
Set Clock Up--

is generally issued by a local office of the National Weather Service, such as the one at Lubbock, or Clovis, when a tornado funnel has been sighted and confirmed. Warning broadcasts are continuous over radio and television and all stations remain on the air generally until danger has passed.

It has been urged to not call your local law enforcement agencies to ask questions about the weather, but DO call to report tornado funnels or unusual weather activity. Local law enforcement officials ask that individuals calling use the regular law center telephone number, 272-4268, and leave the emergency number, 272-4200 open for reporting tornadoes in the area.
