Pair Takes \$1,600 In Holdup

Two Negro men held up Ely's 8 'Til Late Grocery on S. 9th in Slaton about 2:45 p.m. Wednesday, escaping with an estimated \$1,600 in cash after tying up one clerk and threatening a woman clerk with a pistol.

at the store, told officers that the two men entered the store and went to different sections of the store. Observing their actions and suspecting shoplifting, she called another clerk, Randy Rampy, over to the main counter. Then she said, she

asked one of the men if she could help him and he said, "Yes," pulling a small caliber pistol and herding the two over to the main counter. He reportedly cocked the hammer of the pistol pointed at them.

Investigating officer George Quintero said the two tied up Rampy and ordered Mrs. Anthony to take the money from the cash register, put it in a brown bag, and hand it to them. After she complied, they told her to lie down on the floor for five minutes, warning her that if she looked up she would be shot.

After about a minute, Quintero said, she reached up and sounded a buzzer which alerts workers in the store-room to come to the front. Jesse Gatica, working in the back, then came up and untied Rampy. Gatica, in another portion of the store, had not been aware of the holdup.

The two employees of the store gave police a description of the wanted pair. They said they heard a car leave outside, but did not see it.

New Dairy Queen Opens In Slaton

A new combination drive-in and restaurant with a seating capacity of 60 inside has opened at a site on Hwy. 41 west of the U. S. 84 by-pass, as Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Ledbetter began operating their new Dairy Queen last weekend.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony Monday morning formally gave the new facility welcome to Slaton as officials of the Chamber of Commerce conducted the activities. Mr. and Mrs. Ledbetter and children Sherrol, 10, and Dennis, 13, and Mrs. Patsy Hopper and other Dairy Queen employees

were on hand. Ledbetter stressed that cleanliness is one thing he insists on in the operation of the facility. He noted that the Dairy Queen is larger than most operations of its type and offers an expanded menu.

Contractor for the building, which is about 2000 square feet, was J. D. Hunter of Lubbock. Cost of the overall facility was approximately \$100,000. Ledbetter said the Dairy Queen would employ about 16 to 20 persons with a payroll over \$20,000 per year.

An outside picnic area will be constructed soon, he said. The facility is located on the north side of Hwy. 41 about a quarter mile west of its intersection with U. S. 84. It will be open every day.

Integrated Phone Listings Planned

Slaton's telephone numbers will be integrated with Lubbock numbers in the new phone book coming out in December. It was decided Friday, as what had been a controversial subject dissolved into a peaceful settlement at a meeting of phone company officials, city officials and businessmen.

Toll-free service will be available only to Lubbock and Southland numbers, Bob McNamara, Southwestern Bell District manager from Lubbock, told the group. McNamara and Les Stevens, phone company manager from Plainview, hosted the meeting.

Mayor Bland Tomlinson, who earlier had requested opinions of residents regarding possible alternatives in the listing procedure, requested that the numbers be intermingled, as most apparently preferred.

City Police Chief Resigns

Glenn W. Farmer, chief of police for the City of Slaton for nearly a year and a half, has submitted his resignation to city commissioners who accepted it Tuesday night. Chief Farmer said his resignation would be effective Aug. 15. He is leaving the department after five years to accept a teaching position in the Law Enforcement Program of Wayland Baptist College, Plainview. He said he and his wife, Pat, would remain in Slaton for some time, but eventually would move to Plainview.

Joining the force in September 1967 after moving from Greeley, Colo., Farmer first was sergeant, then assistant chief, then chief of police since March 1971. He will receive a bachelor of arts degree in law enforcement from Wayland College after completing work this week, and is the first graduate of the law enforcement program from any college in the South Plains area. He

explained that the law enforcement degree program at Wayland is a pilot program for the area.

In his letter to the commission, Farmer said: "I have more than enjoyed working for the department and the City of Slaton these past five years and it is with feelings of regret that I am leaving. My heart has been filled with good feelings and warm experiences while serving the citizens of Slaton."

In other action Tuesday, the commissioners passed two resolutions. One requested the State Highway Dept. to give the City of Slaton a park next to the cemetery, to be used for additional cemetery lots. The other was a request that the highway department enforce re-

gulations regarding advertising signs on highways which run through the city.

