and 1,325 new and 568 rebuilt freight cars next year. Use Natural Materials For Merry Christmas

Christmas decorations don't have to be all tinsel and glitter. according to an article in the December issue of "Texas

Parks & Wildlife" magazine. With many of the natural materials at hand, you can enjoy an old-fashioned holiday and it won't cost you much. You can make your own decorations, and "the results will speak highly of your creativity, patience and regard for Christmas," according to David Baxter, author of the article, "Gather Nature's

"For centuries," said Baxter, 'natural decorations made of holly, mistletoe, pine cones and colored leaves have been used at Christmas. Dried flowers and plants such as broomweed, yucca, milkweed pods and purple thistles are used at Christmastime in the Southwest.

Some of the natural decorations could double as gifts for wildlife. Bird feeder

wreaths are one suggestion. All you need to make a bird feeder wreath is clusters of bunches of red oyracantha berries, dried water ily pods, pine cones, suet, wild vire frame, a ribbon and a spoo of light florist wire.

The suet is melted and the birdseed is added to the fat. The mixture is then cooled and then stuffed into acorn cups, open pods or pine cones. The milo spikes are wired securely to the

frame. Then the pine cones, seed pods, berries and leaves are secured to the frame in an artistic manner.

Here are other suggestions: -Decorate your tree with stars made from milkweed pods.

-Use nuts for various

decorations. -Wrapp homemade gifts in your own design, using the outline of pressed leaves and spray paint.

-Make bird feeders from materials at hand.

Right after Christmas is a good time to plant trees. Dig a hole for the ex-Christmas tree and mix subsoil with an equal amount of humus. Water the tree well and mulch with leaves.

Farm User Permits, LPG. Decals Expire Dec. 31, 1971

A representative of Robert S. Calvert, Comptroller of Public Accounts, will be at Lubbock District Office from Monday thru Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily, for the pur-pose of renewing Special Farm User permits, and issuing 1972 decals for LPG operated licensed vehicles. The current decals expire on December 31,

Renewal notices have been mailed to those who currently hold a 1971 decal, and these notices should be taken to the meeting place, and as before, it will be necessary to bring the vehicle. The decals will cost \$60,00 each, and must be placed on the vehicle by the representative.

All farmers and ranchers that have vehicles that are LPG operated should purchase their 1972 decals as soon as possible, preferably on one of the dates listed above, in order to avoid the penalties as prescribed by law.

Anyone unable to meet the above schedule may purchase a 1972 LPG decal from the CHRISTA


Christmas

A live, green tree is a symbol of the beauty and joy of Christmas, but a dry tree is a fire hazard. Select a freshlooking and firm needled tree. Saw off the base of the tree at least one inch above the original cut, stand the tree in water, and keep it in water until it is taken down. Check the water level daily. Be sure to place the tree away from all sources of heat fireplaces, radiators or other

Don't rely on "do-it-yourself" flameproofing treatments, cautions the engineer. Tests indicate that some of the coatings available in aerosol cans are partly effective if the coating is thick enough. In short, there is no satisfactory home treatment which will retard fire in Christmas trees.

Artificial trees should be clearly marked as made of slow burning materials. If the tree has "built-in" lighting, look for the Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) Label. Use only indirect lighting on metal trees to avoid

Use noncombustible materials - metal, glass and asbestos - for decorations wherever possible. Cotton batting, flock and decorating paper should be flame proofed. Keep natural evergreen decorations away from candles, the fireplace and other heat sources. Don't use polystrene foam candle holders or polystrene decorations near lighted candles.

Remove combustible gift wrappings as soon as possible and place them in a covered metal trash can.

Finally, never leave children alone or without proper supervision

Be especially careful to keep matches and cigarette lighters out of their reach during the holiday period when your home contains more "fire hazards" than usual.

Have a family escape plan for use in case fire does strike and be sure doorways and stairs are not blocked by the tree or other holiday decorations

Also, in cooperation with local agencies and the news media of Texas, the DPS will conduct its "Operation Motor-cide" during both the Christmas and New Year holidays. Special tabulations on fatal accidents will be prepared and