Ambrosia Gonzales was spokesman for a group representing Our Lady of Guadalupe Church requesting blocking of a street in the vicinity of the church and also asking for use of the tennis courts in the park for a celebration Sept. 15-16. Action on these items was deferred until the next meeting.

Commissioners also heard a complaint from a Slaton resident that a city policeman had used unnecessary force in making an arrest, and said they would investigate.

Otis Neill, mayor pro tem, presided in the absence of Mayor Bland Tomlinson. All other commissioners were present.

Slaton Man Is Fatally Shot

A 55-year-old Slaton man was fatally shot early Monday afternoon in south Slaton and a Slaton woman remained in county jail Wednesday after being charged with murder with malice in connection with the shooting.

Joe D. Burleson, 215 S. 12th St., was shot once in the abdomen and was dead on arrival at Mercy Hospital. Officials said a .22 caliber bullet apparently severed a vein causing massive internal bleeding. Burleson had been a heavy equipment operator in road construction work.

Bernice Cubit, 42, is being held in lieu of \$10,000 bond.

Officer Jerry Edwards of Slaton Police Dept. said he was

cruising on routine patrol in the vicinity of New Mexico and Geneva Sts. a few minutes after noon Monday when he heard what he believed to be two gunshots. He saw large crowd a block north, about the 1100 block of East Dayton St. He arrested the suspect at the scene and took custody of a .22 pistol.

Funeral services for Burleson were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in Trinity Evangelical Methodist Church with Rev. L. L. Frenke, pastor, and Kenneth Burnett, minister of the Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under the direction of Englands.

He is survived by a son, Jackie C. Burleson of Anson;

a daughter, Mrs. Jo Ann Gentry of the Posey Community; his mother, Mrs. Willie L. Burleson of Slaton; a sister, Mrs. Lou Oates of Slaton and four grandchildren.

Measles vaccine or history of illness through age 11. Rubella vaccine through age 11.

Each student must have a record from a doctor, health clinic or school.

Students whose records of inoculations are on file with the school need not obtain new record of inoculations.

Kindergarten and first grade -- 1 p.m.; second grade-- 2 p.m.; third grade-- 3 p.m.

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Livestock Inspection Reinstated... Stocks of Grain Show Increase... Wool Production Declines... Early Stalk Destruction Urged... Pecan Producers To Vote.

LIVESTOCK moving from Texas, Oklahoma, Puerto Rico and parts of Arizona, California and New Mexico must be inspected and certified free of screwworms before being moved interstate.

The regulations will be in effect through Nov. 30 of this year, and from April 15 through Nov. 30 in future years until the present screwworm infestation is overcome.

State and federal veterinarians, state and federal livestock inspectors and accredited veterinarians are authorized to make the necessary inspections, supervise pesticide applications and issue shipping certificates.

TEXAS stocks of grain in all positions as of July 1 are estimated at 190 million bushels. This compares with 141 million bushels a year ago. The largest increase is in sorghum stocks followed by wheat, corn and rye. Stocks of oats, barley and soybeans are down from a year ago.

Sorghum stocks are estimated at 129 million bushels compared with 86.9 million bushels in 1971.

Nationwide, large increases were noted in corn, sorghum grain, wheat and rye. Stocks of corn, oats, barley, and sorghum totaled 81.7 million tons, 35 percent more than 1971.

Feed grain disappearance during April-June totaled 44 million tons, 17 percent more than for the same quarter in 1971.

WOOL production in Texas for 1972 is estimated at 29,765,000 pounds, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is down two percent from last year's production of 30,397,000 pounds.

Spring shown wool is expected to account for 83 percent of the total wool production.

Nationwide, wool production is expected to be down four percent from the 1971 production of 159,084,000 pounds.

The Texas lamb crop is now estimated at 2,302,000 head, up one percent from last year. Nationwide, the lamb crop is estimated to be down four percent from 1971.

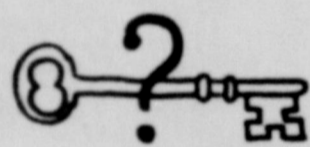
EARLY destruction of cotton stalks in the Lower Rio Grande Valley as well as throughout all of the state is urged. Mandatory deadline is Aug. 31 in the Lower Rio Grande Valley counties of Cameron, Willacy and certain portions of Hidalgo and Starr counties under the pink bollworm act.

Early destruction of stalks will help prevent build-ups of pink bollworms and other cotton insects for the 1973 crop.

HOG CHOLERA outbreaks in Texas and throughout the nation continue to hamper efforts in the final stage of hog cholera eradication.

Fifty cases have been reported in Texas since late last year. Federal quarantines are now in effect in all of seven Texas counties-Dawson, Harris, Jim Wells, Moore, Nueces, Terry and Webb-and parts of Bexar, Mitchell and Nolan counties.

PECAN producers in Texas will vote this fall on a proposed check-off referendum being conducted by the Texas Pecan Growers Association. Proposed assessment will not exceed 50 cents per 100 pounds of pecans. Money will be used to finance a program of production, marketing and use of pecans.

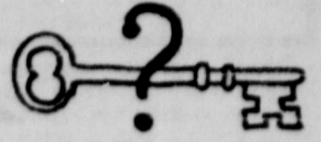

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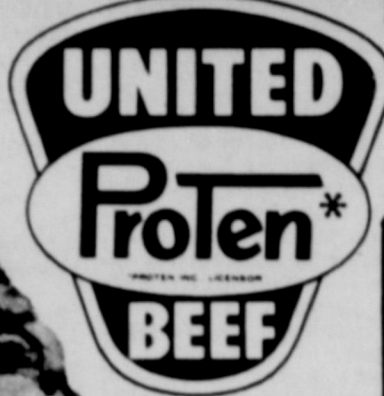

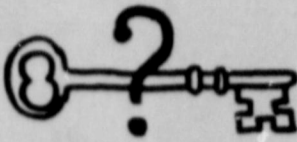

Cadet Curry, a student at the University of Houston, Houston, Tex., is one of more than 10,000 students attending Army ROTC Training at six installations in the U.S.

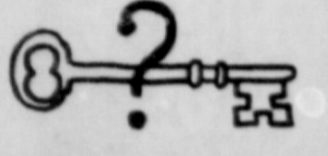

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR-61)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

"(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.

"(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.

"(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants

shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.

"(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections.

"(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.

"(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Rep-

resentatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller for each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

The Seeing Lens

A new device which magnifies light up to 25,000 times and "sees in the dark" is being used by police across the nation to stop nighttime crime.

CONSUMERS' CORNER

Mobile Home Mortgages
The Government National Mortgage Association of the Housing and Urban Development Department has introduced a new finance program to make mobile-home loans more widely available and to make loan terms easier to meet.

The program permits savings and loan associations and other lending institutions to sell mobile-home mortgages that are insured by the Federal Housing Administration to investors. This makes mobile-home loans more attractive to many lending institutions because by being permitted to sell the mortgages, they will have the funds to make more loans to mobile-home buyers. The program also permits loan repayments to be spread out over longer periods, enabling many consumers to buy mobile homes who otherwise could not have afforded them.

In addition, as more mobile homes are financed by FHA-insured loans, more consumers will be protected by FHA minimum property standards, requiring sound construction for mobile homes.

1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
2 cups flour
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
1 cup strawberry preserves

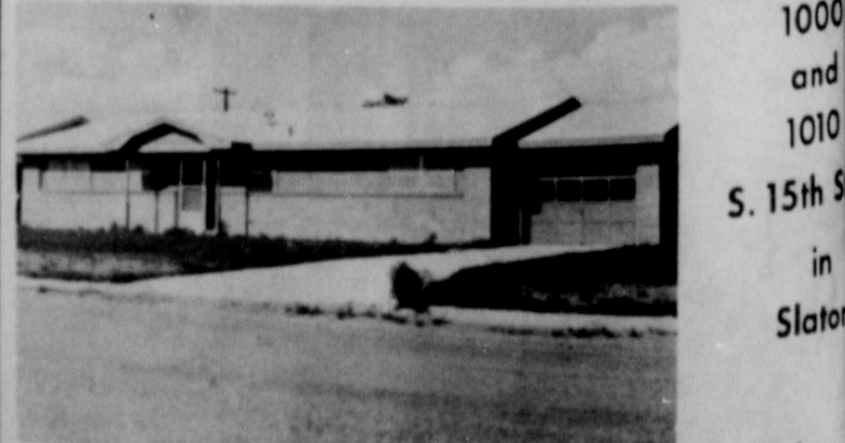

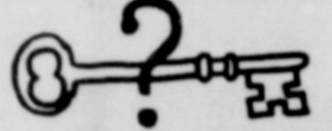
